## APD Notables...

### Southeast Area Command...

- The Southeast Area Command continued its Operation Hot Spot initiative in October; directing field officers, power team and Impact detectives to problem areas identified through predictive analysis in an effort to reduce crime and improve the quality of life for area residents. Output measures have been extremely high, and give an indication of the success of the effort.
- Southeast officers were tasked with a number of major events in October including protests near UNM and Nob Hill area and the air show at KAFB. The air show attracted between 60,000 and 70,000 attendees.
- On October 20, Detective K. Sandy from the Vice Unit wrote a detailed and elaborate operation plan to address prostitution concerns in the Southeast Area Command. The operation was performed in response to numerous citizen and business complaints. Detective Sandy planned to have two separate “john” operations, a prostitute sting operation, and a uniformed presence conducting zero tolerance patrol. All operations were run simultaneously. With a combined effort from the Vice Unit, the Undercover Gang Unit, the Uniformed Gang Unit, the Criminal Intelligence Unit, the Southeast power team and Officer J. Lopez of the Southeast graveyard shift. The plan resulted in 24 misdemeanor arrests (18 were “johns”), eight felony arrests (six were prostitution-related), 13 gang cards, 13 cars towed, 35 movers, one firearm recovered, one missing person found, and one prostitute was admitted into long-term rehab.
- On October 15, Officer T. Melvin was dispatched to a northeast location in reference to an aggravated battery against a household member. The victim was severely beaten by her son, who then left the residence removing all of his clothing. Officer T. Melvin and Sgt. L. Wohlgemuth located the man inside a local grocery store. The man was tazed and taken into custody.
- On October 27, Officer T. Melvin was dispatched to Yale Boulevard SE and Gibson Boulevard SE in reference to a larceny of a suitcase from a local motel. Officer T. Melvin was able to obtain the license plate of a pickup with out of state license plates. Officer T. Melvin broadcasted the information of the

offender vehicle. Officers located the vehicle and suspects nearby. The victim’s suitcase was tossed out of the vehicle prior to officer’s contact; however, the victim’s blanket was located along with a male suspect. The victim identified the man who was arrested for felony larceny and conspiracy to commit a third or fourth degree felony.

- On October 15, officers were flagged down at Yale and Central by “Occupy Burque” protestors. They advised officers that a male came into their camp and tried to stab several of them. They pointed out the male to officers, and they also advised officers to be careful because he was armed with a knife. Officers confronted the man who was trying to flee the scene and refused to obey commands. A taser was utilized on the man, and he was taken into custody.
- On October 23, Officers A. Tapia and T. Economidy were dispatched to a southeast location in reference to a male subject who pointed a gun at neighborhood children. Through their investigation they located the subject and the gun. The male was booked for felony aggravated assault.

### Foothills Area Command...

- The James Joseph Dwyer Memorial Substation opened for business in October. The police facility is located at 12700 Montgomery Boulevard NE, just east of Tramway. Citizens can make police reports, pick up police reports, request crime statistics and neighbor crime information at the location. Scott Maddox is the Crime Analyst operating the substation and is available Monday thru Friday, 10:00 a.m. to 3:00 p.m.
- Officer Meyers created a tactical plan to clean up the area around Dunes and Dorado SE. He recognized that much of this area had become a dumping ground for all types of unwanted items, creating hazards and encouraging criminal elements. He utilized focused patrols, as well as graffiti and litter referrals. His actions resulted in the removal of ten yard sale signs, six graffiti referrals, one criminal trespass notice, and seven litter referrals.
- Officer Locke identified a cluster of auto burglaries and vandalism that was occurring in a Foothills apartment complex. Utilizing random and stationary patrols, Officer Locke saturated the area when not busy with calls or other duties. During his hours on watch, no burglaries or

vandalism were reported. He also identified an issue with drunk drivers along the Eubank section of the Foothills Area Command. By performing random patrols, he was able to arrest 27 drunk drivers, issue 57 citations, and seize 12 vehicles.

- On October 19, Officer Smith responded to a shooting in the southeast portion of the area command. A group of 4-5 male subjects ran to a four-plex apartment nearby and fired multiple weapons. The subjects inside were unharmed; however, over 20 different projectile impacts were located on the exterior wall. Due to Officer Smith's efforts and thorough investigation, a primary suspect was identified and the APD Gang Unit was able to take over the case.
- On October 4, Officer Lee assisted Detective K. Miller with a traffic stop along Interstate 40 in response to an erratic vehicle. Contact was made with the driver who appeared to be under some type of narcotic. The driver admitted to using heroin two hours before driving. When the subject was placed under arrest, he was found to have a loaded needle of heroin in his front pocket. The subject also had his five-month-old son in the vehicle at the time of the stop.
- On October 1, Officers Lee, Lopez and Mills were dispatched to Central Avenue in response to a disturbance. While en route, the caller stated a male subject forced his way into their hotel room and threatened them with a knife. When officers arrived, they made contact with the victims and obtained detailed information about the offender. They located the offender in a different hotel room and took him into custody. The officers also recovered the knife that was used in the incident. The suspect was arrested for aggravated burglary, aggravated assault with a deadly weapon and intimidation of a witness. The suspect had an outstanding felony warrant in Espanola NM, for child molestation.
- On October 6, officers were dispatched to a northeast location in response to a residential burglary that had just occurred. A neighbor stated he saw an unknown male kick in a neighbor's front door. The suspect left the scene before officers arrived, but the witness was able to obtain a license plate number and vehicle description. Officers were able to track the offender and get him into custody. The witness was able to positively identify him. All the stolen property was recovered and returned to

the victim.

- Officer J. Rogillio responded to a shoplifting at a local large retailer. Officer Rogillio learned four other accomplices were still inside the store. Officer Rogillio began conducting surveillance using the retailer's camera system and located the accomplices. He called for assistance and two of the accomplices were arrested, but the other two fled. He conducted further investigation and was able to identify the two that fled. Two of the offenders had an extensive criminal history, including shoplifting.

### Valley Area Command...

- Graveyard officers responded to an auto burglary and Officer Roberto located the offender vehicle and the occupants fled on foot. Officer Roberto along with other Team 7 officers were able to take two of the subjects into custody.
- Graveyard officers quickly secured a perimeter around a commercial burglary in progress location and took one subject into custody.
- Team 9 officers were dispatched to a person who was threatening to jump off a bridge at Paseo del Norte and Interstate 25. Officer Wesenberg was able to use his CIT skills to talk the man down from the fence and he was safely taken into custody and transported for a mental evaluation.
- The Power Team worked all month on narcotics issues around the Valley Area Command. The Team made eight felony arrests and 14 misdemeanor arrests, all narcotics related.
- Day shift officers assisted with and/or participated in several community events last month including the Balloon Fiesta, Home Depot's Children's Safety Fair, National Walk to School Day, the opening of a new bike park in the far North Valley and the Valley Area Command's Officer Appreciation Day.
- Valley command staff created numerous traffic tactical plans regarding concerns that were brought to the staff's attention by citizens. The tactical plans resulted in more than 120 citations being issued in problem areas.
- Impact detectives, Valley Crime Prevention and NiTe detectives worked on a tactical plan in October for a large retail shopping area. Two suspects were arrested for Auto Theft.
- The Valley Area Command Impact Team were also asked to look into reports of increased prostitution and drug activity in the area of 4th and Menaul NW. The Team made ten felony arrests, three misdemeanor arrests and three

warrant arrests.

