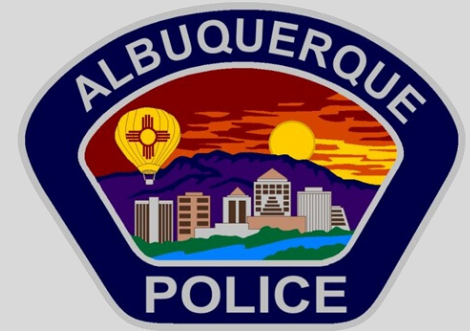

Bolstering Public Safety



Albuquerque Police Department's multi-pronged approach to bolstering public safety is a testament to its dedication to progress, technology, community, and cooperation. By addressing crime comprehensively, APD is unceasingly working to create a safer and more secure environment for the diverse and vibrant community of Albuquerque.

APD's Enhanced Technology

The Albuquerque Police Department (APD) is achieving unprecedented success in solving crimes thanks to its access to an extensive network of over 6,000 surveillance cameras.

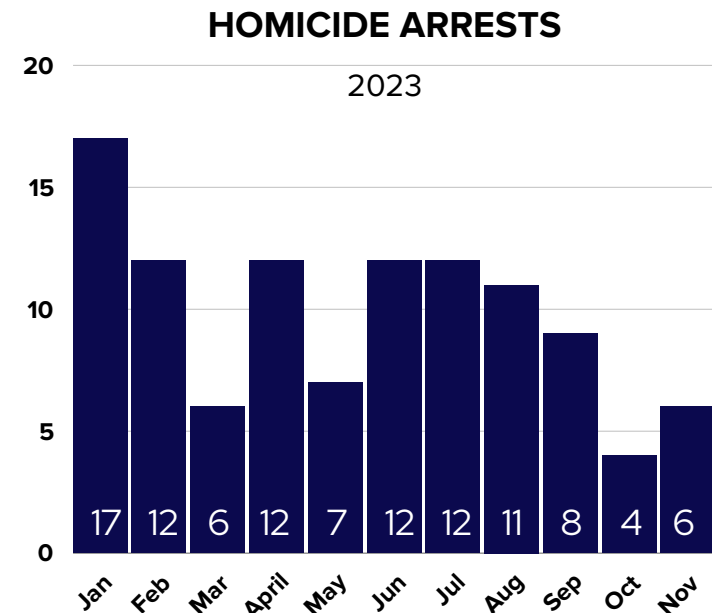
This network includes 1,100 cameras mounted on city buses and is further bolstered by cutting-edge technology such as gunshot detection systems, ballistics tracking tools, license plate readers, and the expansion of its Digital Intelligence Team for in-depth analysis of phone and social media data.



Dedicated to Solving the Case

In 2023, the Albuquerque Police Department has demonstrated remarkable progress in homicide investigations. With over 200 investigators trained through the new Detectives Academy, the results speak volumes:

- 73 cases have been successfully solved, leading to the charging of 111 suspects.
- These achievements have contributed to a significant 22% decrease in homicides compared to the previous year.



Curbing Retail Theft with Operation Sticky Fingers

APD initiated "Operation Sticky Fingers" to combat retail theft in partnership with local stores and mitigate the impact of shoplifting. Officers collaborated closely with retail partners and



stationed themselves at strategic nearby locations, prepared to engage with suspected shoplifters within the stores. This focused and targeted enforcement against retail crime, as exemplified by Operation Sticky Fingers, yielded impressive results, culminating in 196 arrests.

Keeping Albuquerque's Roads Safe

APD's commitment to enhancing traffic safety is evident in the significant rise of citations over the years. In 2023, the number of citations has already reached 45,000, driven by a proactive approach to enforcement.

Specifically addressing the issue of street racing, weekly operations have yielded impressive results. These operations have led to a total of:

- 1,074 citations for street racers
- 636 spectating citations
- Disabling of 52 spiked cars



Tackling the Warrants

In an effort to focus on suspects on Albuquerque's streets with outstanding warrants, APD secured \$5 million from the state for the Metro region. The money is being used to pay overtime for intensive warrant operations. Since the operation started at the beginning of the year, APD has served 5,843 felony warrants, a 27% increase over 2022. During the same time, officers made 4,433 felony warrant arrests, a 29% increase over 2022.
