

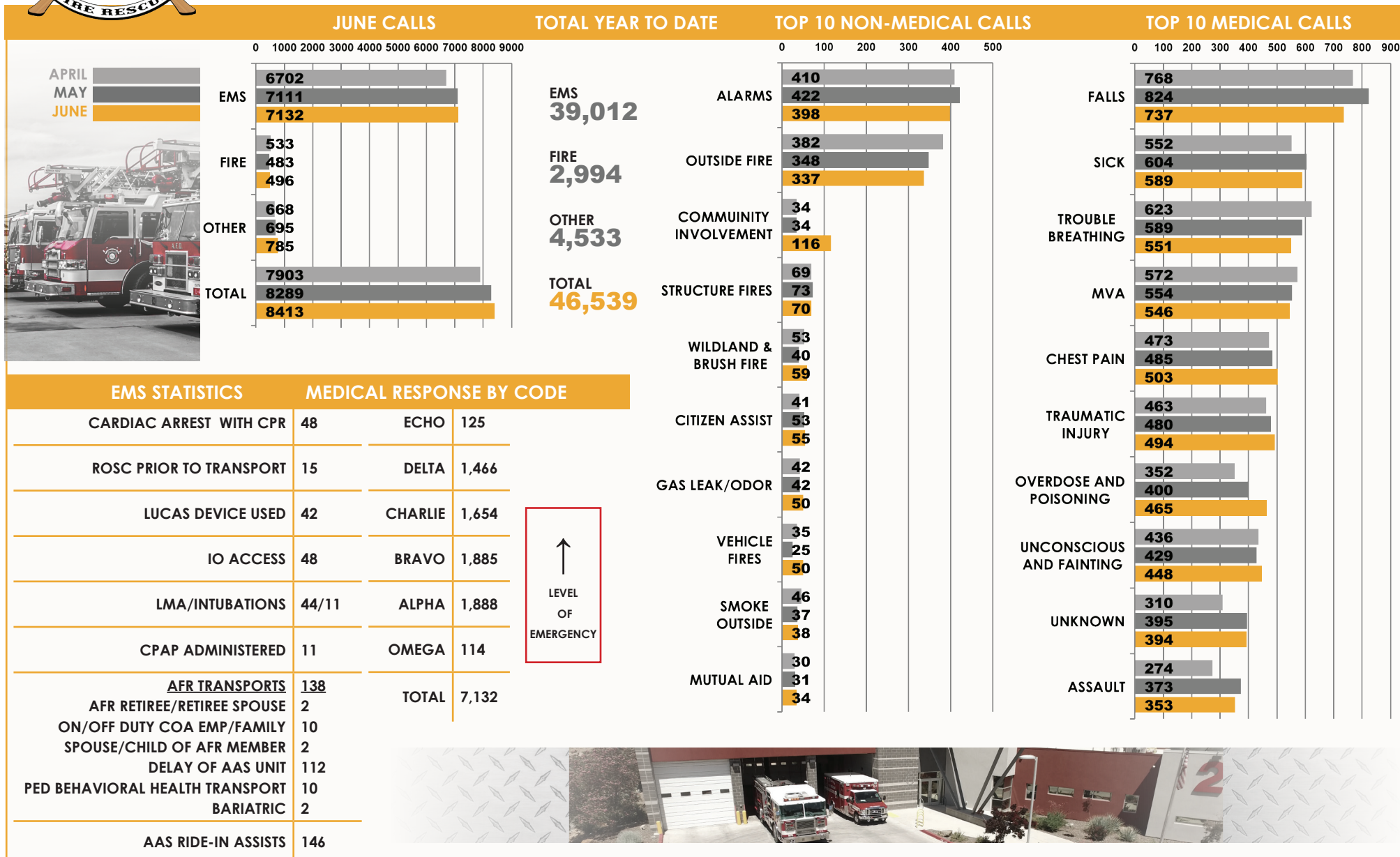

The time from when a 911 call is received until the information is gathered and the call is dispatched.

