Mayor Tim Keller hosted the second
Constructive Conversations series to
discuss the Metro Homelessness Initiative
(MHI). These meetings focused on
expanding housing and support systems to
help individuals transition to stable housing.
Community members engaged directly with
city leaders, sharing feedback on innovative
housing solutions, enhanced support
services, and fostering a compassionate
approach to homelessness. Attendees
emphasized the importance of ongoing
collaboration and open dialogue as
initiatives progress.

Hotel/Motel Conversions:
 These conversions are

These conversions are becoming an increasingly popular solution to housing shortages, with mentions across the board. These conversions provide immediate, cost-effective housing options, often faster than new builds. By leveraging existing infrastructure, cities can address the urgent needs, particularly of individuals facing homelessness or requiring temporary housing

Office Building Conversions:
 Repurposing underutilized office spaces into residential units is another strategy that maximizes existing

infrastructure, offers affordable housing and contributes to urban revitalization, all while meeting the growing demand for residential units.

Micro-Communities: Micro-communities, like Gateway
Recovery, are gaining
attention. These communities
offer individuals a place to
stay for up to 24 months.
Providing access to
healthcare, social services,
and workforce development,
all of which contribute to long-term stability and recovery.
