CREI Programs

Community Centers

The Playground Recreation Program is a CREI program that currently operates in 24 elementary schools and 3 community centers. There are seasonal programs as well as year round before and after school programs. 767-5885.

Therapeutic Recreation

Therapeutic Recreation provides recreation activities for participants (child, teen, & adult) with and without disabilities in a full inclusion setting. The program operates out of Loma Linda C.C. and offers seasonal satellite sites. 505-764-1525



School-Based Program

Students at participating APS high schools can enroll in JMP as an elective course in 9th - 12th grade. This involves group and individual meetings in which students receive career-readiness training for .5 credit hours per semester. Students also participate in volunteer, community service, and Job Shadow placements for which they can receive a stipend.



Course Instruction

Each participating high school is designated a School Based Coordinator who is responsible for instructing the JMP classroom seminar. Instructors will go over topics including life skills, social skills, employability, financial stability, and community partnership.

Work Experience

During the school year, JMP students gain work experience through community service projects, volunteer work, and job shadow.

Students use job shadow experiences to explore career options that match their interests and skills. Job shadow placements are facilitated by School-Based Coordinators, and students are eligible for a stipend each semester that they complete approved job shadow hours.

Summer Internships

Participants in the school-based program can apply for paid summer internships through JMP. Interns are placed at a city, government, and non-profit organization, work for seven weeks, and receive minimum wage.
