## Animal Welfare Department Strives to Help Keep Pets Where They Belong...In Their Homes.



The Albuquerque Animal Welfare Department wants to help people keep their pets. To this end, we have developed a program called Operation Keep Your Pet to help citizens find solutions to the reasons they might consider surrendering their animal to the shelter. Keeping a pet helps both that animal and those already living in the shelter. The truth is there aren't enough homes for them all. The City shelter is consistently at or over-capacity with animals in need of a forever home. Surrendering an animal to the shelter should be viewed only as a last resort.

Many animals brought to the shelter are unplanned litters of puppies and kittens. While this is a consistent problem in our community and communities nationwide there is a solution! Spaying or neutering your pet is the number one way you can help all animals including those already living in the shelter. Remember, each puppy or kitten surrendered to the shelter takes away a potential home for another animal. Moreover, the health and behavior benefits of spay/neuter make an even stronger case. The City offers no charge spay/neuter services to low to moderate income citizens. Other organizations in the area offer low-cost programs as well. Animals are often surrendered for behavior problems such as housetraining and litter box issues, escaping the yard, destructive behaviors and a lack of manners. The City has created a "hotline" for behavior concerns so that citizens can reach out for solutions before it comes to the point of surrender. Email <**behaviorhelpline@cabq.gov**>and a behaviorist will respond quickly.

We often receive animals because their owner is moving into a new place that won't allow pets. Moving is stressful even in the best of circumstances, so give yourself extra time to find a residence where pets are permitted. Offer to introduce your pet to your new landlord, provide vet records and training certificates. References from past landlords can help show your new landlord that you are a responsible pet owner.

If you are moving to a new state your pet can go with you! See that your pet is wearing an ID tag with current information, including your cell phone number. Find pet friendly hotels along your route and reserve rooms ahead of time. Make every effort to confine your pet in a room while you are loading up the moving van. The hustle and bustle can frighten an animal and confinement can help reduce some of the stress and prevent accidental escape. On driving day see that your animal is in a secure, well-ventilated carrier. Larger dogs should be leashed and under control at all times. Give lots of potty breaks and fresh water along the way.

When options have run out consider finding your dog or cat another home instead of surrendering him to the shelter. This is less stressful for the animal, allows you to play a part in uniting him with a new family and makes additional space available for other pets more immediately at risk. Take photos and show off your pet's most endearing qualities. Write a story about your pet including the reason your pet needs a new home, the kind of home he or she would do well in, some funny behaviors and the thing you love most about your pet. Ask people you know and trust like friends, family, co-workers and neighbors. Evaluate potential adopters. Ask questions to help ensure that he will be well cared for, take your time in considering your pet's new owner and follow-up on the adoption to see how your pet is doing in his new home. Make sure if your animal is already spayed or neutered before rehoming. This will make someone more likely to want to give your pet a new home and help solve the overpopulation problem.

No owned animal should have to spend one single day in a strange and confusing place with unfamiliar people, smells and animals. It is a very stressful experience for an animal to have to be walked away from his owner and all he knows. Therefore, surrendering an animal to the shelter should be viewed only as a last resort. Do right by your pet, keep him! You'll both be glad you did.

# RIDE's Fleet and *66 Late Night* Reprising Friday and Saturday Service During Summer Months

Starting in June, Albuquerque residents will be seeing a new kind of ABQ RIDE bus; a brand new bus sporting an entirely different look from what's currently on the street. Its hallmarks are a new, bright paint scheme with an homage to local land-marks and a new ABQ RIDE logo to match.

On Thursday, May 15, 2014, Mayor Richard J. Berry and ABQ RIDE Director Bruce Rizzieri unveiled that new look and logo on one of ABQ RIDE's new buses at Civic Plaza in Downtown Albuquerque. The new vehicles are *New Flyer Xcelsior*®, 40-foot, heavy duty buses, fueled by compressed natural gas ("CNG"). They are part of a 21 bus purchase in January, 2014 from *New Flyer*.

"The new look of the ABQ RIDE buses represents an evolution in modern public transportation services, while still honoring Albuquerque's history by depicting locales that have made us internationally famous," said Mayor Richard J. Berry. "We believe the revamped logo will appeal to a new generation of Transit riders."

Eight scenes from around Albuquerque are featured on the new buses: The Kimo Theater, the Alvarado Transportation Center, the Sandia Peak Tramway, Balloon Fiesta, San Felipe de Neri Church, the Petroglyphs National Monument, Route 66 and a UNM Lobo. The sides of these buses also depict maps lines and points that during nighttime travel become captivating, reflective highlights.



