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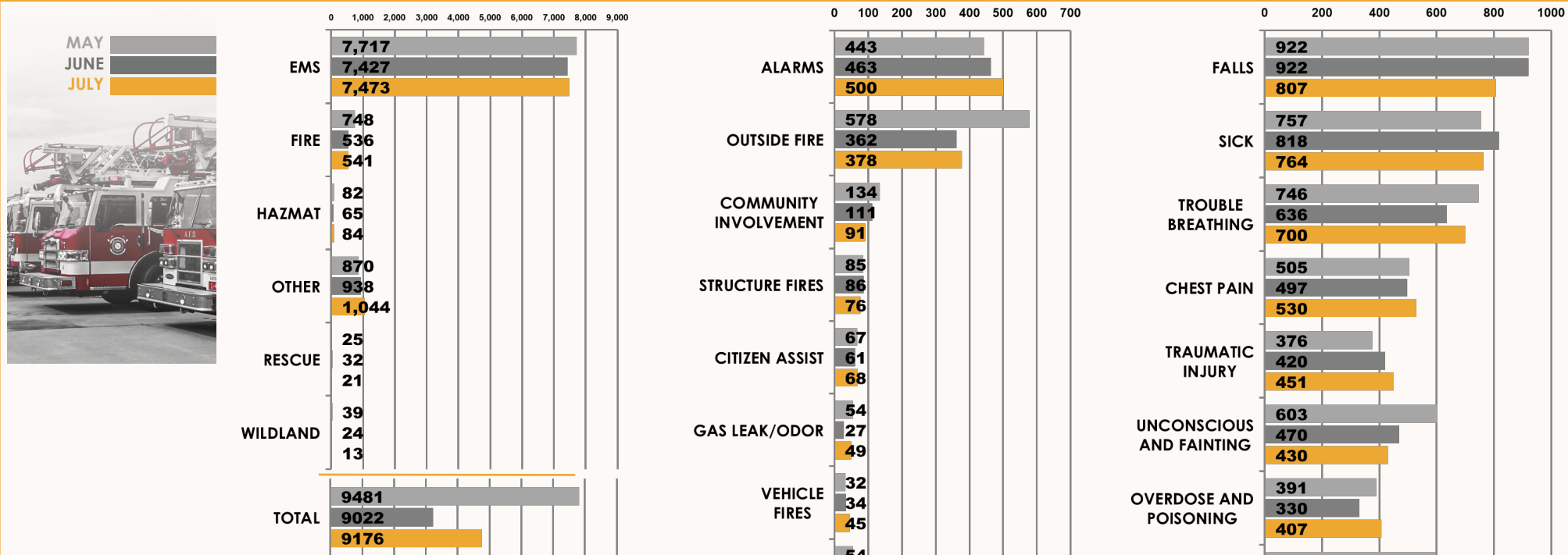

