The Albuquerque Community Policing Councils (CPCs) were established under the Court-Approved Settlement Agreement (CASA) in United States v. City of Albuquerque (Case No. 1:14-cv-01025). Their mission is to foster communication, collaboration, and trust between the Albuquerque Police Department (APD) and the community through advisory roles. The NWCPC tasked itself in 2024 with introducing the public to multiple departments of the Albuquerque Police Department, increasing membership and formulating closer ties with the NE.

#### Purpose

CPCs aim to:

- Review APD policies and community policing strategies.
- Convey community feedback to APD.
- Advise on recruitment diversity and transparency.
- Ensure constitutional policing practices. Additionally, members of the NWCPC attended local events held by both APD and others.

### Membership

The SECPC saw a total of eight members in 2024 and finished the year with a total of four as of the writing of this report, our membership is steady at three.