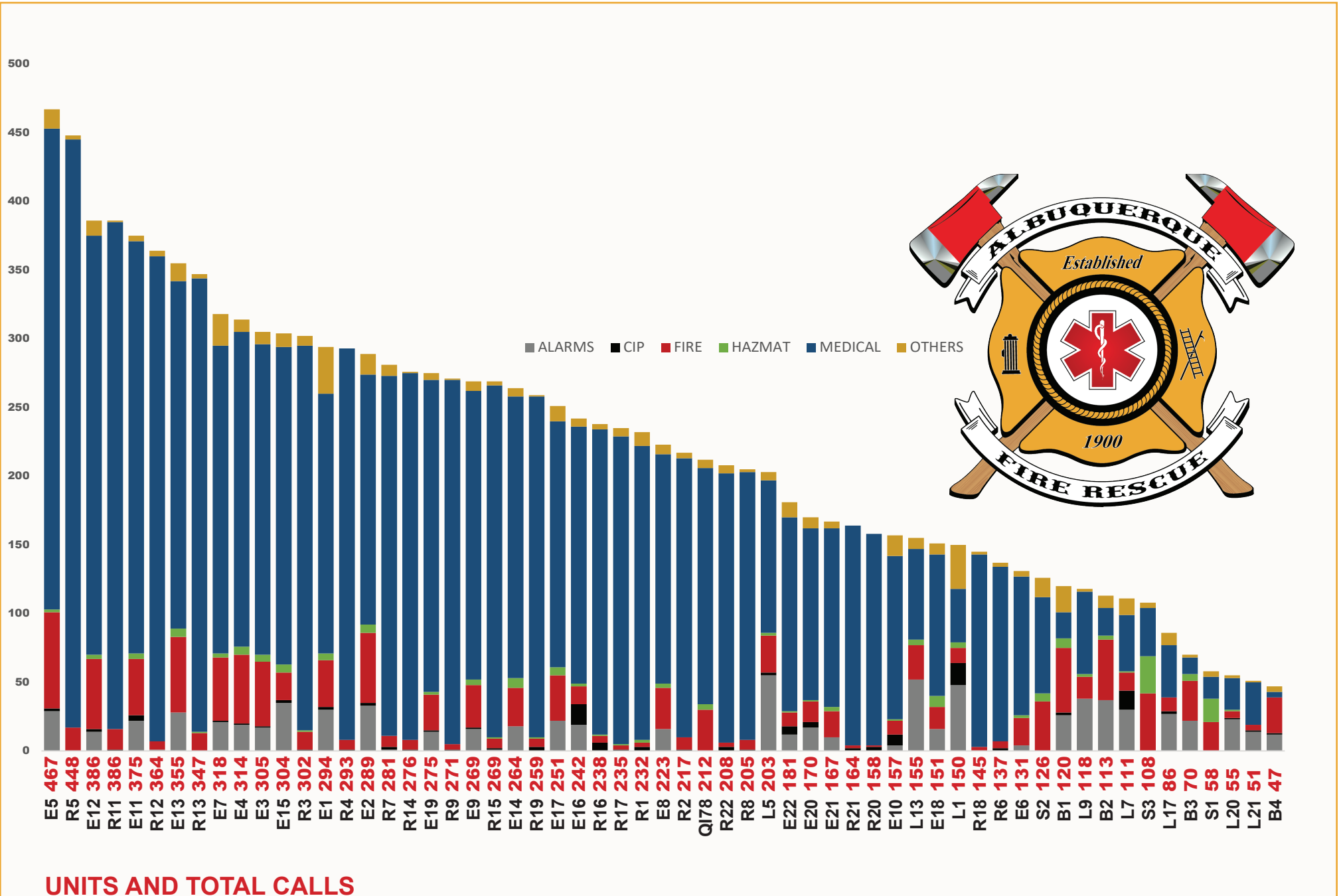
TURNOUT TIME

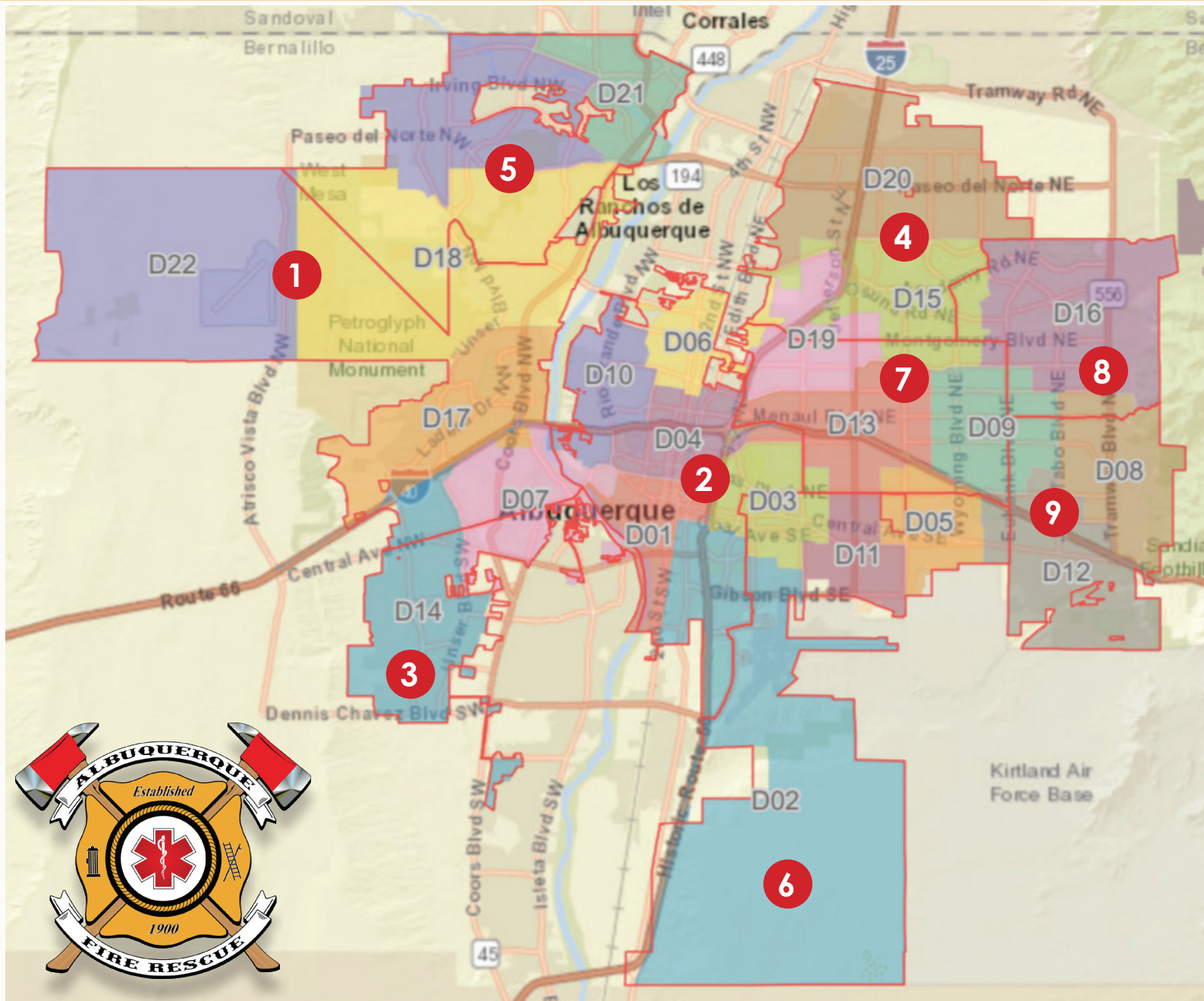

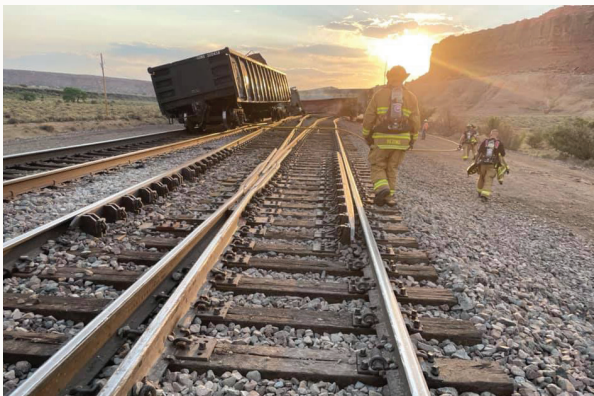
6/3 - Commercial Fire: AFR units were dispatched to 3603 NM-528 for a report of heavy smoke and flame at a commercial structure. Within minutes, AFR crews arrived on scene to attack in the offensive strategy. The decision was quickly made then to go defensive and protect exposures. Initial reports state one person was taken by Rescue 22 to the hospital. The injuries sustained are unknown at this time. No reports of any injuries to AFR personnel were reported.

6/7 - Residential Fire: At approximately 10:16 am AFR was dispatched to the 4900 block of La Cienega St NW in fire district 6 for a residential structure fire. Engine 6 was the first arriving apparatus and reported a working structure fire with heavy smoke coming from the roof of the single story residential home. Engine 6 began conducting fire operations as they stretched hose-lines into the structure for fire control as Rescue 4 also made entry to conduct a primary search of the home. An all clear was declared as it was confirmed that all of the residents of the home were out safely. Fire crews from Stations 6, 4, and 10 all worked to get the fire under control, preventing it from spreading to other nearby homes. As fire operations continued, ventilation efforts as well as salvage and overhaul were preformed to ensure fire control. No injuries were reported to civilians or firefighters.

