



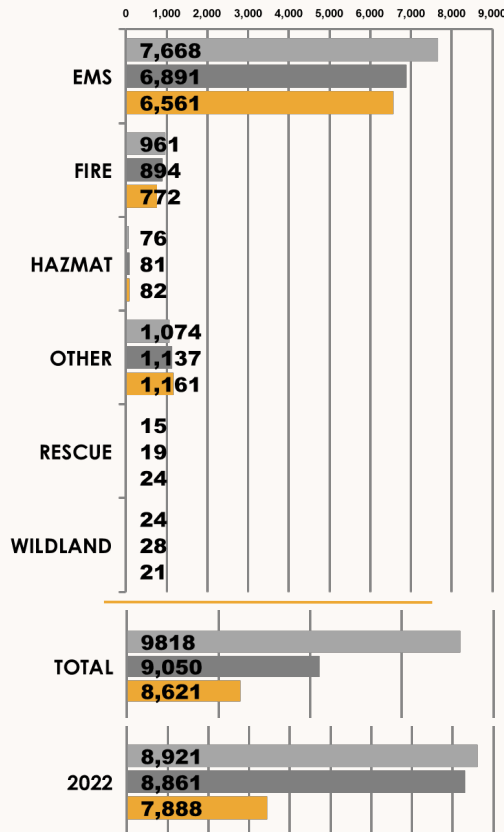

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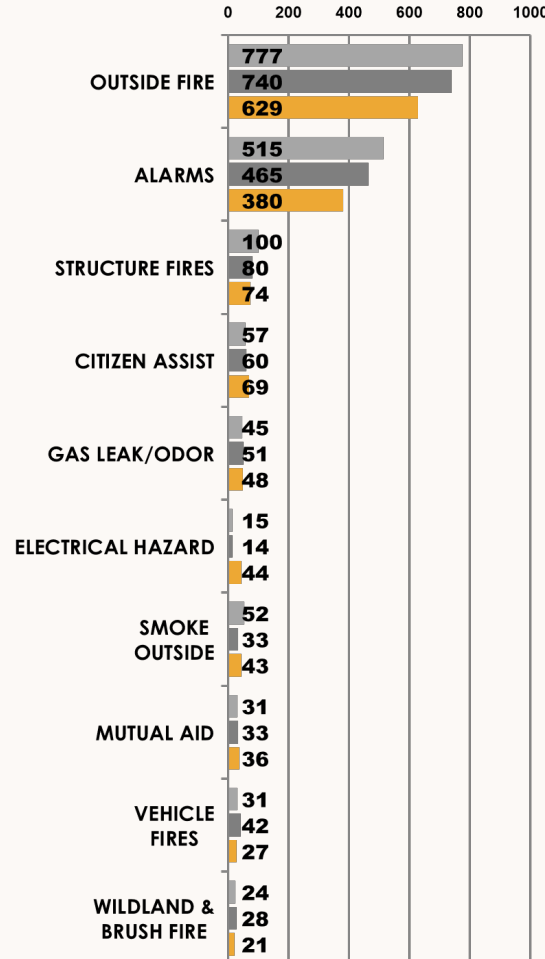