The *New Flyers*, with all their different components, cost about \$485,000 apiece. They were paid for with a split of 83% Federal money and 17% local funding. Each new bus can seat a total of 39 passengers and can accommodate up to two wheelchairs.

Approximately 85% of ABQ RIDE's fleet is comprised of *New Flyer* buses (116 out of 137 buses in the fleet). Not only is this ABQ RIDE's first Xcelsior<sup>®</sup> model, it's also ABQ RIDE's first *New Flyer* buses built with a CNG propulsion system. The new *Xcelsior*<sup>®</sup> will gradually replace about half of ABQ RIDE's Series 300 buses. The 300's were originally purchased in 1996-1997 and also burn compressed natural gas.

"This purchase offered the best bus available for the most economical price," said Bruce Rizzieri, Director of ABQ RIDE. "Not only is it a cost effective purchase but passengers will notice a lot of enjoyable features from the imaginative paint scheme to the smoother ride."

On May 30, 2014, ABQ RIDE reprised an old program, 66 Late Night which extends weekend service on Central Avenue. It makes it that much easier going to and staying later at fun spots along Central Avenue during summer weekends.



The *66 Late Night* extends by one hour service on the #66-Central with the last trips ending at approximately 1:30 a.m. on Fridays and Saturdays until September 20, 2014.

You can save a lot of money by riding the #66 on the summer weekends and leaving your car behind," said Bruce Rizzieri, Director of ABQ RIDE. "That's because 66 Late Night can take you to almost any of Albuquerque's summer hot spots."

66 Late Night uses Route #66 Central buses, which run from ABQ RIDE's Park & Ride at Tramway and Wenonah all the way to the Central and Unser Transit Center. Riders along Central can access four of Albuquerque's main entertainment districts Old Town, Downtown, Nob Hill and East Central by using the #66 and do so at later hours.

*66 Late Night* runs every 30 minutes, with the last pickups through Downtown at about 1 a.m. The fare is \$1 per trip.

"66 Late Night is one of the affordable ways you can keep your family entertained this summer," said Rizzieri. "It is one of the services that ABQ RIDE operates to make sure the travel needs of Albuquerque's residents are met."

With summer upon us, it's time to check our homes for any needed repairs that the winter weather may have caused and for any upcoming repairs that may be expected. If you are a homeowner and your home is in need of repair, the City of Albuquerque may be able to help. Many homeowners are struggling to make necessary repairs to their homes that can result in serious structural damage or health and safety hazards in the future. Most repairs, if not addressed immediately end up costing us more money and require additional repairs that could have been avoided.

The Home Owner Rehabilitation Program provides 0% interest loans to qualified homeowners. These loans allow homeowners to address code violations that make homes unsafe, unhealthy and sometimes unlivable. Some of these loans are forgivable and some may need to be paid back depending on the home owner's level of income.

What Home Improvements are Eligible?

Repairs include, but are not limited to:

- Electrical, Heating or Plumbing Installations.
- Hot Water Heaters.
- Roofs.
- Replacement Windows.
- Structural Damage.
- Insulation.
- Handicap Accessible Bathrooms.

#### Who is Eligible?

Generally, you may qualify for a housing rehabilitation loan if:

- You own and occupy a home within the municipal • boundaries of the City of Albuquerque and you have lived in the house as your primary residence for at least one year prior to application.
- Your home has code violation(s).
- Your property taxes are paid up-to-date.
- Your household income does not exceed the federal guidelines.

The 2014 Income Guidelines will be in effect until the US Housing and Urban Development issues the 2015 Guidelines which normally occurs in March of each year.

The Office of Neighborhood Revitalization staff will examine your income and property to determine if you and your house qualify for housing rehabilitation loan assistance.

Funds are currently available however, they are limited. We suggest you contact the Home Owner Rehabilitation Program at your earliest convenience for further information to determine if you are eligible to participate in this Program.

If you have new owners and/or renters in the neighborhood here are some reminders to keep your association looking good:

- Û Call **311** for "large item pickup" of an item(s) you want to go. Don't just put it on the curb.
- Û Solid Waste Management Department asks that trash/recycling carts be off the street 12 hours after pickup. They often get hit by traffic or vandals.
- $\hat{U}$  Control your weed today or they'll be at a neighbor's tomorrow.
- Û Resist doing long-term parking of cars/RV's/trailers and large junk items in yards out front.
- $\hat{U}$  If you have a dead tree cut it or ask your landlord to do before it becomes the cause of a fire.

