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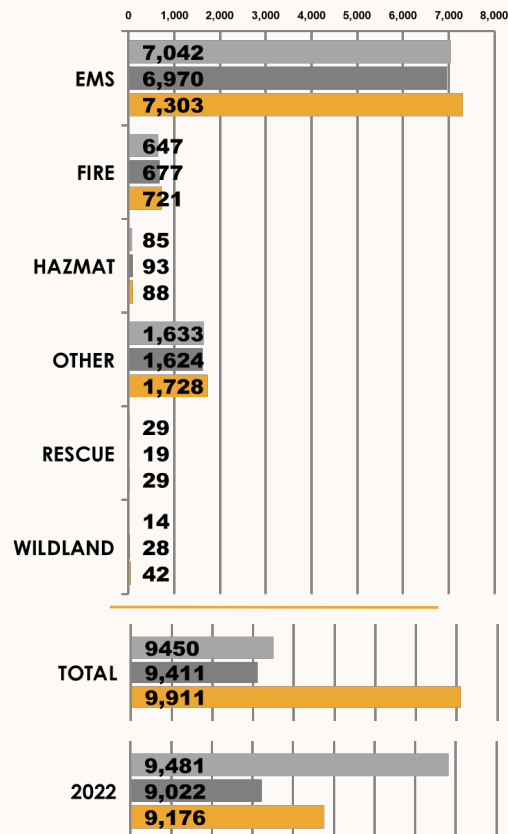

