Pre-Applications for The Section 8 Housing Choice Voucher Remain Restricted

NEW: Pre-Applications will be taken online only at **<www.abqha.org**> starting on Tuesday, October 21, 2014. Applications will no longer be taken in paper format. Written paper applications will not be accepted. All applicants must apply through **<www.abqha.org**>. AHA has two computers available to complete your Pre-Application. These terminals are available by appointment only on Wednesdays and Fridays from 9 a.m. - 12 p.m. and 1 p.m. to 4 p.m. Please **505-764-3942** to schedule an appointment. Walk-ins will not be accepted.

IMPORTANT: You are no longer required to visit the Albuquerque Housing Authority Office at 1840 University Boulevard SE to apply for housing nor is supporting documentation required for your Pre-Application. Your Pre-Application may be completed anytime from October 21 through December 22, 2014 through an Internet connected computer or suitable smartphone at <**www.abqha.org**>. Alist of **FREE** and publicly accessible computers is available at the Albuquerque Housing Authority Office 1840 University Boulevard SE or at <**www.abqha.org**>. If you are a homeowner and your home is in need of repair, the City of Albuquerque may be able to help. With autumn upon us and winter just around the corner, it's time to check our homes for any needed repairs that the summer sun and rains may have caused. As you prepare for the cooler weather it is a good time to take a look at the condition of your heaters, roofs, plumbing, etc. Many homeowners are struggling to make necessary repairs to their homes that can result in serious structural damage or health and safety hazards in the future. Most repairs if not addressed immediately end up costing us more money and require additional repairs that could have been avoided.

The Home Owner Rehabilitation Program provides 0% interest loans to qualified homeowners. These loans allow homeowners to address code violations that make homes unsafe, unhealthy and sometimes unlivable. Some of these loans are forgivable and some may need to be paid back depending on the homeowner's level of income.

What Home Improvements are Eligible?

Repairs include, but are not limited to:

- Electrical, heating or plumbing installations
- Hot water heaters
- Roofs
- Replacement windows
- Structural damage
- Insulation
- Handicap accessible bathrooms

Who is Eligible?

Generally, you may qualify for a housing rehabilitation loan if:

• You own and occupy a home within the municipal boundaries of the City of Albuquerque and you have lived in the house as your primary residence for at least one year prior to application.

- Your home has code violation(s).
- Your property taxes are paid up-to-date.
- Your household income does not exceed the federal guidelines.

The Office of Neighborhood Revitalization staff will examine your income and property to determine if you and your house qualify for housing rehabilitation loan assistance.

Funds are currently available however, they are limited. In order to obtain an application you must attend an Orientation Meeting. Orientations are normally held four times a year. Project #1001620, 14EPC-40070: Proposed Text Amendments to the Zoning Code

At its regularly scheduled public hearing on November 13, 2014, the Environmental Planning Commission (EPC) will consider the addition of a new Section 14-16-3-24 to the Zoning Code, and an associated text amendment to Section 14-16-1-5, Definitions. The proposed text amendments would apply Citywide.

The proposed text amendments would: 1) regulate small lending businesses by requiring a horizontal separation distance of at least 1,500 feet between them as measured from property line to property line; and 2) add a definition for small lending businesses.

To sign up for the PNM Good Neighbor Fund you need to have:

- 1. Proof of income for everyone in the home.
- ID's for all adults living in the home, and ID's for children such as birth certificates or shot records for all children living in the home.
- Your current electric bill that has a past due portion on the bill or a disconnect notice, that is your name.
- If you have no income proof of receiving food stamps or TANF

A Message From Your City Council

Serve on the Police Oversight Board

The Police Oversight Board (POB) application process is open from Wednesday, October 15, 2014 at 8 a.m. until Sunday, November 30, 2014 at 5 p.m. The POB will provide policy guidance for and civilian oversight of the Albuquerque Police Department. Apply now to be considered to serve on this important board.

The POB is a nine-member board appointed by the City Council. Members will be appointed for up to three-year staggered terms and are eligible for reappointment for an additional full term. Any person residing within the City of Albuquerque may submit an application. Appointments are at the sole discretion of the City Council.

Applicants will be evaluated against the minimum qualifications described below and other criteria as described in the Police Oversight Ordinance. In evaluating your application, staff may request additional information and/or an interview as part of the evaluation process.

Minimum Qualifications

- Have not been employed by law enforcement for one year prior to appointment.
- Successfully pass a background check (form is available online: <http://www.cabq.gov/council/albuquerque-police-oversight-board-application>.
- Personal history lacking any pattern of unsubstantiated complaints against APD.
- A demonstrated ability to engage in mature, impartial decision making.
- A commitment to transparency and impartial decision making.
- Residency within the City of Albuquerque.
- There is no minimum required education or work experience.

For an Appeal Hearing – no communication with EPC is allowed within five days of the Public Hearing.

- The assigned staff planner is identified with each agenda item should you need additional information (*i.e., check on the actual placement of your case on the agenda*). All staff may be reached at 505-924-3860.
- On the day of the EPC Public Hearing, call the Planning Department at 505-924-3860 and the receptionist will give you the status of the EPC Public Hearing.
- Staff Reports are available at the Planning Department beginning at 3 p.m. on the 1st Thursday prior to the EPC Public Hearing.

On the 1st Thursday of each month, the EPC has a Study Session to review the applications scheduled for the all-day Public Hearing which occurs on the 2nd Thursday of each month.

