"So few truly original figures exist in pop music that Dan Hicks should be a national treasure." -San Francisco Chronicle

Dan Hicks began his career as a drummer in the seminal 1960's San Francisco rock band, The Charlatans. Now with his band, Dan Hicks and the Hot Licks, he is widely acknowledged as one of the defining figures in American roots music. Having earned a reputation as true original with his signature eclecticism and humor, Hicks continues to carve his way through a number of genres, from proto-psychedelia to Western Swing and jazz, from Tin Pan Alley to country blues—all the while staying true to his own muse.

The group recorded five groundbreaking and Billboard-charting records for the Columbia, Blue Thumb and Warner Brow. Labels. During their touring years, Hicks appeared on the cover of *Rolling Stone* magazine three times. Getting back into the swing of regularly recording and touring, he has proven once again that the king of hipster-chic will always be Dan Hicks. Throughout the 1960s and 1970s there was no one who sounded at all like Dan Hicks, and remarkably, nearly 40 years later, there still isn't.

In the wake of World War II, while Albuquerque experienced a period of rapid growth and change, its artists found a new artistic voice. Join Bill Peterson as he discusses the arrival of international Modernism in Albuquerque at mid-century and its impact on the burgeoning art scene of subsequent decades.

Community Cinema and the KiMo Theatre present a film a film by Llewellyn Smith, Christine Herbes-Sommers, and Kelly Thomson that explores racism in America.

Using the story of Gunnar Myrdal's 1944 investigation of Jim Crow racism as a springboard, *American Denial* explores the power of unconscious biases and how the ideals of liberty, equality, and justice still impact notions of race and class today.

Follow the story of foreign researcher and Nobel Laureate Gunnar Myrdal whose study, An American Dilemma (1944), provided a provocative inquiry into the dissonance between stated beliefs as a society and what is perpetuated and allowed in the name of those beliefs. His inquiry into the United States' racial psyche becomes a lens for modern inquiry into how denial, cognitive dissonance, and unrecognized, unconscious attitudes continue to dominate racial dynamics in American life. The film's unusual narrative sheds a unique light on the unconscious political and moral world of modern Americans. Archival footage, newsreels, nightly news reports, and rare southern home movies from the '30s and '40s thread through the story, as well as psychological testing into racial attitudes from research footage, websites, and YouTube films.

Hear from experts—historians, psychologists, sociologists and Myrdal's daughters—all filmed directly to camera. Witnesses work to exhume unconscious feelings Americans have about themselves and others—fascinated by the Myrdal question, and by how much true thinking and feeling unfolds in social contexts in an unconscious mode. What are the implications for individual responsibility and social justice in democracies like America's?

Community Cinema is a groundbreaking public education and civic engagement initiative featuring monthly screenings of films for the Emmy Award-winning PBS series 'Independent Lens'. Every month between September and June, Community Cinema brings together leading organizations, community members and public television stations to learn, discuss and get involved in today's critical social issues. Albuquerque Museum VISUALIZING ALBUQUERQUE

On the Map: Unfolding Albuquerque Art + Design is a city-wide cultural partnership that celebrates the art of central New Mexico by an array of partnering organizations. Starting in January 2015 and continuing through the spring and summer, public institutions join private galleries to present exhibitions, lectures, performances and educational programming that investigate the diverse art of the greater Albuquerque region. This event places a comprehensive focus on art and design created in the Middle Rio Grande Basin, contemporary to the earliest aesthetic objects created in the region.

At the heart of this collaboration, the Albuquerque Museum's exhibition titled *Visualizing Albuquerque*, curated by Joseph Traugott, will investigate the unique history and present of central New Mexico art and serve as an umbrella for institutional partners. Traugott says, "Albuquerque artists found their own artistic voice after World War II and transformed a western boom town into a thriving art center. This exhibition demonstrates how an influx of modern-minded Californians moved to Albuquerque and changed the city by unleashing the creativity of local artists. The resulting abstract works broke with traditional New Mexico scenes. By including women and their concerns, ethnic perspectives, popular culture subjects, and political content after 1980, Albuquerque artists synthesized an aesthetic that shunned commercial trends. Visualizing Albuquerque revels in the region's diverse artists and reveals how their distinctive fusions have bridged aesthetic divides and cultural rifts." The exhibition will close on May 10th.

WORKS ON PAPER GALLERY: FEATURING FREDERICK HAMMERSLEY

Internationally renowned artist and longtime Albuquerque resident Frederick Hammersley was most famous for his abstract paintings and prints, and as one of the four "Abstract Classicists" celebrated in a 1959 exhibition of that same name. In conjunction with *Gods and Heroes: Masterpieces from the École des Beaux Arts*, the Albuquerque Museum is proud to present a selection of Hammersley's works on paper from a recent gift from the Frederick Hammersley Foundation. Open until May 31, 2015.

ALL OVER THE MAP: THE ONGOING DIALOGUE OF PUBLIC ART

All Over the Map: The Ongoing Dialogue of Public Art is a joint exhibition with the City of Albuquerque and the Bernalillo County Public Art Programs. The exhibition highlights the past 50 years of public art in the region, including an interactive, forward thinking engagement component which will seek public input and feedback on what public art should or could be in the future. Through April 15, 2015.

