CITY OF ALBUQUERQUE CITIZEN PERCEPTION SURVEY JANUARY 2021



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METHODOLOGY

This research study was commissioned by the City of Albuquerque in order to assess residents' satisfaction with various City services, response to the Coronavirus, and issues relating to crime, homelessness, and public safety.

THE INTERVIEW

A random sample of 300 adult residents residing within the Albuquerque city limits were interviewed by telephone. All interviews were conducted between November 16th through November 21st, 2020.

Given the prevalence of cell phone users, 72% of the interviews were completed by random digit dialing cell phone number prefixes that have been issued in Albuquerque.

The telephone interviewers are professionals who are brought together for a training session prior to each survey. This ensures their complete and consistent understanding of the survey instrument. A total of 300 adult Albuquerque residents completed interviews.

MARGIN OF ERROR

A sample size of 300 at a 95% confidence level provides a maximum margin of error of approximately 5.6%. In theory, in 95 out of 100 cases, the results based on a sample of 300 will differ by no more than 5.6 percentage points in either direction from what would have been obtained by interviewing all adult residents within the City of Albuquerque.

SAMPLE BIAS

In any survey, there are some respondents who will refuse to speak to the professional interviewer. A lower response rate among certain types of individuals can result in a sample wherein certain types of individuals are over-represented or under-represented. The potential for sampling bias increases as the response rate decreases. Research & Polling, Inc. often sets quotas and/or weights for various segments of the population who are historically undercounted. This has the effect of minimizing, but not necessarily eliminating, sampling bias.

THE REPORT

This report summarizes the results from each question in the survey and reports on any variances in attitude or perception, where significant, among demographic subgroups. The subgroups examined in this report include.

- Region
- Gender
- Ethnicity
- Age
- Household income
- Education attainment level
- Length of residency

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

QUALITY OF LIFE

Although the City of Albuquerque is facing many serious challenges in light of the COVID-19 pandemic and resulting economic downturn, the majority of City residents (59%) rate the overall quality of life as being either *good* (48%) or *excellent* (11%), while 27% give a *fair* rating. Just 12% of residents rate the quality of life in Albuquerque poorly. It should be noted the percentage of residents who rate the quality of life in Albuquerque as being either *good* or *excellent* has improved slightly from 54% in 2018 to 59% currently.

The results also show that half of the residents surveyed are either *somewhat hopeful* (33%) or *very hopeful* (17%) about the direction of the City, while 49% say they are either *somewhat concerned* (26%) or *very concerned* (23%). The 50% of residents who say they are hopeful about the direction of the City is a slight improvement over the 46% observed four months ago.

CITY SERVICES AND PRIORITIES

Residents were read a list of local government services and programs provided by the City of Albuquerque and asked to rate how much of a priority each service should be when Albuquerque officials plan for the City's budget on a 5-point scale where a score of 5 means a *very high priority* and a score of 1 means a *very low priority*.

- 85% rate economic development programs to create jobs as being a high priority, with 62% who rate this as a very high priority.
- 84% rate improving programs for homeless individuals and families, substance abuse, and individuals with mental health issues as a high priority, with 58% who rate this as a very high priority.
- 73% feel offering more summer school and after-school programs for kids should be a high priority, with 44% who rate this as a very high priority.
- 72% of residents feel hiring more police officers and funding public safety needs is a high priority, with 52% who rate this as a very high priority.
- 68% rate **improving roads and streets as** a high priority when planning the City budget (39% say this should be *a very high priority*).
- 57% say **improving parks and recreational services** should be a high priority (28% believe it should be a *very high priority*).
- 55% feel reducing environmental impact by investing in more energy efficient facilities and expanding renewable energy use should be a high priority (33% feel this should be a very high priority).
- 44% believe **improving public transportation services** should be a high priority when planning for the City's budget, with 25% saying this should be a *very high priority*.

On a more general level, it should be noted that approximately half (48%) of residents agree the Albuquerque City Government is responsive to community needs, while 26% have neutral or mixed feelings. One-in-four residents do not believe City Government is responsive to community needs. This is a significant improvement when compared to previous studies.

COVID-19

Like all municipalities, the City of Albuquerque has faced a daunting task in dealing with the COVID-19 pandemic. The majority of residents (54%) give City Government positive reviews for the way it has handled the pandemic. In comparison, 20% are critical of the way the pandemic has been handled by City Government, while 26% give a neutral or mixed rating.

Residents were asked to rate how strongly they either agree or disagree with various statements pertaining to Albuquerque City Government and COVID-19 using a 5-point scale where 5 is *strongly agree* and 1 is *strongly disagree*.