6/13 - Bosque Fire: Shortly around 5 pm, AFR was dispatched to a Bosque Fire near Atrisco and Central. The 1.5 acre fire took firefighters approximately 2 hours to get under control and extinguished. Over 25 firefighters were working the fire. No injuries were reported.

6/14 - Residential Fire: At approximately 8:52 am, AFR was dispatched to the 900 block of Cagua Dr SE in fire district 11 for a residential structure fire. Engine 11 arrived on scene and reported that a shed was fully involved and encroaching on a nearby fence. A power line was also being impinged upon by active flame. Engine 11 declared an offensive strategy as they pulled an attack line for fire control. Engine 5 and Ladder 5 arrived on scene and assisted with fire operations. Within a few minutes firefighters were able to quickly extinguish the fire preventing further spread and protected nearby homes and businesses. No injuries were reported to firefighters or civilians.

6/14 - Train Incident: (Pictured below) AFR units E10, R22 and Battalion 1, along with units from BCFD, responded to Laguna as mutual aid. Crews assisted with a train that derailed from the tracks and was reported to be on fire. Laguna Fire Department extinguished the fire and the mutual aid resources assisted with water supply and personnel. No civilians or personnel were injured from the incident.



6/14 - Apartment Fire: At approximately 8:15 pm, AFR units responded to reports of a possible structure fire at 7303 Montgomery Blvd. NE in fire district 15 at the Arioso Apartments. When units arrived on scene they saw heavy smoke coming from a two-story, multi-family dwelling at this address. AFR units quickly entered the building and found no flames and no fire. Firefighters started breaking walls to search for fire. Units quickly found the seat of the fire which was in the second story apartment. The fire was contained to the room of origin. AFR units had the fire under control within 15 minutes. One firefighter was injured due to a dog bite.

6/15 - Commercial Fire: (Pictured top right) At approximately 6:15 pm, AFR and BCFD units responded to reports of an outside fire near San Pedro Dr. NE and Alameda Pl. NE. Engine 20 responded quickly and found two large size commercial structures that were fully involved with smoke and flames. Engine 20 requested additional units to assist in firefighting efforts. Crews extinguished the structure fire from the exterior due to safety measures inside both of the structures. Fire was contained at approximately 7:20. There were no civilian or firefighter injuries to report and the cause of the fire is unknown.



