## **OVERVIEW AND HIGHLIGHTS**

The City of Albuquerque is a high desert metropolis located in the central region of the state and is the economic and population hub of New Mexico. The City has approximately 560,000 citizens and a metropolitan area of 909,906 citizens. The City covers a total area of 189.54 square miles with an average elevation of 5,300 feet. The City on average enjoys 310 sunny days per year. The Sandia Mountains run along the eastern side of Albuquerque and the Rio Grande River flows through the City. The City is located at the intersection of Interstate 25 and Interstate 40 and is served by air and rail. Albuquerque is home to an international airport, several institutions of higher education, Kirtland Airforce Base and Sandia National Labs.

The City was founded in 1706 and has an elected Mayor and a nine council seat form of government. The Mayor, as the chief executive officer, has the responsibility for developing the annual budget, daily operations, and the strategic direction of the City. The City's Council establishes local laws, approves the budget and provides government policy and oversight.

The City's Fiscal Year 2019 operating budget was \$997.7 million. The General Fund revenues primarily consist of gross receipt and property taxes. The City manages revenue and expenditures through the General Fund, Special Revenue, Capital and Enterprise funds.

The City provides a full range of general government services for its residents. These services include police, fire and emergency medical services, health and social services, planning and zoning management, parks and recreation, library and municipal development and infrastructure. Business focused enterprises include an international airport, solid waste collection, and a transit system. Drinking water is provided by the Water Utility Authority.




# Primary Sources of Revenue

## WHAT'S NEXT

The City of Albuquerque is creating a vibrant and forward-thinking environment to nurture, retain and attract businesses and families. We have an engaged Mayor, an active City Council, and a talented workforce. Together we are One Albuquerque; giving everyone a seat at the table to make our community safer, and more innovative and inclusive.

Public safety remains our top priority. In Fiscal Year 2018 and 2019, the City added funding for 100 additional officers, increased funding for property crime reduction programs and replaced police vehicles. In fiscal year 2020, we will add funding for an additional 13 officers.

The City is actively seeking to grow economic opportunities. The City approved the use of \$8.75 million in City Local Economic Development Act (LEDA) Funds to Advanced Network Management Inc., TaskUs Inc., Netflix Studios LLC, and NBC Universal Media for technology services and film studio projects that will create numerous jobs and result in an infusion of \$1.5 billion in direct and indirect spending into the statewide economy. Netflix is expected to spend \$1.0 billion over the next decade for film and television productions in the company's first corporately-owned studio.

## **OUR FUTURE CHALLENGES**

### **PUBLIC SAFETY**

Restoring staffing levels at the Albuquerque Police Department is one of the keys to turning the tide on public safety. Meeting the needs of our community to hire additional officers will require targeted marketing campaigns highlighting the benefits of joining the Albuquerque Police Department. This includes partnering with local entities to entice new recruits with incentives such as signing bonuses and moving support if necessary.

#### YOUTH OPPORTUNITY

The City is focusing on increased after school programs and summer programs. This includes providing increased funds for swimming lessons, library programs, meals and nutrition, and open-space activities.

#### **HOMELESSNESS**

The City is working to address homelessness at each stage from emergency shelter to permanent housing. The City is keeping the Westside Emergency Housing Center open year-round, funding housing vouchers, and using outreach teams to connect people experiencing homelessness to behavioral health and other services. In November of 2019, the City approved \$14 million of general obligation bonds for a centralized gateway center for homeless services. The City is engaging the public and service providers to determine the site for the center and the range of services that will be provided.
