District 8 Coalition

This article is the follow up to last month's. The District 8 Coalition is made up of approximately 30 "recognized" and "un-recognized" neighborhood associations. They are located in the Far Northeast Heights, right up against the beautiful Sandia Mountains. Past presidents are Nick Manole and Tom Doherty. The current president is Don Couchman. The Coalition was established in the early 1990's and officially organized in 1994. Therefore they have been in existence for 14 years.

I had a chance to sit down with three of their community leaders, Don Couchman, Patricia Lee and Carole Pigaty. What resonated throughout this meeting is that this is a very hard working group of people. They have a good, strong working relationship with the current and past City Councilors and with each other. They repeatedly emphasized how much the councilors have supported them. That has been a big help to this Coalition, by keeping lines of communications open.

One of their goals this year is to improve communications, not only within the city, but also with their State Representatives and Senators. Along this same line they have invited many of the City of Albuquerque Department Directors and the Chief Administrative Officer James Lewis to address the Coalition. They feel that this is important to problem solving, and will continue this effort in the future. They are also expanding this initiative by inviting District Attorney Kerry Brandenburg and others to their Coalition meetings.

A continuing effort for this Coalition is for all neighborhood associations to report on what is happening in their particular communities; to address positive and negative concerns as well as opportunities and accomplishments. This gives every neighborhood association time to share information with others in the meeting. In addition, there may be someone in this meeting who has had experience in dealing with this particular concern and may already have a solution to the problem. Or maybe someone has a contact who is supportive of neighborhood association's

efforts and can share with the group. Again this is all within the purview of communications and sharing information. This Coalition has also established a website, for which Darrell Spreen is responsible.

Economic development is also at the forefront for this Coalition. Currently they are concentrating on the newly built Eckert's buildings and what these will be used for, now that these remain empty. They are also supporting Councilor Craig Loy in his efforts to find a use for a closed Furrs structure.

Future goals are to get more representatives of their many neighborhood associations to the Coalition meetings; assuring that all of the areas in this Coalition are being represented at the various meetings and happenings around Albuquerque. Along this same vein, they are currently trying to identify who is on all the boards, commissions, and committees of the City of Albuquerque.

Thereby, assuring that they have someone representing them on all these bodies where they could or should have a constituent. If they identify any gaps they plan on working hard to fill these with their members, again the key here is making sure that communications are happening and that someone is involved to represent them.

They currently have several of their members serving on various boards, commissions and task forces. On one particular committee that they have a person (Don Couchman) serving on is the Citizens Supporting Interstate Landscaping Task Force. This is interesting to me because most of their territory is not even close to the Interstates. However, as was stated in the meeting, the beautification of Albuquerque is everyone's job. Just because it is not close does not mean it does not affect them. Don also serves on the Coors /I-40 landscaping and beautification Public Advisory Committee again for the same reason as stated above. I personally have to give a whole lot of credit to Don, because as you are aware Coors and I-40 is located on the other side of Albuquerque from this Coalition. Don's wife, Darlene, serves on the Albuquerque Arts Board.

Current and future goals are as follows: To improve their streets; help in any way they can in the development of more parks in this area; begin work on acquiring a Multi-Generational Community Center, by first identifying if one is needed or wanted by the community. In summary, the District 8 Coalition can be characterized in two words "Open Communications".

Thanks to the hard working, concerned District 8 Coalition members for sharing their goals and accomplishments with us.

Leadership In Your Community

In our City's neighborhood associations and other entities of the community face the issue of leadership, as opposed to Management, continually is expressed as a need. Neighborhood Associations as well as community sports organizations are constantly saying we do not have enough volunteers to run our programs and maintain an active Board of Directors that will insure the future of our neighborhood association.

The issue of recruiting volunteers has taken high priority in the Mayor's Office with the hiring of Debra Saine to head that important function. We are currently producing a Television Series on the Gov 16 Channel to emphasize various aspects of the need for volunteers for everything from Boards and Commissions to the Tri-Centennial celebration, to various other community based organizations.

Nationally the trend toward volunteerism is declining because of what Dr. Warren Bennis, a leadership theorist from the University of Southern California, as "cocooning" on the part of the Baby Boomer population. Cocooning is defined as the retreating to the safety of one's own "electronic castle" and shutting out the outside world because it is safer at home and "we have it all right here". This sort of behavior makes it less likely that people will want to venture out into their communities in the service of others. It tends to be about "me" and not in service for you. This is a sad plight for our communities.

When people are involved in community leadership positions, they usually want to know what is in it for "me" and the betterment of the community is not part of the agenda. The leadership theory work of Dr. Bernard Bass terms this behavior "Transactional Leadership" or people wanting an exchange of some sort in order to give anything. Managers face this in working with employees. "Give me

a raise and I will produce more or maybe give something extra". It never works out that way and "pay for performance" is the counter argument. Volunteers work under a different sense of purpose.

The viable alternative from a leadership perspective is what Dr. Bass calls Transformational Leadership. The expected outcomes of Transformational Leadership are increased effectiveness, extra effort, and increased satisfaction of the part of the worker or volunteer. The challenge is to get people past their own self-interest and getting them to place the needs of the organization ahead of their own personal agendas. This sounds easier than it actually is when you are focusing on a generation who as always thought "me" first.

The Transformational Model begins with the charisma of the leader which is the vital force. Followers identify with the style and goals of the charismatic leader. Charisma is not innate but is actually learned behavior. Charisma provides a sense of mission, instills pride, gains respect and builds trust.