6/22 - Bosque Fire: (Pictured mid right) AFR was dispatched to the area of Tingley and Marquez Ln. SW for a smoke investigation near the Bosque. Engine 1 arrived on scene and reported smoke coming from the Bosque just west of Tingley Rd. Additional resources were added to the event and the Wildland Taskforce was deployed to assist in extinguishing the fire. A total of 26 firefighters were on scene to extinguish the approximate .25 acre fire with 1-2 foot flame lengths. Firefighters utilized hand tools and handlines while operating in the Bosque. The AFR Arson Investigators were also called to the event due to the suspicious nature of the fire. Firefighters were able to successfully extinguish the fire preventing it from spreading past the .25 acre. No injuries were reports to civilians or firefighters.



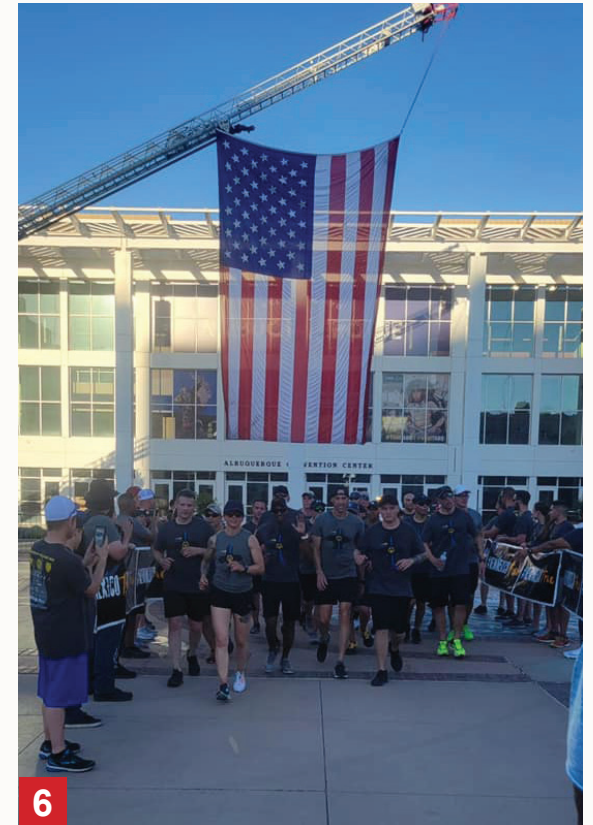
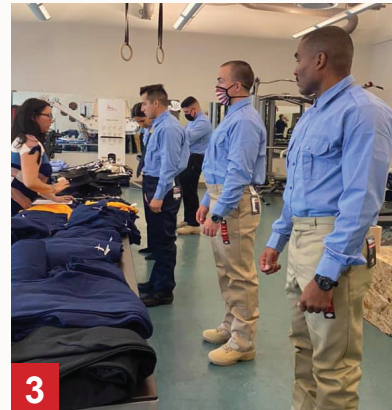
6/23 - Bosque Fire: (Pictured bottom right) On Tuesday June 23rd at approximately 8:13pm AFR was dispatched to the area of Winter Haven and Montano Plaza for reports of smoke coming from the Bosque. Engine 18 arrived on scene to an approximate .25 acre, creeping fire, with 2' flame lengths. Engine- 18 deployed an 1 3/4" handline and knocked down the east side of the fire. Rescue 7 and Brush 22 arrived on scene and deployed a floto pump with several Travis packs consisting of a 100' of 1 1/2" trunk line to a gated wye with a 100 1' lateral line. Hose lines and a perimeter line were placed around the fire with containment being achieved within 30 minutes. The fire burned a total of .26 acres with no structures threatened. No injuries were reported to civilians or firefighters.



6/26 - Hot Air Balloon Incident: At approximately 7:08 am, AFR was dispatched to the intersection of Central Ave and Unser Blvd NW for reports of a balloon incident. Fire crews from Station 14 and Station 7 arrived on scene and reported that one balloon gondola had crashed after striking the power lines and fell approximately 100 ft. Several additional fire crews were also dispatched to assist with patient care on scene. Fire crews reported 5 patients total. 4 persons were pronounced dead on scene and one patient was transported to a local hospital with severe injuries after receiving initial treatment on scene by Rescue 7 but unfortunately did not survive. The balloon envelope was found at a separate location south of the incident. The New Mexico State Police also assisted on scene and PNM arrived to repair power lines. The Federal Aviation Administration and the National Transportation Safety Board will investigate the crash.