- The Cruiser Tactical Plan continued to net numerous citations throughout October. To date, over 1,690 total citations have been written this year.
- Team 5 officers conducted a tactical plan using rooftops and night vision optics. Officers were able to observe criminal activity that resulted in two felony arrests, one of which was an aggravated deported felon who had been on the run for over a decade.
- Swing shift officers were responsible for 112 felony arrests in October.

### Southwest Area Command...

- Team One briefed at motels on Iliff for the first ten days of October. Officer J. Garcia arrested a female for auto burglary which lead to several other suspects being identified on burglary charges.
- Officer Brown was dispatched to a call where City employees had observed and photographed three suspects burglarizing a residence. Using the photos, Officer Brown was able to identify all three suspects which eventually lead to arrest warrants being issued.
- During October, Team Two focused on keeping the tourist community safe during the Albuquerque International Balloon Fiesta. Officers briefed daily at all of the area hotels and also some worked overtime to ensure that those visiting Albuquerque had an uneventful visit. There were no auto burglaries during the nine days of the Fiesta.
- Officers Nagy, Rodriguez, Marquez and Madrid conducted a burglary tactical plan in Beat 124 on October 28. The officers worked in a uniformed capacity utilizing two unmarked vehicles. The officers were able to gain valuable information during the tactical operation and arrested two individuals for outstanding burglary warrants. The officers also recovered one stolen vehicle.
- On October 15, Officers Myers and Gunderson were flagged down by bystanders in response to a shooting in the Northeast Area Command. Officers Myers and Gunderson were able to utilize information from the mother of one of the victims as well information gained from Facebook. Officer Myers used the gang monikers given to her by the victim's mother and was able to identify and show detectives photos of those involved holding guns and taking pictures of narcotics. Officers Myers and

Gunderson assisted Gang Unit detectives on the eventual capture of all the suspects involved in the shooting.

- On October 10, field units responded to a domestic violence call in which the offender was threatening to kill his girlfriend with a handgun and then shoot himself. The offender escaped but Detective Griego was able to obtain an arrest warrant for him. Detective Griego contacted the offender to speak with him about the incident but the offender was very agitated and stated that he was not taking his prescribed medication and would kill himself before he went to jail. The CIT Unit was contacted and asked to help with the arrest due to the offender's history of mental illness. Detective Griego located the offender at the CNM Campus and the ROP Unit was called to assist in taking him into custody.
- On October 31, Detective Grant responded to an auto burglary. The offender was arrested by field units and found to be related to a burglary that had occurred a week prior. On that call, several offenders escaped from the back of a residence prior to a perimeter being established. The offender admitted that she knew where one of the offenders was staying. Detective Grant and Killinger responded to the location and conducted a knock and talk. Several suspects were detained and a male was identified as one of the outstanding offenders from the burglary incident. He was booked for a felony warrant. Another male was arrested for possession of a controlled substance.
- Several quality of life tactical plans were conducted at bus stops in the area command. The plans were directed at people loitering at the stops and to act as a deterrent to criminal activity and other unpleasant incidents. Numerous contacts were made with the loiterers. Officers issued one misdemeanor citation and made one felony arrest. After two months of specific focus resulted in a drastic drop in calls for service, and freed up officers for other calls.
- On October 8, Officer Holguin answered an aggravated assault call at a local hotel. A male subject had threatened an on site security guard with what appeared to be a live hand grenade. Officer Holguin responded to the call and obtained the necessary information from the on-site security guard. Security guards informed Officer Holguin that the subject had stated the object was a live hand grenade and made movements which demonstrated him removing

the pin. Officer Holguin coordinated with other responding officers and safely executed the arrest on the subject without the use of force. It was later learned that the object was a toy replica.

### Northwest Area Command...

- Watch 1 officers continued to be aggressive in all areas of enforcement in October. The watch compiled 19 felony arrest, 35 misdemeanor arrests, 16 domestic violence arrests and wrote 22 criminal summons for various offenses. Watch 1 officers issued 846 moving citations, completed 47 DWI arrests, and 82 parking citations were issued along with 34 handicap parking citations. 273 offense reports were handled along with 1,733 calls for service and the watch also initiated 557 on-site activities.
- Watch 1 continued to address quality of life, community and criminal activity issues by initiating over 80 tactical operations. The operations were conducted throughout the command and included hot spot areas, commercial burglaries, auto burglaries, business and apartment complex checks, graffiti and public park checks.
- Watch II officers conducted continuous traffic tactical operations, netting significant results in both citations and a reduction in traffic incidents. Requests for traffic enforcement remain high throughout the command by both residential and commercial partners. Tactical operations involving day-shift bicycle officers have resulted in narcotics and property crime arrests.
- Team 2 officers initiated a panhandling tactical operation that resulted in numerous contacts with individuals who were referred to COAST and other social services. Elevated attention was placed on locations which had an increase in property crimes. The Northwest Impact Team, as well as bicycle officers, saturated the areas identified by the Crime Analysis Unit as potential high-criminal-activity areas.
- The Northwest Impact Team continued to implement their residential/auto burglary POP projects to identify suspects and clear cases where minimal information was provided.
- Watch III officers handle the largest amount of calls for service. Watch tactical operations were developed to address traffic and quality of life issues such as graffiti and disruptive behaviors.

