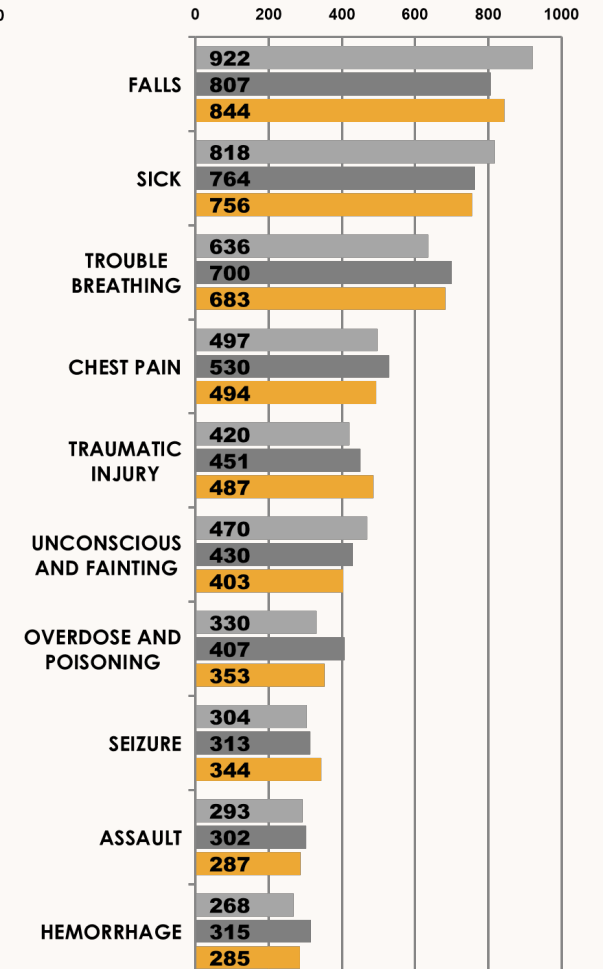

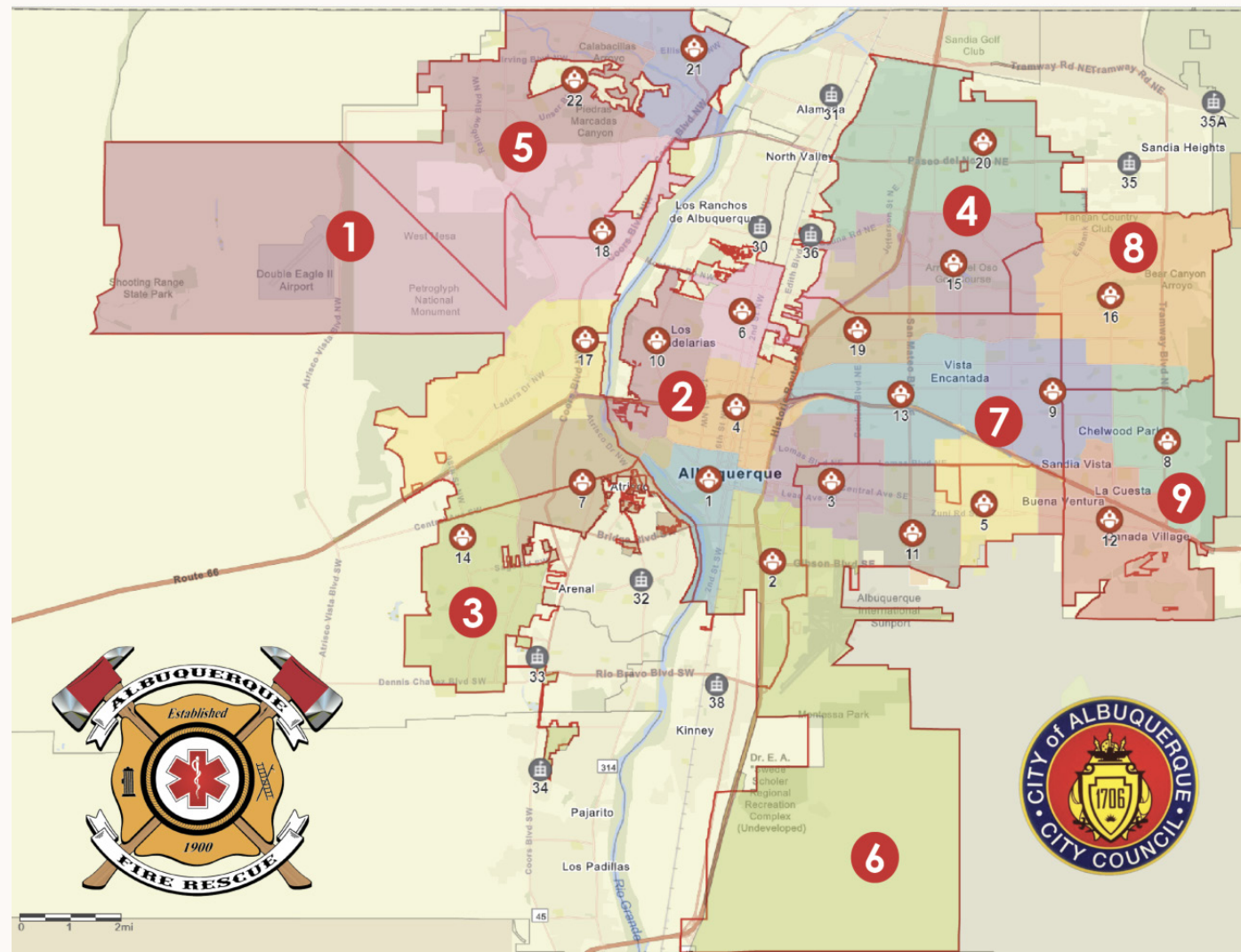

These events are activated by the AFR Dispatch Center as a "Significant Event" based on specific criteria and emailed to media and specific AFR members but does not include all responses by AFR to emergency calls.

8/4 - Commercial Fire: *AFR units were dispatched to 111 Coors Blvd NE at the Smiths grocery store in fire district 7 for reports of an explosion. Ladder 7 arrived on scene and reported light smoke coming from the front corner of the building. As additional units arrived on scene Engine 14 made entry into the store and was able to locate the maintenance room from where the initial explosion was reported. A small fire was extinguished as employees of the store were being evacuated. Two employees that were in the maintenance room working on HVAC repairs were injured as a result of the initial explosion. Rescue 14 and Rescue 7 arrived on scene and transported the two injured civilians to a local hospital. Both of the patients sustained significant burn injuries and were listed in critical condition. On scene AFR personnel continued their operation efforts to ensure that the building was clear of any hazards. The air quality was checked extensively as firefighters worked to ventilate the store. Out of an abundance of caution, APD was notified due to the initial explosion. Several of the adjacent businesses were also evacuated to ensure no exposures had occurred. There were no reports of injuries to firefighters. In total there were 16 AFR fire apparatus on scene to assist with operations.*

8/8 - Residential Fire: *AFR crews were dispatched to a possible structure fire at 142 Wisconsin NE in fire district 5. Upon arrival of the first unit, a single wide mobile home was found to be fully involved with fire. Engine 5 pulled an inch and three-quarter quick attack line and was able to get the fire under control within minutes of their arrival. The fire was contained to the mobile home of origin. There were no injuries to firefighters or civilians.*

8/9 - Apartment Fire: *AFR was dispatched to a possible structure fire at 1000 Marquette Ave NE in fire district 3. Fire crews arrived to a 2 story 4 plex with light smoke showing. After further investigation firefighters found a fire in the floor of the second story. Fire crews had the fire under control within minutes. No civilian or firefighter injuries were reported.*

