

These events are activated by the AFR Dispatch Center as a "Significant Event" based on specific criteria and emailed to media and specific AFR members but does not include all responses by AFR to emergency calls.

6/1 - Apartment Fire: AFR units were dispatched to 3550 Old Airport Avenue NW in fire district 21. Engine 21 arrived on scene to find a working structure fire at a multiple family apartment complex which was contained to a single unit. Engine 21 deployed a garden-lay hose line for fire attack, entering the structure on the front side of the building. AFR crews were able to extinguish the fire and contain it to the room of origin.

6/2 - Commercial Fire: AFR responded to reports of an outside fire at 7001 Prospect NE in fire district 13. Upon arrival Engine 13 found fire extension into a commercial structure and quickly called for a full dispatch. 13 AFR units responded and were able to extinguish the within about 45 minutes. There were no injuries to firefighters or civilians.

6/17 - Commercial Fire: AFR dispatched to reports of a fire at 5300 sequoia Road NW in fire district 17 at large, single story strip mall. Station 17 firefighters determined a working fire in one of the businesses. AFR crews forced entry and quickly extinguished the fire in the unit while simultaneously performing a search in the main fire occupancy and the adjacent businesses on either side. No injuries were reported.

6/17 - Residential Fire: AFR units responded to a reported structure fire located at 212 Cornell Drive SE in fire district 3. Engine 3 first arrived on scene assuming command, reporting a working fire of a detached shed and a vehicle fire. AFR units deployed two hand lines, searched for victims and secured utilities. Within minutes, the fire was controlled and there were no victims located.

6/18 - Apartment Fire: AFR crews were dispatched to 3301 Monroe St. NE in fire district 19 an apartment complex. Engine 13 first on scene reporting a working fire in one of the units. The occupants were not home during the fire. Three pets (2 dogs and 1 cat) were rescued.

6/20 - Residential Fire: AFR crews were dispatched to 11505 Baldwin Ave NE in fire district 9 for a residential structure fire. Rescue 9 arrived first on scene and declared a working fire with smoke showing, assigning Engine 9 to fire control and Ladder 9 to search. Fire was brought under control in 10 minutes. One resident sustained minor burn injuries and refused transport. No other injuries were reported.

6/22 - Residential Fire: AFR responded to a single story single family home located at 7037 Luella Anne Dr. NE in fire district 15. E-15 arrived to find thick brown smoke pushing out of multiple areas around the home. It appeared the fire originated in the garage. Two occupants were home at the time of the fire and both exited quickly and were not injured. The fire was quickly extinguished. Two cats and one pet lizard survived the fire.

6/25 - Residential Fire: AFR crews were dispatched to a single family home located at 2403 Cardenas Dr NE in fire district 13. Engine 13 arrived on scene and reported heavy smoke and flames in an attached structure outside the main home that was being used as a garage/ apartment. The occupants were able to safely evacuate the structure without injury. Firefighters were able to get control of the fire within minutes of arrival, minimizing the damage to the building of origin. The structure sustained major smoke and water damage. There were no injuries to firefighters The cause of the fire was determined to be accidental.

6/26 - Residential Fire: AFR was dispatched to 711 3rd St SW in fire district 1 for reports of a possible Structure Fire at a single-family dwelling. E1 arrived on scene and reported a working fire with smoke showing from attic vents on both the front entrance and rear side of the home. The fire was brought under control within 15 minutes of their arrival. Fire related damage to the structure was contained to the attic with smoke and water damage extending into the interior of the home. No injuries of civilians or firefighters was reported. The occupants of the home were not present at the time of the fire.

6/27 - Residential Fire: AFR crews responded to a small, single story abandoned structure fire at 1811 8th St. NW in fire district 4. Engine 4 was first on scene and reported a working fire with the structure fully involved. Engine 4 established command setting up operations in a defensive strategy for extinguishment using master streams and hand-lines to get the fire under control. The building suffered a roof collapse due to the intensity of the fire.

