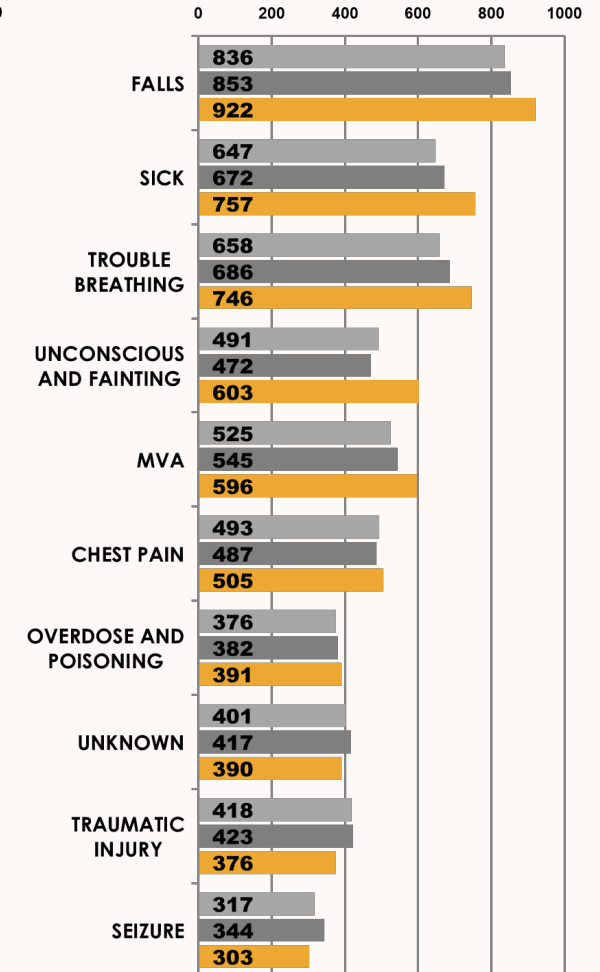

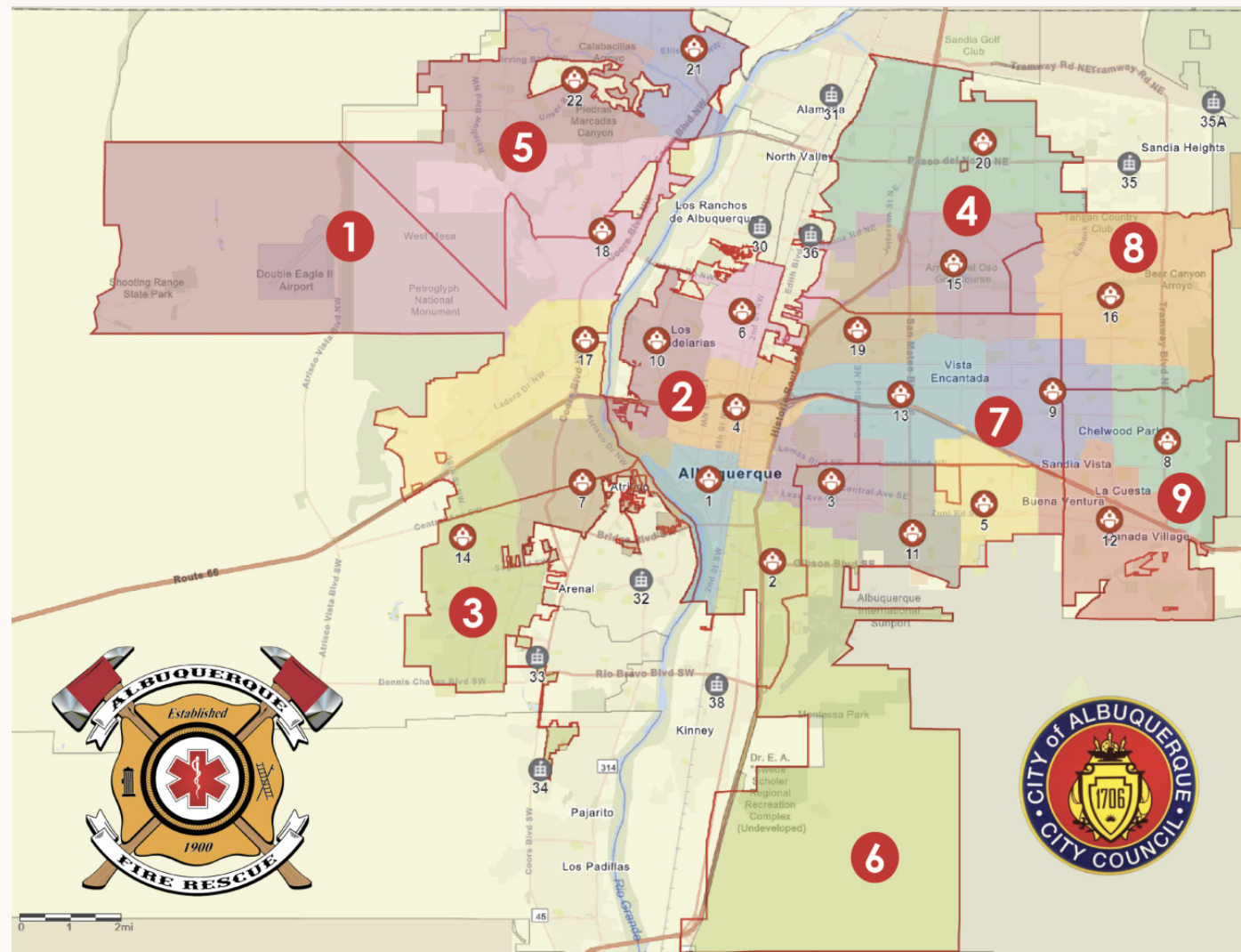

These events are activated by the AFR Dispatch Center as a "Significant Event" based on specific criteria and emailed to media and specific AFR members but does not include all responses by AFR to emergency calls.

5/3 - Residential Fire: *AFR was dispatched to 541 Chama St NE in fire district 5 for a residential structure fire. Battalion 2 arrived on scene and reported a working abandoned single story structure fire. Additional fire crews arrived on scene and began fire attack as Command assigned units to search the affected house for victims. Multiple exposures were affected as well as two vehicles that had sustained fire damage. After a secondary search was performed, an all-clear of both houses was declared as it was confirmed that no victims were inside either home. One family was displaced as a result of the fire in the second house. Fire investigators were called to investigate. One civilian injury was reported as one homeowner attempted to extinguish the fire with a garden hose. He was evaluated and released. No injuries were reported to firefighters.*

5/3 - Commercial Fire: *AFR and BCFD crews were dispatched to a second alarm fire located at 5021 Edith Blvd NE in fire district 6. Engine 6 arrived to find heavy smoke and flames coming from the building. Fire crews had difficulty initially attacking the fire due to multiple tractor trailers being involved along with the main structure. There were multiple explosions that prevented firefighters from entering. A total of 24 AFR and BCFD units responded. Unfortunately, the building was a total loss.*