8/12 - Residential Fire: *AFR crews were dispatched to a possible structure fire in fire district 13. The first arriving unit found a fully involved motor home adjacent to a residential structure. Firefighters made a quick attack on the fire and brought it under control within minutes of their arrival. There was a minimal damage to the adjacent home. No firefighters or civilians were injured.*

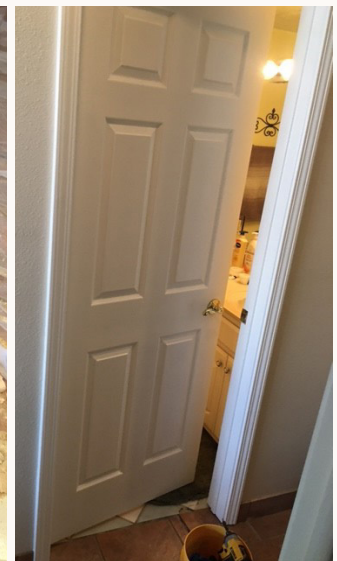
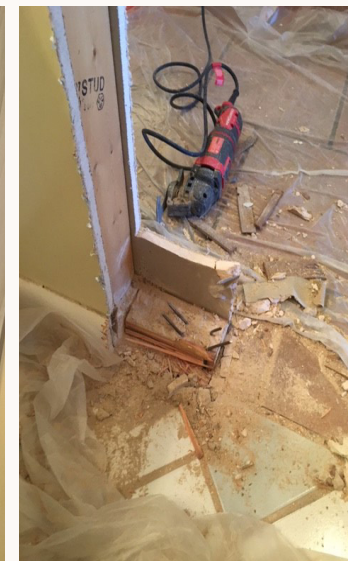
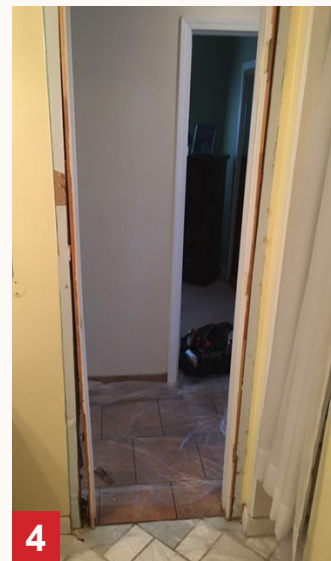
8/13 - Residential Fire: *AFR was dispatched to a possible structure fire at 820 Monte Alto NE in fire district 8. The first unit arrived to find a working fire in a residence. Fire crews made a quick attack and worked in an offensive strategy to bring the fire under control within 10 minutes. One civilian occupant was injured and transported to UNMH. No fire fighter injuries were reported.*

8/14 - Commercial Fire: *AFR responded to 5301 Quail Rd NW in fire district 17 to a possible structure fire. Upon arrival crews found smoke coming from the front door and the eaves of a McDonald's at this location. The building had been evacuated prior to arrival of firefighters. The fire was brought under control within 30 minutes of their arrival. Damage to the structure was mostly contained to the void space of the ceiling. No injuries were reported.*

8/25 - Commercial Fire: *AFR units were dispatched to a reported structure fire located at 6416 Central Ave NE in fire district 5. Station 11 crews arrived on scene and declared a working fire. E11 and R11 quickly performed a primary search. Due to structural instability and fire location a switch in strategy to defensive was implemented. The fire was brought under control within 30 mins. There were no injuries to civilians or firefighters reported.*

8/25 - Residential Fire: *AFR crews were dispatched to a single wide mobile home working fire located at 9000 Zuni Rd SE in fire district 5. Rescue 9 arrived first on scene took command with Engine 13 initiating fire attack. Unfortunately, there was fire related damage to the mobile home causing four people and one dog to be displaced. There were no injuries to firefighters or civilians.*