### Northeast Area Command...

- In early October, Northeast officers responded to a fatality on Interstate 40 when a 23 year old man was killed while attempting to change his tire on I-40 westbound just west of Carlisle. Team 1 officers did an excellent job blocking off the freeway, securing the scene, identifying witnesses, and taking the offender in custody.
- Officer Ashley Leal was selected as October's Albuquerque Police Department Officer of the month. Officer Leal's award stems from at least two different incidents. The first one involved a traffic stop which netted an offender who had outstanding felony warrants, and possession of cocaine. On another occasion, Officer Leal was able to gain custody of an armed subject who was causing a disturbance at a convenience store and tried to stab a store employee. Once the offender was taken into custody, it was learned he had two knives. Officer Leal was recognized by several community and department organizations during the month.
- Officer Shane Treadaway was selected as the Mayor's Hero of the Week. The recognition stems from an incident where Officers Treadaway and Garcia were able to locate a missing juvenile who had been in the custody of a 21-year-old drug-using suspect.
- Detective Baker received a phone call from a victim whose vehicle was broken into near her home. The victim stated that she discovered many of her stolen items on Craigslist. Detective Baker called the offender to set up a time to see the items. When the detective arrives, the two offenders were taken into custody, including their vehicle. A large amount of stolen property was recovered. Both offenders are still in custody.
- Detective Roach, while off duty, observed an individual trying to cash worthless checks. He stepped in and started an investigation. Detective Roach ended up conducting a search warrant at the offender's residence. Detective Roach confiscated two computers, four cell phones, stolen tools and a small amount of methamphetamine. The items were secured through his execution of a search warrant.
- Team 5 officers quickly responded to a call of power lines down across I-25 at Jefferson which shut down both directions of travel at the beginning of rush hour. Due to the immediate response of units and the quick diversion of traffic to alternate routes, danger from the lines

was mitigated and traffic was able to resume within 40 minutes.

- Team 6 officers continued to be active in addressing problems within the Northeast Area Command. Throughout October, the Team conducted 19 different field briefings to target problem areas. The Team's aggressive enforcement resulted in 61 felony arrests. The officers also conducted seven tactical plans during the month to target problem areas.
- On October 19, Officers M. Martinez and C. Chavez responded to a local hotel in response to a disturbance call. Officers discovered that a male subject had become intoxicated and decided to jump from the second story hotel railing onto the hood and windshield of another guest's pickup truck. There was extensive damage to the vehicle's hood, windshield and windshield wiper arms. When the vehicle owner saw what the male subject had done, he yelled at the male subject. The male subject then jumped off of the truck, went back to the second story and began a physical fight with the elderly vehicle owner. The hotel clerk heard the commotion and investigated the disturbance. The hotel clerk then called APD. When the male subject saw the clerk on the phone he ran from the hotel. Officer Martinez was able to apprehend the male subject while en-route to the hotel. It was discovered that the male subject had also broken some of the furniture inside the room he was renting.

### Scientific Evidence Division...

- During September and October, the Biology Lab acquired Y-STR (male DNA) quantification kits for lab usage. Because of the stringency of this new technology, it is hoped that the kits can locate male DNA in CSP cases faster and more accurate than the normal, conventional methods. The Biology Lab began the validation process and barring complications, will be on-line within three months.
- Controlled Substances Unit scientists assisted undercover operations by converting cocaine salt into cocaine base (crack) for reverse buy purposes. This simple chemical technique not only allowed the officers to conduct important anti-crime functions, but also educated everyone involved regarding what to look for when individuals have engaged in this type of chemistry.
- The Firearm and Tool Mark Unit continued to

maintain currency with casework, while at the same time finding a new and innovative use for the Department's 3D Laser Scanner. The Unit used this device (in conjunction with Doppler radar) to precisely track the paths of projectiles, which perforated common materials such as windshields, drywall, and simulated tissue. While this is a first step in a long-term project, the early results suggest that the data will be very important for crime scene investigation, and will provide a more scientific foundation for accurately predicting the paths bullets take, and how much they are deflected in shooting incidents.

- In October, Identification Technicians processed 58 case dispositions; 91 employment background checks; 35 firearms requests, and 58 FBI background investigations. 298 RAPs and photos were distributed, 12 new APD applicants were fingerprinted, 1,858 fingerprints were classified in AFIS and 1,526 new and old arrests were processed into the TIBURON Criminal History Record during normal shift operations.
- The Evidence Unit received 3,311 evidence items, duplicated 636 audio/video recordings and supported 68 pre-trial viewings in October. The Unit returned 289 items to their owners, disposed of 1,262 items, and recovered \$723.78 in auction income. An additional 3,181 items have met final disposition processing requirements and are pending destruction court orders.

### Communications Division...

- The APD 911 Communications Center staff answered 67,668 incoming 911 and 242-COPS calls in October. There were 26,602 calls answered for 911 and 41,066 calls answered for 242-COPS. 911 Operators answered 89.61% of the 911 calls within 10 seconds (national standard is 90%, APD standard is 93.37%); operators also answered 94.31% of the 242-COPS calls within 30 seconds (APD goal is 90% answered within 30 seconds).
- The building security system was upgraded from analog to digital and additional cameras were installed.
- The Telecommunications Operator II position (dispatch) was posted on October 18th and is scheduled to close on November 10th. So far, over 250 applications have been received.

## Strategic Support Division...

- APD was recognized at the 2011 International Association of Chiefs of Police conference for two different awards for the work linked to two public-private initiatives that seek to address crime and public safety through community partnership and joint crime fighting efforts. APD was recognized as a finalist for the IACP Community Policing Award for Cities with a population over 250,001 for the development of Hospitality Partnership with Albuquerque's Hotel-Motel industry. At the IACP conference the work linked to this partnership was profiled as a "Best Practice in Community Policing". APD was also recognized as a Top 10 Finalist for the Webber-Seavey Quality in Law Enforcement Award for its work linked to building the Construction Industry Crime Alliance (CICA) with Albuquerque's Construction sector.
- In October, there were 116 incidents submitted on the CONNECT website by a combination of business partners and APD personnel regarding criminal activity during the month; of these, 67 were from ARAPA partners; 15 were Hospitality Partners; 23 by FISOA partners; 8 by CICA Partners; 1 by Pawn & Recycling Partners, 1 LE Hotsheet and 1 by Downtown. Additionally, there were 64 Alert Update Comments to these postings, which were provided by personnel from the various partnerships.
- In October, 32 new registration requests were received for the month for the various areas contained in the CONNECT website. CONNECT had a total of 1,835 visitors in 31 days for an average of 59.194 visitors/day.
- The October CICA meeting was held on Tuesday, October 11, and there were 11 partners in attendance
- The October Hospitality Meeting was held on October 27 at the MCM Elegante and there were 21 partners in attendance.
- The October ARAPA meeting was held on October 19, at which time the new Organized Crime Unit detectives were introduced to partners regarding how the unit will follow-up on investigations.
- On October 13, APD and ARAPA hosted the 2011 Southwest Organized Retail Crime Conference with over 400 persons registering to attend. Presentations at the conference included topics such as: Using Public-Private Partnerships to Combat Organized Crime; Fraud

of the Future: Smart Phone Technology and Crime; Using Technology to Combat Organized retail Crime; Counterfeit Currency: Production & Detection; An Albuquerque ORC Case Study; and, ORC and Impact on Southwestern Border States. Feedback on the conference was very positive from all attendees and continues to show ARAPA as a leader in the country for establishing effective public-private crime fighting partnerships.

- The Crime Analysis Unit created 176 bulletins and maps in October. The Unit also created 713 cyclical reports, maps and threshold alerts.