5/4 - Residential Fire: *AFR units were dispatched to a reported residential fire located at 2123 Oxford SE in fire district 3. Within minutes Engine 3 arrived on scene and reported a fully involved detached garage that was spreading to a nearby apartment complex and a single story family dwelling. E3, E1 and E2 coordinated hand lines to address the fire involving the two structures. The three apartments were searched and they were not occupied at the time of the fire. An APD officer arrived on scene prior to AFR crews. The APD officer helped in evacuating occupants. The officer was evaluated for smoke inhalation.*

5/6 - Residential Fire: *AFR crews were dispatched to a single story residential structure fire at an abandoned house at 1804 Columbia SE in fire district 2. Rescue 3 reported heavy fire conditions upon arrival, took command and assigned Engine 11 to fire attack and R11 to search. The fire was quickly brought under control. The property was signed over to City of Albuquerque Code Enforcement because the owner could not be located.*

5/6 - Commercial Fire: *AFR crews were dispatched to a single story commercial structure fire at 5308 Coal SE in fire district 11. Engine 11 reported heavy fire conditions upon arrival with smoke and flames showing from the Alpha side. E11 took command and assumed fire attack while assigning R11 to conduct a primary search. The fire was quickly brought under control and no firefighters or civilians were injured.*

5/11 - Residential Fire: *AFR was dispatched to 3108 Candlelight NE in fire district 16 for reports of an outside fire. Engine 9 arrived on scene and reported that there was an outside fire with flames impinging on three separate residential structures. At that time Engine 9 called for a full dispatch as they began to extinguish the flames with handlines. Additional units arrived and the fire was successfully extinguished.*