- 1. *AFR Engine 10 along with Engine and Rescue 4 were proud to be part of a car wash benefiting the Highland YAFL Program. Thank you to all that helped participate and helped to connect our firefighters with the community.*
- 2. *Fire Chief Gallegos, the AFR Executive staff and District 1 City Councilor Louie Sanchez participated in a traditional push-in ceremony for new Rescue 17. The AFR Apparatus Spec Committee did an outstanding job in the processes necessary to procure this 2022 Ford E-450 Braun Northwest Rescue. Rescue 17 and Rescue 2 are unique to our fleet as they are capable of transporting bariatric patients when necessary.*
- 3. *Special Olympics New Mexico invited Albuquerque Fire Rescue to participate in the Law Enforcement Torch Run Softball Tournament. Together 5k was raised to help NM Special Olympics athletes!*
- 4. *AFR HEART carpenter Steve Selgado performs on average 45 home modifications per month including toilet risers, grab bars, handicap ramps, door widenings and so much more. One client enrolled in our division has mobility issues requiring she use a walker to get around. Her bathroom door was too small to accommodate the walker. Steve widened her bathroom doorway from 24 inches to 30 inches (the max allowed by code) at no cost to her and has now allowed her to access this bathroom safely.*



FIRE MARSHAL'S OFFICE

INSPECTIONS DIVISION

- In preparation for the 2022 Balloon Fiesta's 50th anniversary, the Fire Marshal's Office has been attending regular meetings with city officials to ensure a safe event. We have received and are processing well over 100 tent permits for food vendors, arts and crafts, and many other events.
- With the long-awaited closing of Coronado Park, FMO was tasked with inspecting the Gibson Medical Center as a potential location to house Albuquerque's homeless. We went through two different buildings to ensure all life safety systems were up to code and that this would be a viable option.
- FMO continues to meet weekly on the adoption of the new city ordinance. In an effort to complete this arduous process, FMO has extended the hours of each meeting to be more productive.

ADAPT

- ADAPT has 144 properties that have been formally brought into the program, 86 have been cleared from the program and 58 are still in the program at different stages. ADAPT continuously monitors the properties that are in the program to track their compliance with the Nuisance Abatement Agreement.
- There are 116 properties on the Unsafe Buildings list. Four new properties were added to the list this month. The properties are labeled on the First Due application with a white "X" on a red background. In the field these properties are marked with a red spray painted "X" and the letters "AFR" under it.
- The following properties were entered into the ADAPT program:
 - * Desert Sands Inn & Suites located at 13317 Central Ave NE
 - * Community Housing Resources located at 7900 Bell Ave SE
 - * Court John Motel located at 2700 4th St NW
 - * Motel 76 located at 2007 Candelaria Rd NE
- One property cleared the ADAPT program with an average of 100% reduction in crime.
 - * 1809 Leonora Dr NW was cleared with a 100% reduction in reported crime.
- Two properties cleared the COP program with an average of 59% reduction in crime.
 - * 7900 Central Ave SW was cleared with a 45% reduction in reported crime.
 - * 5401 Central Ave NW was cleared with a 73% reduction in reported crime.

HUMAN RESOURCES

- Sick Leave Exempt/Emergency
 - * A significant factor when approving SKE/SKEXEMPT has always has been the time frame in which the employee submits documentation. Past practice has always been within two (2) weeks of the SKP leave occurrence. Two (2) week is considered “reasonable” or within a “timely” manner to submit. This past practice was performed by the past administration as well as current administration. Request for Sick Leave Exempt/Emergency has to be timely and within a reasonable time frame.
- Created a Leave Management Policy that combines all department leave into one document to alleviate member clarity regarding their leave benefits. Need Policy Review Committee and then LMC approval.
- Working with AFR HSO Deal to create a Light Duty (On-Job-Injury)/Modified Duty (Off Duty) Policy to reduce member’s uncertainties of such a request pending LMC approval.
- Created a Remote Work from Home Policy (Clerical employees).
- Approved by LMC.
- Creating a Volume 12 – Human Resources in Target Solutions. The goal is to combine all HR related matters into one TS volume. EX: IAFF Local 244 CBA, FMLA, Recruitment, PLF, Promotional Procedures, etc. Not accessible until folder is complete.
- Digitized all HR Personal files into On-Board platform. All files currently being uploaded into the platform.

