APD Notables...

Southeast Area Command...

- July's Southeast graveyard shift officers of the month are officers Hernandez and Taylor for their work in taking into custody a repeat burglar who was victimizing a residential area. They used night vision goggles to locate and arrest the suspect. The two officers also performed a tactical plan at a local retailer to identify and arrest repeat shoplifters.
- On July 2, officers responded to a call about shots being fired near an apartment complex. When officers arrived, they observed several bullet holes in and around the front door of an apartment. Officers were able to quickly ascertain that the offender lived across the street. After setting a perimeter around the offender's apartment, officers were able to convince the offender to open the front door of his apartment and allow officers to enter the residence. The offender was taken into custody, and gun and shell casings were recovered.
- On July 5, officers L. Jaramillo and J. Franco responded to an auto burglary in progress. When they arrived, they observed the offender fleeing the scene on foot. After a short chase, the offender was apprehended. Stolen items were in the offender's possession when he was apprehended.
- Officer Clipp was dispatched to a location to respond to a burglary in progress. Upon arrival, he observed a male subject detaining a combative female. The subsequent investigation discovered that the female had entered the residence and attempted to burglarize it. The female subject was taken into custody and transported to the hospital due to her injuries.
- Officer T. Stephenson was dispatched to a call near Central and Solano after a caller reported that he was going to kill himself and others. Upon arrival, Officer Stephenson was able to reason with the man and transported him to the hospital for a mental evaluation.
- Officers D. Lujan and J. Jung conducted a tactical plan at Phil Chacon Park. During the plan, officers removed approximately 200 vehicles, broke up two fights and issued three citations for drinking in public. The same officers responded to a residential burglary and were able to recover over \$1,000 worth of property and arrest three juvenile offenders.

- Team 5 officers were dispatched to a southeast location in response to a male subject who was threatening to shoot an officer, and was making suicidal statements. Team 5 officers secured the scene for SWAT. After approximately four hours, the subject came out of the residence. SWAT utilized a Taser to prevent the subject from going back into his residence and was taken into protective custody.
- Officers Pacheco and Smith conducted a tactical plan in the southeast area command to recover stolen vehicles. The officers used the automated license plate reader to scan 1,400 license plates. During the that time, the officers recovered three stolen vehicles and prevented an auto burglary.

Foothills Area Command...

- Detective J. Gonterman assumed case responsibility on a theft of a firearm which was reported by a citizen. A convicted felon and wanted fugitive was suspected in the theft. Through investigation, it was learned that the suspect knowingly purchases firearms and transfers them to convicted felons. Det. Gonterman obtained and served a search warrant on the suspect's residence. A firearm was found and seized. Three convicted felons were also in the house at the time of the search. The case was turned over to the ATF. An arrest warrant was issued for the suspect, who was subsequently arrested by U.S. Marshals.
- On July 30th, Officer D. Miller was dispatched to a location regarding a residential burglary in process. Remarks on the call stated that a male had parked a red vehicle in the driveway of the home and was carrying property out of the house. The caller was able to provide the license plate of the red vehicle. The plate number indicated that the vehicle was also stolen. Upon arriving at the scene, Officer Miller observed the offender putting something inside the vehicle. The subject looked up, saw Officer Miller and ran from the scene. Officer Miller gave a short chase and established a perimeter. The suspect was taken into custody a short time later and identified by the witnesses. It was determined that the suspect had entered the house by breaking a rear bedroom window. The suspect broke into a second home while police searched the area for him. The stolen vehicle was recovered and returned to the owner. The case was turned over to the Burglary Unit.
- Officer J. Lopez conducted a traffic tactical

plan that resulted in the issuance of 50 traffic citations, completion of a felony arrest, and two misdemeanor arrests. Also during the tactical plan, Officer Lopez made a traffic stop because the driver was not wearing his seat belt. While making contact with the driver, Officer Lopez noticed that a passenger in the vehicle was acting very nervous and was having a hard time answering any of his questions. Officer Lopez then asked the passenger to step out of the vehicle where he conducted a pat down search and located narcotics in the subject's waistband. The subject was arrested for possession of a controlled substance.

