	23	SECTION 1. A new Part 19 is hereby added to Chapter 2, Article 6 of the
	24	Revised Ordinances of Albuquerque, New Mexico, 1994, establishing the Route
	25	66 Visitors Center Commission as follows:
	26	"§ 2-6-19-1 SHORT TITLE.

1 This Ordinance may be cited as the "Route 66 Visitors Center Commission 2 Ordinance."

§ 2-6-19-2 MISSION AND GOALS.

- (A) Route 66 Visitors Center Mission. The Route 66 Visitors Center, an interactive cultural center, is a public-private partnership between the City of Albuquerque and local non-profits and local businesses, managed by the City of Albuquerque's Arts and Culture Department, dedicated to preserving the history of the country's longest urban stretch of Route 66 that is the only location where the route crosses itself and educating both the residents and visitors of Albuquerque about the role that the Historic corridor plays in economic and community development. The City shall carry out the original vision of the community members who first conceptualized the Route 66 Visitors Center in the 1990's.
 - (B) Route 66 Visitors Center Goals.
- (1) To provide a vibrant cultural hub and economic anchor for the Route 66 related events and celebrations, including the upcoming Route 66 Centennial Celebration.
- (2) To provide a culturally and historically relevant location for launching programs and events to celebrate the legendary Route 66 corridor.
- (3) To serve as a community workspace designed to inspire collaboration, creativity, and productivity among freelancers, entrepreneurs, startups, and remote workers who are producing products and services that elevate Route 66 a history related to the development of the center.
- (4) To serve as an archive of research and oral history materials accessible to the public and Route 66 stakeholders for the purpose of education, preservation, and management of the historic Route 66 corridor.
- (5) To reflect the diversity and richness of the City and the State's culture and history related to Route 66.
- (6) To serve as a catalyst for tourism-related business along West Central, including helping stimulate private and public investment, create jobs and bring greater prosperity to the West Side, and all of Albuquerque.
- (7) To seek maximum support and cooperation from government, industry, academia, and private institutions.

- 1 § 2-6-19-3 COMPOSITION OF THE COMMISSION.
- 2 The Route 66 Visitors Center Commission shall consist of seven (7) voting
- 3 members and three (3) non-voting advisory members confirmed by the City
- 4 Council. The commission shall be composed of:
 - (A) The Mayor or his/her designee.
 - (B) Two City Councilors, one of which is the Councilor representing the section of Albuquerque South of Central Avenue, west of the Rio Grande and East of the Albuquerque City Limits. The other shall be a member of the City Council appointed by the President of the City Council.
 - (C) Four representatives designated by the West Central Community Development Group or its successor.
 - (D) An advisory member from Visit Albuquerque.
 - (E) An advisory member from the Hispano Chamber of Commerce.
 - (F) The Director of the Arts & Culture Department as an advisory member.
 - § 2-6-19-4 APPOINTMENTS.
 - (A) Term of Office. The initial Commission members shall serve an initial term of five (5) years. After the expiration of the initial five (5) year term, the term of office of each member of the Commission shall be three (3) years from the date of appointment.
 - (B) Vacancies. Vacant positions occurring as a result of an expired term shall be filled by the entity that appointed the outgoing member. Vacant positions occurring for reasons other than an expired term shall be filled by the entity that appointed the departing member, with the replacement member serving for the remainder of the unexpired term.
 - § 2-6-19-5 ORGANIZATION AND MEETINGS.
 - (A) The Mayor and or their designee shall serve as the Chair of the Committee. The Committee shall elect a Vice Chair to serve in place of the Chair in their absence.
 - (B) The Commission shall meet monthly unless otherwise determined by the Chairperson or requested by three (3) or more members.
 - (C) Decisions of the Commission shall be made by a majority vote of those voting members present.

- 1 (D) Quorum shall consist of four (4) voting members, one of which shall 2 be the Chair or Vice Chair. 3 § 2-6-19-6 DUTIES AND POWERS OF THE COMMISSION. 4 The Route 66 Visitors Center Commission shall: 5 (A) Authorize such policies as are deemed necessary for the operation 6 of the Route 66 Visitors Center. Policies are defined as broad operational 7 quidelines, within which programmatic and administrative decisions may be 8 made and implemented in accordance with accepted City administrative 9 procedures; 10 (B) Recommend and authorize programming at the Route 66 Visitors 11 Center, including programming at the event space, taproom, museum, 12 amphitheater, neon sign park, gift shop, and co-working spaces; 13 (C) Review and recommend an annual fee schedule for renting the 14 facilities in the Route 66 Visitors Center; this includes developing a fee 15 schedule that offers meeting spaces for free to neighborhood associations 16 and community groups who might not have sufficient funding to access other 17 meeting spaces; 18 (D) Review and ensure that Route 66 Visitors Center collections are 19 maintained and preserved in accordance with professional standards for 20 museum operations and the public interest; and authorize policies for the control, acquisition, and disposal of Route 66 Visitors Center materials: 21 22 (E) Review and recommend appropriate contractual arrangements 23 between the City and contractors providing services to the Route 66 Visitors 24 Center; and 25 (F) Act as a forum for communication, education, and dialogue with 26 Albuquerque residents and visitors about Route 66 history and culture as well 27 as the role that Route 66 plays in economic development along Central 28 Avenue in Albuquerque.
 - SECTION 2. COMPILATION. SECTION 1 of this Ordinance shall amend, be incorporated in, and made part of the Revised Ordinances of Albuquerque, New Mexico, 1994 as a new Part 19 in Chapter 2, Article 6, titled, "Route 66 Visitors Center Commission."

	1	SECTION 3. SEVERABILITY. If any section, paragraph, sentence, clause,
	2	word or phrase of this Ordinance is for any reason held to be invalid or
	3	unenforceable by any court of competent jurisdiction, such decision shall not
	4	affect the validity of the remaining provisions of this Ordinance. The Council
	5	hereby declares that it would have passed this Ordinance and each section,
	6	paragraph, sentence, clause, word, or phrase thereof irrespective of any
	7	provision being declared unconstitutional or otherwise invalid.
	8	SECTION 4. EFFECTIVE DATE. This Ordinance shall take effect five days
	9	after publication by title and general summary.