## Professional Standards Division...

- The Basic Training Unit incorporated the training curriculum that was recently adopted by the New Mexico Department of Public Safety Law Enforcement Board (NMDPS LEA). The curriculum will take effect on January 1, 2012. The APD Academy will implement all changes beginning with the 106th Cadet class which starts November 7, 2011. The Basic Training Unit is also implementing "The Four Pillars of Justice Based Policing" concept to the new Cadets. The concept will be integrated into training by following the four basic principles represented by the LEED model: Listen and Explain with Equity and Dignity. By addressing these four critical human needs on every call, officers will elevate the quality of interactions and people will see police as helping rather than controlling. The result will be improved officer safety and increased community trust.
- Recruiting efforts continue to increase, incorporating all segments of our community. In October, staff attended 11 job fairs/ recruiting events, establishing positive contacts with potential applicants and job placement counselors. Three new advertisements will be appearing in the NAACP regional meeting agenda, [ihirelawenforcement.com](http://ihirelawenforcement.com), and Albuquerque the Magazine. Recruiting and selection has been completed for the 106th Cadet class, seating 46 cadets and one Albuquerque Fire Department arson investigator. Testing and selection has begun for the 107th Cadet class, the Prisoner Transport Unit, and the upcoming Police Service Aide Class.
- The Advanced Training Unit completed Phase 2 MOE and will incorporate two additional make-up dates to accommodate personnel who were unable to attend regularly scheduled

classes. Advanced Training continues to provide MEGGITT simulator training to APD units as requested. The training has also been introduced to civilian employees to assist them with verbal de-escalation skills. Several community meetings were hosted at the APD Academy, including CICA, ARAPA, a neighborhood block captain meeting and Teen Court.

- The Westside Range prepared for the 106th Cadet class firearms training, ensuring all materials and weapons are ready. Range staff conducted an M&P transition course and completed day and night qualifications for officers returning from administrative assignment, military, or injury leave. There were a total of 153 officers who utilized the range for practice.
- The Tactical Range continued to assist SWAT with scenario-based training. The training was provided to Southeast Area Command officers, and will be provided to all FSB officers this year and continue with non-uniformed officers in 2012. There were a total of 210 officers who utilized the tactical range for practice including numerous outside agencies. The tactical range is quickly becoming New Mexico's only regional firearms range. The tactical range is utilized by other county agencies, state, and various agencies within the federal government. Planning has begun to create a state of the art regional firearms training facility.
- Academy staff attended the "Officer/ Supervisor Role in Managing the Use of Force Incident" conference.

### Support Services Division...

- The Criminal Nuisance Abatement Unit (CNAU) posted 57 units as substandard in October, identified 16 problem properties, and visited 242 properties.
- Detective Wickline and Detective Treece conducted a warrant tactical plan for the month of October. The plan resulted in three arrests and a parole revocation. One individual arrested had two misdemeanor warrants and two felony warrants. The second individual arrested had three felony warrants and was a probation/parole absconder. She was also found with a syringe and heroin.
- Court Services scheduled 79 pretrial hearings, processed 521 arraignments, submitted 423 felony cases to the District Attorney's Office, and submitted 275 summons to Metro Court.

- The Telephone Report Unit generated 391 telephone reports and 134 telephone supplemental reports which resulted in a total monetary savings of \$21,000 and 1,365 officer hours if the calls for reports were dispatched to Field Services.
- In addition, the Telephone Report Unit received 247 on-line reports which resulted in a monetary savings of \$9,880 and a savings of 642.20 Field Services hours.

### Planning and Policy Division...

- The boiler that was problematic at the Valley Area Command was replaced.
- Development of the Leadership Academy and companion office space continued in October. Painting, window tint, carpet and furniture selection were completed. Division staff also coordinated the selection of a security system and began finalizing the technology package.
- Division staff completed the Sharepoint site that is tasked with keeping track of PERF recommendations.
- Division staff submitted suggestions of departmental accomplishments for the Mayor's State of the City Address to be held in November.

### Records Division...

- The Data Entry Unit finished September, 2011 and started October, 2011 work.
- The Unit conducted the 3rd annual "Turkey Drive" for Joy Junction.
- The Report Review Unit has two temporary employees that are entered accident report face sheets and BCSO offense report face sheets. They have eliminated the backlog for entering the accident and BCSO offense reports into Tiburon.

### Traffic Division...

- The Traffic Unit issued 1,237 citations in October.
- The DWI Unit arrested 205 people for driving while intoxicated.
- The Seizure Unit confiscated 153 vehicles in October, totalling \$163,323.
- In October, the Traffic Unit made nine felony arrests, four misdemeanor arrests and two DWI arrests. The Unit issued 875 moving citations, including 53 for cell phone use while driving. The Unit conducted 33 tactical plans in



October that produced 289 citations. The Unit investigated 200 crashes, including five that were fatal.

- From October 1-9 the Air Support Unit utilized both aircraft and flew flights for every Balloon Fiesta Event to support traffic and ground units in the egress and ingress of Balloon Fiesta traffic. The aircraft also patrolled the TFR (Temporary Flight Restriction) area, preventing any aircraft from entering the area that was not authorized.
- On October 1, Air Support Unit staff set up and coordinated a response to an aircraft with a declared emergency (606- NMSF's helicopter) at Double Eagle Airport. The helicopter experienced tail rotor failure and circled the airport in preparation for an emergency landing. ASU units coordinated with 606, Double Eagle Tower, AFD, State Police and NMDPS MDT and had emergency services on site ready to assist 606. 606 was able to land without injury to crew or damage to the aircraft.
- On October 18, at about 0008 hours, Air1 observed a dark colored van traveling at a high rate of speed eastbound Interstate 40 over the river. Air1 kept a visual on the vehicle and started units to conduct a traffic stop. The vehicle continued at a high rate of speed and failed to maintain a lane several times. The vehicle eventually exited and went northbound on San Mateo. The vehicle came to a sudden stop and entered the intersection, on red light, at both Menaul and Candelaria. Units were finally able to conduct a traffic stop at Candelaria and Manzano. The driver was found to be DWI and was arrested.
- On October 25 at 2320 hours Air1 assisted UNM PD, State Police, APD ERT and SWAT/K9 with the removal of protesters from UNM's property in the area of Yale and Central. Several subjects were taken into custody without incident but several subjects resisted. After the group was escorted off of UNM property several subjects proceeded to block Central Avenue. Air1 assisted by giving real-time updates to incident commanders. Air1 remained on-scene until approximately 0140 hours on October 26.

### Special Operations Division...

- During October, the Bomb Squad was assigned to provide security for the 2011 International Balloon Fiesta. The squad responded to numerous calls of suspicious bags on the field,

as well as one suspicious foreign national refusing to let balloon pilots search his bag prior to a flight that he was trying to get on. APD's Bomb Squad also responded to general calls for service at the Balloon Fiesta, including locating children who were reported missing.

