Albuquerque 2023 Year in Review



In 2023, our city reached many milestones that are making our community a better place for everyone. The promise of Albuquerque is well on its way to being realized.

USING TECHNOLOGY AND CIVILIAN SUPPORT TO FOCUS ON CRIME

- Cleared 5,843 felony warrants to get violent offenders off our streets.
- · Solved the most homicide cases in city history.
- Achieved 94% operational compliance with its Department of Justice (DOJ) settlement agreement.
- Albuquerque Community Safety (ACS) Department expanded to 24/7 response.
- ACS has taken over 55,000 calls for service and diverted over 34.000 calls from APD.
- Issued 45.000+ traffic citations, taking a proactive approach to enforcement.
- Built a network of Automated Speed Enforcement cameras that are slowing down dangerous drivers and freeing up officers' time.
- Cleaned nearly 7,000 encampments and offered shelter and resources.

EXPANDING PUBLIC SAFETY SUPPORT

- ACS's Violence Intervention Program (VIP) maintains a 91% two-year running success rate of participants not recidivating in violent crime.
- · School Based VIP at West Mesa High School shows 85% reduction in major offenses. City working to expand the program to all high schools.
- · Created the University Area Command which includes officers on APD'S Open Space Unit.

FILLING CRITICAL GAPS TO BUILD HOUSING AND ADDRESS HOMELESSNESS

- · Passed Housing Forward Legislation, opening up zoning so casitas can be built throughout the city.
- Purchased the Surestay Hotel to be converted into housing, currently under construction.

- Awarded \$25 million through the RAISE Grant to fund the Uptown Connect and Uptown Transit Center Joint Development. The project will create over 400 affordable and market-rate housing units.
- Opened Housing Navigation at Gateway Center, connecting people to the resources and support they need to access permanent, stable housing.
- Added 392 new housing units, through six projects, by utilizing Redevelopment Tax Abatement incentives.
- Provided housing for over 1,100 individuals through the Family Housing Navigation Center.
- Invested \$28.3 million in six affordable housing projects over the last two years, adding 460 new units.
- Supported substance-use treatment for 527 people who could not afford it and were not covered by Medicaid.

BUILDING AN ECONOMY FOR ALL

- Brought Maxeon to Mesa Del Sol, marking the biggest Metro jobs announcement since Intel. Maxeon will employ 1,800 people and bring \$4.2 billion in economic impact.
- Secured agreement to house the CNM Media Academy at the Railyards.
- Expanded studio space and infrastructure, including NBCUniversal, Netflix, Hanover Studios, and The Studios at Journal Center.
- Passed state legislation to expand our ability to complete work in designated Redevelopment Areas
- University Tax Increment Development District (TIDD)
 was created to support economic development
 and job creation by a \$4 million tax increment for
 public infrastructure.
- Provided contracts totaling more than \$3 million to over 200 arts and culture organizations.
- Kicked off the \$90 million Dream of Flight terminal renovation with opportunities for local businesses.

ELEVATING OUR COMMITMENT TO FAMILIES

- · Served 219,277 summer meals.
- Provided summer programming to 42,294 kids.
- Assisted 5,000 individuals in preparing for school through "Cruzin' into the School Year"
- Placed 135 Junior Mentor Program (JMP) interns across 58 locations for summer work experience and mentored 60+ youth through Mayor's Creative Youth Corps.
- Expanded the Trumbull Child Development Center, reopening to serve kids aged 0-5 in southeast Albuquerque with two new classrooms.
- Started renovations on Phase 2 of Westgate Community Center.
- Started renovations on the Loma Linda Community Center and Jack Candelaria Community and Boxing Training Center.
- Began construction on the Santa Santa Barbara-Martineztown Multigenerational Community Center.
- Made 13,750 contacts with seniors, resulting in 5,249 referrals to case management resources.
- Provided 51.802 rides to seniors.

PAVING THE WAY TOWARD ALBUQUERQUE'S SUSTAINABLE FUTURE

- · Acquired five electric buses and funding for 20 more.
- Awarded a \$3.9 million grant from the New Mexico Department of Transportation to install 36 new electric vehicle (EV) charging stations
- Ranked 4th among large cities in the U.S. for most installed solar per capita by Environment America's Shining Cities report.

ADVANCING QUALITY OF LIFE FOR FAMILIES

- Leased 7 of the 365 acres of Balloon Fiesta Park to New Mexico United for a multi-purpose stadium.
- Completed Los Altos Park Renovation Phase 1—

bringing five new softball fields to the Park.

- Doubled the amount of dog parks throughout the city.
- Expanded Open Space by preserving and making permanent 3% bond program to acquire more open space land.
- Opened the highly anticipated Asia habitat at the BioPark Zoo.
- Started groundwork for the Rail Trail, a pedestrian parkway linking Downtown neighborhoods that reflects Albuquerque's rich history and diverse culture.
- Fixed over 8,000 potholes on ABQ roads.
- Built 765 miles of storm drains throughout the city.
- Added 15 miles of bicycle lanes to ABQ roads.
- · Added or refreshed 48 crosswalks.

CHAMPIONING EQUITY

- Won the 2023 National League of Cities Cultural Diversity Award for integrating diversity, equity and inclusion throughout city government.
- Became the first city in the nation to advance Justice40, delivering 40% of overall benefits from certain federal investments to disadvantaged communities.
- Over 1,000 CABQ employees attended a Culture Change training on topics of racial equity, language access, transgender justice, cultural humility and implicit bias.
- Over 300 Migrants assisted through the Migrant Assistant Project.
- Provided 1,205 meals provided to migrants passing through Albuquerque through the Migrant Assistant Project.
- Passed a permanent zero fares legislation for ABQ Ride, so all riders can use public transportation free of charge.