- On July 18th, officers Souers and Gonzales arrested a male who had brutally beaten a woman and her 15-year-old son. The male was charged with kidnapping, aggravated battery, and felony child abuse. Although they had volunteered to assist graveyard shift officers until 1 a.m., they completed a thorough investigation and remained on the call until 10 a.m. Both officers received letters of commendation for their outstanding performance.
- On July 29, officers J. Smith and D. Torrez were called to an apartment complex regarding a bear on the loose. The officers were able to contain the bear in an area until New Mexico Game and Fish officers arrived at the scene. The two APD officers assisted Game and Fish officers with the capture of the bear for relocation.

Valley Area Command...

- Swing shift officers continued to work on the Valley Swing Cruiser Tactical Plan on Friday and Saturday nights. To date, swing shift officers have issued 1,009 citations, completed 35 arrests and 74 towed vehicles.
- Swing shift officers helped the DEA seize \$830,000 from downtown drug smugglers. In July, swing shift officers were extremely proactive in obtaining arrest warrants for several subjects, including a residential burglar and a heroin drug dealer.
- Throughout the month of July, bike officers and several ERT officers worked the Bosque Tactical Plan to ensure people did not utilize the Bosque during the "high fire danger" period. Day shift bike officers did make one arrest for arson during this time.
- Day shift officers escorted over 150 cyclists through the area command for Matthew

Trujillo's Memorial Ride. During the ride, the Duke City Wheelmen Foundation installed a ghost bike in memory of Mr. Trujillo at the intersection of Washington and Indian School.

- Impact detectives arrested a man for an aggravated assault with great bodily harm after he ran over another man. Impact detectives continued to work on a POP project in the Raynolds Addition with the help of the power team and crime prevention.
- Crime Prevention staff participated in the Health Fair at the Hispanic Cultural Center and provided McGruff the Crime Dog for the children who attended. McGruff, horses, motors, SWAT, EOD, and K9 also made a special appearance at the Valley Substation for a Girl Scout tour.
- Recruit Officer Bartlett and Officer Apodaca were instrumental in saving a man's life. As the officers arrived on scene, they were advised that the victim had stopped breathing. Officer Apodaca began chest compressions until he tired. At that time, RO Bartlett took over the chest compressions. After rescue arrived, they were able to get a heartbeat after shocking him three times.
- All watches continued to work a number of tactical plans in response to citizen requests. In July, 56 tactical plans were implemented. As a result, numerous citations were issued, several arrests were made, and many vehicles were towed.

Southwest Area Command...

- Officer J. Brown conducted a tactical plan in the Avalon/Estancia neighborhood due to traffic complaints. Officer Brown wrote 31 citations and noted a decrease in traffic violations afterwards.
- Team Two officers conducted six tactical plans in July and issued 25 citations.
- Officer Carrasco trained Recruit Officer Jared Foulk in July. Officer Foulk made two felony arrests and completed the associated casework; made five misdemeanor arrests; conducted 15 traffic stops; issued 28 traffic citations; arrested two DWI offenders and wrote 36 reports for the month. Officer Carrasco and Foulk also responded to several shoplifting calls at a large retailer. Officer Carrasco and Foulk enlisted the help of the Southwest Impact team to assist on a tactical plan. They worked in a plain clothes

capacity and were able to cite two individuals for shoplifting and arrest an individual with an outstanding felony probation warrant.