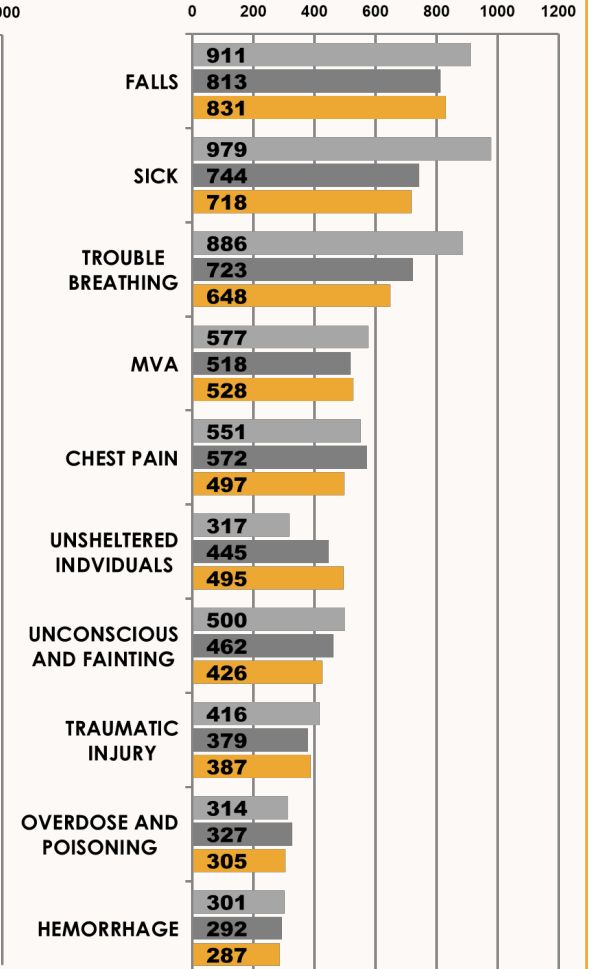

TOP 10 NON-MEDICAL CALLS



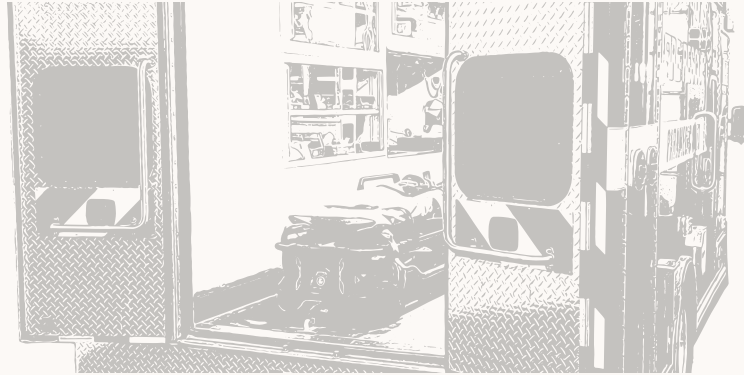

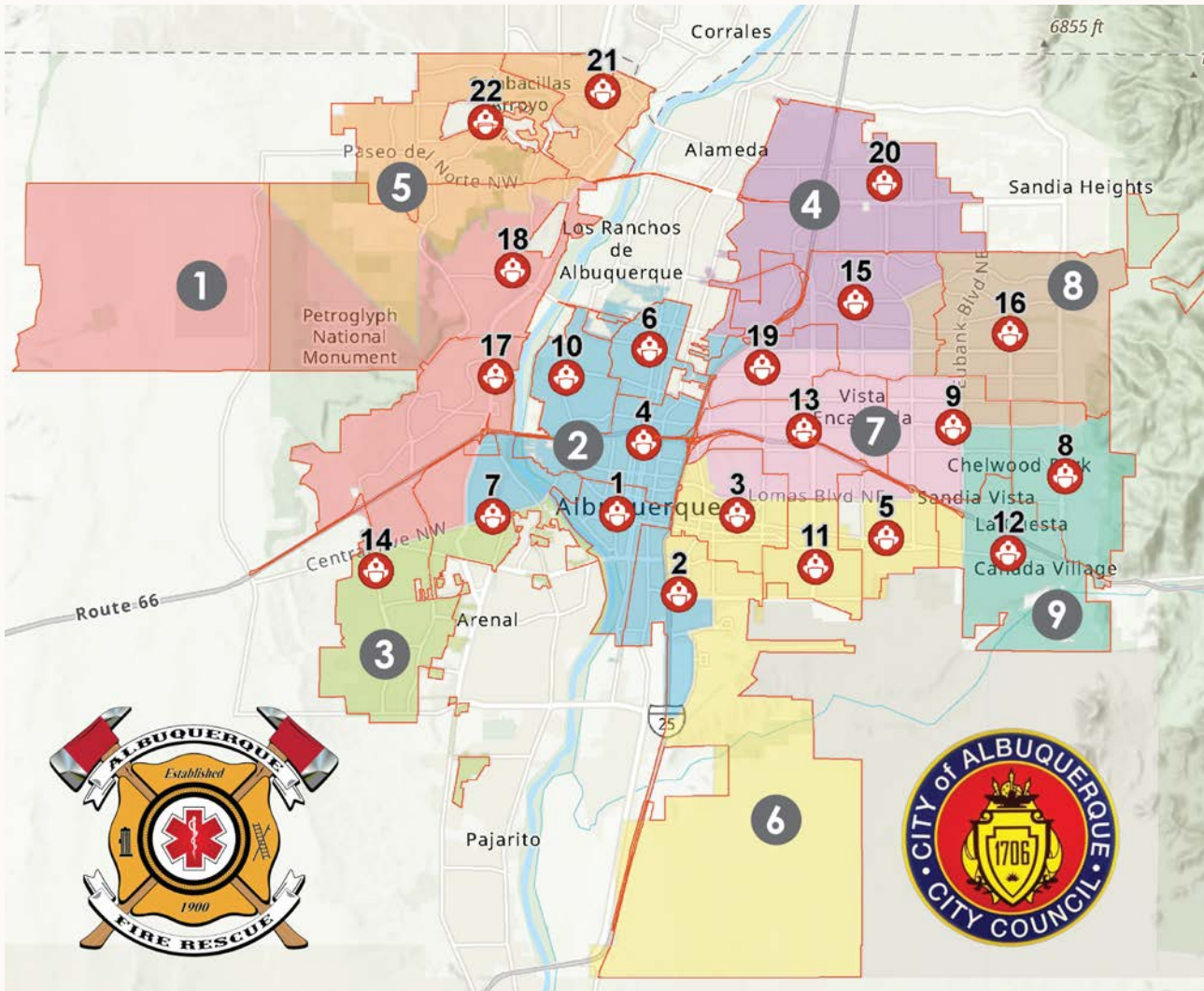

These events are activated by the AFR Dispatch Center as a “Significant Event” based on specific criteria and emailed to media and specific AFR members but does not include all responses by AFR to emergency calls.

2/1 - Commercial Fire: AFR crews responded to an outside fire located at 11500 Menaul NE in fire district 8. Engine 8 was first on scene and reported a fire behind the Dollar Tree. The engine crew quickly extinguished the fire but had concerns that the fire might have penetrated into the building. A full dispatch was called at that time. Once fire crews gained access to the Dollar Tree they discovered that the fire didn't penetrate into the building.

2/4 - Residential Fire: AFR units responded to a mobile home fire located at 6228 Karlson Dr. NE in fire district 20. Engine 20 was first on scene and reported smoke coming from the eaves of the structure. Firefighters extinguished the fire within minutes of arrival. There were a total of 9 responding AFR units at the scene. There was one occupant home at the time but self evacuated without injury. The occupant will be displaced and will be staying with family.

2/6 - Residential Fire: AFR crews responded to a single story residential home located at 158 Chama St NE in fire district 5. Engine 11 was first on scene of the abandoned house. Firefighters encountered heavy smoke and flames but quickly made entry into the home and extinguished the fire within 10 minutes of arrival. The cause of the fire was due to squatters. The home was a total loss.