1. AFR is in the beginning phase of developing a drone program that is currently utilizing a DJI Mavic 2 Pro. Drones offer a variety of uses for fire departments and promises to be an extraordinary tool for AFR. Pilots are required to possess a Part 107 FAA license for small unmanned aircraft systems (sUAS) and will complete a task book and flight test to demonstrate proficiency.
2. AFR K-9 members Wheezy and Wrigley now have their own collectible trading cards that feature professional pictures from photographer Kim Jackson and offer information specific to each canine. Handlers Lt. Gray, Lt. Sargent, and Investigator Gunderson give these trading cards out during community involvement events.
3. Cadets for the upcoming 97th Cadet Class completed their orientation and were fitted for their uniforms and bunker gear. These 45 Cadets will begin the 18 week Training Academy the first week of August, graduating in December.
4. Firefighters from Albuquerque Fire Rescue, officers from the Albuquerque Police Department, Solid Waste employees and many other members of the community completed the rebuild of a home that was severely damaged last year in a fire. Multiple businesses across Albuquerque donated supplies; contractors provided free labor, including Lowe's, Summit Electrical, Hunter-Bower, Home Depot, Champion Windows, Harder Champion, Pats Doors, Board Up, Raks, and IAFF 244. Additionally, local plumber Greg Ortiz provided his skills, electrician Ed Mora handled the electrical, and Victor Carillo stuccoed the home.
5. AFR Station 9 took possession of their new engine, a 2021 Ferrara Cinder equipped with a 500 gallon tank, a 2000 GPM pump, a Cummins 450 HP L9 Engine, and a custom clean cab design.
6. Albuquerque Fire Rescue was proud to participate in the Special Olympics New Mexico (LETR) Law Enforcement Torch Run this year helping to raise awareness for Special Olympics New Mexico.





Albuquerque Fire Rescue has participated with Camp Fearless since 2018. This year, the camp has undergone a complete overhaul and is better than ever! This one day camp is City sponsored and will be held one day per week over six weeks at different locations throughout Albuquerque. The mission of these camps are to build community relations with youth by teaching lifesaving skills and serving as community caretakers. Each camp is based around a rescue mission that will be accomplished through a coordinated effort between youth participants and first responders. This camp will be a building block approach to develop skills that will last a lifetime. Thank you to all of our firefighters that have participated and continue to represent our department with professionalism and dedication to the youth of our community. We look forward to our continued partnership with the Albuquerque Police Department and NM National Guard for this event as it grows. Opportunities like Camp Fearless are one of many ways we can give back to our community while helping teach safety and risk reduction to our future generations.





Albuquerque Fire Rescue would like to congratulate **Deputy Chief Sean Frazier** on his retirement. Chief Frazier has successfully completed 24 years of dedicated service with the department and is served his last shift as Deputy Chief of Human Resources. Chief Frazier began his career in September of 1997 as a member of the 58th Cadet Class and has a Bachelors Degree in Criminology from The University of New Mexico.

Early in his career as a firefighter, Sean was assigned to Engine-5 on B Shift. In 2001 he was promoted to the rank of Driver and was assigned to Engine 5 for two years. He then went on to Drive Engine 9 for 1 year and Engine 15 for two years. In October of 2006 he was promoted to the rank of Lieutenant and was assigned to Engine 1 then assigned to Engine 15. In September of 2009 Sean was promoted to the rank of Captain and was assigned to Engine 12 on A Shift for 2 1/2 years then was assigned to Squad 3 for 1 year, and Ladder 15 for an additional 2 years. In January of 2015 Sean was promoted to the rank Battalion Chief and was assigned to Battalion 3 for 2 years then served as Battalion 1 Chief on B Shift for another year. In January of 2018 Sean was promoted to the rank of Deputy Chief and was selected to serve as DC of Human Resources for AFR. Chief Frazier has been instrumental in creating a positive atmosphere within the department and played critical roles in the development of our new Behavioral Health Program as well as the Public Affairs Office.

