- 4. Pulse of the Neighborhoods—Brief reports from CPC members and citizens
 - Joe Abbin presented a comparison of Albuquerque crime stats for 2017 and 2018 based on the newly released (September 30, 2019) FBI Uniform Crime Report. See Appendix A of these minutes for the presentation slides. The FBI data reveals that Albuquerque violent crime remained unchanged between 2017 and 2018 at record breaking levels, putting our city in the top four worst cities in the US for violent crime and number one for property crime. The FBI numbers differ substantially from the numbers reported by the city in the Albuquerque Journal even though the source data came from APD in all cases.
 - Byron Powdrell- related that he observed a vehicle going the wrong way on Tramway and called 911 but nobody responded apparently because the wrong way driver went from county to city and the handoff of the call did not happen.
- 5. Presentation Pete Dinelli on "Housing for the Homeless" and the recent Bernalillo bond issue for a homeless center that was passed earlier in the month. Mr. Dinelli is a lawyer and former city councilor who has dedicated decades of his life to public service. He maintains a blog, www.petedinelli.com with 60,000 followers with his analyses of many public issues. Some of the high points of his presentation follow:
 - a. A January point in time survey revealed 1524 homeless living on the street in Albuquerque and the number has been increasing year to year
 - b. Some think actual number may be 5000 based on school free lunch stats
 - c. 80% of homeless are suffering from mental illness or drug addiction
 - d. Westside overflow jail is now a remote homeless shelter, costs \$5M annually to operate, \$1M to transport homeless back & forth to downtown
 - e. Bond issue did not specify a location for new shelter and issue might have failed if it did since nobody wants it in their neighborhood
 - f. New shelter may be scattered smaller shelters rather than a central facility




Appendix A 2017 - 2018 Albuquerque Crime Summary