2/20 - Residential Fire: AFR was dispatched to 10610 Central SE in fire district 12 for reports of a possible structure fire to a travel trailer. Medic 12 arrived on scene and reported a working fire with smoke showing. The fire was brought under control within 10 minutes of their arrival. Damage to the structure was contained to the original fire occupancy with no damage to near by exposures. There were no civilian or firefighter injuries reported on this incident.

2/22 - Residential Fire: AFR units responded to a single story residential kitchen fire at 7200 Pecos Trail in fire district 12. The occupant was cooking at the time of the fire. The occupant was displaced as well as her 2 dogs. Red Cross was Called to help relocate the occupant. This fire was quickly extinguished by fire personnel. There were a total of ten units that responded to this fire.

2/24 - Residential Fire: AFR responded to a single family residential mobile home fire at 10601 Central Ave SE in fire district 12. There were 6 AFR units utilized to extinguish the fire. The first responding units arrived on scene to find the mobile home fully involved in fire, the residents had already self evacuated themselves. The firefighters quickly performed defensive actions to extinguish the structure fire. There was a complete loss of the home due to the fire. The residents were displaced and Red Cross was called to help relocate the residents. There were no injuries to civilians or firefighters.

2/28 - Residential Fire: AFR units responded to an RV fire that was threatening a single story residence near 55th and Churchill SW in fire district 7. The RV fire was extinguished quickly before it spread to the residence. Two people and a dog were helped out of the threatened building.



