	25	WHEREAS, the Albuquerque Community Safety Department's Street
	26	Outreach Navigation team, currently staffed with two navigators actively

1	working with 25 high-needs clients to obtain long-term benefits and secure
2	permanent housing, has engaged 80 individuals to date, successfully housing
3	62 of them — a 78% housing outcome rate; and
4	WHEREAS, expanding street outreach, eviction prevention, and housing
5	stability programs will directly address the intertwined crises of homelessness
6	and substance use disorders, as recommended in the Vital Strategies opioid
7	settlement plan; and
8	WHEREAS, the Albuquerque Community Safety Department has a goal to
9	ensure people of all ages have access to holistic and trauma-informed
10	response to calls for services; and
11	WHEREAS, the City of Albuquerque has the goal to assertively respond to
12	the homelessness challenges with a diversified public health strategy
13	leveraging both housing assistance and public safety; and
14	WHEREAS, the operation of the Albuquerque Community Safety
15	Department provides the technical means of accomplishing these goals; and
16	WHEREAS, the City of Albuquerque is desirous of applying for these funds
17	to support operations within the community.
18	BE IT RESOLVED BY THE COUNCIL, THE GOVERNING BODY OF THE CITY OF
19	ALBUQUERQUE:
20	SECTION 1. PROGRAMMING. The Department of Finance and
21	Administrative Serices (DFAS) and the Albuquerque Community Safety
22	Department (ACS) shall create two programs within Fund (201) as follows:
23	(1) Expand Mobile Crisis Response Services
24	(2) Recovery Housing
25	SECTION 2. APPROPRIATION. That opioid settlement funds in the amount
26	of \$2,916,162.94 are hereby appropriated from Fund (201).