Chief Frazier has been the quintessential firefighter, believing strongly in the brotherhood that is the fire service and will be deeply missed by all that had the honor and privilege of working with him. - In the month of June, the Fire Marshal's Office welcomed its newest member Gary Davis. In his short time here, Gary has begun to learn the office, go along on inspections in the field and participated in Camp Fearless where he was a big hit with the kids. He has already signed up for the IFSAC Inspector I course and should be certified by the end of August.
- In preparation for the Fourth of July, we have approved and inspected over 70 sites for fireworks sales. Working with the Parks and Rec department, we have approved 5 city parks/facilities to host fireworks displays. We are continuing to issue Cease and Desist orders for ABQ311 complaints in an effort to slow the use of illegal fireworks, especially during this extreme drought.

ADAPT

- ADAPT has had 73 properties that have been formally brought into the program, 25 have been cleared from the program and 48 are still in the program at different stages. ADAPT continuously monitors the properties that are in the program to track their compliance with the Nuisance Abatement Agreement.
- There are 218 properties on the Unsafe Buildings list, 2 new properties were added to the list, and one property was removed because of demolitions. The list is in Target Solutions file center, under the FMO > ADAPT > Unsafe Buildings tab. The properties are labeled on the First Due application with a white "X" on a red background.
- The APD Crime Prevention Specialists inspected 3 properties.

PLANS CHECKING

- **Total Inspection –142**
- **Total Plans Reviewed – 235**
- Plans Checking Personnel are now IFSAC Inspector I and II, ICC inspector I and II certified.
- The Plans Checking Division is working closely with the state Fire Marshal on a joint review process for the new UNMH tower. Plans Checking and the State Fire Marshal were in preliminary meetings with the architect and contractors to work out the plan submittal and the review and inspection process because it is a state facility. The State Fire Marshal will have final approval of all plans submitted after a joint review with AFR Plans Checking.
- The Plans Checking Division conducted its final inspection of the New Kairos Power Research and Development Center. Kairos Power has chosen Albuquerque as its home for a new engineering center to support the development of its advanced proprietary clean energy technology. The facility will be located in Albuquerque's Mesa del Sol on 32-acres of land for future expansion. Over the next few years, Kairos Power plan to invest up to \$125 million on the campus and create more than 65 high-paying jobs.



FIRE INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION

- **9 fires investigated in June (4 of the 9 were Bosque fires)**

- Fire Investigations assisted with the arrest of an individual in connection with the recent Bosque fires. Cameras that were placed in conjunction with APD real time crime center assisted in the identification and subsequent arrest of the individual.
- Metro court Attorney J. Boon gave a class to the entire division that was focused on misdemeanor fires and the small brush/dumpster fires that are occurring throughout the city. He stated that they are working on a new program to help us with these fire setters and their issues.

HUMAN RESOURCES

HEALTH AND WELLNESS

- The H&W Office continues to network nationally and locally to build the most proficient BH program possible. The BH Director and H & W Officer have been performing station visits to introduce the director and overview the program to crews.
- CISM Debriefings occurred with crews after potentially Traumatic Events (PTE) in the city happened on multiple occasions, the balloon MCI crash being one of them.
- H&W Office sent out information via the internal memo system, providing resources and topics that address sleep hygiene as June is National Sleep awareness month.
- The Peer Support team continues to develop and define roles and structure. The team was active in the AFR community in supporting all aspects of peer support and critical call identification.
- The AFR Chaplaincy continued to build on the roles and structure of the program. The Chaplain participated in the CISM debriefings offering the support of the chaplaincy. 5 of the 6 members of the chaplaincy plan on attending a Chaplaincy training (40 hour) course.
- Met with APD to discuss collaborating efforts including the potential for office space.
- Continued to network with surrounding agencies to optimize the delivery of our support systems.
- The office started to consider how it could positively impact members H&W from more than just BH. H&W officer met with "Solutions" group contracted by Pres Insurance for possible programs to bring to our membership.
- Met with IAFF Nutritionist for possibilities for program implementation.