5/12 - Bosque Fire: *At On Thursday May 12, 2022 at approximately 4:15 pm Albuquerque Fire Rescue was dispatched to the area of Central and Sunset Ave for reports of a fire near the Bosque in fire district 7. Fire crews from station 7 arrived on scene in Truck 317 and reported smoke coming from the West side of the river, South of Central. The full Wildland Task Force was dispatched and as units began to arrive on scene. The initial size-up of the fire was described as approximately ½ of an acre with grass and low lying fuels being the main source being burned. BCFD dispatched their airboat and were able to assist with fire operations by supplying water and assisting with shuttling fire crews to the east side of the river. In addition to their airboat, BCFD also sent two Type 6 brush trucks. In total, 17 fire units and 45 personnel were on scene to assist with wildland firefighting efforts. After approximately 45 minutes, firefighters were able to stop the forward progress of the fire and began to build a wet-line to prevent any further fire spread. Given the climate, high temperatures, and extremely dry conditions, an outstanding job done by AFR and BCFD to get this potentially dangerous Bosque Fire under control quickly. Firefighters remained on scene mopping up any hot spots to ensure complete extinguishment of the fire. Approximately 1 acre was burned by the fire. No homes in the area were threatened, and no injuries were reported by civilians or firefighters.*

5/13 - Residential Fire: *AFR responded to a single-story residential vacant home, located at 1105 California St. SE in fire district 11. Flames and smoke were showing from one side of the building upon arrival. Engine 11 was first on scene and firefighters quickly entered the structure with hose lines and were able to extinguish the fire. There were two squatters inside the building who were able to evacuate without any injuries. There were no injuries to civilians or firefighters. The start of the fire is believed to be started from the outside of the building and made its way into the structure through the eaves of the roof.*

5/15 - Residential Fire: AFR was dispatched to 225 Utah St NE in fire district 5 for reports of a possible residential fire. Station 5 arrived within 2 minutes and found a working fire in a small, vacant, boarded-up structure. A coordinated fire attack and search brought the fire under control in less than 15 minutes. The structure was declared clear of occupants. No firefighter or civilian injuries were reported. A total of 10 AFR apparatus responded.

5/19 - Residential Fire: At approximately 04:30, a full dispatch was sent to 510 Martinez Lane NE in fire district 4 for a reports of a single story residential fire. Engine 6 arrived to find an abandoned and boarded up single story residential structure with smoke and flames showing. The crew initiated fire attack with a line on the alpha side from the exterior. The fire was soon declared a defensive fire and crews worked from both the alpha and charlie sides to extinguish the fire. No firefighters or civilians were injured. PNM and COA Code Enforcement also responded to the scene. The cause of the fire is unknown.

5/20 - Commercial Fire: AFR At approximately 2:35am, AFR units were dispatched to a fire reported inside Coaches Sports Bar at 1414 Central SE in fire district 3. Engine 3 was first on scene to find a single-story commercial structure with a working fire. After a strong coordinated effort, AFR crews were able to get the fire under control without any reported injuries. The cause of the fire was not determined.

5/25 - Bosque Fire: AFR A fire containment line has been established and the forward progress of the fire has been stopped. The fire has two main burn sites, one on each side of the River which has fire personnel on scene. The fire has burned an approximate of 34 acres. There are currently closures in the area and the community is asked to continue to stay clear of the area from Montano to Campbell Road on the East side of the river, and from Montano to Andalucia Park on the West side of the river. These closures will be in place until further notice.

5/28 - Commercial Fire: At approximately 0600 this morning AFR responded to reports of a commercial fire at 417 Tramway NE in fire district 12. E8 arrived on scene and reported a working fire with smoke showing from the end unit of a strip mall. Fire control and primary search were coordinated. The building was searched and fire was extinguished quickly and contained to the initial fire occupancy. A total of 11 AFR units responded. No civilian or ff injuries reported. The cause of the fire is currently under investigation

5/28 - Residential Fire: AFR crews responded to a structure fire at 906 John St. SW in fire district 2. Engine 1 was first on scene of the two story single family dwelling and reported smoke and flames showing. With a coordinated fire attack by Engine 1 and 2 crews, the fire was extinguished within 20 minutes of the first unit arriving on scene. The fire caused considerable damage to the abandoned structure and the cause was not determined.

3. AFR Captain Jason Ramirez recently graduated the APD 125th Cadet Class and will be leading the Fire Investigations Division. Captain Ramirez was named Top Cadet for excelling in the areas of academics, fitness, firearms, and emergency vehicle operations training.
4. The International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers Local 611 collected surplus cleaning and sanitation supplies from AFR and were taken to the evacuation center for the Calf Canyon and Hermits Peak Fires.
5. AFR ADAPT Division members along with BCFD Fire Chief Greg Perez and PIO Lt. Robert Arguelles volunteered with The National Dance Institute of New Mexico and their In-House Outreach Program that brings in children from APS schools to perform live musical stage productions.