- 1. Fire Chief Gene Gallegos will be retiring after serving as a fire fighter for Albuquerque Fire Rescue since 2000. Mayor Keller has appointed First Deputy Chief, Emily Jaramillo, as the next Fire Chief for AFR. Emily Jaramillo will be the first woman to lead the state's largest Fire department in it's 123 year history.
- 2. Ladder 9 had the opportunity to visit Hope Christian Elementary School. Driver Mike Tobin provided this group of kids important fire safety information.
- 3. AFR's historic 100th Cadet Class began February 13, 2023. The 37 Cadets that were selected will spend the next 18 weeks learning the skills, tactics and safety required to join the women and men of Albuquerque Fire Rescue.
- 4. AFR celebrates Black History Month and honors the courage and bravery of the Black firefighters who have paved the way for generations to come.
- 5. AFR and local public safety agencies participated in the Special Olympics NM Law Enforcement Torch Run to kick off the 2023 State Conference.
- 6. AFR members took home first place in the 2023 First Responders Relay Race as part of the Don Kirby Elite Invitational at the Abq. Convention Center.



FIRE MARSHAL'S OFFICE

INSPECTIONS DIVISION

- We are nearing completion of the 145 annual inspections of schools. We have begun working with the State Fire Marshal to expand our inspections in the schools to include all improvements and any change to the school's life safety systems. APS has been adding extra security and fencing with the unfortunate concern of persons with ill intent gaining access to the schools. We are attempting to make sure these added measures don't affect egress pathways in the event of an emergency.
- FMO had 3 black firefighters, Lieutenant Carla Williams, Driver David LaCour, and Driver Gary Davis honored for Black History month at the first annual NM Black Firefighters Association meeting. This is the first of its kind for AFR and is a great recognition of our diverse firefighter family.
- The entire FMO division attended a movie class put on by NETFLIX at their studios. Our instructor was a 30+ year veteran of the fire service in the Hollywood area and brings a wealth of knowledge for our growing movie industry.

ADAPT

- ADAPT has 149 properties that have been formally brought into the program, 93 have been cleared from the program and 56 are still in the program at different stages. ADAPT continuously monitors the properties that are in the program to track their compliance with the Nuisance Abatement Agreement.
- There are 113 properties on the Unsafe Buildings list. Three new properties were added to the list this month. The properties are labeled on the First Due application with a white "X" on a red background. In the field these properties are marked with a red spray painted "X" and the letters "AFR" under it.
- The following properties were cleared from the ADAPT program:
 - * Smith's located at 111 Coors Blvd NW with a 28% reduction in reported crime.
 - * Strip Mall located at 111 Coors Blvd NW with a 28% reduction in reported crime.

FIRE INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION

- On February 1, 2023, Fire Investigations personnel were contacted by Battalion Chief 4 in reference to a structure fire incident involving a single-story residential home at 10704 Cenote Rd SW Albuquerque, NM. Fire investigators responded to the scene and contacted Battalion Chief 4 and the first arriving Engine Officer. The first arriving officer stated fire crews noticed heavy flames coming from the southwest corner of the structure. E14 made entry into the structure to fight the fire in an offensive strategy, but soon were overcome by fire. E14 officer stated the lack of structural integrity to the home soon turned fire crews to defensive operations. The roof of the structure had collapsed and walls on the north and south side of the structure no longer had structural support. The structure was no longer safe to enter and the home is a total loss due to fire damage. All spaces to the interior of the structure suffered extreme fire and smoke damage. The entire interior of the home was covered with burned and charred structural support members and water from aerial operations.
- On February 3, 2023, Fire Investigation personnel responded to 1218 Eubank Blvd., NE Albuquerque, NM 87108. Upon Engine 12's arrival, fire crew contacted an employee who was on scene. The employee stated he had arrived for work at approximately 0600 and unlocked the rear door of the business and discovered the building was full of smoke. Fire crews arrived on scene and were able to extinguish a small smoldering area near one of the salon stations inside the business. There were no signs of forced entry or broken glass to any of the structure.
- On February 5, 2023, Lieutenant Gunderson and Louise "Wheezy" responded to Anton Chico, NM at the request of the New Mexico State Fire Marshal's Office to assist in the processing of an adobe home that was involved in a structure fire. The structure fire contained two juvenile fire fatalities, an eighteen-month-old female and her 3-year-old brother. The New Mexico State Fire Marshal's Office called in Lieutenant Gunderson and Louise, a Cadaver Dog Team from Sandoval County, multiple technicians from the Office of Medical Investigators, and an Albuquerque Special Agent from the Bureau of Alcohol, Tobacco, Firearms and Explosives to assist in the processing of the scene. While processing the scene Lieutenant Gunderson located the juveniles remains beneath approximately 8 inches of soil that had collapsed from the structure's walls and ceiling. A search of the structure by Lieutenant Gunderson and Louise for ignitable liquids resulted in no positive results.
- On February 7, 2023, Fire Investigation personnel responded to 7415 Willow Springs Rd NE Albuquerque, NM 87108. United States Marshals stated they were at 7415 Willow Springs Rd NE serving an arrest warrant for an individual when he allegedly used the fire as a distraction to evade arrest. Upon arrival to the fire incident address, Fire Investigators found a two-story residential structure that had been involved with fire. Most of the fire damage was in the attic space and the closet and bathroom accessed by the master bedroom. This area had been heavily overhauled by fire crews. Removal of drywall in these areas exposed all interior walls. Heavy charring was noted to studs within these void spaces reveal extreme heat and fire was confined within the walls. Water damage from fire suppression was noted throughout the entire home, mainly