- 2. *To commemorate the completion of the 100th AFR Cadet Class, the final run for these Cadets was made special by inviting all members, retired and present, to join their respective Cadet classmates in a 7 mile run from the AFR Training Academy to Civic Plaza.*
- 3. *Albuquerque Fire Rescue is proud to announce the graduation of the 100th Cadet Class. 26 cadets completed the 18-week academy and will now join the department as sworn members.*
- 4. *In recognition of National CPR and AED Awareness Week, the AFR EMS Division distributed hands only CPR training kits to the Staff and fans of the Albuquerque Isotopes and helped demonstrate proper CPR.*
- 5. *A family found a lost puppy and went to nearby Fire Station 15 on Academy to scan the dog for a microchip and hopefully identify the owners. The crew at 15s was able to locate a chip and obtain the owners information. The helpful family set out from the station to reunite the dog with it's family.*
- 6. *Escuela Del Sol had a special visit from Albuquerque Fire Rescue's Engine 4. The Escuela Del Sol summer campers were great hosts and attentive listeners. Thanks to the crew of Engine 4 for putting on a great show and tell.*



FIRE MARSHAL'S OFFICE

INSPECTIONS DIVISION

- In preparation for this year's 4th of July fireworks sales, FMO inspectors went out to over 80 tents and stores to ensure everything was set up correctly. The inspectors will also revisit each site to verify all life safety equipment is in place and everything is still set up according to their permit.
- Camp Fearless is a collaboration with Albuquerque Fire and Rescue, Albuquerque Police Department (APD), the New Mexico National Guard, the U.S. Attorney's Office, and the Drug Enforcement Administration which hosts NM youth in a leadership camp. The goals of Camp Fearless focus on building positive relationships and self-image, engaging with positive role models, leadership, physical fitness, and team building so participants are equipped with skills to develop successful and healthy lifestyles. Each support division in AFR was able to send 2 personnel, 4 times a week for 6 weeks to mentor the campers and FMO sent 6 inspectors each Thursday to give the campers a day in the life of a firefighter. Thank you to everyone who participated, the kids really enjoyed all the interactions.

ADAPT

- ADAPT has 151 properties that have been formally brought into the program, 96 have been cleared from the program and 55 are still in the program at different stages. ADAPT continuously monitors the properties that are in the program to track their compliance with the Nuisance Abatement Agreement.
- There are 129 properties on the Unsafe Buildings list. Four new properties were added to the list this month. The properties are labeled on the First Due application with a white "X" on a red background. In the field these properties are marked with a red spray painted "X" and the letters "AFR" under it.

FIRE INVESTIGATIONS DIVISION

- On June 12, 2023, fire investigators arrived on scene at 6500 Acoma Dr SE, at approximately 0957 hours. Investigators met with Battalion Chief 2 who advised us on the events that took place during the structure fire. BC 2 stated that Engine 5 was first on scene and quickly extinguished a small room and contents fire on the north side of the trailer in space #19. BC 2 also contacted APD due to two young children that were living at the residence in substandard conditions. BC 2 felt that this fire scene was suspicious due to the circumstances with the residents. Fire Investigators then spoke to the Engine and Ladder 5 crew. Ladder 5 Captain stated that they arrived on scene and found a trailer with smoke showing from a door on the northeast side. They made entry into the trailer on the west side through a door that was unlocked. The inside of the trailer was filled with smoke and had low visibility, but found the seat of the fire and extinguished it quickly. The occupants were all outside the trailer upon their arrival. Fire investigator then spoke to the on scene APD officers who were concerned with the safety and wellbeing of the two children that were living at the residence. Children Youth and Families Division (CYFD) was contacted by APD to conduct a welfare check on the two young children.
- On June 16, 2023, Fire investigators responded to 900 Valencia at the request of Battalion 2 to investigate a fire incident that was occurring. When we arrived on the scene we interviewed several individuals about the fire incident. One individual from the involved fire apartment stated that she received a message from this person threatening to light her apartment on fire. Fire investigators confirmed the identity of this person with the help of APD and also learned that the individual had an active warrant for arrest for aggravated battery. Shortly thereafter the property manager approached Fire Investigators and stated the individual was seen walking south on Valencia. After a short foot chase, the individual was taken into custody and eventually booked into MDC for the outstanding warrant. The fire incident severely affected one apartment from heat and smoke and moderately affected three others through exposure.
- On June 20, 2023, fire investigators were responded to Presbyterian Hospital to conduct an interview related to a fire incident that occurred at 2913 19th St. NW. The individual became a suspect and was linked to four (3) separate fire incidents at this residence. The residents provided fire investigators surveillance footage of all three (3) incident and the suspect was identified in all incidents. The incident that occurred on June 20, 2023 revealed the suspect carrying two large trash bags and proceeded to ignited them on the southeast corner of the home. The other incident also revealed the suspects igniting fire in others areas on the outside of the home. After compiling all of the information, fire investigators drafted an arrest warrant for the suspect and it was approved by the judge.
- On June 25, 2023 at 0616 hours, fire investigation personnel were dispatched to 7204 Santa Fe Trail NW to determine origin and cause of an outside shed fire. Upon arrival, investigator met with Battalion Chief 4. He stated fire crews showed up to a fully involved detached shed fire. Engine 18 was the first unit on scene and extinguished the fire while protecting the house from fire spread. Examination of the scene revealed severe fire and heat damage to the shed located in the backyard of this address. This 10' x 8' shed was a total burnout. The general area