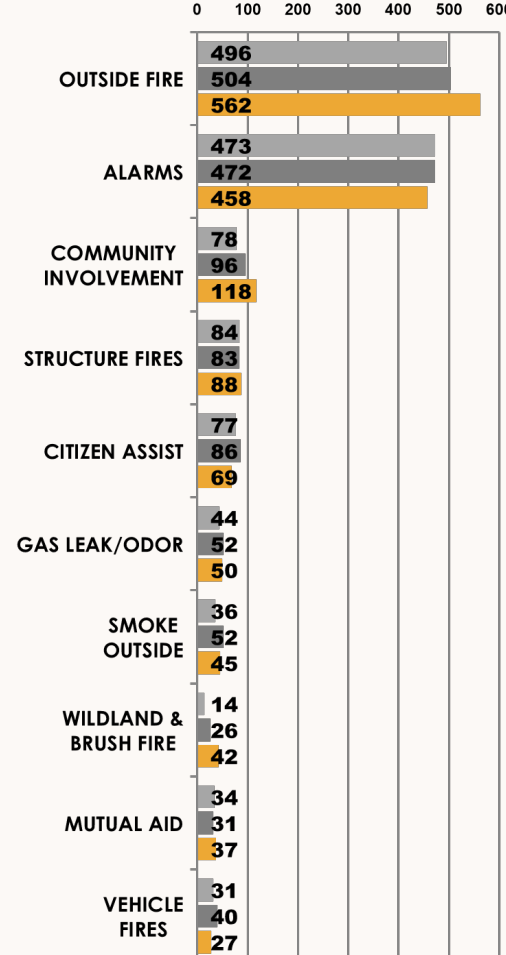

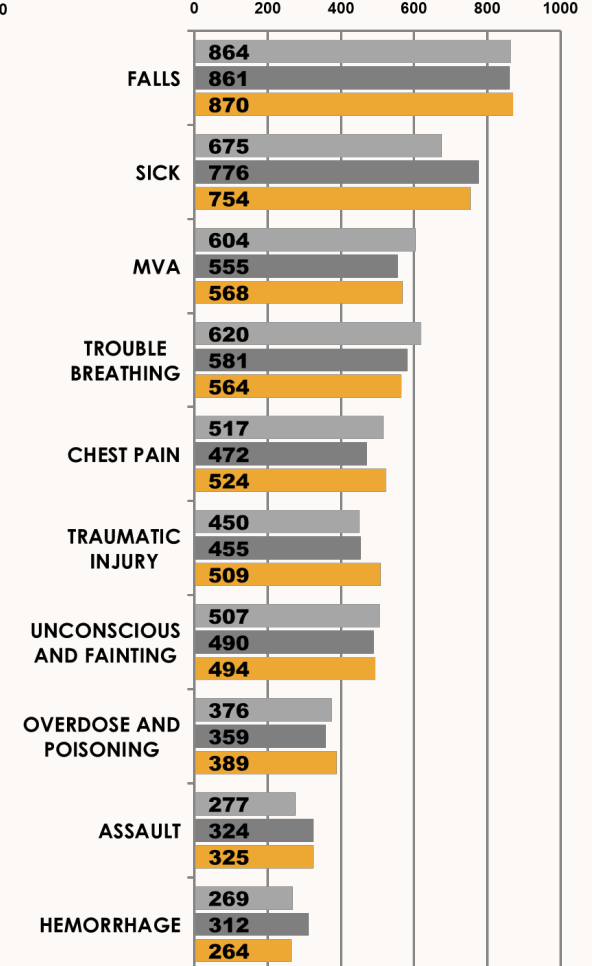

TOP 10 MEDICAL CALLS

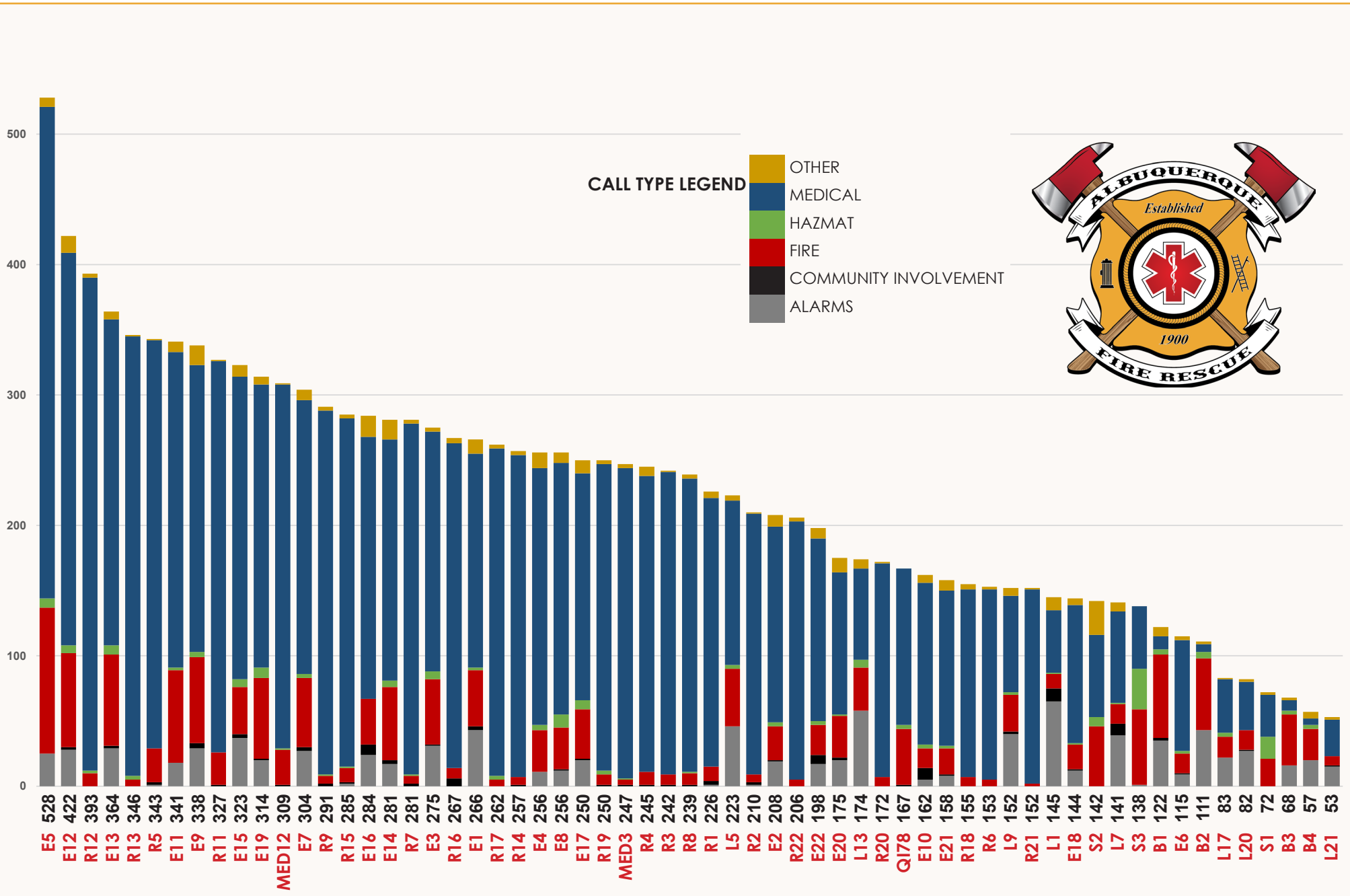

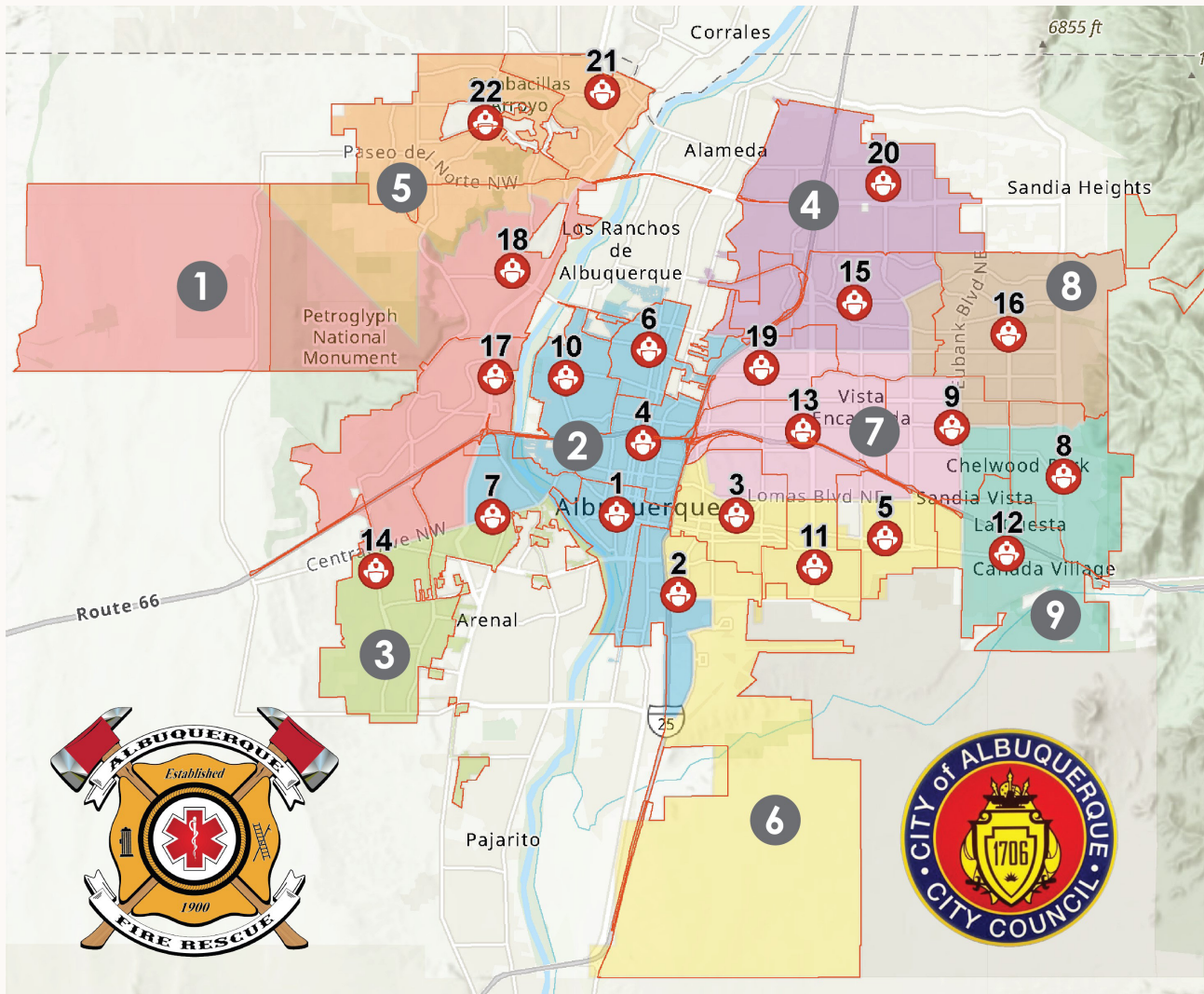

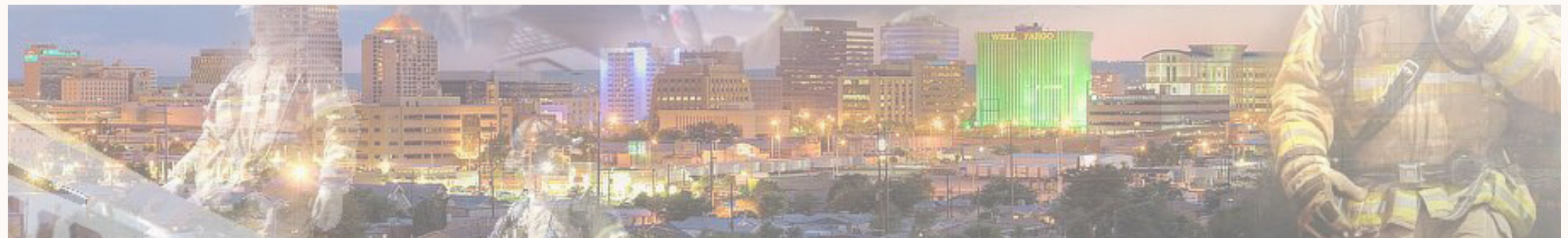

These events are activated by the AFR Dispatch Center as a “Significant Event” based on specific criteria and emailed to media and specific AFR members but does not include all responses by AFR to emergency calls.

7/3 - Residential Fire: AFR crews responded to a structure fire located at 5609 Mosquera Ct. NW in fire district 18. First arriving crews reported smoke coming from a single family residential home. All of the occupants of the home had safely self evacuated. Fire crews immediately made entry into the home and contained the fire to the room of origin. No injuries were reported. The cause of the fire was determined to be accidental.

7/4 - Residential Fire: AFR Engine 5 arrived on the scene of a two story multi-family residential structure at 328 Tennessee St SE in fire district 5 with flames showing from the roof. Engine 5 stretched a line for fire control and search. Ladder 5 made access to the roof and extinguished a small fire in the roof with a water can. No extension was found to the interior of the structure. All occupants self evacuated or sheltered in place. The cause of the fire was ruled to be accidental.