- The EOD (Bomb Squad) was deployed 19 times in October. The call outs included a mailbox explosion in the Northeast Heights, and a subject who threatened a security guard with a grenade (which turned out to be inert). Other call outs included an unknown subject leaving large mortars and gas containers at APD's Traffic Substation. The squad also assisted SWAT with robot support on two occasions.
- APD's Bomb Squad K-9 units conducted sweeps for UNM football games, a loss prevention conference held at the convention center, and two visits from United States Department of Homeland Security Secretary Janet Napolitano.
- The Canine Unit conducted 52 building searches and 3 area searches.
- The Mounted Unit patrolled the Albuquerque International Balloon Fiesta in October. Duties included field security, clearing areas of patrons for fireworks, clearing the field for balloon operations personnel before the competition, and public relations for the event. The Mounted Unit was able to assist in locating nine missing children during the event and was able to speak with several hundred people from all around the world who came up to see the horses.
- Homeland Security coordinated with the Southeast Area Command, KAFB Counter Terrorism Section, and 377th Security Forces to support the KAFB Air Show/Open House to prevent and mitigate any terrorist activity. The open house was expected to attract 90,000 civilians. The section coordinated with the Bernalillo County Homeland Security Section to provide mass decontamination if necessary and survey equipment for weapons of mass destruction. The section ensured that Southeast personnel were equipped and prepared for a WMD event.
- Section staff attended the Sunport Emergency Plan meeting and the annual table-top exercise. Section staff provided guidance on evacuation plans and also attended the table top exercise providing our input into APD's role in supporting an incident at the Sunport.
- The section attended the MMRS communication subgroup and steering committee. MMRS

discussed the acquisition of new 700 Mhz radios for hospitals in the event of a major disaster.

The new system will provide more channels for voice communications and internet connection.

- In October, the Prisoner Transport Unit processed 1,716 prisoners through the Prisoner Transport Center. The Albuquerque Police Department arrested 1,423 prisoners, and other agencies arrested 293 prisoners. The Prisoner Transport Unit made 208 trips to MDC and accepted 43 walk-in prisoners at MDC.
- The savings in hours and fuel costs for the month of September was \$32,858.

### Investigations Bureau...

- On October 14, the Undercover Gangs Unit responded at the request of field officers to assist on an attempted murder case. All Unit detectives responded to assist, and apprehended the two main offenders. Detective Fisher continued to work on the case, and two additional arrests were also made. The investigation also resulted in the seizure of over 30 grams of heroin and a handgun.
- On October 18, Detective D. Garcia obtained a two count federal indictment for a multiple-convicted felon.
- On October 20, the ROP Unit established surveillance at a northeast Albuquerque location in reference to a suspected fugitive. Two suspects were arrested without incident by the ROP Unit.
- On October 28, the ROP Unit set up surveillance on a stolen Saturn automobile. The vehicle's occupants were taken into custody for receiving and transferring a stolen vehicle. The two advised that they had just plead to a separate receiving and transferring a stolen vehicle case where they used the Saturn to attend the hearing.
- Detective K. Sandy from the Vice Unit wrote a detailed and elaborate operation plan to address prostitution concerns in the Southeast Area Command. The operation was written at the request of Lieutenant G. Callaghan in response to citizen and business complaints. The operation was performed on October 20. Detective Sandy planned to have two separate "John" operations, a prostitute sting operation, and a uniformed presence conducting zero-tolerance patrol. All operations were run simultaneously. Using a coordinated effort from the Vice Unit, the Undercover Gang Unit, the Uniformed Gang Unit, the Criminal Intelligence

Unit, and the Southeast John Squad. During the over five hour operation, the group completed 24 misdemeanor arrests (18 were "Johns"); eight felony arrests (six were prostitution related); 13 gang cards and towed 13 cars.

- On October 1, Detective Vollmer from the Vice Unit responded to a possible human trafficking case. Field officers received information that a 17-year-old girl was being prostituted by a 22-year-old man. Detective Vollmer worked through the night and determined the man coerced her into making several "dates" for \$150 and attempted to sell her for \$3,000. The man was booked into the Metropolitan Detention Center on charges of human trafficking, second degree criminal sexual penetration and sexual exploitation of children. He was held on a \$300,000 bond.
- In October, Eastside Narcotics completed 11 felony arrests, wrote four search warrants, and submitted 13 cases to the District Attorney's office. Eastside seized 84 grams of methamphetamine, 24 grams of cocaine, and two firearms.
- In October, Westside Narcotics completed 14 felony arrests, wrote 12 search warrants, and submitted 11 cases to the District Attorney's office. Westside seized five grams of methamphetamine, 21 grams of cocaine, 30.8 grams of heroin, and one firearm.