- With the city almost back to normal and the end of the school year upon us, FMO has been requested to attend many events involving our communities' children. Working together with field units, we have been able to accommodate almost every request. Thank you to all the units that have attended these events and made these visits so memorable for the kids.
- To continue with building and adding information into First Due, FMO has created a Community Connect flier to hand out to Albuquerque businesses. We are asking businesses to enter the locations of all utilities, hazardous materials, and vulnerable employees. We are also asking they continually update their contact information so it is always up-to-date.

ADAPT

- ADAPT has 132 properties that have been formally brought into the program, 78 have been cleared from the program and 54 are still in the program at different stages. ADAPT continuously monitors the properties that are in the program to track their compliance with the Nuisance Abatement Agreement.
- There are 102 properties on the Unsafe Buildings list. Six new properties were added to the list this month. The properties are labeled on the First Due application with a white "X" on a red background. In the field these properties are marked with a red spray painted "X" and the letters "AFR" under it.
- Two properties cleared the ADAPT program with an average of 80% reduction in crime.
 - * 3400 Coors Blvd NW was cleared with a 92% reduction in reported crime.
 - * 7817 Central Ave NE was cleared with a 67% reduction in reported crime.
- Four properties cleared the COP program with an average of 53% reduction in crime.
 - * 2801 Eubank Blvd NE was cleared with a 55% reduction in reported crime.
 - * 2401 Wellesley Dr NE was cleared with an 89% reduction in reported crime.
 - * 6001 Lomas Blvd NE was cleared with a 16% reduction in reported crime.
 - * 10131 Coors Blvd NW was cleared with a 51% reduction in reported crime.

RECORDS MANAGEMENT

- Began the hiring process for a new Billing Specialist for the Department.
- Investigated ways of increasing our collection rate for EMS treatment and transports.
- Provided data revolving around AFR's 23B and 32B (disposition, transportation destination, calls by hour of the day and locations/heatmap) to more completely understand the demographic and seek ways to better match resources to patients.
- Began collecting data revolving around success rates of I-Gels and complications with the device.
- Assisted with the roll out of the new Lifepak 15s for all Engines and Rescues.
- Provided data revolving around AFR's wildland response, specifically events taking place in the Bosque.
- Assisted with the CODESTAT update to version 10.1, allowing our EMS Supervisors to review and provide feedback on cardiac arrest responses, as well as other high acuity calls.
- Enrolled in ImageTrend Connect Conference to increase the RMS Office's knowledge, skills and abilities with our documentation software. Learning about new products (Continuum), opportunities for growth within our division to better serve to our community.
- Assisted with insuring AFR personnel providing EMS response during Isotopes events had all the necessary equipment to provide EMS care and documentation.
- Provided support fill for in for frontline units.
- Continued to track data revolving around hospital drop time averages, means and 90% to assess the impact on the EMS System.
- Continued to assist with tracking and analyzing data revolving around the Cerebral Oximetry research study AFR is participating in.
- Provided data revolving around Patient's eligibility to be transported to the CARE Campus. This could potentially provide more appropriate destinations for a specific patient population as well as potentially alleviate some of the burden to area hospitals.

HEART

- In the month of May, HEART provided 81 rides with its "Rides with HEART" rideshare service.
- The HEART Home Modification Program provided 30 home modification installation services. These home installations included grab bar installations and ramp building in order to prevent falls.
- HEART received and processed 58 referrals for service. The patients were processed and moved into one of our many programs.
- In a partnership with the Office of Substance Abuse Prevention HEART provided all AFR Stations with "Leave Behind Narcan Kits" to provide to community members in need.
- HEART BEATS had their 1year anniversary!
- To date, the HEART BEATS stroke discharge program has received over 216 referrals for service. HEART is currently working with 78 patients in the program. Two more staff members are currently undergoing training to expand the HEART BEATS program and are close to being able to perform assessment as a separate team.
- Be Brave Fall Prevention Classes taught at Barelvas Senior Center and North Valley Senior Center.
- HEART hosted and taught Community Health Worker certification class. Thirteen students in total. Combined of AFR, AMR and Sandoval County.
- Completed Fentanyl Test Strip Usage Training given by the DOH.
- In the process of creating a Fentanyl Program that will provide the community the ability to test their personal street drugs and discern if it is cross contaminated with Fentanyl. This would lessen the chance of an accidental overdose as the user would be aware of the potency of their substance prior to use.
- Provided medical monitoring at the John Marshall Building for refugees of the local wildfires when they stop by to receive social services and donations.
- Provided support fill for frontline units.