7/5 - Residential Fire: AFR crews responded to reports of an outside fire at 422 Bryn Mawr NE in fire district 3. Upon arrival, Engine 3 found a garage fire threatening a home and called for additional units to help extinguish and contain the fire. The fire was extinguished before it could reach the interior. There were a total of 9 units that responded.

7/7 - Wildland Fire: AFR was dispatched to a reported brush fire in the area of Ellison and Corrales RD in fire district 21. Corrales Fire Department arrived and requested resources from AFR to assist with a large brush fire that threatened several residential homes. Upon AFR arrival a full Wildland task force was dispatched. Albuquerque Fire Rescue and Corrales Fire department established a unified command post and coordinated efforts to quickly control the brush fire. Approximately a half acre of brush, several cotton wood trees, and several private fences sustained fire damage. No structures were affected and there were no injuries to fire fighters or civilians. State Forestry wildland resources were also requested to assess and completely extinguish the fire.

7/9 - Apartment Fire: AFR responded to a two story apartment building at 6021 Anderson Ave NW in fire district 11 for a reported fire in one of the units. Upon arrival fire crews quickly gained access to an apartment on the second floor that was involved with heavy fire and smoke. Fire crews quickly brought the fire under control, searched the apartment and contained the fire to only the one unit. Multiple apartments were affected with fire, smoke and water damage. There were no injuries reported. Eleven people were displaced and Red Cross was called to assist and coordinate accommodations with the property owner. The cause was determined accidental.

7/10 - Residential Fire: AFR was dispatched to a smoke investigation call in the area of Pitt Street and Candelaria in fire district 9. Additional reports came in of a possible structure fire at a single story, single family residence. Engine 9 arrived to find a working fire. Engine 9 forced open the front door to initiate search and fire control. Upon making entry, Engine 9 encountered zero visibility and high heat. Crews located two deceased individuals inside the home. Arriving crews continued with fire suppression efforts, search and ventilation. The fire was brought under control and subsequently a third victim was removed from the home. That person was treated on scene for burn and inhalation injuries and transported to the hospital. AFR Fire Investigators remained on scene to determine the cause and origin of the fire. Due to the fatalities and nature of the scene, APD was called out to assist with the investigation and cause of death. The cause of fire has not been determined.

7/15 - Residential Fire: AFR crews were dispatched to a vehicle on fire in the driveway of a home at 6923 Arvilla PI NE in fire district 13. Crews arrived to find the fire extending into the garage. Engine 13 was first on scene, and was able to secure their own water supply. Fire crews immediately had the vehicle fire under control and kept the fire damage to the garage area of the home. The two residents of the home along with all of their pets safely evacuated the residence without injury. No injuries were reported to fire personnel. Unfortunately due to fire damage, the gas and electricity had to be disconnected to the home so the homeowners will be temporarily displaced. AFR dispatched the Red Cross to assist the homeowners during this difficult time.

7/15 - MVA: AFR responded to reports of two vehicles racing on near 4801 Central Ave NW in fire district 14. One of the vehicles lost control and ran into pedestrians that were in line at a food truck. The vehicle struck four bystanders and all were transported by ambulance to the emergency room. Three of the pedestrians were critically injured and one sustained non-critical injuries. No information on the driver of the vehicle or on other aspects of the situation are available.

7/22 - Commercial Fire: AFR responded to 3401 Comanche NE in fire district 19 for small, single story vacant commercial structure fire. Engine 9 quickly arrived and reported a working fire with flames showing from roof. Engine 19 made entry and reported high heat. Defensive operations were soon declared. After the main fire body was knocked down, interior operations resumed. Fire under control was declared within 35 min. No injuries were reported.

7/26 - Residential Fire: AFR crews were dispatched to 508 5th St. SW in fire district 1 for a possible structure fire. Upon arrival, Engine 1 and Rescue 1 crews report a fire in a 2-story residential tri-plex apartment building. Four occupants and two cats on the 2nd floor of the apartment complex were rescued by AFR crews using a ground ladder. AFR crews were able to quickly extinguish the fire and stop it from spreading to other apartment units. Red Cross was contacted for displaced residents. One occupant was treated on scene for a minor injury.

7/28 - MVA: AFR was dispatched to the Hispanic Cultural Center (pictured below) at 1701 4th St SW in fire district 1 for a vehicle collision into the building with reported injuries. Squad 2 arrived on scene and reported a vehicle inside the building with a total of 2 patients, one of them with critical injuries. The critical patient was transported by AFR Rescue 1 and Albuquerque Ambulance transported the second patient. A small fire in the building that resulted from the collision was extinguished by an employee prior to AFR's arrival. A total of 8 units were dispatched to the scene to establish treatment, triage and transport operations. AFR's Heavy Technical Rescue Task Force was dispatched to assess the structural integrity of the building. The building had to be stabilized and shored up by the task force due to the severity and amount of damage sustained in the collision. APD remained on scene to conduct their investigation.