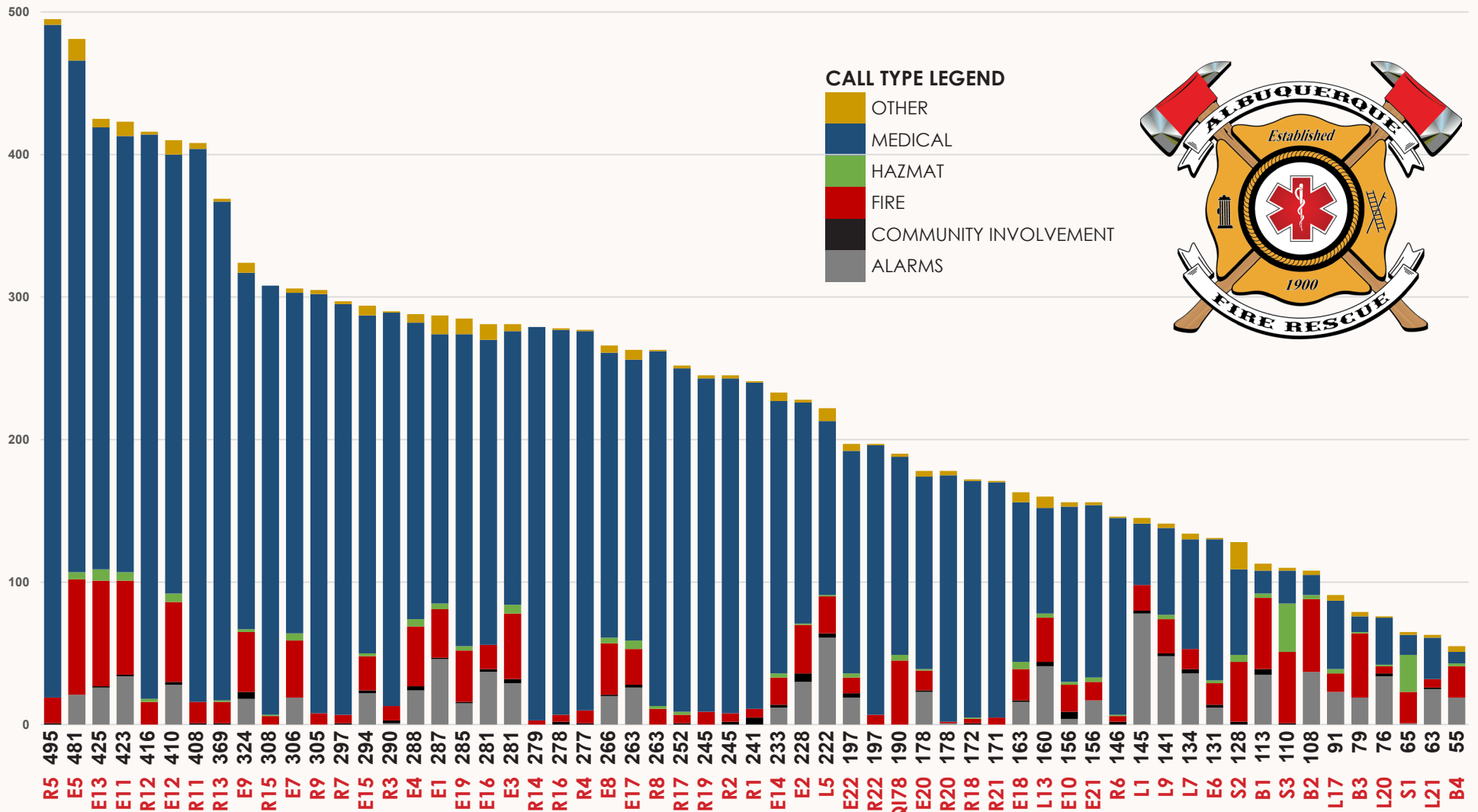

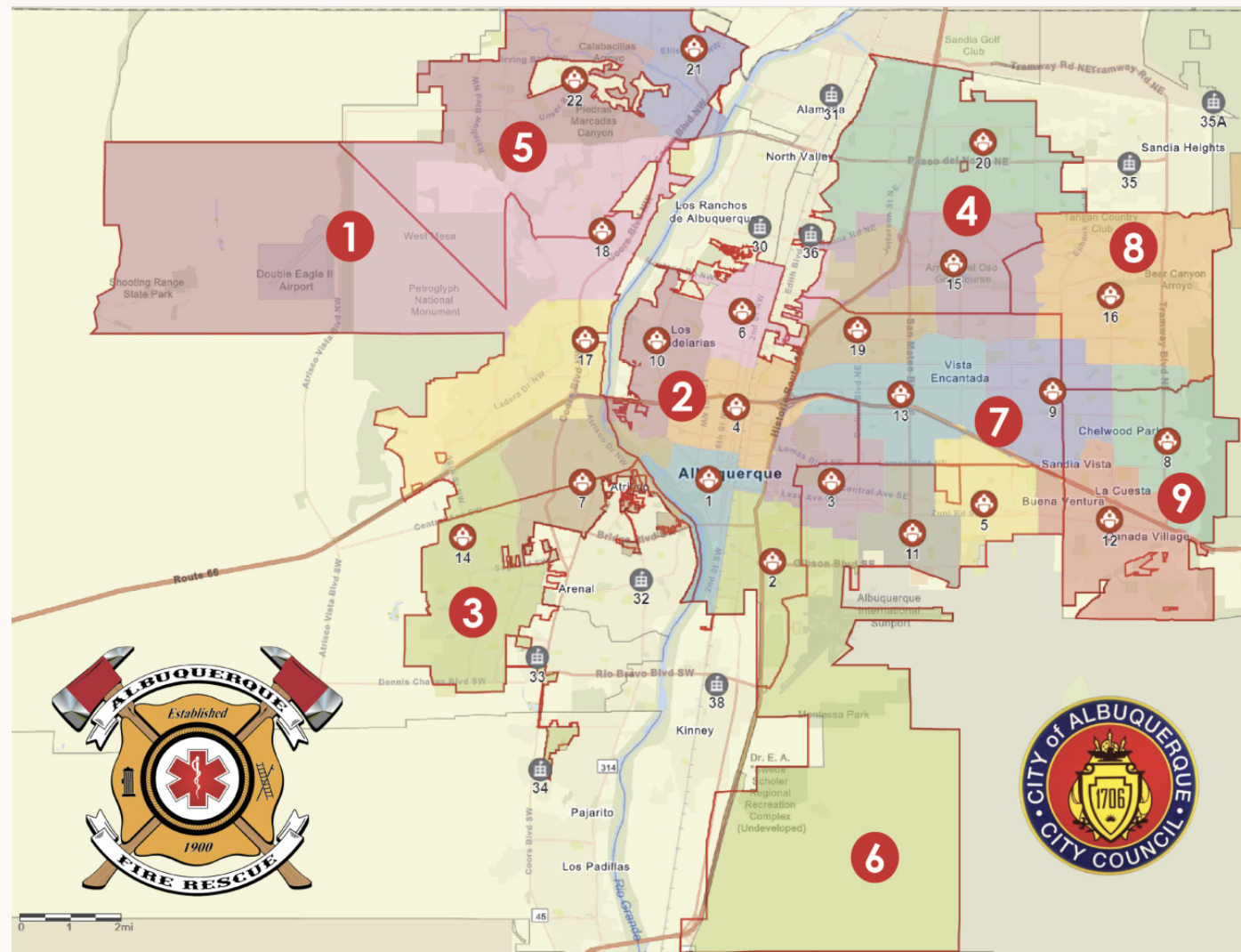

**7/1 - Residential Fire:** AFR responded to a 2 story family townhouse located at 5714 Pennacle Peak NW in fire district 22. Engine 22 was first to arrive on scene and found the town house fully engulfed in flames. The blaze was so large it had spread to the neighboring home. It sustained major smoke and water damage. The town home was vacant and under construction but is a total loss. The occupants of the 2nd town home were safely evacuated and were displaced. Firefighters limited the damage to 2 of the 10 units.

**7/4 - Commercial Fire:** AFR was dispatched to a reported structure fire at 2500 Central SW in fire district 7. Fire crews arrived on scene to find a working fire in an abandoned single story structure with smoke and flames venting through the roof. Due to the complexity and advancement of the fire upon arrival, fire crews operated from a defensive standpoint. Fire crews were able to deploy several handlines and also utilize Ladder 7 for fire suppression. After approximately 45 minutes fire crews were able to declare the fire under control and verify extinguishment. No injuries were reported to civilians or firefighters.

**7/7 - Residential Fire:** AFR Engine 5 was requested by APD to investigate smoke coming from the roof of a single family residence involved in a swat situation on the 8100 block of San Joaquin Av SE in fire district 5. Police were dealing with a barricaded subject within the structure when they noticed active flames. Engine 5 was then asked to advance to the exterior of the structure to extinguish the fire. Due to the subject still being barricaded, firefighters were forced to perform a transitional attack from the exterior of the structure in coordination with APD. As the fire was being extinguished the suspect did exit the structure and was immediately taken into custody by APD. In coordination with APD, fire crews entered the structure and located a deceased individual. There was one firefighter that sustained minor injuries and was treated on scene.

**7/12 - Residential Fire:** AFR was dispatched to 2915 San Diego SE in fire district 3 for a single story residential structure fire. Engine 2 arrived on scene and reported a structure fire with heavy smoke and flames showing from the garage. As additional units began to arrive on scene, Engine 2 and Engine 11 stretched hose lines for fire control. At that time fire crews heard several explosions coming from the garage as a result of propane tanks. Fire crews were advised to exit the structure and utilize defensive operations to fight the fire. The homeowner confirmed that all occupants were out of the house. Crews utilized several methods to gain access into the garage area for fire suppression. After approximately 45 minutes fire crews were able to gain control of the fire and determined that the fire was under control. One firefighter was transported due to heat exhaustion and was in stable condition after being evaluated at a local hospital.