- On July 8th, Officer D. Madrid conducted a cell phone tactical plan in the Southwest Area Command; she issued four citations.
- On July 11th, Officer Gunderson conducted an abandoned vehicle tactical plan in the Summerfield Subdivision near Unser and Gibson. He red-tagged three vehicles.
- Detectives Piatt and Chavez conducted several hours of surveillance looking for offenders with outstanding felony warrants regarding their cases. Detective Piatt located a subject with a felony warrant for auto burglary, which resulted from an AFIS hit. Piatt also made two felony arrests, clearing three felony warrants for offenders which were wanted on probation violations.
- Detective Chavez located an offender responsible for a shooting in a local restaurant's parking lot. The man, who shot the male subject in March 2011, was charged with armed robbery, conspiracy and tampering with evidence. Detective Chavez also arrested a man who was charged with conspiracy to commit armed robbery with the shooting suspect.
- Detectives Grant and Killinger made several arrests at a local retailer for drug charges including dealing and possession. Detective Grant also arrested a repeat shoplifter who was taking property from a large retailer, pushing it through a fence, then coming back around and taking the property.
- Detective Zambrano and Sergeant Hoisington stopped a suspect vehicle while conducting surveillance. The driver was found to be a convicted felon for murder and was in possession of a firearm. The case was referred to the ATF for federal prosecution.
- Officers conducted numerous traffic tactical plans throughout July. Areas of concern included cell phone usage, speeding, expired registration, seat belt usage, and failure to stop at posted signs. Watch 3 officers wrote a total of 1,266 moving citations in July.
- Officer B. Briones and PSA K. Ricketts conducted an illegally parked vehicle tactical plan in July. Enforcement actions were taken on all illegally parked vehicles, including abandoned vehicles, handicapped parking infractions, and parking on sidewalks. They wrote 97 citations and issued 10 red tag

citations.

- The Open Space Section successfully completed the Bosque Fire Tactical Plan in cooperation with the Albuquerque Fire Department and continued to upgrade their skills in a variety of areas. A variety of patrol techniques were used to prevent crime and fire in the Open Space areas.
- In July, Open Space officers logged 794 hours of regular patrol and over 2,000 hours of tactical plan patrol. Significant contact was made with 889 visitors to the Open Space areas answering questions, handling problems, and enhancing the visitor's experience.

Northwest Area Command...

- Graveyard shift officers continued to conduct field briefings at high volume calls for service locations throughout the area command. Several tactical operations were conducted in reference to speeding complaints received from citizens and observations of officers within the watch. Tactical operations yielded 115 citations, 24 parking citations, and a felony arrest for residential burglary. Watch I officers conducted 64 tactical operations dealing with quality of life issues, traffic enforcement and top ten call for service locations.
- All three squads conducted traffic tactical operations at heavily-travelled intersections within the area command, resulting in 1,092 citations. Lt. P. Rees and his bicycle patrol units conducted frequent bike patrols along the river banks and the Bosque area during July in an effort to curb fire risks. Numerous subjects were contacted and resulted in the absence of fire incidents and the referral of multiple subjects to the COAST Unit.
- The Northwest Impact Team assisted in addressing auto burglary issues near Cottonwood Mall and Coors/I-40 areas during lunch time hours. Auto burglaries dropped over 50% in July.
- The Northwest Impact Team assisted FBI agents in Midland, Texas, with a high-level drug dealer who was living in the Northwest Area Command. Impact Team members located the subject's car and conducted surveillance for several hours. He was stopped as he was leaving Albuquerque. A search of his car yielded forty pounds of high grade marijuana worth approximately \$224,000.
- Northwest swing shift continued to be the

busiest shift, with officers responding to the largest number of calls for service and resulting in the largest number of statistics in almost all categories achieved.

- A residential burglary suspect was apprehended, which resulted in a significant drop in residential burglaries within the general area.

Northeast Area Command...

- Officer Burchell conducted a tactical plan on Pennsylvania in response to speeding complaints. The officer issued 30 moving citations during the operation.
- Officer Scott conducted a “Decisional Shoot Training” at the tactical range for the members of an entire watch. The training consisted of various shoot/no shoot scenarios as well as different methods of response.
- Officer Jacobson made a felony shoplifting arrest at a large retailer, where he was able to recover over \$700 worth of stolen property. The investigation also led to more white-collar crimes being solved.
- While in an off-duty capacity, Officer Wilder observed an individual having a medical emergency at his gym. Officer Wilder immediately rendered aid to the subject by administering CPR. He continued assisting until he was relieved by AFD rescue personnel. The subject was rushed into surgery and survived the ordeal. Officer Wilder will be nominated for APD’s Life Saving Award for his actions.
- Detective Carter investigated a fraud case from a furniture store. Carter was able to locate and arrest the offenders and tie them to numerous fraudulent auto purchases. The FBI is assisting in the case.
- Detective Hilger investigated a forged prescription case in which a registered nurse supplied his spouse with pain medication after he stole a prescription pad from his employer. The nurse was arrested and the New Mexico State Medical Board was notified.
- Detective Baker was able to follow up on leads resulting from a theft of oxygen tanks from a local business. Detective Baker was able to locate 97 tanks that were valued at \$10,000. The tanks were returned to the owner and the offenders were arrested.
- During July, Watch III officers completed 145 felony arrests; 206 misdemeanor arrests; 1,026 moving citations; and took 3,588 calls for service. Additionally, 25 subjects were arrested