SAFETY OFFICE

- June Safety Message Poster was 2021 Safety Stand-down – Rebuilding Rehab. This is a national initiative from IAFC, NVFC, and FDSOA that asks departments to focus on training that may not be reviewed on a regular basis, but is vital to fire ground operations. This was also in conjunction with training to help all members review current Rehab policies.

Firefighting puts intense strain on firefighters, both physically and mentally. It is critical that firefighters receive a comprehensive rehab program after fire incidents or intense training to ensure their physiological and psychological wellbeing. Rehab should encompass all areas of post-incident health, including cardiac, nutrition, exposure, mental health, hydration and heat stress.

As a crew, review SOG 5-1-13 Rehabilitation Group.

KNOW WHEN REHAB SHOULD BE IMPLEMENTED!

- For any strenuous activities, which may last longer than 2 hours
- Prolonged extractions, fireground activities, MCI incidents, or other emergency operations which require sustained levels of physical and mental exertion
- All structure fires of 2nd alarm or greater
- Anytime the heat index reaches 95° F or when the Heat Stress SOG 5-1-12 has been implemented
- Anytime the IC identifies or anticipates the need

WHAT DOES REHAB PROVIDE?

- An initial assessment following strenuous activity
- Revitalization - rest, hydration, and nutrition
- Medical evaluation and treatment of injuries
- Continual monitoring of physical condition
- Transportation for those requiring treatment at medical facilities
- Initial stress support assessment
- Reassignment

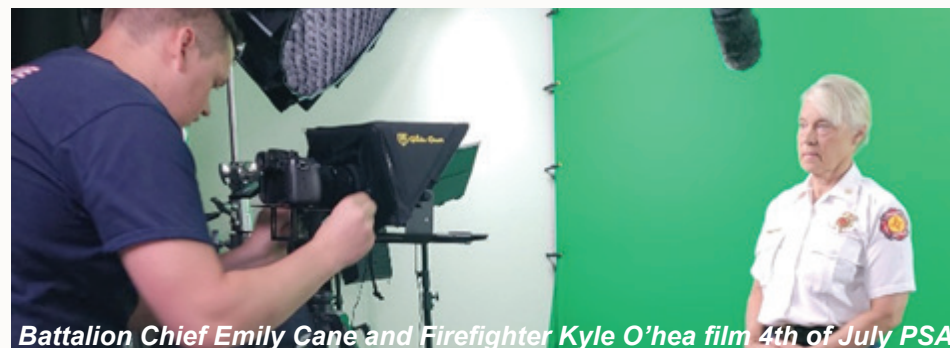

OPERATIONS

WILDLAND

- The AFR Wildland Division sent resources to the following fires during the month of June. Our members were able to assist other communities during this very hot and dry fire season.
 - * REM 1 and our Wildland Rescue responded to the Eicks Fire south of Animas, NM.
 - * REM 1 and our Wildland Rescue responded to the Wolf Draw Fire west of Cuba, NM.
 - * E317 assisted State Forestry in the East Mountains, they were assigned on a Severity Assignment to the Cibola National Forest Sandia District.
- Albuquerque Fire Rescue has had a busy fire season so far, we have responded to 65 wildland type incidents in the downtown/Tingley area alone.
- The AFR Wildland Division has replaced our aging Bendix King radios with new ones. The new radios will ensure that AFR has up-to-date equipment.

HEAVY TECHNICAL RESCUE

- AFR HTR members were sent to instructor professional development for swift water rescue and structural collapse specialist. The AFR members that attended will be supporting future AFR courses as qualified instructors. This training ensures that AFR is up to date with safe and efficient practices for rescue in Albuquerque and the surrounding areas.

HAZMAT

- The AFR HazMat Division has trained on and issued the new Haz-Mat ID Elite monitor. This new portable hazardous material chemical identifier is on Squad 3 and allows crews to quickly and accurately identify chemicals such as; chemical warfare agents, explosives, pesticides, narcotics, and other hazardous chemicals.
- AFR crews assisted the DEA with two operations, one in Albuquerque and one in the East Mountains. AFR provided Hazardous Materials decontamination on a very hot day. The collaborative effort between the DEA and AFR was smooth and flawless.
