

City Council Redistricting 2001


- Same basic process
 - Redistricting Committee
 - City Council
- Over 40 plans
- Name of plan that was adopted in June 2001
 - Plan G-2-1d Mod5
- Similar growth patterns from 1991 to 2000 as occurred over the last decade


City Council 2001 to 2010


Growth Patterns in Albuquerque

Current Districts



Estimation Process - Data

- 2000 Census data
 - Precinct level
 - Total and adult population
 - Census block group level
 - People per household
- Building permits within ABQ
 - 2000 through 2009
 - Residential only

Estimation Process – Data (continued)

- Postal Service data
 - Vacancies
- Voter registration
 - Reality check

Estimation Process


Precinct data

- Baseline data at the precinct level
- Apply 2000 Census data to today's precincts
 - Precinct splits since 2001 redistricting

Building permits

- Identify vacant homes and exclude
- Append people per household from encompassing block group
 - All building permits within a block group will be given the average household size of the block group
- Fine tune around the edges

Block Groups

Estimation Process (continued)

- Building permits (continued)
 - Assign precinct numbers to building permits
 - Aggregate permit household population to the precinct level
- At this point we have...
 - 2000 Census data at the precinct level
 - Includes race/ethnicity categories
 - Add'l population at the precinct level, based on permits
 - Does not include race/ethnicity categories

Estimation Process (continued)


- At the precinct level...
 - Apply 2000 Census race/ethnicity profile to the add'l population
 - Example if a precinct was 50% Hispanic in 2000, 50% of the add'l population in the precinct will be Hispanic
 - At the precinct level, add add'l population by race/ethnicity to the 2000 Census data to derive final population totals by race/ethnicity for the precincts
- Ready for redistricting

Estimation Process (continued)

Miscellaneous

- If 2000 Census data does not exist, use neighboring geographies
- Use voter registration as reality check
 - Is % change in registered voters from 2000 close to % population growth over the same time period?
- Block groups and precincts do not share the same boundaries, they overlap
- People per household is not available at the precinct level