- on the first floor of the structure. Heavy soot staining was noted to the homes stucco, soffit and eave from smoke and flames exiting the structure.
- From February 21-24, 2023, Lieutenant Dave Auge and Investigator Vasquez attended FI-210 Wildland Fire Origin and Cause Determination course in Farmington, NM. Both members represented AFR very well and were successful in the course.
- On February 26, 2023, Fire Investigation personnel responded to 1406 Gold Ave. SE Albuquerque, NM. Upon arrival, Engine 1 crew found smoke and fire coming from the Charlie side of this residential structure. Fire crews were able to make entry through an already opened front door and did suppress and limit fire damage to the South side of the structure. Fire crews were also able to extinguish a mattress that was found on the exterior of the structure near the alley way near the rear of this residence. Fire Investigation efforts revealed a single mattress, fully consumed, located on the south side of this residence. There was severe heat and fire damage to the exterior wall of the south side of the residence which appears to have extended into the structure and caused severe heat and fire damage inside the structure. Owner of the property stated the tenant was in the process of eviction, but still had legal access to property as of the date of this event. Red Cross aided the displaced tenant.

- Albuquerque Fire Rescue has received Accredited Agency status with the Commission on Fire Accreditation International (CFAI) for meeting the criteria established through the CFAI's voluntary self-assessment and accreditation program. Albuquerque Fire Rescue is one of more than 300 agencies to achieve Internationally Accredited Agency status with the CFAI and the Center for Public Safety Excellence, Inc. (CPSE)
- Albuquerque Fire Rescue is only the second fire department in the state of New Mexico two receive accredited status beside Los Alamos County Fire Department.

HUMAN RESOURCES AND TRAINING

HUMAN RESOURCES

- Employee Referral Incentive MOU routed for signature approval. Once MOU signed, the goal is to make effective for the current 101st Open Enrollment process. Since Open Enrollment has already started, AFRHR and Training has identified an internal method that would create a fair and equitable process for all applicants to be identify referral.

TRAINING ACADEMY

Professional Development

- Two Lieutenant Certification Courses were completed in February, with 26 students in total. Both two-week courses received excellent feedback from the attendees. Many thanks to the hard-working adjunct instructors that assist with the professional development courses.
- Officer I was hosted and taught by AFR personnel at the Training Academy. 12 students attended from within AFR and from other departments.
- Inspector I was also hosted at the Training Academy with 20 students in attendance over the week-long course.

Suppression Division

- The 100th Cadet Class began on February 13th with 37 members. In February the cadet began their training with an introduction to fire service concepts, including PPE, SCBAs, ropes and knots, etc. We are now down to 28 members who are continuing in the Cadet Program
- 9 additional firefighters were certified as upgradeable drivers in February after successfully completing their testing.