for panhandling.

- On July 16, Officer Keiper, accompanied by members from Teams 5, 6, and 10, were dispatched to a local retailer in response to an attempted robbery of a subject involving an AK-47. Upon arrival, officers were able to determine that the event was a drug deal that resulted in a robbery. Officers conducted interviews which revealed that one subject had transported five pounds of marijuana concealed within forty pounds of hay from Texas on a bus. The subject then attempted to sell the marijuana to a local drug dealer. In the process, the local dealer attempted to rob the man from Texas. Both subjects were taken into custody, along with the drugs and seized \$12,500.
- On July 18, Northeast Team 9 officers apprehended two subjects who were attempting to burglarize a medical supply company. The two subjects had already loaded over \$7,000 of aluminum cylinders into their vehicle.

Scientific Evidence Division...

- Criminalistics responded to one call-out in July.
- In July, the Physical Identification Unit provided valuable training for narcotics officers across the country. In conjunction with a nationwide class, the Controlled Substances Unit effectively demonstrated common street methods for the manufacture of methamphetamine. This process gives investigators valuable firsthand knowledge of how the process works chemically, what the potential dangers are when investigating scenes, as well as what materials and tools to look for.
- Katie’s Law sample collection has gone well with an increase of nearly 75% in the total kit.
- The Latent Unit trained new latent examiners as part of a year-long process. The APD Crime Lab currently has two examiners on staff.
- The Biology Lab made preparations to set up and validate a newly-purchased thermocycler. The lab also made preparations to validate Y-STR (male DNA) quantification kits for lab usage. Approximately 50 cases need to be finalized before being distributed.
- Field Investigators made adjustments to scheduling to allow for the loss of the six SRO officers that were utilized during the summer. Positions are expected to be filled sometime in August.
- In July, Identification Technicians processed 71 case dispositions; 54 employment background checks; 27 firearms requests, and 75 FBI

background investigations. 339 RAPs and photos were distributed, 18 new APD applicants were fingerprinted, 1,839 fingerprints were classified in AFIS and 3,637 new and old arrests were processed into the TIBURON Criminal History Record during normal shift operations.

- The Evidence Unit received 3,508 evidence items, duplicated 584 audio/video recordings and supported 31 pre-trial viewings in July. The Unit returned 294 items to their owners, disposed of 3,015 items, and recovered \$744.12 in auction income. An additional 9,012 items have met final disposition processing requirements and are pending destruction court orders.

Communications Division...

- The APD 911 Communications Center staff answered 75,562 incoming 911 and 242-COPS calls in July. There were 28,435 calls for 911 and 47,127 calls for 242-COPS in July. 911 operators answered 93.73% of the 911 calls within 10 seconds (national standard is 90%, APD's standard is 92.5%); operators also answered 96.94% of the 242-COPS calls within 30 seconds (APD's goal is 90% answered within 30 seconds).
- Communications Division staff reclassified two positions into Communications Record and Data Coordinators. The employees enter hazard information and other data into the CAD system, appear in court, and make audio recordings.
- Staff began implementation of a security system upgrade to the Emergency Operations Center
- On July 24, Communications staff took 911 and radio calls for the Bernalillo County Sheriff's Office and the New Mexico State Police.
- The installation of a new phone system was delayed until August to refine aspects of the system for optimal performance.

Strategic Support Division...