Following Charisma are the Four I's of Transformational Leadership! These are Idealized attributes and Behaviors, Inspirational Motivation, Intellectual Stimulation and Individualized Consideration. These behaviors are intended to increase volunteer or follower motivation and Empowerment.

Idealized Attributes and Behaviors - Key characteristics:

Demonstrates selflessness; Acts in ways to build respect; Display confidence; Talk about important values and beliefs, Consider the moral and ethical consequences of decisions; and Model what is supposed to be (the behaviors).

Inspirational Motivation:

Be very optimistic; Talk enthusiastically; Articulate a compelling vision of the future; Provide excitement; and Take a stand on controversial issues.

Intellectual Stimulation:

Seeks perspectives of others/followers; Gets others to look at problems; Encourages other to think outside the

box; Provides an environment of supportive intellectual growth.

Individualized Consideration (Influence):

** Be a teacher, coach and counselor.

Relates closely to charisma; Treat followers as individuals; Help followers to develop their strength and show them you care by listening .

These vital behaviors will help leaders and coaches in directing the followers and volunteers toward high levels of performance, which is self motivated, a sense of empowerment, and away from their own self interest oriented concerns.

Talkin' Trash



He was joined by Clean Team members, Neighborhood Associations, Business Leaders, Law Enforcement and Metropolitan Court Judges on the roof of a downtown parking structure for this special announcement of the momentous Anti-litter Initiative – the largest anti-litter undertaking in Albuquerque's 300 year history.

FY/06 Budget Schedule

The following schedule outlines the process the City Council and Administration has completed or will adhere to in determining and adopting the FY/06 Budget for the City of Albuquerque. The budget process began with the introduction of the Enterprise Fund on March 7 and culminates with the final adoption of the General Fund budget on May 23.

Monday, March 7, 2005 - 5 p.m.
City Council Meeting – Enterprise Fund budget introduced to Council.

Thursday, March 31, 2005 - 4 p.m.
Committee-of-the-Whole (C.O.W.) – Public Hearing #1 on Enterprise Fund.

Monday, April 4, 2005 - 5 p.m.
City Council Meeting – General Fund budget introduced to Council.

Thursday, April 14, 2005 - 4 p.m.
Committee-of-the-Whole (C.O.W.) – Public Hearing #2 on Enterprise Fund (Mark-up). **No public comment at this meeting.**

Monday, April 18, 2005 - 5 p.m.
City Council Meeting – Final adoption of Enterprise Fund budget.

Thursday, April 28, 2005 - 4 p.m.
Committee-of-the-Whole (C.O.W.) – Public Hearing #1 on General Fund budget. The goals to be covered include Human and Family Development, Public Safety, Economic Vitality, and Community and Cultural Engagement (social goals).

Thursday, May 5, 2005 - 4 p.m.
Committee-of-the-Whole (C.O.W.) – Public Hearing #2 on General Fund budget. The goals to be covered include Public Infrastructure, Sustainable Community Development,

Environmental Protection and Enhancement, and Governmental Excellence and Effectiveness (physical goals).

Thursday, May 19, 2005 - 4 p.m.
Committee-of-the-Whole (C.O.W.) – Public Hearing #3 on General Fund budget (Mark-up). **No public comment at this meeting.**

Monday, May 23, 2005 - 5 p.m.
City Council Meeting – Final adoption of General Fund budget. Any Floor Substitutes must be distributed 24 hours prior to the meeting and any amendments must be distributed prior to the meeting.

Municipal Development Capital Implementation Program

The 2005 - 2014 Decade Plan for city-wide Capital Improvements, which includes the 2005 General Obligation Bond Program, will be heard by the Environmental Planning Commission (EPC) on March 17, 2005. At this time, the Capital Program is expected to be number two on the EPC agenda but, as usual, please check before coming downtown. EPC Hearings are held in the basement hearing room at Plaza del Sol. (**Update**- the 2005 GO Bond Program was just heard and approved by EPC and will move on to the Mayor City Council for approval).

The Importance Of Checking Your Mailbox Regularly

DID YOU RECEIVE A NOTICE FOR CERTIFIED MAIL to be picked up and didn't claim your mail?? With the rising cost of mail (*The standard cost to send certified mail varies from \$4.95 on up - depending on the size of the envelope*) and the time limit that the Post Office will only hold certified mail for pick-up once a notice has been left at your residence or post office box (*only for a three (3) week period and they return it back to the sender*), your neighborhood association has missed an opportunity to participate in city government by not going to the Post Office to pick up your certified mail from the applicants of projects that will affect your neighborhood and various city departments who are required to send "recognized" neighborhood association information on their application.

Direct quote from the O-92 Ordinance: *"Applicants for approval of amendments of the zone map, zoning site development plans (except houses and accessory buildings), major subdivisions, vacations of public right-of-way, mapping historic districts, land marking sites, and issuance or transfer of liquor licenses shall, prior to filing the application, make a reasonable attempt to give written notification of their proposal to any recognized neighborhood association which covers, abuts, or is across public right of way from the site of their plans. Certified letters, return receipt requested, mailed to the two designated neighborhood association representatives on file at the City Office of Neighborhood Coordination constitutes a reasonable attempt to notify an association.*

We strongly encourage any neighborhood association to have two contacts that will be able to accept certified mail for their association or be able to pick up the certified mail within a timely manner so that your association is notified of any future development that will affect your area.