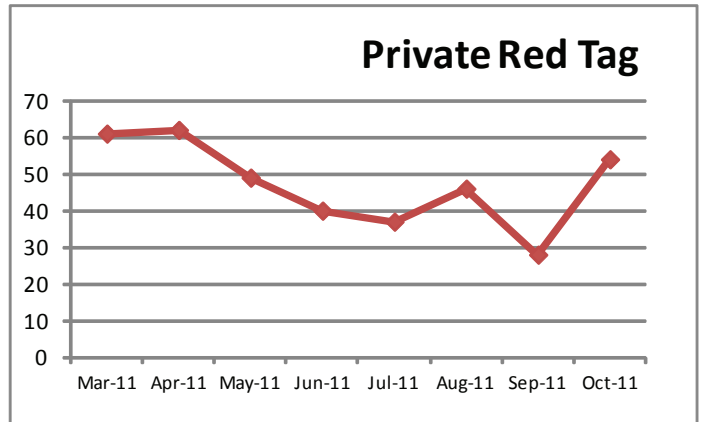
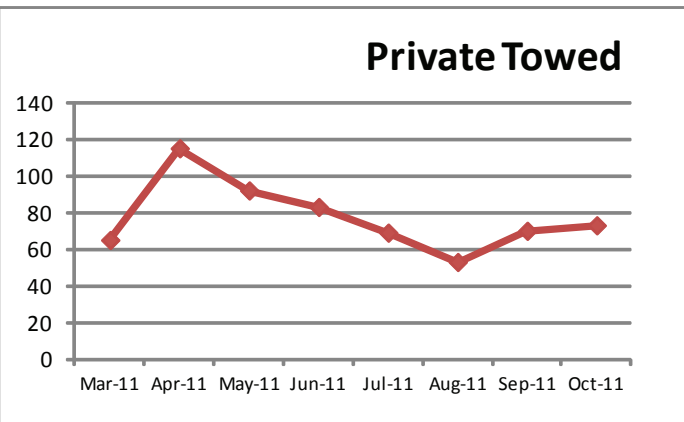
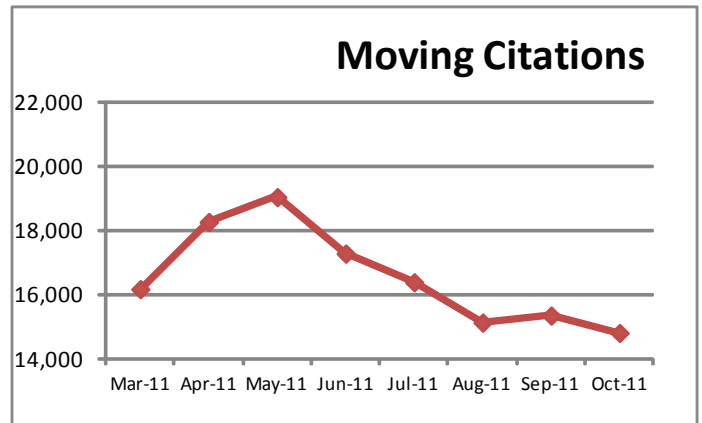
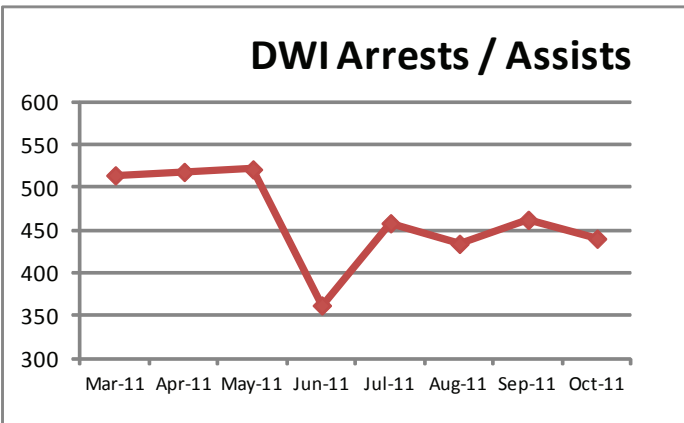
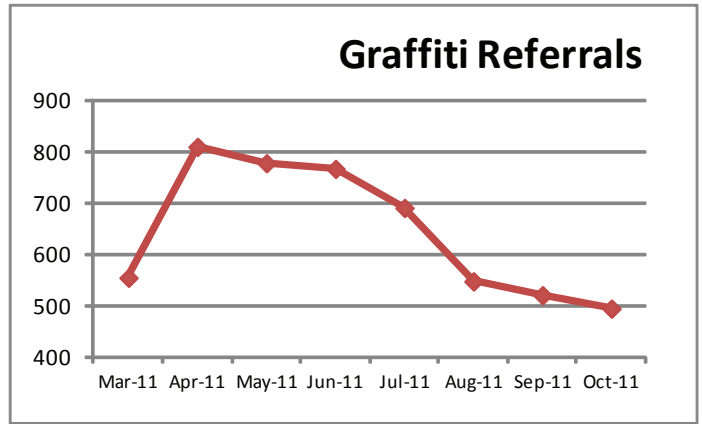
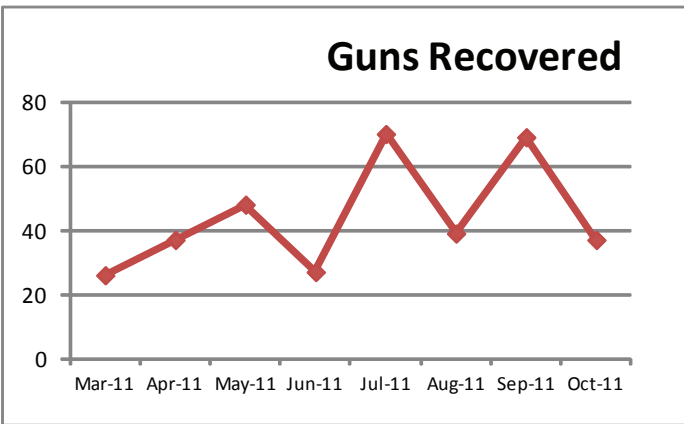
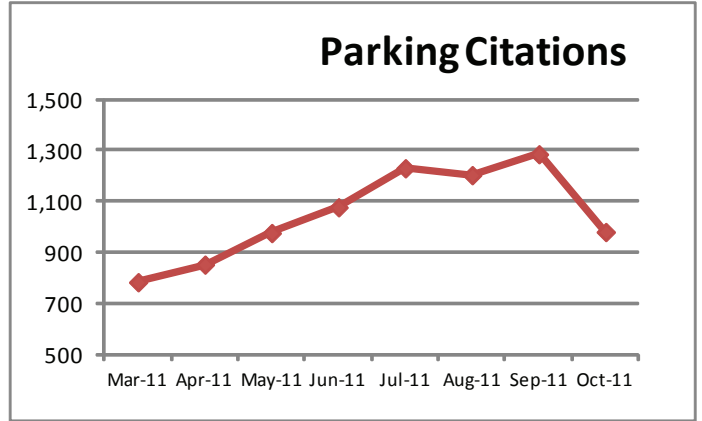
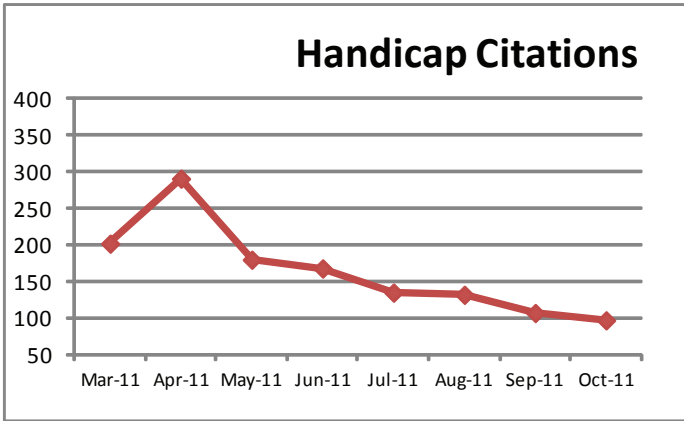
- The Homicide Unit responded to four call outs during the month of October. One of the call outs was an actual UCR homicide. The additional three call outs were major cases. The Homicide Unit sent six cases to the District Attorney's Office for prosecution in October. The Unit currently has 57 active cases.
- The Armed Robbery Unit responded to four call outs and cleared 49 cases in October with 38 of those going to the District Attorney's Office for prosecution. They made four arrests, wrote two arrest warrants and served two search warrants. The Robbery Unit had 38 new cases assigned this month and received approximately 75 new reports. The Unit has 43 active cases.
- The Sex Crimes Unit responded to nine call-outs in October, cleared 23 cases, and sent eight cases to the District Attorney's Office for prosecution. There were 24 new cases assigned. The Unit served five search warrants, and has 45 active cases. The Unit also assisted with several