- In July, there were 87 incidents submitted on the CONNECT web site by a combination of business partners and APD personnel regarding criminal activity during the month; of these, 48 were from ARAPA partners; 13 were Hospitality Partners; 11 by FISOA partners; seven by CICA Partners; seven by Pawn & Recycling Partners; and one by Downtown Partners. Additionally, there were 25 Alert Update Comments to these postings, which were provided by personnel from the various partnerships.

- In July, 29 new registration requests were received for the month for the various areas contained in the CONNECT web site.
- In July, CONNECT had total of a total of 1,346 visitors in 31 days for an average of 43.4 visitors/day.
- Staff continued on plan to follow up and engage other law enforcement agencies from around New Mexico as discussed in the January presentation at the New Mexico Sheriff's and Police Officers Association, regarding organized criminal activity, traveling criminal networks and crime displacement from the Albuquerque/Bernalillo County area.
- In July, the stopabqgang.org website had a total of 2,183 visitors in 31 days for an average of 70.4 visitors/day. During July, eight tips were received via this website.
- The Crime Analysis Unit created 362 crime analysis bulletins/maps and 543 cyclical reports, maps and threshold alerts in July.

Professional Standards Division...

- The Police Service Aide Class graduated on July 15, with 13 Aides.
- The Meggitt training simulator was installed and the Academy hosted an open house to showcase the new system. The Chief's Staff, Command Staff, City Councilors, Police Oversight Commission, media, and several neighborhood groups were invited to the open house.
- The Basic Training Unit assisted with the final Junior Police Academy program and assisted with range safety at the Westside range for qualifications.
- CSA Gerald Sandoval completed the last Junior Police Academy for 2011 and began a new Citizens Police Academy.
- The Advanced Training Unit began Phase 2 M.O.E. (Use of Force Review) and continued to bring advanced training opportunities to the department.
- The 106th Police Academy starting date was announced. Recruiting and Selection continued their efforts to bring the most qualified candidates to APD.

Planning and Policy Division...

- Division staff coordinated with City ISD to develop a template SharePoint site for the Department's Strategic Plan in order to facilitate frequent updating of each of the Department's strategies and objectives.

- Construction of the new Leadership Academy began in July with the trenching and installation of new computer lines to support the facility. Utility connection, bathroom facility installation and landscaping will continue throughout the summer.
- The Inspections/Accreditation Unit welcomed a new detective to the Unit to help in preparing for the CALEA on-site inspection that is scheduled for late August.
- The Chief and Planning staff met to discuss the allocation for the 2011 Justice Assistance Grant.

Prisoner Transport Unit...

- In July, the Prisoner Transport Unit processed 1,714 prisoners through the Prisoner Transport Center. The Albuquerque Police Department arrested 1,401 prisoners, and other agencies arrested 313 prisoners. The Prisoner Transport Unit made 209 trips to MDC and accepted 29 walk-in prisoners at MDC.
- The savings in hours and fuel costs for the month of July was \$33,452.

Support Services Division...

- The Criminal Nuisance Abatement Unit (CNAU) continued to respond to referrals from area commands, Safe City Strike Force, neighborhood associations and City Council members. CNAU conducted patrol operations at City housing properties. CNAU conducted numerous interventions with owners, landlords and occupants of problem properties. In July, CNAU posted three units as substandard, identified 9 problem properties, and visited 292 properties.
- Detectives Casaus and Wickline made six misdemeanor warrant arrests in July. CNAU assisted the Field Services Bureau with calls for service and AFD with fireworks enforcement over the Fourth of July weekend.
- In July, the Telephone Report Unit (TRU) saved patrol officers 1,781 hours of report time, saving an estimated \$27,400. CopLogic also received 235 reports, saving approximately 738 hours (\$11,360).

Traffic Division...

- The Traffic Unit issued 1,802 citations in July.
- The DWI Unit arrested 172 people for driving while intoxicated.
- The Seizure Unit confiscated 132 vehicles in

July, totalling \$50,195.