TRAINING ACADEMY

Suppression Division

- The 99th Cadet Class started August 1st with 48 incoming cadets, one of the larger incoming cadet classes held by Albuquerque Fire Rescue Training Academy in recent years.
- As always, the introduction to the “business” of the Academy takes center stage as incoming cadets work to become a close-knit team aiming to reach a common goal with careful guidance from the Instructional Cadre.
- Topics of study include:
 - * Communications and radio operations
 - * Incident/Firefighter Rehab
 - * Target Solutions introduction and orientation
 - * PPE & SCBA Donning
 - * Building Construction
 - * Fire Extinguisher types and operation
 - * Hose handling and Advancement
 - * Salvage and Overhaul
- In-seat learning was suspended for several days due to COVID with online delivery of lecture material taking its place as in previous years.
- Resumption of class at the Training Academy introduced the first true test of mental toughness for the 99th Cadets with hose handling.
- The Training Academy would like to extend a very special “Thank You!” to the crew of Engine 14-A for their involvement with hose handling, their front line experience is key in the development of our future firefighters.
- 97th Cadet Class 3rd Quarterly evaluations feature the Rescue Certification Test-Out and delivery of final testable material leading to promotional 11-month test.



Professional Development

- Driver School course held August 1st – August 12th to prepare firefighters for certification on Engines and Ladders.
- Driver School Test out continues.
- Hazardous Materials Tech Class held at the Training Academy August 22nd – to September 2nd.

RECORDS MANAGEMENT

- Collaborated with Chicago Fire's Director of EMS, on processes for tracking patients during mass casualty incidents and coordinating reunification with family members after the event is over.
- Assisted the Health and Wellness Lt. and Clinician more efficiently connect with crews that have identified a need for their services.
- Developed and implemented a new process for continuous quality improvement (CQIs) and quality assurance (QAs).
- Welcomed Vianae Estrada, our new billing specialist, to the RMS Team.
- Provided Naloxone usage data and heat maps to APD Real Time Crime Center and the DEA to help identify areas to increase enforcement operations.
- Added Reason for AFR Transport selections of AAS Level Zero and AAS Critical Status and began tracking data.
- Added questions into the System Improvement Data (SID) panel to track and analyze instances of violence against EMS providers.
- Worked with ImageTrend to initiate AFR's InstaMed Account to provide access to claims, remittance, explanation of benefits (EOB's) and payment information to improve overall financial performance involving EMS billing.
- Continued conducting RMS station visits educating crew on available resources, how to mitigate common issues with ImageTrend, answering questions, receiving suggestions for improvements and talking about current projects the division is working on.

HEART

- HEART provided 80 rides with its "Rides with HEART" rideshare service.
- Uber ride service pilot program for the EMS system is underway.
- The HEART Home Modification Program provided 42 home modification installation services. These home installations included grab bar installations and ramp building in order to prevent falls.
- HEART received and processed 41 referrals for service. The patients were processed and moved into one of our many programs.
- In a partnership with the Office of Substance Abuse Prevention HEART provided all AFR Stations with "Leave Behind Narcan Kits" to provide to community members in need.
- Fentanyl Strips to Frontline units has been completed and supply will be ongoing.
- Buprenorphine Program- Inserting information for suboxone treatment in the LBN kits. Individuals will receive access to an app with counseling, cognitive behavioral therapy and contingency mgmt. Plus, monetary rewards for compliance.
- To date, the HEART BEATS stroke discharge program has received over 250 referrals for service. HEART is currently working with 71 patients in the program. Two more staff members are currently undergoing training to expand the HEART BEATS program in order to perform assessments as a separate team.
- HEART Beats presented at the International Neuroscience Nursing Research Symposium (INNRS) and was voted BEST Presentation.
- Be Brave Fall Prevention Classes taught at North Valley Senior Center.
- HEART hosted and taught Community Health Worker certification class. Mix of AFR, AMR and Sandoval County.
- Provided support fill for frontline units.