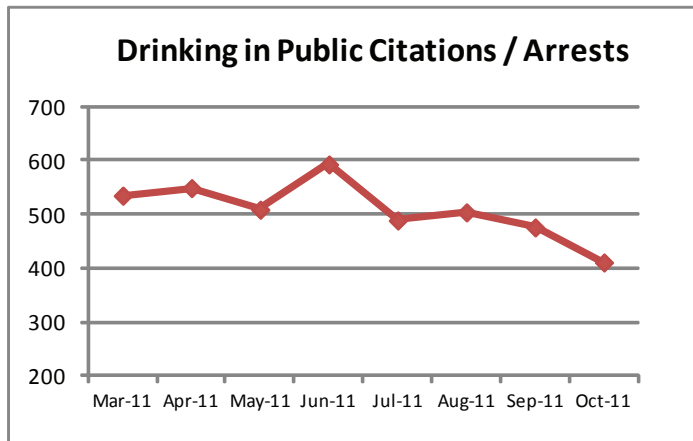
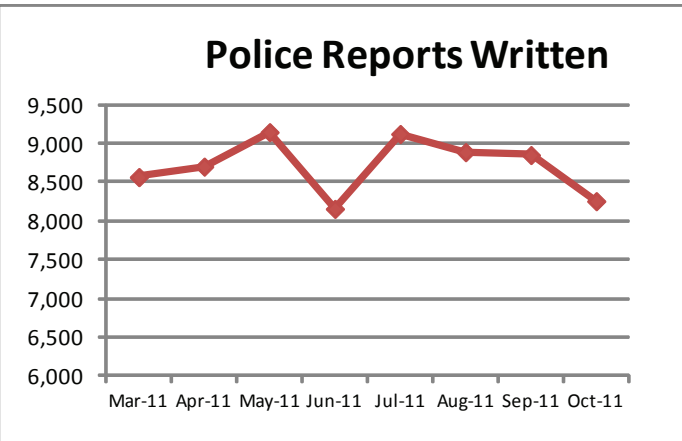
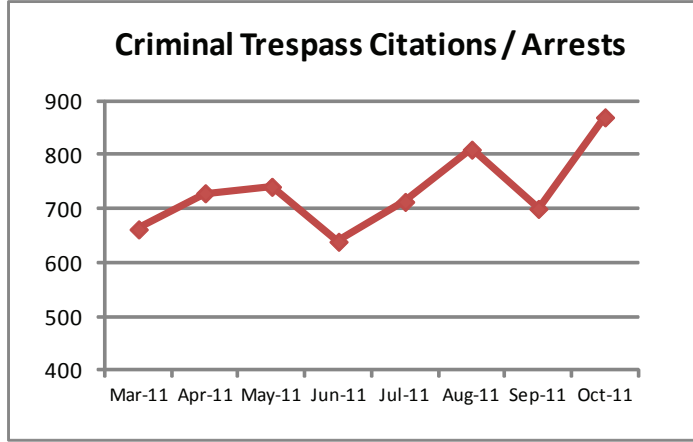
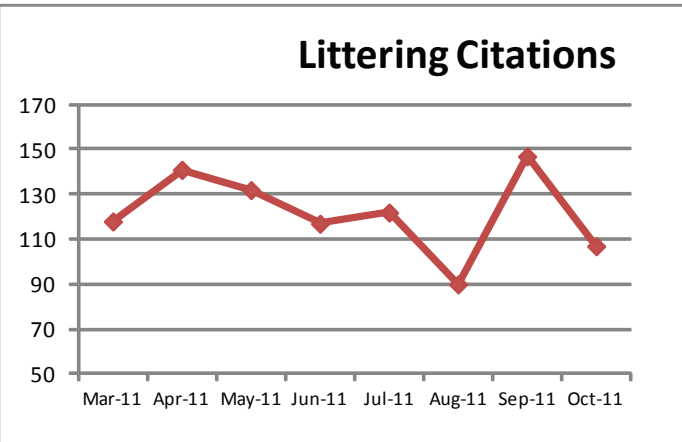
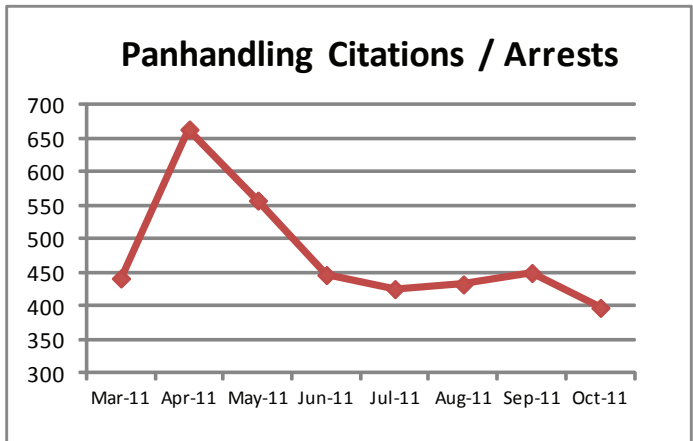
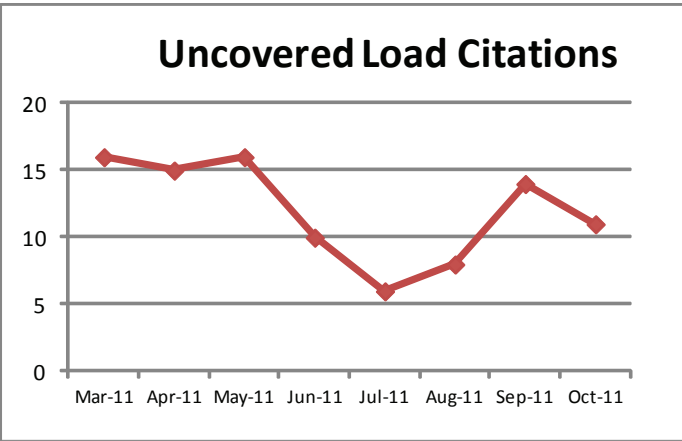
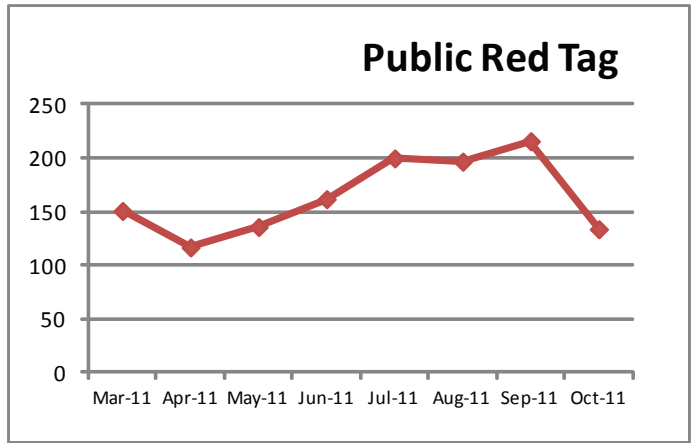
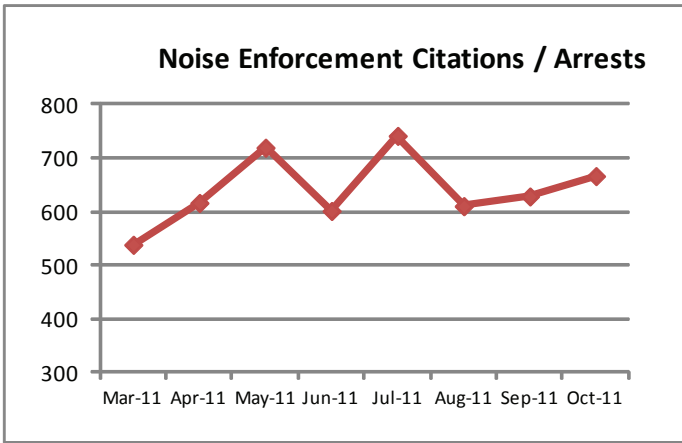
violent crimes call-outs. The Sex Crimes Unit made 48 referrals to the provider's side at the Family Advocacy Center in October.