HEART

- HEART provided 72 rides with its “Rides with HEART” rideshare service.
- The HEART Home Modification Program provided 35 home modification installation services. These home installations included grab bar installations and ramp building in order to prevent falls.
- HEART received and processed 56 referrals for service. The patients were processed and moved into one of our many programs.
- In a partnership with the Office of Substance Abuse Prevention HEART provided all AFR Stations with “Leave Behind Narcan Kits” to provide to community members in need.
- Fentanyl Strips to frontline units have been completed and supply will be ongoing.
- Buprenorphine Program- Inserting information for suboxone treatment in the LBN kits. Individuals will receive access to an app with counseling, cognitive behavioral therapy and contingency mgmt. Plus, monetary rewards for compliance. Will be an ongoing push.
- To date, the HEART BEATS stroke discharge program has received over 321 referrals for service. HEART is currently working with 53 patients in the program.
- Pediatric Assessment Program is currently being forged. AFR HEART division will partner with UNM Hospital for pediatric assessments. The mission is to provide a patient visit with assessment 24-48 hours post discharge for sick children who were discharged from the hospital with oxygen. Details are still being worked out. The go live date to be determined.
- Be Brave Fall Prevention Classes taught at Sandia Vista Senior Living and Rio Vista 55+ independent community.
- Community Health Worker class is still ongoing. Seven of ten classes have been completed. The class is made up of AFR members, AMR, Sandoval County Fire and Santa Fe County Fire.
- Met with Adult Protective Service to discuss referred patients.
- Working on Blue Cross Blue Shield application. Hopefully this will led to reimbursements for the stoke assessments.
- Continue to build and foster a partnership with New Mexico Cancer Center with Wrigley’s help.
- Educated the students about the division at the Lieutenant Certification course
- Conducted the interviewing process to fill the Lt. vacancy, 10 applicants participated is this competitive process.
- Congratulations Lt. Christian Cruz, he will be our new addition to the team.
- Provided support fill for frontline units.

RECORDS MANAGEMENT

- Developed new Structure Fire and Outside/Encampment Fire measures to assist in evaluation of AFR’s fire response and better match appropriate City resources to community needs. Also, created inputs in the NFIRS documentation form to capture more accurate data on these variable.
- Assisted Charlotte Fire Department with guidance and resources to improve their EMS and Fire Documentation processes.
- Continued to work on the build out of Continuum:
 - * Developed Center for Public Safety Excellence (CPSE) dashboards to assist with AFR’s reporting to obtain accreditation.
 - * Developing monitors that will allow for real time feedback and intervention on specific areas of interest (Fire Marshal’s Office follow up, Peer Support follow up, Physical Assaults on Providers and EMS specific case studies AFR is involved with).
 - * Developing station dashboards to relay statistical information as well as messaging from the Fire Chief and Divisional updates.
- Continued work on the Premier One CAD to ImageTrend Elite integration. This will create a single source for all of AFR’s statistical analysis and improve the accuracy and consistency across all variables.
- Assisted with AFR’s professional development program, teaching EMS & Fire documentation in the Lieutenant Certification course.
- Assisted in getting EKG review software on EMS Supervisor’s MDT. This facilitates the capability to have on scene debriefs, following critical emergency medical responses.
- Assisted Superior Ambulance with guidance and resources to improve their EMS and Fire Documentation processes.
- Provided support fill in for in for frontline units.

EMS TRAINING

- This February the EMS Training division started ramping up production of online continuing education content. We filmed and edited multiple training, social media, and case study videos with Dr. Pruett. These trainings will be assigned over the remainder of 2023.
- A comprehensive first aid and CPR training session was conducted with 15 new employees of CABQ’s ACS team. This training prepares new ACS members to respond to a broad range of emergencies safely and effectively.
- The division continued to coordinate with the NM EMS Bureau to relicense all AFR EMTs who are due for renewal this year, approximately 320 firefighters.
- Division members assisted with February’s Lieutenant certification course, Driver certification course, and the Fire Officer 1 certification.

QUALITY ASSURANCE

- Throughout February, the 78 Cadre credentialed multiple new paramedics and these paramedics are now working in the field in our many paramedic positions.
- The EMS Division performed interviews/test outs for our new members of the 78 Cadre and we are proud to add our new additions.
- AFR continues our PECMO program and we had our first cannulation of the year in February. We remain excited and optimistic about the benefits this program will bring to the citizens of Albuquerque.
- In a partnership with UNMH, AFR has added a new evaluation tool, the pupillometer, to learn its potential benefits for cardiac arrest patients.