7/31 - Apartment Fire: AFR crews were dispatched to 517 Kentucky St. SE in fire district 11 for a possible structure fire. Upon arrival, Rescue 5 reported a working fire in the back of a duplex apartment complex. The fire was concentrated in the NE corner of the apartment. AFR crews were able to quickly locate and extinguish the fire before the fire was able to spread to other units. One resident self evacuated prior to AFR arrival on the fire scene. AFR crews rescued two dogs that were not injured.



1. Mayor Keller participated in river patrol with AFR and APD. AFR's Special Operations and Heavy Technical Rescue Task Force respond out of Station 4. They gave Mayor Keller a first hand look at river conditions and the challenges increased flows have given rescue crews this year.
2. The AFR 99th Cadet Class returned to the Academy for their 7 month evaluation. Following the 7 month evaluation, Cadets will be certified to drive Rescues, know what skills they need to work on, the status of their task book and will have the study material for their final 11 month evaluation.
3. Firehouse Magazine 2022 National Run Survey: Part 2 listed Albuquerque Fire Rescue was 16th in total call volume of participating departments with 108,379 calls for service. Engine 5 came in as the 11th busiest Engine company with 5,947 responses. Ladder 5 was the 39th busiest ladder company answering 2,412 calls.
4. The AFR Fleet Division is processing four new Battalion vehicles and five Braun Northwest Rescues to replace aging units currently in the field.
5. The AFR Training Academy hosted a group of teens from the Junior Police Academy and toured the facility with BC McMullen. These Junior Cadets learned about the skills our Fire Cadets acquire in the 18 week Academy and how firefighters serve the community as first responders.

INSPECTIONS DIVISION

- In the days leading up to the 4th of July, our personnel continued mailing cease and desist orders for 311 firework complaints and multiple complaints to the same address resulted in a “knock and talk” to personally educate. This 4th of July weekend, the FMO division sent 5 personnel to Balloon Fiesta Park for the Freedom 4th celebration. The fireworks show was a huge success and went off without a hitch. We assigned 14 inspectors on the 3rd and 24 inspectors on the 4th to patrol for illegal fireworks. The patrols issued numerous cease and desist orders and there were many educational encounters with the public.
- In an effort to house some of our homeless population at the Gateway Center, previously Gibson Medical Center, FMO has been meeting with building and other city divisions to finalize and approve all work. Hopefully, everything will be up and running in the near future.
- Inspectors met with a few of Albuquerque’s night clubs to correct violations and ensure they are maintaining the appropriate occupant loads. Working together, we have been able to resolve some of the issues that having been plaguing them for years.

ADAPT

- ADAPT currently has 52 properties that are in the program at different stages and continuously monitors the properties to track their compliance with the Nuisance Abatement Agreement.
- There are 138 properties on the Unsafe Buildings list. Four new properties were added to the list this month. The properties are labeled on the First Due application with a white “X” on a red background. In the field these properties are marked with a red spray painted “X” and the letters “AFR” under it.
- The following property was cleared from the ADAPT program with 100% reduction in criminal activity:

FIRE INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION

- On July 5, 2023, at approximately 1900 hours, fire investigators were advised by AFR Battalion Chief 3 of a fire incident that occurred at 7620 Pan American Freeway NE. Investigators responded to that location to conduct an origin and cause investigation involving a multi-story, abandoned hotel. I arrived on the scene and met with AFR Battalion Chief 3. Chief 3 stated that fire crews extinguished three (3) separate fires within the abandoned hotel property. Fire investigators noted there were no electrical or gas utilities in service at this property. Fire investigators performed a walk through with AFR Engine 15 Lieutenant. One fire was located in the middle courtyard, on the east side of the building. This fire was approximately 15' x 15' in size and extended to an exterior wall of the building. As a result of the fire spreading to the outer wall of the building, a 12" x 4" wooden beam sustained severe heat and fire-related damage. The fire extended approximately four (4) to five (5) feet in height. The remaining damage from this fire was contained to the exterior courtyard. Fire investigators did find used "roman candle" type fireworks near the area of origin. The second fire was located in an exterior courtyard adjacent to the swimming pool in the southwest area of the hotel property. This fire was approximately 30' x 30' in size. Grass and dry brush on the ground were burned and consumed by this fire. The third fire was located in the structure's interior near the front lobby area. Lieutenant Trujillo stated a stack of 4' x 4' foam square pads approximately four (4) feet in height were on fire and quickly extinguished by fire crews. Fire investigators found fireworks located in the interior lobby area. Fire investigators noted that the property was easily accessible in multiple locations of the building. There was evidence of unauthorized entry throughout the property by unknown individuals. An APD Officer and AFR Fire Investigators cleared the buildings within the property prior to City of Albuquerque Code Enforcement personnel securing the building. There have been multiple fire incidents at this property as well. The property was released to City of Albuquerque Code Enforcement.
- On July 10, 2023, fire investigators responded to 3109 Pitt St. NE to conduct an origin and cause investigation. Upon arrival and initial examination, fire investigators suspected foul play and requested APD Homicide Detectives to assist in the investigation. Two individuals were found deceased at the scene. AFR fire investigators and APD coordinated their efforts in a week-long investigation and the fire was classified as incendiary and was intentionally set.
- On July 12, 2023, Lieutenant Gunderson and Louise "Wheezy" provided a canine demonstration to approximately 30 civilians who will be serving as members of the Federal Grand Jury. The demonstration included presenting the abilities of the ATF Accelerant Detection Canine and the methodology of food-based detection canines. The demonstration was well received by all civilians in attendance and generated many questions and conversations about canine use in fire investigations.
- On July 15, 2023, at approximately 0347 hours, Albuquerque Fire Rescue Fire Investigations personnel responded to 6923 Avilla Pl. NE Albuquerque, NM 87110. Battalion 3 made the request to investigate the origin and cause of a vehicle fire that extended into the structure at the above address. Upon E13's arrival, the crew found a fully involved vehicle parked in the driveway of the above address. The

