DIVISION UPDATES

ALARM ROOM / TECHNICAL SERVICES

Communications Division reported 9,123 priority responses created in CAD for the month of September. Jan. 1 - Sept. 30, 2018 total calls are 83,117 (an increase of 2,764 from last year). Drivers Isidro Griego and Richard Funaro have graduated from the Public Safety Tele-Communicator PST 140 course.

Technical Services Division along with the Fleet division successfully installed 25 new CF-33 MDT computers in front line units. This was made possible by the computer refresh program through DTI.

FIRE MARSHAL'S OFFICE / ARSON / PUBLIC AFFAIRS OFFICE

FMO reported 415 inspections and 287 re-inspections for the month of August. A total of 4965 adults and children were reached through fire prevention classes and outreach programs. New policies are being put in place for a false fire alarm reduction program and includes the creation of the "False Alarm Reduction Unit" located in the RMS division.

Public Affairs Office PIO was busy helping coordinate the annual 9/11 Stair Climb and Memorial event at Civic Plaza and included working with several City and State agencies.



AFR Driver Lisa Hernandez was visiting Station 5 on the way home from working her last shift at FMO before retirement. A call was dispatched to Stations 5 and 12 for an MVA and Lisa jumped on the truck one last time to help! This is a true example of what defines us as firefighters for AFR.

TRAINING / EMS / HAZMAT / WILDLAND / HTR

The **EMS** division is continuing to build momentum with the HEART program since its launch in August. The four members that make up the two teams of paramedics, have been increasing the components of this care that are now including the repeat patient program, and fall prevention visits. AFR's HEART program was recently featured in Firehouse Magazine and JEMS.

Emergency Management Division performed risk assessments at Southwest Learning Center and the ABQ Bio Park and Aquarium. "Stop the Bleed" was taught at the APD Academy to the cadets and at Springstone Montessori Schools to a group of 60 students. Captain White also lectured at the Homeland Security and Emergency Management Conference.

The **Hazmat** division was training the 92nd and 93rd Cadet Class this month. Special guests from the 64th CST Army National Guard demonstrated monitoring equipment and other tools from their truck.



- The Funeral units have been used on a few occasions recently for retired AFD Firefighters that have passed.







- Ladder 13 participated in the American Towman Spirit Ride to support the "Slow Down and Move Over" law.



AFR STATION 16

- AFR was dispatched to the Pino Trailhead near the Elena Gallegos open space. Crews were alerted that an adult male had experienced a medical episode and was unable to continue walking down the trail. Crews from AFR Station 16 as well as Squad 2, Battalion Chief 3, QI Officer, APD Open Space, Albuquerque Mountain Rescue, BCSO Metro 1, BCFD, and PHI all responded. AFR crews were able to safely reach

the patient who was approximately 2 miles up the trail, and stabilize the him for transport. Metro 1 was able to short haul the patient out of the heavily wooded area and at that point he was transferred to PHI and flown to a local hospital for definitive care. All public safety personnel played a integral part in providing excellent patient care and getting him to a hospital safely. No injuries were reported by any responders.




Station 12 was one of several stations to receive station goods, like this electric smoker, from Copper Pointe Church.