of origin is determined to be the shed. This fire will be classified as incendiary with one suspect. The home owner stated that her best friend, who is staying with her is separated from her husband and going through a divorce. She stated that the ex-husband has been threatening her and her friend during this process and she believes he is the one who started this shed on fire. The owner provided video footage of a vehicle, which appears to be a silver Toyota 4 Runner driving by her house just after 0500 hours. She stated that the suspect drives a silver 4 Runner. APD detectives were able to locate the suspect and contacted fire investigators to question the suspect. He was placed under arrest and charged with felony arson among other criminal charges.

- The Fire Investigations Division has a total of 62 responses YTD (31 fire investigations, 23 consult cases, and 8 ATF/canine cases).

PLANS CHECKING

- Plans Checking reviewed and approved plans for the Zoo's Bio Park Asia expansion. This is an amazing new habitat for snow leopards, tigers, siamangs, and orangutans. The new Asia habitat will also join in with the newer elephant viewing area with an overlook and space for events. This Asia expansion is expected to create bigger, more natural homes for the zoo's big cats while visitors will be able to enjoy a new overlook. The 28 million-dollar phased project passed its Fire Final inspection and expects its Grand opening within a few months.
- Plans Checking is working closely with the contractors of the new Marikana Uptown Apartments located at 6500 Americas Pkwy NE. The 50,000 sq. ft complex is being constructed in 8 phases. The Preliminary inspections took place to verify all life safety is in place throughout construction including access, hydrants, standpipes, Sprinkler system, and storage.

EMERGENCY SERVICES

RECORDS MANAGEMENT

- The Records Division officially moved to Fire Station 20, 7520 Corona Ave. NE.
- Assisted in providing data for AFR's Performance measures.
- Assisted in providing data revolving around the impact the recent Arson arrests have had on the Huntington Highlands community.
- Began compiling new fire data to assist in the Departments evaluation of structure fire response and efficacy (360's, rescues and location, basements fires).
- Provided data revolving around fires in the Bosque to assist with the City's operational plan regarding unlawful encampment fires in the area.
- Assisted ADAPT by creating new matrix to more accurately and expeditiously identify abandoned and nuisance structure to assist the City in mitigation efforts.
- Improved the process to identify assaults on EMS providers to increase the responsiveness of action taken in response to these encounters.
- With input from the field, RMS as implemented several "preset values" to improve accuracy and increase speed of EMS and Fire documentation.
- Began compiling all necessary data and documentation for the Medicaid ground Ambulance Data Collection System to insure AFR is able to collect payments from Medicaid/Medicare patient transports.
- Made several updates to AFR's EMS documentation forms to improve customer service and assist in more complete and accurate documentation: resource numbers (CYFD and Adult Protective Services), links to on scene resources, documentation contingency plan, etc.
- Continuing the process of moving AFR's EMS documentation to the new version of the National EMS Information System (NEMSIS). This is the national system used to collect store and share EMS data from across the country. NEMSIS develops and maintains a national standard for how patient care information is documented. This system is designed to improve patient care through standardization and point of care data aggregation.
- Continued work on the Premier One CAD to Image Trend Elite integration. This will create a single source for all of AFR's statistical analysis and improve the accuracy and consistency across all variables.
- Assisted with AFR's professional development program, teaching EMS & Fire documentation in the Lieutenant Certification course.
- Provided support fill in for in for frontline units.