As with the Public Hearing, **the public is invited** to attend the Study Sessions, however, *Study Sessions do not provide an open forum. ABQ RIDE

World-Renowned Author Rudolfo Anaya Inducted into Albuquerque's Wall of Fame and ABQ RIDE Breaks Artistic Ground with *Poetry Slam*

In many literary circles he's considered the godfather of contemporary Chicano literature; a groundbreaking author whose work not only evokes images of the llano (desert flatlands) of his youth, but also the simple, humble world of *la raza* in rural and urban New Mexico.

It is for these unique images and his celebrated body of work that world-renowned author Rudolfo Anaya was honored as the 2nd ever Inductee into the Albuquerque Wall of Fame on September 30, 2014. A plaque with his name and legacy was placed on the wall at the Alvarado Transportation Center. It is next to the Wall of Fame's first inductee, New Mexico and Southern California TV icon Dr. George Fischbeck.



"Our Wall of Fame honors people of achievement who have contributed positively toward making our community better," said Mayor Richard J. Berry. "Rudolfo Anaya through his descriptive narratives has positively opened up Albuquerque and New Mexico to the world."

Anaya was born in Pastura, New Mexico and raised in nearby Santa Rosa. As a teenager he moved with his family to Albuquerque and never left. He went from Albuquerque High to the University of New Mexico, where he completed his B.A. and two Master's Degrees. It was while teaching English in Albuquerque Public Schools that he began writing his seminal work, *Bless Me, Ultima*.

Despite the reluctance of mainstream publishing houses to publish it, *Bless Me, Ultima* went on to sell over 300,000 copies in 21 printings. It has become one of the most widely-acclaimed books in Chicano literature much less any genre of literature. It went on to become a full length motion picture in 2012.

Anaya taught at the University of New Mexico until 1993. It was during this time that his body of work grew, including such books as *Heart of Aztlán, Alburquerque, Zia Summer, Rio Grande Fall, Jalamanta: A Message from the Desert, Shaman Winter* and a collection of his works titled The Anaya Reader.

His career as an educator, his exposure to both joy and pain and the desire to connect with his own culture and heritage inspired a passion for writing that has brought him and his beloved New Mexico international fame and recognition. Yet he remains the educator, the poet and the wordsmith of his people.

"Rudolfo Anaya's work has brought worldwide attention to our state," said Bruce Rizzieri, Director of ABQ RIDE. "So now, it's fitting that we honor this literary legend with a permanent place on our Wall of Fame."

"The poem feeds upon thought, feeling, impulse, to breed itself, a spiritual urgency at the dark ladders leaping..."

The words expressed in Robert Duncan's "Poetry, A Natural Thing" could be those of any poet expressing innermost thoughts. But on Thursday, August 14, 2014 others experience those innermost thoughts of poetic inspiration, if just for an hour, when they attended ABQ RIDE's The Artistry of Words/ Poetry Slam.

This event, unique not only for ABQ RIDE but also for its location brought a small crowd to the Northwest Transit Center (10401 Ellison Boulevard NW at Coors Bypass NW) to see some of Albuquerque's most poetically creative minds recite their work.

"This was the first time ABQ RIDE has ever sponsored an event of this caliber based on poetry," said Bruce Rizzieri, Director of ABQ RIDE. "This was also the first time our department staged an event for riders and visitors to our Northwest Transit Center."



Headlining the Poetry Slam was Albuquerque's first ever Poet Laureate, Hakim Bellamy (yes, Albuquerque actually has its own Poet Laureate. The city's current Laureate is Jessica Helen Lopez). Also joining Bellamy in reciting poetry were students from nearby Cibola High School. That group included current and former students from the school's Poetry Club along with students from Cibola's English classes.

Bellamy performed with another well known Albuquerque poet, DJ Manny G. Bellamy is a national and regional Poetry Slam Champion and holds three consecutive collegiate poetry slam

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titles at the University of New Mexico. His poetry has been published in numerous anthologies.

Bellamy is also an award winning writer, musician, journalist and actor. His stage and screen credits include a cameo in the independent film *Romeo & Juliet vs. The Living Dead* (2009) along with appearances in such films and TV shows as *Gamer* (2009), *Swing Vote*



(2009) and Crash, the Television Series, Season II (2010).

Debate/Discussion

Debate (also called discussion) is a basic right of any member of an organization; this right is an important part of the decisions made by the membership. Debate follows the making of a motion; without a motion, discussion does not focus on specifics. Without focus, the comments can digress and get way off the main subject; this is hard for the presider/chair to control.

In groups that number more than about twelve members, it is recommended that members indicate that they wish to speak by a raise of hand or by standing and addressing the chair. When called on they speak. If this procedure is not followed members often interrupt a speaker. For effective deliberation all members must **listen** to the speaker!

Previously the presider after stating the motion was advised to state, "Are you ready for the question?" The 11th Edition suggests the statement, "Is there any debate?" (page 386) This is more commonly understood.

The maker of the motion has the privilege of speaking first and giving the rationale for the motion. "In debate, the maker of a motion, while he can vote against it, is not allowed to speak against his own motion. He need not speak at all, but if he does he is obliged to take a favorable position."

It is important that the member's remarks relate to the issue of the motion...Robert's Rules states "...*the member's remarks must be germane to the question before the assembly*." (page 392) The presider has the authority to intervene if the remarks do not have a bearing on the immediately pending question.

Members should not attack another member's ideas.... "...a member can condemn the nature or likely consequences of the proposed measure in strong terms, but he must avoid personalities, and under no circumstances can he attack or question the motives of another member." (page 392)

Members may not speak against a motion that they have introduced. "In debate, the maker of a motion, while he can vote against it, is not allowed to speak against his own motion." (page 393)