## **City of Albuquerque Fire Restrictions**

The City of Albuquerque imposed Stage II Fire Restrictions on June 2, 2014. An Open Burn Ban will also be in effect within the municipal areas of the city.

Although rain has recently fallen, extreme fire conditions exist throughout the Albuquerque Metro Area as evidenced by current and predicted fuel conditions, fire behavior, weather and drought. Stage II Restrictions are necessary to decrease the likelihood of human-caused wildfires in order to protect the public's health and safety and valuable natural resources.

The fire restrictions apply to all Open Space areas within the municipal boundaries of the City of Albuquerque to include the West Mesa Grass Lands, the Bosque and the Open Space Areas of the Sandia Foothills.

#### Stage I & II Restrictions prohibit:

- Building, maintaining, attending or using a fire, campfire, charcoal, coal or stove fire.
- Smoking.
- Possessing, discharging or using any kind of fireworks or other pyrotechnic device.
- Possessing or using a motor vehicle off any publicly designated roadways, except when parking in developed parking lots or at developed trailheads.
- Operating a chainsaw or spark emitting equipment.
- Operating any internal or external combustion engine.
- Welding or operating acetylene or other torch with an open flame.
- Camping or overnight stay.

All Open Space areas within the municipal boundaries remain open. Those enjoying the Open Space areas are required to remain on established trails, paths and levee roads.

#### **Open Burn Ban**

Open burning has been banned in public and private outdoor areas within the municipal boundaries of the City of Albuquerque. Examples include but are not limited to:

- 1. Open burning.
- 2. Bonfires.
- 3. Recreational Fires.
- 4. Use of Model Rockets.
- 5. Open Flame Devices.

Burning may be done in enclosed chamber devices such as cooking/outdoor grills.

#### **Penalties and Enforcement**

Any person found violating the fire restrictions ordinance shall be charged with a petty misdemeanor. Upon conviction, each violation shall be punishable by a fine up to five hundred dollars (\$500) and/or imprisonment up to ninety (90) days.

The Albuquerque Fire Department and the Albuquerque Police Department's Open Space Officers are responsible for enforcing the Fire Restriction Ordinance. AFD and APD Open Space Officers will be increasing their patrols beginning June 2, 2014, until conditions improve.

#### **Reporting Suspicious Activity**

The Bosque, Foothills, Open Space Areas and the Sandia Ranger District are your lands. You have a stake in what happens on them. Illegal activities can take place anywhere and at anytime but usually occur later in the evening or on the weekends. If you see an activity that you think is suspicious we encourage you to report it.

- What to look for when reporting suspicious activity:
- Any spark or light in the Bosque, Foothills, Open Space Areas or Sandia Ranger District.
- Camping or Smoking.
- Anyone damaging any Open Space site or trail or deliberately setting a fire.

If you witness suspicious activity, call **505-242-COPS**. When you report a tip provide information such as:

- 1. Description of the person(s) and of their vehicle.
- 2. Registration or distinguishing logo (car rental identifier, license plate).
- 3. What they are doing, when and where.

Do not approach them! If there is a fire or someone is in danger, call **911**.

#### Czech Route 66 Association visit to ABQ

In May members of the Czech Route 66 Association spent a few days in Albuquerque as part of a cross-country tour of Route 66. In addition to having a great time riding motorcycles and enjoying our local culture they filmed a documentary about Route 66 which is a big tourist destination for European travelers.

In Albuquerque the group spent some time at the Enchanted Trails RV Park and Trading Post owned by local Route 66 aficionado Vickie Ashcraft. On Sunday morning May 25, the Czechs were greeted by some Albuquerque locals and received an escort from a local car club to their next stop in Moriarty.

The *Route 66 Economic Impact Study* (2011) conducted by Rutgers University found that travelers spend an estimated aggregate of \$38 million dollars per year on Route 66 in the U.S. Many of those dollars are spent on lodging, camping, food and drink, airfare, automotive expenses and entertainment. The study says, "The Mother Road nurtures the economic pocket book of jobs, income and wealth as we all the heart."

With tourism as one of New Mexico's key sources of revenue it makes sense to invest in Route 66. Along Route 66, Albuquerque is known for Historic Old Town, the KiMo Theatre, Nob Hill and Museums. Plus we have great events and attractions such as The Albuquerque Balloon Fiesta, the ABQ BioPark and of course green chile.