- In July, the Traffic Unit made six felony arrests, 31 misdemeanor arrests and eight DWI arrests. The Unit issued 1,557 moving citations, including 119 for cell phone use while driving. The Unit conducted 39 tactical plans in July that produced 223 citations. The Unit investigated 218 crashes, including three that were fatal.
- The Abandoned Vehicle Unit red-tagged three vehicles and towed five.
- From July 1-4, Air Support performed directed Bosque Fire Watch during the Fourth of July weekend, included looking for fires and enforcing Bosque closures.
- On July 19 at 11:25 p.m., Air1 observed a motorcycle traveling at a high rate of speed on Interstate 40 eastbound approaching the Big I. Air1 attempted to slow the vehicle by utilizing the searchlight but the vehicle continued to drive recklessly. The vehicle eventually went south on Interstate 40 and then exited on Martin Luther King Jr. Boulevard. The driver continued to the University of New Mexico campus where it drove recklessly on sidewalks that were occupied by pedestrians. The vehicle was eventually stopped by University Police and the driver was taken into custody for reckless driving.
- On July 25, a group of six motorcycles were observed driving eastbound on Montgomery at Wyoming. One driver was observed operating the vehicle without the proper lighting and riding on the back tire only. Air 1 called out the activity to the Foothills Area Command who dispatched a unit. Air 1's spotlight was used on the motorcycle. The other five motorcycles split up and left the area. No marked units were in the area at the time and the motorcycle in Air 1's spotlight started to run at high speed. After a few moments, the rider apparently decided that he could not outrun the helicopter so he parked his motorcycle on the side of the road at Morris and Montgomery where he shut the motorcycle off and waited. Within three minutes a ground unit arrived and dealt with the subject who was cooperative.
- On July 27 at 10:30 p.m., Air1 responded to a pursuit at 12th and Interstate 40. Units advised Air1 that a white vehicle was failing to yield and was possibly related to a carjacking and possible abduction. Units advised that the vehicle had aggressively threatened two marked units. Air1

arrived as the vehicle was traveling northbound. Air1 took over primary pursuit and had all ground units disengage. The vehicle continued northbound for a short time. It eventually turned westbound where the driver fled on foot. Air1 followed the subject and directed ground units to the location. The subject eventually hid in a yard and a perimeter was established. A K9 unit eventually apprehended the subject where Air1 last had contact. The subject was booked for felony aggravated assault on officers, felony eluding and a felony warrant.

Special Operations Division...

- The EOD (Bomb Squad) was deployed 10 times in July. On July 8th, the Bomb Squad conducted a fireworks destruction of five large improvised fireworks that were retrieved on a bomb call.
- On July 6th, the Bomb Squad was called to assist SWAT for robot operations on a SWAT call at a southeast location.
- The Canine Unit conducted 51 building searches, 17 area searches, and performed five apprehensions.
- The Mounted Unit spent most of July in trucks. The first mission of the Mounted Unit during this time was to assist the Field Services Bureau with calls for service in the Southeast Area Command. The second mission of the month was to assist Open Space in enforcing the partial opening of the Open Space areas all over the city.
- SWAT was activated six times in July to address barricaded subjects, hostage situations and suicidal subjects.
- Homeland Security officers participated in a committee to coordinate the final details of the National Disaster Medical System and EMTrack which was scheduled for July 28.
- The Metropolitan Protection Specialist Unit answered 1,037 calls for service; conducted 409 misdemeanor arraignments; 132 felony arraignments; 56 out of custody arraignments; 124 remands; 44 warrants were booked; cleared 165 misdemeanor warrants; cleared three felony warrants, and conducted 106 escorts.

Investigations Bureau...

- On July 7, the ROP Unit arrested Justin Virginis. Virginis had previously been featured as one of APD's Top 5 property crime offenders. On July 7, Virginis was observed in a stolen vehicle. Virginis left the vehicle in the area

of Indian School and Louisiana NE. ROP detectives obtained an arrest warrant for Virginis and later took him into custody. Virginis was in possession of methamphetamine, stolen property, and stolen credit cards.