**7/24 - Residential Fire:** AFR was dispatched to 11100 Gibson Ave. SE in fire district 12 for a possible structure fire. Upon arrival Engine 12 found a double wide mobile home fully involved in flames. Engine 12 crew made a quick attack on the fire and had it under control within nine minutes of their arrival and were able to contain the fire to the structure of origin. The structure was a total loss. The home was occupied at the time of the fire but the occupants were able to self evacuate. Four adults and one child have been displaced and are being assisted by American Red Cross. The fire was determined to be accidental.

**7/30 - Residential Fire:** AFR responded to 425 Western Skies Dr. SE in fire district 12 to reports of a multi-family apartment building on fire. Rescue 12 reported smoke and flames coming from the roof of one of the apartment buildings. The fire was brought under control and extinguished within minutes of arrival and prevented the fire from spreading to the interior of the building and adjacent apartments. Construction crews had been working on the roof and the fire was found to be caused by exposed electrical wires that ignited some roofing materials. There were no injuries to civilians or firefighters.

**7/31 - Commercial Fire:** AFR responded to reports of a commercial structure fire located at 528 NM 512 NW in fire district 21. Ladder 21 arrived on scene to confirm a working structure fire coming from the roof of a single story strip mall. Crews made access to the occupancy and the roof of the structure which allowed them to make an aggressive fire attack and contain the fire to the occupancy of origin. Due to the quick efforts of 13 trucks and 35 firefighters the fire was brought under control and extinguished within minutes of arrival preventing the fire from spreading into 6 other additional occupancies. The cause of the fire is currently under investigation. There were no injuries to civilians or firefighters.

1. Sparky the Dog (AFR Driver Dave LaCour) along with AFR Captain Miguel Tittmann and Firefighter Gus Pedrotty joined UNMH Pediatric Oncology to help entertain and check in children on their way to Camp Enchantment this year. Sparky the Dog and firefighters from Ladder 7 also visited with children from different pediatric clinics at UNMH.
2. There were 1,883 reports of illegal fireworks on July 4, 2022. Both APD and AFR teamed up to respond to illegal fireworks on the nights of July 3rd and 4th. Fireworks Enforcement Units (FEUs), made up of one FMO Inspector, and one APD Officer responded from 1800-2400 hours each night. The FEU's primary objectives were public education, inspecting fireworks vendors, and responding to reports of illegal fireworks. These units issued 144 Cease and Desist Orders over the two nights.
3. Four stations were able to complete a vehicle extrication refresher with the new EMS consortium fellows who will be working in the field soon. They worked in bunker gear and PPE on a hot July day training in vehicle extrication drills removing and treating trapped victims.
4. The AFR Training Academy has recently completed hosting and instructing another EMT-Basic course. Lieutenants Cristian Cruz (bottom left) and John McGee (bottom right) have also helped with graduating 10 APD officers from the course over the last year and a half.



**CITY OF ALBUQUERQUE**  
**ILLEGAL FIREWORKS ENFORCEMENT**

Albuquerque has unique wildland urban interface open space areas that are in constant threat of fires. Fires in the Bosque, Westside Open Space area and the Foothills endanger the lives and property of those who live nearby.

On July 4, 2021 Albuquerque Fire Rescue responded to 25 outside fires. The City's Field Enforcement Units (FEU) responded to more than 60 locations and issued 29 cease-and-desist orders.

It is against City Ordinance Fire Code 0-19-63, Section 5609 to use illegal fireworks within city limits. FEU patrols WILL be responding to reports of illegal fireworks. Read the fireworks label if you are unsure what is legal.