- residents had self-evacuated and were on the exterior of the structure upon crews arriving on the scene. Severe heat and fire damage was noted to the vehicle, and moderate extension was noted to the exterior of the garage. Fire crews made entry and assessed the interior of the structure. Fire crews were able to contain the fire to the vehicle and to the exterior of the structure. Minor to moderate smoke and soot staining was noted on the interior of the garage nearest the vehicle, and minor smoke damage was noted throughout the interior of the home.
- On July 25, 2023, Lieutenant Gunderson assisted in an ATF Operation for an illegal gun purchase. The operation resulted in the removal of an illegal firearm from the streets of Albuquerque and will lead to federal criminal charges against the individual who is dealing the weapons.
- On July 26, 2023, at approximately 2005 hours, Albuquerque Fire Rescue Fire Investigation personnel responded to 508 5th St. SW Albuquerque, NM 87102. Battalion 1 made the request to investigate the origin and cause of a porch fire at the above residence. Upon the first unit's arrival, they reported a fire on the porch of this two-story tri-plex. The porch did sustain moderate to severe smoke and fire damage which extended to the ceiling of the porch. The apartments did sustain light smoke damage with minor heat and fire damage. The area of origin is believed to have been near the center of the porch where, according to tenants of apartment B, a stack of cardboard boxes had been stored. Fire damage was consistent with where these boxes were said to have been stored. There were three sets of tenants displaced in this area and all offered Red Cross.
- After several months of follow-up investigation, an arrest warrant was approved by a judge in connection with an arson investigation. The fire occurred in April near the downtown area and the suspect now has an unknown whereabouts. After several interviews with neighbors, fire investigators felt they have enough evidence to pursue charges. An arrest warrant was approved by a district attorney and signed by a judge. When located, the suspect will be charged with negligent arson.
- The Fire Investigations Division has a total of 70 responses YTD (35 fire investigations, 26 consult cases, and 9 ATF/Canine cases).

PLANS CHECKING

- Plans Checking reviewed and approved plans of the Gateway Center at Gibson Health Hub located at 5400 Gibson Blvd SE. The City acquired the 572,000-square-foot Gibson Medical Center in April 2021 and renamed it the Gibson Health Hub. The campus hosts existing tenants providing medical, behavioral health, and vocational services. The City's Gateway project will add additional health resources for the community as well as centrally located overnight beds and supportive services to connect people with the help they need on their pathway to housing. The Gateway Center passed its Fire Final Inspection for Phase 1 of the project.
- The Plans Checking Division helped staff the 4th of July FMO Command Center, FMO Patrol units, and the Freedom 4th.
- Inspector Bob Nevarez, Ryan Hopkins, and Fred Rivera attended and passed the National Fire Academy Plan Review of Fire Alarm Systems course in Emmitsburg MD.

