New Fun Jump Policy in City Parks

Due to their popularity for birthday parties and events we have decided to allow jumpers in select parks and within select areas of those parks. A reservation will be required at the designated locations. We will have monitors patrolling parks to make sure that jumpers are only in designated locations. The Parks and Recreation

Department is currently working with APD to make sure that the policy can be enforced. The policy took affect Memorial Day weekend and will run as a Pilot Program this year. To schedule a jumper or to report a violation, please call **505-261-1028**.

Scam, Fraud and Con Games

Can you spot a con artist or con game? Most of us think we can – that we’re too smart to fall victim to one of the leading crimes in our country today. The sad reality is generally it’s not that easy. Con artists rob all kinds of people of millions of dollars every year. Cons, scams and frauds attempt to victimize us with false promises of miracle cures, financial security and fabulous prizes. Remember if it sounds too good to be true it probably is. Follow these tips to help prevent you from becoming a victim.

- Never give a caller your social security number, credit card information, bank account number or phone card over the phone. It’s illegal for telemarketers to ask for these types of numbers to verify a prize or gift.
• Beware of 900 numbers. If you call a 900 number to claim a “prize” you might end up paying for the call. Understand all charges prior to making the call.
• Don’t allow an aggressive con artist to pressure you into making a quick decision. Demand information in writing by mail. Also get a second opinion. Ask family, friends and/or neighbors what they think about the offer.
• You have the right and the power to say NO. If the caller makes you wary, be assertive and end the conversation. They often pray on the trusting, polite nature of people and the excitement over receiving a prize or bargain. You can prevent a crime and financial loss by saying no and hanging up the phone.
• Don’t buy health products or treatments that promise quick cures or a single product that cures many illnesses.
• Look closely at offers that come in the mail. Con artists often use official looking forms and language.

You are not obligated to respond to an offer you did not initiate.

- If you have lost a loved one and you receive a call asking for payment for something they ordered or purchased prior to their death do not make payment until investigating.
• Beware of cheap home repair work especially if it is initiated by door-to-door soliciting. The con artist may do an incomplete job, use less than appropriate materials and untrained workers or simply take your deposit and never return. Never pay with cash. Never accept offers from someone who “just happened to be in the neighborhood.” Always check their credentials, work history and licenses prior to contracting services.
• If someone rips you off or you detect a fraud or con game report the contact with the police department the consumer protection office and/or the District Attorney’s Office.
• Don’t be embarrassed to make the call. Very few frauds are reported, which leaves the con artist free to victimize others.
• Remember – If someone is attempting to gain information about you and you did not initiate the call or contact consider it the beginning of a scam and discontinue the conversation. If you want information about a service or purchase you make the initial contact.
• What to do if you are a victim of a theft or lose your purse or wallet:
- Cancel credit cards immediately – keep account numbers and toll free numbers handy.
- File a police report immediately to prove diligence on your part.
- Call the three national credit reporting organizations immediately to place a fraud alert on your name and social security number.
- Equifax at 1-800-525-6285.
- Experian at 1-800-397-3742.
- Trans Union at 1-800-680-7289.
- Social Security Administration also has a fraud line at 1-800-269-0271.

Water Safety Tips

Practice constant adult supervision around any body of water including pools and spas. Drowning is the second leading cause of accidental death in New Mexico for ages one to 44 years old. Each year over 8,000 people drown in this country. Nearly 4,000 of those drowning occur during the summer months of June, July and August.

Arroyo, River or Ditches - NEVER PLAY IN OR AROUND ARROYOS. The water can travel from 3-30 mph.

- Be careful! Even when arroyos are dry they can flood very quickly.
- If caught in the flowing water float on your back - feet downstream.
 - o Call for help.
 - o Stay calm.
 - o Avoid bridge supports and debris use feet to push off.
 - o Stay floating on your back until the water slows down.
 - o Do not try to swim or stand up until the water slows.
 - o Reach for a rope or other object when near you.
- Never attempt a rescue you may become the next victim.

The Albuquerque Fire Department (AFD) has eleven stations that are trained and ready to deploy 24/7 to a Swift Water Rescue incident. AFD trains annually to maintain certifications and to be prepared to respond if the need arises.

**West Route 66 Sector Development
Plan Update**

The West Route 66 project team is preparing a working draft of the new Sector Development Plan. It has taken shape with input from the community meetings and through extensive research on current policy, conditions and projects in the corridor. Information has been collected and analyzed on topics ranging from very specific, like road widths on Central Avenue to projects in the pipeline for stormwater management and open space access, to longer term plans that are relevant to West Route 66, such as traffic modeling by MRCOG. The working draft will address land use, zoning and transportation by all modes down the six miles of West Route 66 in the city plan area and suggest some catalytic projects along the way.

A West Route 66 Liaison Committee is being formed to review the working draft. The project team is inviting neighborhood associations and coalitions with an active interest in the Sector Plan to appoint a representative, as well as commercial property-owners and others with a stake in the future of the corridor. Meetings will begin in late July and between meetings, representatives will be consulting with their colleagues while the project team refines the draft with input from the Committee and new data from their research.