PHARMACY

- Droperidol distributed on to trucks.
- Amiodarone distributed on to trucks.
- Quarterly Pharmacy Clinic inspection complete.
- Still dealing with back orders and shortages on multiple items, changing daily.
- Preparing for Medic 3 rollout.
- Stryker Maintenance contract complete and devices are being repaired as needed.
- LP15 devices ordered for new Medic units still on back order. Using spares for the units for now until new devices arrive.

SPECIAL OPERATIONS

HEAVY TECHNICAL RESCUE

- AFR HTR program had a notable response where a individual as rescued from the bottom of a 30' pit. The crews immediately recognized the Confined space and found a bad air environment with hydrogen sulfide. The risk was managed and the crews completed a rope rescue from the environment. The HTR task force is a ALS capable system with rescue technicians that are trained to the ALS level to provide the best care even in the more difficult locations in and around Albuquerque.
- HTR was able to participate with Rio Rancho Fire Rescue, Corrales Fire Department and Sandoval Fire department in a trench Rescue course. The joint nature of this training allows AFR HTR program to build a strong working relationship with our Counterpart Technical Rescue team, Rio Grande Basin. When the incident grows, we will be ready to work together and effectively and efficiently complete our rescues. This course also earned the following AFR members their Rescue Technician qualifications!!! Joseph Kandel, Zach St-Jean, Brandon Lykins, Brandon Keryte, Eric Jaramillo, Isiah Selgado, Joe Vigil.

HAZMAT

- Hazmat coordinator was invited to DPC industries for a building familiarization of their chlorine plant. The purpose is to have communication of DPC plant manager with both AFR and Bernalillo fire in case of an emergency. DPC familiarized both departments of how much chlorine they have at all times, how chlorine is brought to their facility by train, and how they ship it. AFR Hazmat Stations 13 and 17 will participate in the same training.
- AFR Hazmat coordinator was asked by Kirtland AFB DTRA to help with SCBA training. This is a yearly training DTRA needs to maintain and meet their qualifications. The class included everything from inspection to donning and doffing of the air pack.
- Hazmat coordinator assisted Joe Kandel and wildland pack testing of the entire department for the year.

WILDLAND

- For the month of February, the Wildland Division hosted the Work Capacity Test (WCT) aka "The Pack Test" at the arduous level for all uniformed personnel. The arduous level WCT consists of walking 3 miles in the allotted maximum time of 45 minutes 45 seconds, while wearing a 45-pound weighted vest. This test is designed to simulate the endurance levels required to fight long duration wildfires.
- The RT-130 Refresher has been assigned to all personnel in Target Solutions and has a due date of April 1, 2023.
- The combination of the above aforementioned courses, along with the Wildland training received in the Fire Academy, allows all uniformed personnel to be "Red Carded". This means that all our Firefighters are qualified to fight Wildfires.
- Multiple members of the division have completed courses this month that were hosted by New Mexico State Forestry. Some of the aforementioned courses included; S-230 Crew Boss, S-231 Engine Boss, & S-212 Wildland Fire Chainsaws.

FOC

- Through February, the FOC was able to work through staffing problems by filing many vacant positions with members newly certified and able to upgrade. This enabled FOC personnel to utilize these members and keep apparatus fully staffed augmented with some overtime. An additional help were the 30+ members that recently graduated the cadet program at the Albuquerque Fire Academy and entered the field to fill firefighter vacancies, thus allowing the more senior members to upgrade and fill spots that were vacant.
- AFR is working with the AFR Tech division and the CABQ Tech Department to streamline the vacancy-filling process. As more becomes automated, we hope to improve and anticipate field staffing needs and adjust for them through a more efficient system.

SPECIAL EVENTS

- With recent changes to public safety and AIBF leadership, AFR has been in several meetings with other partners in the city to develop an improved public safety plan for the Albuquerque International Balloon Fiesta. Both CABQ public safety and AIBF have benefited from lessons learned coming out of the 2022 50th anniversary fiesta. Our hope is that we can continue to partner to improve public safety for the citizens of Albuquerque and the visitors of the state’s largest public event.
