Over the past year, our city has reached many milestones that are making our community a better place for everyone.

FIGHTING CRIME FROM ALL SIDES

- Solved the most homicide cases in city history
- Gained national attention for quickly solving high-profile murders of Muslim men in ABQ
- Lowered traffic fatalities by 29%
- Expanded investments in crime fighting and law enforcement technology
- Created new officer retention program to keep experienced officers in the streets
- Continued Metro Crime Initiative to prioritize fixing the broken criminal justice system
- Worked with Attorney General to arrest habitual, organized retail crime offenders
- Launched Aggressive Driving Unit and Road Rage Evidence Portal
- Expanded Digital Intelligence Team to assist criminal investigations
- Increased DOJ compliance and made significant progress on reform and self-monitoring

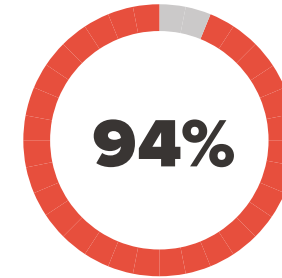

Albuquerque Community Safety (ACS) responded to 21,000+ calls for service



- Created Domestic Abuse Response Team (DART) to support victims and survivors
- Started and expanded Automatic Speed Enforcement to keep streets safe
- Launched the Targeted Enforcement and Active Monitoring (TEAM) program to increase police presence downtown

PROVIDING SOLUTIONS FOR HOUSING AND HOMELESSNESS

- Doubled the number of people being served by the City's homeless support system
- Transformed 5 hotels to help vulnerable populations survive the quarantine
- Ramped up renovations of the Gateway Center, on track to serve 1,000 people a day in 2023
- Completed Luminaria, a 92-unit senior affordable housing complex
- Moved over 500 children and their families from shelters to housing
- Launched ABQ Housing Forward, initiative to build 5,000 housing units by 2025

BUILDING AN ECONOMY FOR ALL

- Secured agreement to bring fiber internet to every home and business with Vexus
- Invested over \$12 M in local businesses
- Brought thousands of new jobs online with companies like Netflix, Amazon, and Bueno Foods
- Added \$11,426,896 in annual wage-earning power through Job Training Albuquerque
- Secured \$200 M in transformative infrastructure funding to modernize and maintain our city
- Began construction for the Rail Trail, a future ABQ

landmark that will connect old town to downtown

CREATING OPPORTUNITIES FOR YOUTH

- Registered 37,277 youth registered in summer programs
- Served 278,643 meals to kids through November 2022
- Brought back Teen Nights and Youth Job Fair
- Completed Westgate Community Center, International District Library, and Trumbull Child Development Center
- Welcomed our fellow New Mexicans who were affected by wildfires and provided support

LEADING ALBUQUERQUE TOWARD A SUSTAINABLE FUTURE

- Completed the Solar Direct project, allowing CABQ to use 88% renewable energy
- Adopted the Clean Car Rule to reduce vehicle emissions
- Unveiled the BRAIN, revolutionary technology for assessing energy consumption and improving utility usage at City Facilities.
- Added 6 sites to the Wildflower Project; resulting in 108 sites to help pollinators

CHAMPIONING EQUITY

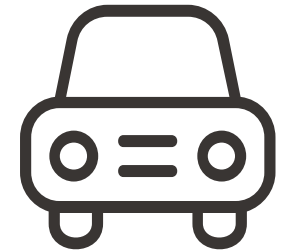
- Improved LGBTQ Scorecard to A rating for the first time
- Established Black, AAPI, and LGBTQ community liaisons to foster collaboration
- Released the Needs Assessment, a report that identified housing disparities in Black and Native communities
- Hosted the Tribal Law Enforcement Summit, outcomes included identifying a contact in each law enforcement jurisdiction and standardizing missing person public-facing communications
- Launched the Southwest Indigenous Housing Work Group