We learned from the Czechs that Route 66 is still a great destination for tourists who come to our city and stay in our motels eat in our restaurants and enjoy our culture. In Albuquerque we are looking at ways to revitalize the Route and roll out the red carpet to visitors as well as locals.

The City Planning Department is working on the Route 66 Action Plan, a long-term plan to bring the 'Mother Road' back to Albuquerque and promote it as a destination for visitors as well as a great place to live, work and play.



The Plan focuses on five keys areas and what we can do as a community to share this great asset.

- Historical Legacy
  Infrastructure and Transportation
- Public Spaces
  Business and Development
  Promotion and Tourism

The Route 66 Action Plan has been presented to the Environmental Planning Commission (EPC) and they have recommended it the City Council. The Plan will be presented to Council in early Fall.

The **48-Hour Rule of the EPC**: All written materials and other documents shall be submitted to the Planning Department no later than **9 a.m.** on the  $2^{nd}$  **Tuesday** of the Public Hearing Week. For an Appeal Hearing – no communication with EPC is allowed within five days of the Public Hearing.

In order to make maximum use of the following information – please note:

- Scan the entire list to see if your neighborhood association has a case this month.
- The name and phone number of the developer/agent is listed so that you can easily contact them should you have any questions.
- The assigned staff planner is identified with each agenda item should you need additional information (*i.e., check on the actual placement of your case on the agenda*). All staff may be reached at 505-924-3860.
- On the day of the EPC Public Hearing, call the Planning Department at 505-924-3860 and the receptionist will give you the status of the EPC Public Hearing.
- Staff Reports are available at the Planning Department beginning at 3 p.m. on the 1<sup>st</sup> Thursday prior to the EPC Public Hearing.

On the 1<sup>st</sup> Thursday of each month, the EPC has a Study Session to review the applications scheduled for the all-day Public Hearing which occurs on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Thursday of each month.

As with the Public Hearing, **the public is invited** to attend the Study Sessions, however, *Study Sessions do not provide an open forum. Discussion is limited to staff and the EPC.* Study Sessions regularly begin at **3 p.m.** in the Planning Department Hearing Room, Plaza Del Sol Building. Please call the Planning Department at **505-924-3860** to confirm the Study Session schedule will happen at the times listed, as time adjustments are made occasionally.

## **Parliamentary Pointers**

## <u>Quorum</u>

"Do we have a quorum?" asks an organization member. "What is our quorum?" asks another member. "What is a quorum?" asks a new member, unfamiliar with meeting rules.

Webster's New World College Dictionary, 4<sup>th</sup> edition, 2000 states that a quorum is "the minimum number of members required to be present at an assembly or meeting before it can validly proceed to transact business."

*Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised, 11<sup>th</sup> Edition,* p. 21 states: "The minimum number of members who must be present at the meetings of a deliberative assembly for business to be validly transacted is the quorum of the assembly. The requirement of a quorum is a protection against totally unrepresentative action in the name of the body by an unduly small number of persons."

The quorum for a monthly meeting, board meeting or executive committee meeting is usually stated in the bylaws. The bylaws may state a definite number that constitute a quorum. Occasionally bylaws state that a percentage of the membership constitutes a quorum. The disadvantage of this is that if membership fluctuates, the number must be computed dependent upon present membership.

The decision that must be made when establishing a quorum is.... What is the number of members that can be expected to be present and make decisions for the membership? There are organizations that have over 100 members but few turn out for monthly/yearly meetings. The quorum can be 10 or 20 people if that is the largest number that can reasonably be depended upon to be present at a meeting.

Bylaws cannot be suspended; therefore, if the quorum is to be changed, the bylaws must be amended. This is done by giving notice in a meeting announcement or at the meeting before the amendment is to be adopted. It is recommended that the motion to amend be made to "strike out" the stated quorum and "insert" the recommended quorum.

In the absence of a quorum, there are four actions that can be taken.

- 1. The meeting be adjourned.
- 2. A member can make the motion to *Fix the Time to Which to Adjourn*. If adopted, this motion makes it possible to have an adjourned meeting to carry out the agenda of this meeting; the adjourned meeting would follow the same agenda set for this meeting. The adjourned meeting must be held before the next regular meeting would be scheduled.
- 3. The chairman/president can state that there will be a recess until enough members arrive to have a quorum.
- 4. Steps can be taken to obtain a quorum; members can be called and reminded of the meeting. Business can be transacted when a quorum is reached.

Information can be reviewed in Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised, 11th Edition, (RONR) pp. 347-349.