EMS TRAINING

- Four AFR firefighters and five APD officers completed the AFR/CNM fast track EMT- Basic course. All students are either already using their new licenses in the field, or are finishing National Registry testing.
- The AFR studio continued to film and produce training videos with Dr. Pruett, AFR QA Officers, and EMS Training Division Staff.
- The 12 AFR members in UNM's in person paramedic program, and the 1 in CNM's online course are progressing very well, with every one of them receiving incentive pay for maintaining above an 80% GPA in their respective programs.
- AFR's studio continued its work on Abqfire.com, the new recruitment and hiring website.
- Coordinated, assigned, and tracked monthly department training on Vector Solutions.

- Hazmat tech class started end of August and continued in September. 14 AFR personnel attended.
- Jeff Hankins from BNSF came and taught a class for the rail roads.
- Assisted the academy staff with help on cadet training.
- Continued training with Station 13, and 17.

WILDLAND

- The Type 6 Engine Crew, and our Helicopter Manager returned home this month from their assignments in Alaska, Wyoming, and Texas. The Type 6 Engine Crew was used as an initial attack/severity resource in Texas, and our Helicopter Manager was assigned to multiple fire and initial attack assignments in Alaska and Wyoming. Both resources received stellar reviews from their supervisors.
- The month of September is expected to be extremely hot and dry throughout New Mexico, and much of the west coast, with record daily temperatures reported. With the abundance of new growth, due to the monsoons, we must continue to be diligent, and prepare for what could potentially be a second fire season for us.
- The Wildland Division continues to receive resource requests every week, from around the nation, and will continue to facilitate those requests based off of current staffing.

**HEAVY TECHNICAL RESCUE**

- HTR assigned members were able to complete a large animal technical rescue course offered to us by our mutual aid partners of Corrales fire department. AFR trained alongside many of our fellow first responders to learn animal behavior and technical rescue systems to help our four legged friends.
- 14 members of AFR completed their rope operations course this month increasing our experience to provide technical rescue in the city and wilderness settings. These trained members will be able to support our mission for search and rescue, industrial rescue, and Wildland fire deployments.



FOC

- Administration and FOC/Special Operations made the announcement that a Lieutenant will be placed in the FOC position on C-shift. The reason behind this change is to add supervision and a division of responsibilities for all FOC-related duties. The Lieutenant will work as the FOC representative for C-shift and provide supervision and direction for both B and A shift. Relocating this position allows many of the shift and staffing duties to be handled at this officer level by having a clearing house for multiple daily concerns that affect the FOC's ability to manage the staffing board and find personnel to fill vacancies on a daily basis. The goal with this move is to see how the mid-level supervision can improve effectiveness and efficiency. This change will be evaluated periodically to look for other possible changes that could potentially be more effective in helping us work through our complicated and dynamic staffing.

SPECIAL EVENTS

- AFR The Westside Summerfest was held on August 20th at Ventana Ranch Park in Albuquerque's northwest neighborhoods. COA's Arts and Culture department coordinated with other city departments to include APD's Northwest command and AFR to host this event. Several local bands entertained while guests were able to visit local vendors set up in nearby tents along with numerous food trucks that provided wonderful food to help highlight the event that concluded the Summerfest season. Crews from AFR worked EMS standby in mobile units throughout the park while members of the Fire Marshal's Office ensured that everyone was working safely in providing a fun experience for all guests. A big thanks to the Arts and Culture Department and APD for their coordination and cooperation in making these events a success.