EMS TRAINING

- Our Division welcomed Driver Gabe Healey to the EMS Training team. His experience and knowledge will be a valuable addition to the EMS Training Division.
- During June the EMS Training Division has been delivering AFR's yearly EMS refresher. Every AFR member will attend this refresher, which covers; report writing, cardiac arrhythmias, wilderness trauma, and pediatric anaphylaxis.
- Assisted the Suppression Training Division with the cadet "Field Transition Night", a 24-hour shift which simulates a day in the field.
- We started our 8-week fast track EMT-B course for graduating Cadets who are not currently licensed.

- The AFR studio shot and edited multiple case studies and training videos with Dr. Pruett, field providers, and EMS Battalion Chief Ortiz.
- Coordinated, assigned, and tracked monthly department training on Vector Solutions.
- Work continued on ABQFIRE.com, this month an educational module has been added to better prepare firefighter candidates for AFR's entrance test.

HEART

- HEART provided 87 rides with its "Rides with HEART" rideshare service.
- The HEART Home Modification Program provided 30 home modification installation services. These home installations included grab bar installations and ramp building in order to prevent falls.
- HEART received and processed 74 referrals for service. The patients were processed and moved into one of our many programs.
- In a partnership with the Office of Substance Abuse Prevention HEART provided all AFR Stations with "Leave Behind Narcan Kits" to provide to community members in need.
- Fentanyl Strips to Frontline units has been completed and supply will be ongoing.
- Buprenorphine Program- Inserting information for suboxone treatment in the LBN kits. Individuals will receive access to an app with counseling, cognitive behavioral therapy, and contingency mgmt. Plus, monetary rewards for compliance.
- To date, the HEART BEATS stroke discharge program has received over 363 referrals for service. HEART is currently working with 40 patients in the program.
- Pediatric Assessment Program is currently being forged. AFR HEART division will partner with UNM Hospital for pediatric assessments. The mission is to provide a patient visit with assessment 24-48 hours post discharge for sick children who were discharged from the hospital with oxygen. Details are still being worked out. The go live date to be determined. All equipment, documentation and staff are trained and ready to respond. Currently working of referral process with UNM ED.
- Taught a three-step BE BRAVE class that focused on fall prevention and fall recovery at Sandia Vista, Bear Canyon.
- HEART Carpenter helped out CIP with projects while they rehire more staff and assisted HEART and RMS with moves to new respective locations.
- HEART Carpenter will resume partnering with Department of Senior Affairs to assist with home mods for our elderly in the community.
- Met with Adult Protective Service to discuss referred patients.
- Presented at Albuquerque Police Department's Crisis team meeting to educate them on HEART and community paramedicine.
- Working on Blue Cross Blue Shield application. Hopefully this will be led to reimbursements for the stoke assessments. Work in progress.
- Continue to build and foster a partnership with New Mexico Cancer Center with Wrigley's help.
- Participated with Chief Ortiz and Dr. Pruett on AFR EMS Case Study podcast regarding Pediatric Fent/ Xylazine incident.
- Partnered with ACS on several patients.
- Meet with UNM C3Fit team about the partnership with HEARTBEATS.
- Educated the students about the division at the Lieutenant Certification.

QUALITY ASSURANCE

- PECMO is live, operating M-F 0800-1700 for now.
- The EMS Division is in the process of completing Paramedic Credentialing for 10 new AFR Paramedics.
- AFR is continuing to work with APD, ACS, and other community shareholders as we collectively determine the best way to address the mental health crisis in our community.

PHARMACY

- Fiscal year end. Setting up new blanket POs for purchasing.
- Fixed asset review. Confirming that the spreadsheet is up to date.
- Possible Ferno battery recall. I am reaching out to every station with a Ferno gurney to get serial numbers off the batteries and then send the list to Ferno to confirm.