**FIRE MARSHAL'S OFFICE**

**INSPECTIONS DIVISION**

- In the days leading up to the 4th of July, our personnel continued mailing cease and desist orders for 311 firework complaints and multiple complaints to the same address resulted in a “knock and talk” to personally educate. This 4th of July weekend, the FMO division sent 5 personnel to Balloon Fiesta Park for this year’s Freedom 4th. The fireworks show was a huge success and went off without a hitch. We assigned 6 inspectors on the 3rd and 12 inspectors on the 4th to patrol with APD, along with an additional 14 inspectors, paired together, patrolling for illegal fireworks. The patrols issued numerous cease and desist orders, confiscated a large amount of illegal fireworks, and had numerous educational encounters with the public.
- FMO continues to meet weekly on the adoption of the new city ordinance. In an effort to streamline the inspection process throughout the division, FMO and city legal are working together to produce an MOU for city council. This will remove an NFPA requirement that has hindered the business community as well as our inspectors. If successful, this will be achieved prior to the adoption of the code, which is still months away.

**ADAPT**

- ADAPT has 141 properties that have been formally brought into the program, 82 have been cleared from the program and 59 are still in the program at different stages. ADAPT continuously monitors the properties that are in the program to track their compliance with the Nuisance Abatement Agreement.
- There are 112 properties on the Unsafe Buildings list. Four new properties were added to the list this month. The properties are labeled on the First Due application with a white “X” on a red background. In the field these properties are marked with a red spray painted “X” and the letters “AFR” under it.
- ADAPT launched a new pilot program, Trespass & Litter Control (TLC) Program, to address vacant lots with trespass and litter concerns.

**FIRE INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION**

- Captain Ramon “Mando” Martinez officially retired from AFR with his last duty date of July 28, 2022. Captain Martinez graduated from the Albuquerque Police Academy, where he earned his law enforcement credentials. He has served in the Fire Investigations Division at multiple ranks for a total of 12 years. He has spent the last 4 years as the Captain of the Fire Investigations Division. Captain Martinez has been vital in the growth of the Fire Investigations Division and his contributions are immeasurable.
- Investigators are continuing to investigate multiple fires of incendiary nature. Investigators continue to work to identify suspects and file charges in accordance with NM State Law.
- Lieutenant Freddy Sanchez and Firefighter Morgan Mahboub are set to begin the next law enforcement training academy on August 1, 2022. They are scheduled to graduate in December of 2022 and they will become vital resources for the Fire Investigations Division.
- The Fire Investigations Division is gearing up for Socktober. Socktober is an AFR and Locker 505 program that collects new socks and underwear for children in need during the month of October. Donations can be dropped at all Albuquerque Fire Rescue fire stations, the AFR Training Academy, and the Fire Marshal’s Office.
- The Fire Investigations Division will be seeking letters of interest for the ranks of Firefighter (Upgradeable) and Driver early fall. The next law enforcement academy will be with the Albuquerque Police Department and is tentatively scheduled in December of 2022.

**FIREFIGHTER WELLNESS**

- Direct support with 3 AFR members needing some support and assistance.
- Maia and Driver Meyers spent significant time with BCFD supporting their civilian admin, their administration and multiple station visits/multiple debriefs. Along with the AFR Peer Support team, AFR was able to hit every BCFD station as well as their training facility in the aftermath of losing Lt King.
- Finished up the 5 week Cadet Preparation course.
- Continuing to build the momentum for Imagine ABQ.

**RECORDS MANAGEMENT**

- Assisted with gathering data for the NFIRS Data for Fire Protection Grant.
- Provided data revolving around AFR’s key performance indicators for emergency response Downtown.
- Assisted with an analysis of AFR’s Emergency Response around the 4th of July holiday. Looking at responses to structure fires, outside fires, CCIP and total emergency response.
- Assisted with an analysis the efficacy of the ALS expansion pilot at E20 and E14. Looking at response times, time on task, interventions performed, code 3 returns, AFR ALS requests, number of calls, call types, and refusal percentages.

- To date, the HEART BEATS stroke discharge program has received over 240 referrals for service. HEART is currently working with 74 patients in the program. Two more staff members are currently undergoing training to expand the HEART BEATS program and are close to being able to perform assessment as a separate team.