SPECIAL OPERATIONS**HAZMAT**

- Chemistry class taught by Capt. Basile. 14 AFR members attended the class with a 100 percent passing.
- Updated 6 gas monitors with the help of Mallory supply. The purpose is for monitors to maintain proficiency for emergency operations.
- New powered air-purifying respirator (PAPR) were distributed to squad 1 and 3. A PAPR is a battery-powered blower that provides positive airflow through a filter, cartridge, or canister.

WILDLAND

- For the month of May, the Wildland Division participated in FireWatch training that was hosted by COA Open Space. The training was attended by, twenty, Open Space volunteers that will be on patrol monitoring our open spaces for potential wildfires, enforcing closures, and educating the public on wildfire awareness. A second course has been scheduled in June.
- Due in part to our extreme fire season, AFR has responded to multiple wildfires this year. Of these fires, the Montano Fire was the largest wildfire incident that we have experienced many years. AFR, along with multiple cooperators, was able to contain the fire in a matter of days. The Wildland Division will continue to be out in force patrolling during this extreme fire season, with an emphasis on preparation for this year's Fourth of July holiday season.
- AFR continues to support the wildfires around the state by sending resources where needed. The Wildland Division has deployed resources to the Calf's Canyon and Hermits Peak Fires. The Rapid Extrication Module (REM) has been assigned to the fires in northern New Mexico for over 50 days. The Type 6 apparatus returned from a 14-day assignment on the Calf's Canyon Fire this month.

**HEAVY TECHNICAL RESCUE**

- Operations for HTR were busy this month! HTR task force responded to many vehicle extrications that required advanced stabilization and lifting techniques to access the patient areas. Everything from individuals underneath the vehicles or wrapped around poles or trees. The extrication are safely and efficiently getting executed by crews!
- At the same time multiple confined space rescues took place this month with victims requiring roped systems to be removed with emergencies in a confined space. Confined spaces come in two types; those with in the space (trauma, diabetic, etc) and those of the space (atmosphere, engulfment etc). The emergencies due to the space are a leading cause of would be rescuers deaths with two out of three deaths being the would-be rescuers. Stay diligent in identifying a confined space, and remember our storm drain systems are confined spaces!
- The cadet class has completed their vehicle extrication, swift water, and flood channel training this month.
- AFR's airboat along with APD and BCFD airboat were able to support our members during the Bosque fires this month. The airboat crews were able to complete direct attacks on islands to reduce spotting across the river, setup multiple water supplies, maintain the pumps from the river side, Division Supervisors were able to get a unique perspective of the entire fire quickly, and multiple support and supply runs from the rivers edge were completed.



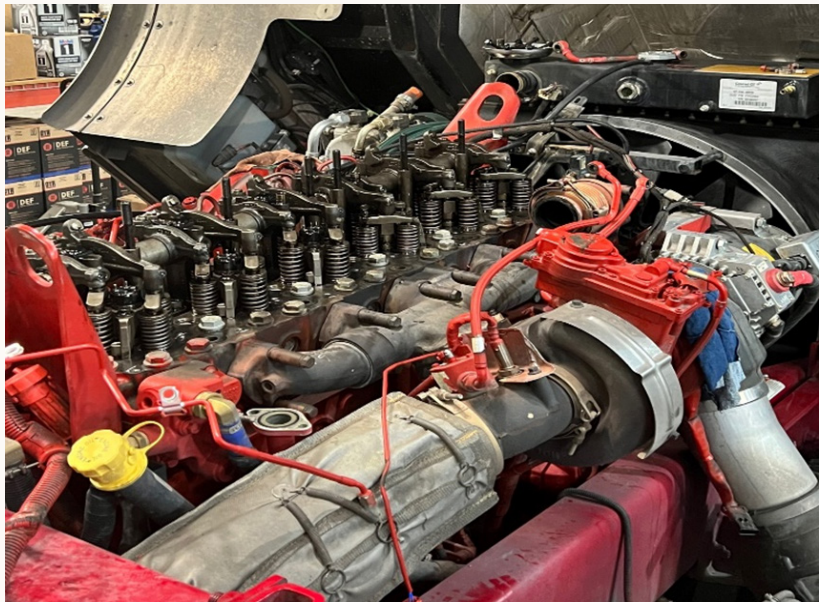
