


# NOTE CFS BY PROGRAM CFS BY CALL TYPE\*




## FISCAL YEAR TO DATE CALLS FOR SERVICE







#### MAJOR RESPONSE ACTIVITIES

- Following the tragic double homicide of two Albuquerque teens on Mother's Day, CORA conducted outreach where the victims attended school, offering support and resources to the staff and students that knew the victims.
- The day after the active shooter incident that took place on Espanola St., CORA conducted outreach with APD's Southeast PRT team to offer support and resources to residents of the neighborhood. CORA spoke with several neighbors providing them with resources.
- CORA received a referral from HopeWorks for an unsheltered victim of domestic violence. CORA was able to meet with the victim and get her into a hotel for the week while Hopeworks worked on the long-term housing stability plan.

#### PROACTIVE AND ONGOING COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT ACTIVITIES

- CORA assisted in the City's efforts to support the evacuees at the Ramada Hotel. CORA helped gather an assessment of needs and meal distribution.
- CORA tabled at the Public Safety Town Hall hosted by Representative Dixon and Herndon. CORA provided resources and knowledge on the different ways the Albuquerque Community Safety Department is committed to serving our community.
- CORA was invited to speak at a monthly meeting for the staff at the Sexual Assault Nurse Examiners (S.A.N.E.). During the meeting, CORA educated staff about how ACS and S.A.N.E can collaborate to serve our community and survivors of sexual assault.
- CORA Responder, Lynae, is a proud member of the Gun Violence Prevention and Intervention Task Force