**EMS TRAINING**

- The EMS Training Division completed delivering AFR's Day 1 EMS Refresher.
- The AFR/CNM fast track EMT- B course, is nearing completion. We have four Firefighters from the 98th Cadet program, and five APD officers taking the class. All students are on schedule to have their EMT licenses and be ready to hit the streets by mid-August.
- The AFR studio continued to film and produce weekly 12 Lead training videos with Dr. Prueett, as well as additional EMS training material.
- There are currently 12 AFR members in UNM's in person paramedic program, and 1 in CNM's online course. Both are challenging courses but all the students are doing well.
- AFR's studio continued its work on Abqfire.com, the new recruitment and hiring website. This site will dramatically streamline AFR's recruitment and hiring process.
- Coordinated, assigned, and tracked monthly department training on Vector Solutions.
- Approximately 85 people attended Lifesaver training during the month of July. These trainings were held at Isotopes stadium, West Mesa Aquatic Center, and in Estancia.
- 13 ACS members were trained in CPR and received American Heart Association certification.

**WILDLAND**

- For the month of July, the Wildland Division finally received some well-deserved relief from the severe fire weather, due to the annual monsoons, and has utilized this time to prepare our fall training schedule. The Task force has done an exceptional job this year minimizing the intensity of, what could have been, multiple catastrophic wildfires within our jurisdiction.
- AFR currently has a Type 6 Engine and a Helicopter Manager deployed through the New Mexico Resource Mobilization Plan (NMRMP). The Type 6 is currently assisting with Initial Attack (IA) in Texas, and our Helicopter Manager is assigned to the Minto Fire in Alaska. We wish our crews good luck, and pray for their safe return.



**HEAVY TECHNICAL RESCUE**

- AFR Airboat one along with BCFD airboat provided patrols covering the 4th of July weekend Between Isleta and Corrales. The weekend was uneventful except one rescue of a four pawed friend. AFR's Airboat has been able to support multiple searches this month for individuals being swept away at the peaking flows in the river.
- Four stations were able to complete a Vehicle Extrication refresher with the new EMS consortium fellows who will be joining you on the streets soon. They worked in bunker gear and PPE on a hot July day extricating "randy" from his vehicle. As future refreshers become available, HTR will reach out via your BC's.
- The EMS Consortium also spent a day with AFR HTR Task force participating in awareness sessions for confined space, high angle rescue, swift water, flood, and flood channel rescues. We discussed the complication these events can bring to us as first responders. The fellows were able to gain a unique perspective from the paramedics view when it comes to treatment within these events. They are ready to receive your inquires for patient care!
- As the monsoons arrived, the river levels raised quickly resulting in multiple events in the Rio Grande valley. AFR, APD, BCSO, BCFOD, and NMSAR launched a 57-responder search in the Rio Grande for a missing individual. Our lost person went chasing after he dogs in the river and never came back. The first responding APD officers gathered critical information and imitated a joint SAR mission with Airboats, Drones, Swift water task force, K9s, and ground teams being deployed within this search. She was found and every was home safe!

**STAFFING**

- 4 Cadets completed their EMT-Basic and are entering the Field to start their probationary period and add to emergency response staffing.

**SPECIAL EVENTS**

- **Freedom 4th:** AFR dedicated personnel for advanced emergency medical response and Fire Marshal's services at Albuquerque's Freedom 4th. Personnel mitigated a handful of medical incidents during the event and worked to assist attendees in seeking shelter during a brief thunderstorm. Coordinating with APD and the UNMH EMS Consortium proved beneficial for the running of a smooth event that exceeded 50,000 visitors, hosted a headliner band and several local bands, and culminated in a fireworks show. The fireworks event was safely conducted with the help of the Fire Marshal's Office and members of AFR's Wildland Task Force. This enabled full coverage for safety from start to finish at one of Albuquerque's most heavily-attended events.
- **Route 66 Summerfest:** Central Avenue was blocked off from Girard to Washington to host the 2022 Route 66 Summerfest. AFR provided Fire Marshal's Office coverage for event vendors and advanced medical response from 3 AFR Advanced Life Support units and 1 Basic Life support unit. With good medical support coverage, only 3 medical emergency calls for service were generated for this event. AFR command staff utilized AFR's Command Vehicle 1 as a shared command post with APD. This enabled public safety to coordinate with the Arts and Culture Division and City Security to provide a safe event. Route 66 Summerfest hosted 4 separate stages for live bands, vendors, multiple food trucks, a car show, and an area for face painting and bounce houses for children. In all, the event was a great success drawing a large crowd despite the significant summer heat.