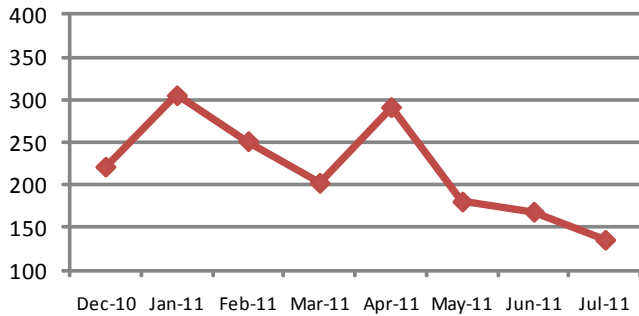
- On July 13, the ROP Unit assisted narcotics detectives with a fugitive surveillance and arrest. The suspect barricaded himself at a residence. SWAT was called out and the fugitive later turned himself in.
- On July 21, the ROP Unit assisted Homeland Security with a federal fugitive. The ROP Unit established surveillance at the home of the suspect. The fugitive was wanted for providing drivers licenses to illegal aliens. Silva also had a felony state warrant for aggravated assault. Silva was observed at the residence and was taken into custody. The ROP Unit turned Silva over to Homeland Security. Homeland Security also executed a search warrant at Silva's apartment.
- On July 22, the ROP Unit observed a stolen Jeep Wrangler in the area of Osuna and Pan American NE. The Jeep had been stolen earlier in the day. The female driver was taken into custody at Jefferson and Osuna and was found to be in possession of burglary tools.
- On July 26, the ROP Unit assisted Southeast Impact Detectives with a kidnapping and aggravated assault investigation. The suspect was in a dispute with his girlfriend. The girlfriend called for assistance from witnesses. One individual attempted to assist and was dragged by the suspect's vehicle. The suspect fled the scene and the girlfriend was able to escape. ROP detectives began surveillance at the suspect's residence. A short time later, the man was observed leaving the residence and was taken into custody. The man is a convicted felon and was found in possession of a 9mm handgun.
- Streets Level Gang Unit officers conducted a tactical plan at a northeast apartment complex in response to gang issues on July 13 and 15. The plan resulted in two felony arrests, eight gang cards and 25 citizen contacts.
- On July 8 and July 15, Gang detectives assisted the Burglary Unit in capturing known gang members with burglary warrants.
- During July, Gang detectives responded and took fugitive responsibility on two homicides and assisted the Vice Unit throughout several high-profile investigations.
- In July, the Vice Unit focused on following up

leads and continuing to investigate two ongoing, high-profile cases. The Southwest Companions case has resulted in over 25 search warrants being executed on various electronic devices such as laptops, cell phones and other digital storage. Unit detectives are awaiting the results of those warrants so that they can continue with prosecution of the cases.

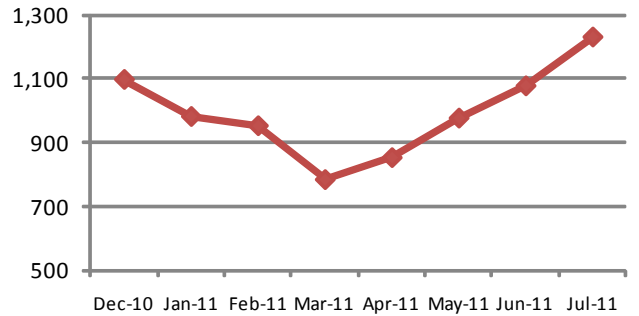
- Vice detectives made 17 misdemeanor arrests in July, wrote/executed 16 search warrants and completed five felony arrests.
- Task Force detectives seized \$112,000 in cash, 748 grams of methamphetamine, four grams of heroin and two stolen firearms. The Task Force wrote eight search warrants and made nine controlled narcotics purchases.
- Eastside Narcotics officers conducted 23 knock and talks. The Unit wrote eight search warrants, and made 11 felony arrests. In July, the Unit seized five grams of methamphetamine and four grams of heroin. The Unit recovered two stolen vehicles and placed three subjects into custody.
- Westside Narcotics officers completed 12 felony arrests, wrote eight search warrants and made 17 controlled buys. The Unit seized 3.5 grams of methamphetamine, 21.8 grams of cocaine, and 9.7 grams of heroin. The Unit submitted 10 cases to the District Attorney's office for prosecution.