The neighborhood associations and coalitions that are being contacted are: Alamosa, Anderson Hills, Avalon, Encanto Village, Pat Hurley, Riverview Heights, Skyview West, Stinson Tower, Southwest Alliance of Neighbors (SWAN), Vecinos del Bosque, West Mesa, West Park, Westgate Heights, Westside Coalition and the Northwest Alliance of Neighbors.

The West Route 66 project team includes Council Services, Planning Department staff and consultants from Strata Design. We thank all those who have contributed so far to developing the new Sector Plan and look forward to working with many of you in this exciting new phase of the planning process.

**A Look at City Government—
What’s Being Enacted and How
Does It Affect You?**

The City Council normally meets on the first and third Monday of the month, except in July. Council and Committee schedules are posted at <http://www.cabq.gov/council/council-meeting-schedules>.

Agendas can be found at <http://cabq.legistar.com/calendar.aspx> after 5 p.m. one full business day before the meeting date (Friday for a Monday meeting); preliminary draft schedules are usually posted 4-5 business days prior to the meeting at <http://www.cabq.gov/council/events>. To get ahead of the game, click on the **Minutes** link on the right side of the **President** line to see the “**Letter of Introduction.**” This lists proposed new legislation and initial disposition (e.g., Council hearing or committees—Land Use, Planning, and Zoning; Finance and Government Operations; Public Service). Copy the Bill designator (e.g., EC-10-190, O-xxx, OC-xxx, R-xxx) of the item you’re interested in and go back to the “agendas” page. Click on the **Legislation** tab at the top of the page. This will take you to another Search page where you can access the proposed legislation for review. Key or paste in the legislation number (e.g., EC-10-190, O-xxx, OC-xxx, R-xxx) in the **Search Legislation** box and select **All Years or This Year** in the box to the right of the **Search Legislation** button. Then tap on the **Search Legislation** button.

That will take you to another page with the file on that particular Executive Communication (EC-), Ordinance (O-), Resolution (R-) or whatever. Click on the yellow-highlighted file number to go to the history page for that item. You can click on the main item or attachment of interest (e.g., **O-2.doc**, **O-2att.doc**) and save it to read more than the brief “title and description” provided on the agenda.

You can read about the meeting results at the same link <http://cabq.legistar.com/calendar.aspx> by

clicking on the **MINUTES** tab on the right side of the line for the meeting of interest.

The process is similar for Council Committee meetings, agendas and minutes. Use the same pages and appropriate links.

Educate yourself and your neighbors...get involved in the process by calling **505-768-3100** or e-mailing all of the Councilors via <http://www.cabq.gov/council/councilors>. Then prepare to speak up...attend meetings and testify on items of interest to you and the community.

Neighborhood Alert – Be aware that public comments at EPC Meetings have a time limitation due to the length of the EPC Hearings. The **48-Hour Rule of the EPC**: All written materials and other documents shall be submitted to the Planning Department no later than **9 a.m.** on the **2nd Tuesday** of the Public Hearing Week. For an Appeal Hearing – no communication with EPC is allowed within five days of the Public Hearing.

In order to make maximum use of the following information – please note:

- Scan the entire list to see if your neighborhood association has a case this month.
- The name and phone number of the developer/agent is listed so that you can easily contact them should you have any questions.
- The assigned staff planner is identified with each agenda item should you need additional information (*i.e., check on the actual placement of your case on the agenda*). All staff may be reached at **505-924-3860**.
- On the day of the EPC Public Hearing, call the Planning Department at **505-924-3860** and the receptionist will give you the status of the EPC Public Hearing.

Parliamentary Pointers

Officers' Reports

Officers are not required to report at every meeting; those having information are called on in the order in which they are listed in the bylaws. It is the custom of some organizations to have the report of the treasurer immediately after the approval of the minutes of the last meeting.

In the order of business covered under the topic of Agenda in *Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised, 10th Edition*, (RONR) the officer reports are given after the approval of the minutes of the last meeting with the president or chairman reporting first. Reports with general information can be oral reports; the secretary can summarize this report in one or two sentences. Longer reports and reports with specific

information should be written reports; these reports should be handed to the secretary and attached to the minutes.

Reports of officers are not adopted. A report may include a recommendation; another member than makes a motion to adopt the specific recommendation of the officer. This procedure is recommended because the report is compiled by one person, the officer. The officer **should not** make a motion to adopt his/her recommendation.

The treasurer's report is not adopted but is filed for audit. The treasurer's report is usually compiled by the treasurer; the membership cannot be assured that the report is accurate and adoption would be a statement that the report is accepted as it is given. The audit (usually done annually) is a procedure in which members of an internal audit committee or a certified accountant review the financial records to check accuracy. The audit committee report or the auditor's report are adopted.

The treasurer's report can be given in a brief statement of beginning balance, income, expenses and final balance. This report can also be given in detail particularly if the organization has developed a budget. The membership may be interested in the expenditures in specific line items in the budget and the percentage of the budget remaining. This type of a report can be configured on a spreadsheet.

Samples of treasurer's reports using spreadsheets can be acquired by e-mailing Jan Strand. Information can be reviewed in *Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised, 10th Edition*, (RONR) pp. 344-345 and 459-463.
