

RADICALISM LEFT AND RIGHT IN COLD WAR LATIN AMERICA

ISABELLA COSSE & LUIS HERRÁN AVILA

Offered in coordination with the Albuquerque Museum's "Dictatorship and the Disappeared" exhibit, Drs. Cosse and Herran Avila will discuss the emergence, operation, ideology, and social relations of left- and right-wing radical political groups in Cold War Latin America. In a conversation moderated by UNM Professor of History Liz Hutchison, these historians will go beyond the usual approaches to Latin American radicalism to examine how forces of religion, sexuality, family formation, and ideology shaped these radical groups' formation and impact.



Isabella Cosse is a historian and researcher at CONICET (National Council of Scientific and Technological Research) and a professor at Universidad Nacional de San Martín, Argentina. She has written several books (including *Estigmas de Nacimiento*, 2006; *Pareja, sexualidad y familia en los años sesenta*, 2010; and *Mafalda: historia social y política*, 2014, also published in English as *Mafalda: A Social and Political History of Latin America's Global Comic*, 2019) and other publications where she looks at childhood and family in relation to social, cultural and political processes.



Luis Herrán Ávila is a historian of the Latin American Right and of the Cold War in Latin America. He is Assistant Professor of History at the University of New Mexico, and holds a PhD in Politics and History from the New School for Social Research. He has published in English and Spanish on the history of anticommunism, conservative Catholicism, and right-wing movements in Mexico and Argentina, and has written op-eds for Mexican newspapers *Reforma*, *El Norte*, and *El Universal*, as well as *Foreign Affairs en Español* and *The NACLA Report on the Americas*. His current book project focuses on the national and transnational dimensions of anticommunist activism in Cold War Mexico.