- The FASST Unit cleared 25 cases in October, sending 11 of those to the District Attorney's Office for prosecution. FASST detectives reviewed 244 cases. The Unit has six active cases. The Unit cleared two misdemeanor warrants resulting from tactical plan arrests and served three restraining orders. The Unit also made 10 referrals to the service provider side of the FAC.
- There were 101 new runaways/missing persons reported to the Missing Persons Unit in October. The Unit cleared 98 total runaways/missing person cases. The Unit sent three cases to the District Attorney's Office for prosecution. Detectives Dyer and Wiebe were able to locate and return a missing juvenile to Arizona.
- The CIT / COAST Unit assisted 337 individuals in October. The Unit completed 34 home visits and made 363 referrals for social services. The Unit also completed 23 threat assessments, eight hazard files and completed seven officer safety bulletins.
- In October, the Crimes Against Children Unit (CACU) received 853 referrals for review and possible assignment. The Unit cleared 80 cases and sent 36 cases to the District Attorney's Office for prosecution. CACU responded to 29 call-outs and made nine arrests. Five search warrants were performed in October. Detectives were assigned 68 new cases distributed among the eight detectives assigned to the unit. CACU responded to one child death call out in October and the case is still under investigation. Detective Z. Wenz assisted with eight Spanish-speaking interviews and translated numerous phone messages and conducted phone calls for detectives. Sergeant Weber, who serves on the Child Fatality Review Panel, made its final recommendations to the State Health Department for the previous year of review.
- The Child Exploitation Detail (CED) cleared 12 cases. Of those, five cases were sent to the District Attorney's Office for prosecution. CED assisted the Field Services Bureau by responding to 22 calls and participated in nine investigations with outside agencies. CED also responded to five call outs and completed 10 search warrants. CED detectives completed 43 computer/cell phone forensic examinations in October. The Child Exploitation Detail taught 89 students at

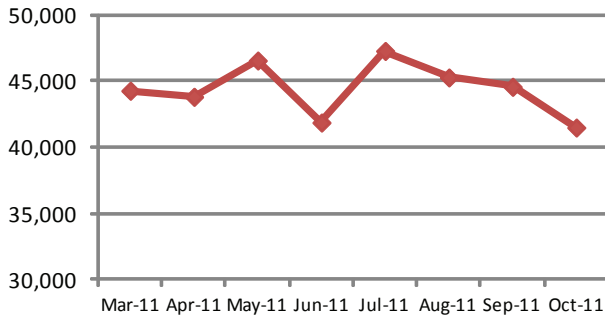
various schools on cyber-bullying and internet safety. The Child Exploitation Detail requested two subpoenas for active peer-to-peer sharing of child pornography.

- In October, SORD conducted 41 verifications of registered sex offenders, performed 60 hours of surveillance, and collaborated with a multi-jurisdictional task force for the Halloween Holiday. SORD detectives provided 20 APD officer assists and made 28 community contacts. Sixteen background investigations were completed during the month of October. The Unit responded to five call-outs in October. SORD Unit detectives made two arrests in addition to working with BCSO and probation and parole to insure compliance with sex offender laws during the busy holiday season.
- During October, School Resource Officers continued implementing programs and training, including GREAT, school lock downs, and traffic control plans. Members of the SRO Unit assisted with the Balloon Fiesta and received many positive comments on their performance. Officer Zamora, in coordination with the National Guard, established a Red Ribbon Week to keep kids off of drugs. Officer A. Lehocky began the private school pilot program and conducted several lock down trainings and drills with the schools. The program will continue to grow until all schools public or private have a representative from APD that they can go to for training or questions. Officer T. Baldonado apprehended a robbery offender and recovered a projector that was valued at three thousand dollars.

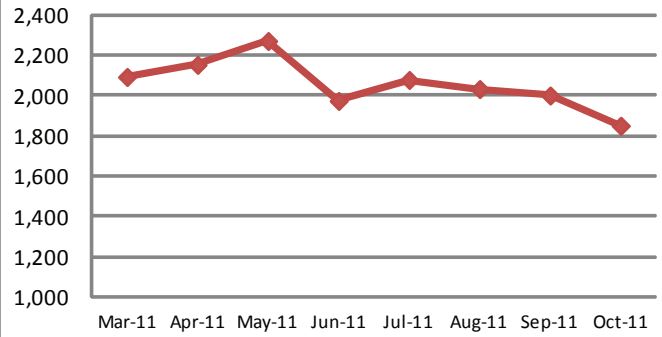




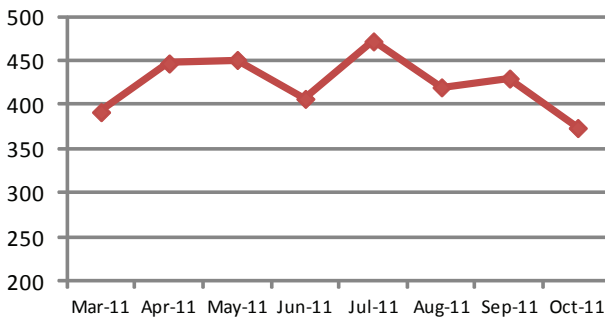