SPECIAL OPERATIONS**FOC**

- The Field Operations Center was busy through the month of June. With Summer here, the FOC anticipated an increase in vacation and leave usage. With this, we continue to see more members signed up for voluntary overtime. The addition of the almost-continual certification classes has enabled the FOC to fill vacancies with newly upgradeable members. This helps to decrease the strain on staffing. Almost 10 new members graduated Paramedic School in May and the FOC expects to be able utilize them on the Advanced Life Support units as they become available.

SPECIAL EVENTS

- The City of Albuquerque held the first of three Summerfest concert events at the Heights Summerfest in North Domingo Baca Park on June 10. This event went very well in a collaboration between Albuquerque Arts and Culture, APD and AFR. We look forward to contributing to safe events in July for the Route 66 Summerfest and in August for the West Side Summerfest. Discussions continue between agencies of CABQ (APD, AFR, Parks and Recreation, Solid Waste, etc) and the Albuquerque International Balloon Fiesta executive board. These discussions are centered around providing for a safer event by way of ensuring direct communication among all decision-makers with each represented stakeholder. The concept of a Unified Command appears to be universally accepted as the best method to improve public safety for Albuquerque's largest (and world-renowned) balloon event. Because the AIBF spans 9 days and 14 operational periods, the coordination, communication and cooperation between all involved is imperative.

WILDLAND

- For the month of June, the Wildland Division participated in a Wildland and fire safety prevention presentation for the Embudo Canyon Neighborhood Association. The training was attended by, the board members of the neighborhood association. They learned about wildfire awareness for Wildland Urban Interface.
- Due in part to our high danger fire season, the Wildland Division has responded to multiple mutual aid east mountain vegetation fires. We are experiencing an increase of lightning strike wildfires, such as the Bear Canyon fire, 10K fire near the east side of the Metro area. Multiple cooperators, along with AFR resources, were able to contain the fires.
- The Wildland Division has been working diligently, in preparation for the July 4th holiday weekend. Wildland apparatus will continue to be out patrolling with an emphasis on preparation for this year's Fourth of July holiday season.
- AFR continues to support the wildfires around the state by deploying the Rapid Extrication Module (REM) and has been assigned to the Comanche fire in northern New Mexico.



HAZMAT

- The AFR Hazmat coordinator attended a State wide Chempack exercise hosted by NMDOH. Chempack is defined as “It provides antidotes (three countermeasures used concomitantly) to nerve agents for pre-positioning by State, local, and/or tribal officials throughout the U.S. CHEMPACK Program is envisioned as a comprehensive capability for the effective use of medical countermeasures in the event of an attack on civilians with nerve agents”
- Hazmat tech class was conducted in the beginning of June which provided 12 additional hazmat techs to AFR.
- The Hazmat program was dispatched to an event to assist the State DOH in analyzing a biological/chemical for USPS. The event went well and the substance was identified as not being hazardous.

HEAVY TECHNICAL RESCUE

- AFR and BCSO students completed their Rope Rescue Operations course this month. This prepares us for rescues that require vertical access in the mountains and industrial setting. The joint aspects of these courses are critical as we all come together to ensure everyone goes home from the mountains. These events are difficult and labor intensive. The joint courses also prosper relationships among responders and ensure a common ground and compatibility of our systems. This is priceless in those high stress high risk situations which are occurring more often.
- The Rio Grande River continued to provide continuous flows that resulted in many rescues. The collaboration among all the responding entities has been instrumental with ensuring a safer access for recreation on the Rio Grande. All the organizations have worked together to removed strainers, trash, and be available to assist each other in conducting many rescues this month. AFR is proud to be working among the great organizations along the Rio Grande River.
- AFR HTR was able to attend the National SAR conference in Arizona this year with two of its members. Our instructors got to work side by side with teams across the world, share ideas, and take part in panels pertaining to the future of rescue. AFR HTR Instructors are forwarded the opportunity to continue their education via avenues like this to ensure our practices and knowledge do not stall or steer us in the wrong way. These opportunity keeps us ready for any need the city demands.


FLEET
