ZANE BLANEY: Words are only like a window that has no light of its own but only shines forth out of the light that it emits. Beginning today on "The Public Affair", a series of original poetry by Albuquerque poets. With the introductions, poet Karla Hall.

KARLA HALL: David Johnson is currently teaching at the University of New Mexico two classes. One on poetry and the other mythology. He has had work published in several magazines including the *New Mexico Magazine* and *Stooge*. He'll be having a book coming out this Summer called "Pilgrim Country", published by the San Marcos Press. He's also working on a book on mythology and literature. The poems David's reading today are largely a result of a year spent living in Mexico and a journey he took two years ago through Europe. David says about himself, he writes to come to terms with his own experiences and to discover the meaning of them.

HALL: Clay Thurmond moved to Albuqueruqe from Texas several years ago to attend the University of New Mexico. He is presently finishing his studies and teaching a poetry class at Jefferson Junior High School. His interest in writing began as a reaction against his early military school education. He says the past year has been his most intense, creatively. The following reading represents some of his most recent work.