EMERGENCY SERVICES**RECORDS MANAGEMENT**

- The Assisted with data revolving around vacant and abandoned structures. This data is being used to assess the increased risk of civilian and firefighter injuries, exposures, and deaths in these types of structures during emergency response.
- Provided data revolving around Downtown Albuquerque's key performance indicators. This data is used to monitor trends and assist in the implementation of the City's Downtown Forward plan.
- Attended ImageTrend "Connect Conference" July 19th-21st. ImageTrend is the documentation software (SaaS) AFR uses during all emergency response, fire inspections, community health involvement and data analytics. During the conference we learned about new products (Continuum) and opportunities for growth within our division to better serve to our community and our members (tracking of exposures).
- Began developing a process for providing follow up to providers about patient outcomes. This is an effort to disseminate kudos to providers for outstanding care provided during significant medical events.
- Provided data revolving around AFR's 4th of July emergency response to identify trends and opportunities to improve services provided during this time of year.
- Assisted ACS with the development of a billing processes to help develop a self-sustaining service to the public.
- Assisted with providing data and ensuring compliance with National Fire Incident Reporting System (NFIRS) standards to secure AFR's eligibility for the New Mexico Fire Protection Grant cycle for FY24.
- Continued to compile all necessary data and documentation for the Medicaid Ground Ambulance Data Collection System to insure AFR is able to collect payments from Medicaid/Medicare patient transports.
- Updated the Primary Impression Lists to increase documentation precision as well as increasing the Departments ability to accurately and efficiently track data and make changes to improve patient care/patient's outcomes.
- Continued assisting the Abandoned and Dilapidated Abatement Property Team (ADAPT) identify and track activity around abandoned and nuisance structures to assist the City in mitigation efforts.
- Continued compiling all necessary data and documentation for the Medicaid ground Ambulance Data Collection System to insure AFR is able to collect payments from Medicaid/Medicare patient transports.
- Continuing the process of moving AFR's EMS documentation to the new version of the National EMS Information System (NEMSIS). This is the national system used to collect store and share EMS data from across the country. NEMSIS develops and maintains a national standard for how patient care information is documented. This system is designed to improve patient care through standardization and point of care data aggregation.
- Continued work on the Premier One CAD to ImageTrend Elite integration. This will create a single source for all of AFR's statistical analysis and improve the accuracy and consistency across all variables.
- Provided support fill in for in for frontline units.

HEART

- HEART provided 52 rides with its "Rides with HEART" rideshare service.
- The HEART Home Modification Program provided 31 home modification installation services. These home installations included grab bar installations and ramp building in order to prevent falls.
- HEART received and processed 73 referrals for service. The patients were processed and moved into one of our many programs.
- In a partnership with the Office of Substance Abuse Prevention HEART provided all AFR Stations with "Leave Behind Narcan Kits" to provide to community members in need.
- Fentanyl Strips to Frontline units has been completed and supply will be ongoing.
- Buprenorphine Program- Inserting information for suboxone treatment in the LBN kits. Individuals will receive access to an app with counseling, cognitive behavioral therapy and contingency management plus monetary rewards for compliance. To date, the HEART BEATS stroke discharge program has received over 370 referrals for service. HEART is currently working with 42 patients in the program.
- Pediatric Assessment Program is currently being forged. AFR HEART division will partner with UNM Hospital for pediatric assessments. The mission is to provide a patient visit with assessment 24-48 hours post discharge for sick children who were discharged from the hospital with oxygen. Details are still being worked out. The go live date to be determined. All equipment, documentation and staff are trained and ready to respond. Currently working of referral process with UNM ED.
- HEART Carpenter will resume partnering with Department of Senior Affairs to assist with home mods for our elderly in the community.
- Met with Adult Protective Service to discuss referred patients.
- Continue to build and foster a partnership with New Mexico Cancer Center with Wrigley's help
- Partnered with ACS on several patients.
- Working closely with UNM Center for Development and Disability for specific clients who require specific treatment plans and instructions.
- Participated in a Project Echo meeting and presented on accidental overdoses and Narcan usage.
- Helped with Los Griegos community center health fair offering education on fall prevention, home assessments and age in place information.
- Fall prevention info-booth at North Domingo Baca
- BE BRAVE fall prevention class taught at 500 Sandia Vista Senior Living
- Members participated in Fire Prevention / fall prevention class given at Overture 55+ Active Apartments
- Attended a IAFF First Responder Therapy Class
- Wrigley was taken by an auxiliary handler to health fair event for canine support
- Sent one individual to professional development class at the fire academy
- Several members who are in the Peer Support Program attended the quarterly meeting
- Provided support fill for frontline units

EMS TRAINING

- This month the training division completed AFR's yearly EMS refresher. This training was delivered to all AFR firefighters and covered report writing, cardiac arrhythmias, wilderness trauma, and pediatric anaphylaxis.
- We continued our fast track EMT-B course, which will see 18 new firefighters receive their NM EMT License.
- 2 AFR members have been accepted into CNM's upcoming Paramedic program. These along with the 19 members in UNM's current Paramedic program, and 1 in CNM's current program, should see AFR gaining 22 new paramedic providers in the next year.
- The AFR studio shot and edited multiple case studies and training videos with Dr. Pruet, field providers, and EMS Battalion Chief Ortiz.
- Coordinated, assigned, and tracked monthly department training on Vector Solutions.
- AFR's recruiting website, ABQFIRE.com, has already received over 100 applications for the upcoming 102nd cadet class.

QUALITY ASSURANCE

- PECMO is live, operating M-F 0800-1700 for now.
- The EMS Division is in the process of completing Paramedic Credentialing for new AFR Paramedics.
- AFR is continuing to work with APD, ACS, and other community shareholders as we collectively determine the best way to address the mental health crisis in our community.