OPENING FEBRUARY 21ST: RAD GADGETS

What the (bleep) is that? A Rad Gadget! *Rad Gadgets* is a fun look at off-the-wall vintage tools and equipment from the Museum collection. The exhibit is presented in the newly named William A. + Loretta Barrett Keleher Gallery just a few weeks before the opening of the new history exhibition.

Rad Gadgets will inspire visitors to explore the Museum's collection of antique and vintage gadgets, with an eye toward recycling. The exhibit also explores the notion of "up-cycling" – the practice of making recycled parts more environmentally responsible, and often, beautiful. Particularly trendy is the notion of using Victorian-era industrial design as inspiration for contemporary Steampunk art and fashion.

Rad Gadgets features vintage tools and equipment, including recent gifts from the Hays family, Keleher family, Bob Myers, PNM Forerunners, and others. The collection ranges from simple and strange to quirky and complicated. No single object will be identified upon first glance – you'll have to guess what it is!

Visitors will be able draw fantasy gadgets and vote for their favorite gadget. Programs will explore the role historic tools, equipment and their intriguing parts play in fashion design, recycled art, and Steampunk art. Keep an eye out on the calendar for opportunities to play, create, and recycle! Open through August 1, 2015.

Permanent Exhibition (East Gallery)

A permanent art exhibition highlighting a significant and museum-owned works from the late 19th century to the present day, including some that have never before been viewed by the public.

BALLOON MUSEUM

CHILDREN OF WAR, VOICES FOR PEACE

Back by popular demand, this touching exhibition features a little-known footnote in the history of World War II. Japanese schoolchildren were recruited to help create "Fugos"—giant balloons that were armed with bombs and launched across the Pacific.

The only enemy-caused deaths on the North American continent in World War II occurred from the detonation of one of these bombs. The exhibition features the story of one Japanese schoolgirl who later learned that her contribution to her country's safety was an instrument of death, and of her subsequent efforts to promote peace.

CHILDREN'S PEACE STATUE

The Children's Peace Statue is a monument designed and funded entirely by children. It stands as a symbol of hope for a peaceful future. In the fall of 1989, children of Arroyo del Oso Elementary School in Albuquerque, New Mexico were studying the Arms Race. The children decided that one solution to the problem of war would be to teach young people to work for peace. During their studies, the students learned the story of school children in Japan who built a monument, the Genbaku No Ko No Zo Statue for Children Who Were Victims of the Atomic Bombs. Inspired by the story, the children formed the Kids' Committee for the Children's Peace Statue and made plans to design and build a peace monument of their own.

FAI BALLOONING COMMISSION INTERNATIONAL HALL OF FAME

The Hall of Fame features some 40 existing inductees and recognizes people who have made significant contributions to aerostation. In a private induction ceremony for media and invited guests on September 30, 2011, the following were inducted into the Hall of Fame: Ron Clark, a member of the crew to make the first balloon crossing of the Pacific Ocean; Larry Newman, a co-inventor of the ultra-light airplane and co-captain on the first manned balloon crossing of the Pacific Ocean; Rocky Aoki, a restaurateur and a record-setting balloonist in crossing the Pacific Ocean in a helium balloon; and Olivier Roux Devillas, the founder of the French Aeronautical Federation and competitive balloonist. Past inductees with a New Mexico connection include Sid Cutter, the Balloon Fiesta co-founder, and Maxie Anderson and Ben Abruzzo, two of the three balloonists of the first trans-Atlantic balloon flight.

KIMO THEATRE

OPENING FEBRUARY 6TH: THE IMPETUS SEEKERS" INTEGRAL INNOVATIONS OF PUEBLO WOMEN ARTISTS

Part of a larger city-wide art project, "On the Map," the exhibition opening at the KiMo Theatre Art Gallery on Friday, February 6th focuses on the timeline affiliated with the visual and artistic history of Pueblo women artists. A free public opening reception is scheduled for 5 – 8 p.m. on opening day. The dance group Zuni Pueblo Olla Dancers will perform during the reception.

The story begins with the period of renewed interest in traditional art works constructed within the curriculum of the Indian Boarding Schools, the Dorothy Dunn Art Studio classes, and the Work Progress Administration (WPA) art programs, to the current pedagogy, dialogues, and work of contemporary Pueblo women artists.

Pueblo women have endured as essential keepers of family and community traditions, cultural identity, attitudes, and values. These beliefs sustain their passion and love, which are most often expressed through their creative art forms.

Curator Deborah A. Jojola has assembled the works of nine artists, some with national and international reputations. All exemplify the tradition of encouraging and empowering young artists, continuing a rich history of art, and those who are contemporary are among the most prolific and productive artists working today. They include: Tonita Pena, Qyah Ah (Pink Shell) Cochiti, San Idlefonso Pueblo, 1893–1949; Lucy M. Lewis, Acoma Pueblo, 1898–1992; Helen Cordero, Cochiti Pueblo, 1915–1994; Pablita Velarde, Tse Tsan (Golden Dawn), Santa Clara Pueblo, 1918–2006; Helen Hardin, Tsa-Sah-Wee-Eh (Little Standing Spruce), Santa Clara Pueblo, 1943–1984; Margaret Bagshaw, Santa Clara Pueblo, 1964–; Glendora Fragua, Jemez Pueblo – 1958-; Deborah A Jojola, Isleta/Jemez Pueblo, 1962–; and Marla Allison, Laguna Pueblo. 1980–.