PHARMACY

- USPS medications received and expired sent back.
- HUD gurneys have been outfitted with correct equipment and have been put on all the appropriate HUD trucks.
- R17 notified me that they still have a manual gurney and I am sending a power to them ASAP.
- Pharmacy checking with all units to confirm there are no others with manual gurneys.
- Following up with Henry Schein on Lidocaine. Still back ordered. I am still ordering the vials just in case.
- Westside summer fest equipment delivered to Station 22, ready for the weekend.
- Still working with Vector to figure out what the text message problem is. The 78 officers are telling me it works intermittently. Vector built a prototype station and apparatus and it works on their end.

SPECIAL OPERATIONS**FOC**

- The FOC has also been actively training members within Fire Station 2 to act as FOC personnel. These members are trained by the on-duty FOC firefighter in all of the daily and monthly tasks. This includes the operation, inventory and maintaining of the AFR Rehab truck. These members are each assigned a position task book that reflects the successful completion of all FOC-related tasks. 2 members were newly certified through this process.

SPECIAL EVENTS

- AFR was very active throughout the month of July in Special events. This was kicked off with the annual City of Albuquerque's Freedom 4th celebration at Balloon Fiesta park. This one-day event typically draws 40 to 50,000 people. AFR works with ABQ's Arts and Culture, APD and Office of Emergency Management to ensure a safe celebration for all participants. AFR's Wildland division also contributes with the Fire Marshal's Office to manage the large amount of fireworks on display at the end of the evening. The Wildland manages smaller spot fires started in nearby brush areas while the Fire Marshal's Office coordinates with the fireworks vendor to ensure all guidelines are followed for safe practices. FMO also regulates all participating vendors to see that Fire Code is followed during the event.
- AFR also coordinated EMS and Fire Marshal's office to provide public safety coverage for the City of Albuquerque's Route 66 Summerfest held over a 2 mile stretch of Central Avenue from UNM to San Mateo. This event went off well with no issues. AFR's main safety concern was this month's extreme heat effect on visitors as they migrated from food trucks, to any of the 4 stages where live music was playing and various other activities along the event. As always, after action debriefs serve to provide public safety with improved methods for providing safety for the participants in future events.

STAFFING

- Throughout the month of July, the Field Operations Center worked smoothly. Despite members taking leave, extra needs for July 4th Wildland patrols, and special events, field apparatus were staffed and managed with overtimes, the continued use of filling vacancies with members working in support divisions, and utilizing many of the newly-certified upgradeable personnel to upgrade either within their station or throughout the city allowed AFR coverage throughout the city to be maintained well.

WILDLAND

- For the month of July, the Wildland Division will continue to be out in force patrolling during these hot and dry extreme conditions. Due to extreme weather conditions, the Wildland Division has responded to multiple vegetation fires. We are experiencing an increase of vegetation fires that have been initially ignited by illegal aerial fireworks, such as the Calle Cuervo Fire near Alameda and Coors. Multiple cooperators, along with AFR resources, were able to contain the fire.
- The Wildland Division participated in Fire Watch training that was hosted by COA Open Space. The training was attended by, Open Space volunteers that will be on patrol monitoring our open spaces for potential wildfires, enforcing closures, and educating the public on wildfire awareness.
- The Wildland Division also participated in helicopter training. The training goals for the Helicopter Operations exercise are to ensure all FBI personnel can establish an appropriate Helicopter Landing Zone (HLZ) consistent with NMSP/NMNG expectations, maintain effective communications, safely load a patient and medical provider, and can conduct/assist with patient treatment while airborne.
- The Rapid Extrication Module (REM) has returned home from the Comanche Fire and within seven days a second REM Team was deployed to the Gila National Forest.
- AFR currently has a Type 3 Engine deployed and is currently assisting with project work, severity patrols, and Initial Attack (IA) in the Sandia Ranger District on the Cibola National Forest.

**HAZMAT**

- The Hazmat Division has been in continuous meetings with the 64th CST team of an upcoming exercise that will be held in August. The talks about the exercise will be an UNK product or products that was found in the West Mesa.
- The Hazmat Division has started its second Hazmat Tech class that will continue in August. Upon completion of the class and passing of the new techs, that will provide 190 certified IFSAC hazmat techs in the department

HEAVY TECHNICAL RESCUE

- Our team assisted with an emergency intervention of one of the CABQ Zoo residents that required heavy lifting rigging and techniques. The patient is doing great as she has an amazing team taking care of her and all the other residents at our zoo.
- River Rescues are continuing and the effectiveness of the airboat program is paying off dividends for those that need the rescue with efficient response times and effective rescue techniques reducing the risk to the patient and rescuers. The river program of AFR is a component of a wide support network of each other of the responding agencies along all of our sections of the Rio Grande. This collaborative work among these response partners is creating a quicker efficient and safer response that is available at all times.
- To close out the month, The THR task force completed a refresher on confined space and Ropes with the new EMS fellows that are joining our system. Over three days, the new fellows get to experience the difficulties, problems, solutions of accessing and treating and transporting patients in technical rescue incidents. They experienced moving patients on rope, from vehicles in 109 F weather, mountains, and the river valley. It is great for us to learn from each other perspective during this event.