- 79% of residents agree Albuquerque City Government should provide more financial assistance and aid programs to residents who have been unable to pay for housing and other necessities due to the pandemic, with 54% who *strongly agree*. Less than one-in-ten (9%) residents disagree.
- 79% also agree Albuquerque City Government should **provide direct payments to businesses that have been hurt economically by the pandemic,** with 53% who *strongly agree*. Just 5% of residents disagree, while 14% have neutral or mixed feelings.
- 61% agree City Government has done a good job of communicating with the public during the outbreak, compared to just 18% who disagree, while 19% have neutral or mixed feelings.
- 60% agree City Government has done a good job keeping City services running during the outbreak (28% strongly agree), compared to 15% who disagree.
- 27% of residents agree City Government has done a good job helping business owners during the outbreak, though 41% disagree and 28% have a neutral opinion.

Although Albuquerque City Government has been assertive in developing and implementing programs and services to help businesses owners, there appears to be a feeling among some residents that businesses need more help. This may be due to a lack of awareness of the programs that have been put in place. It is also an indication of just how damaging the pandemic has been on businesses, particularly small businesses and local food/drinking establishments.

While most residents do believe City Government has done a good job communicating with the public, the City needs to continue to find ways of reaching more people to inform them of the programs and services that are available to residents and how these initiatives are helping area businesses and the public in general.

ALBUQUERQUE POLICE DEPARTMENT

Approximately half (48%) of residents agree the Albuquerque Police Department (APD) is respectful in its treatment of citizens. However, 17% disagree, while 31% have neutral or mixed feelings. Overall, these results are similar to those observed in the 2018 survey, though lower than ratings observed in 2015 and 2016 when public opinion of the Albuquerque Police Department was at a peak.

Furthermore, when asked how much trust they have in the police officers in Albuquerque, 37% of City residents say they have a *great deal of trust*, while 45% say they have *some trust* and 16% say they have *hardly any trust* in Albuquerque police officers.

City residents were informed that APD is working with the U.S. Department of Justice to implement new policies and reforms designed to reduce the use of force and encourage policing that ensures residents' constitutional rights. City residents were then asked to rate how well of a job they believe APD is doing making these changes. Overall, 48% of City residents say APD is doing a good job implementing new policies and reforms. Twenty-nine percent of residents have a neutral opinion, and 16% say APD is doing a poor job implementing these changes.

Overall, the 48% of residents who give APD positive reviews is an improvement compared to previous studies, rising from 44% observed in 2018 and 40% in 2019.

SAFETY AND CRIME

Crime and feelings of personal safety are important components to perceived quality of life. To this end, 84% of residents say they feel either *very safe* (60%) or *somewhat safe* (24%) **alone in their neighborhood during the day**, compared to just 9% who feel unsafe.

It is also observed that approximately two-thirds (68%) of residents say they feel either *very safe* (30%) or *somewhat safe* (38%) **alone in their neighborhood at night**, though 24% say they feel either *somewhat unsafe* (14%) or *very unsafe* (10%).

City residents were read various things that can be done to make neighborhoods safer and asked to rate the effectiveness of each one using a 5-point scale where a score of 5 is *very effective* and a score of 1 is *very ineffective*.

- 77% of residents believe **neighbors working together to report crime and suspicious activity** is an effective way of making neighborhoods safer, with 52% who feel this is *very effective*.
- 76% of residents feel more street lighting is an effective way to make neighborhoods safer, with 55% who rate this as very effective.
- 69% feel more police officers patrolling your area either by car, walking or biking would be effective.
- 44% of City residents rate **more neighborhood social events** as an effective way to make neighborhoods safer, while 29% have a neutral opinion and 27% feel this is ineffective. It is important to note that the current COVID-19 crisis and lockdowns may be impacting residents' feelings about having more neighborhood social events as an effective strategy.
- 36% of residents believe having more nearby retail stores and restaurants is an effective way to make neighborhoods safer, while 33% have a neutral opinion and 30% rate this as being ineffective.

Residents were also asked if they feel different types of crimes in Albuquerque are *going up*, *going down*, *or not changing*. Overall, relatively few residents believe any of the different types of crime are going down in Albuquerque. With the exception of home burglaries, the majority of residents believe each of the following types of crime are increasing.

- 66% of residents believe violent crimes are going up, while just 10% say violent crimes are going down in Albuquerque and 21% feel it is not changing.
- 61% believe that **crimes involving guns** are *going up*, compared to 12% who feel crimes involving guns are *going down* and 23% say it is *not changing*.
- 56% believe **auto thefts** are *going up*, while 17% say auto thefts are *going down* and 24% feel this is *not changing*.
- 53% of the residents surveyed believe crimes against children are going up, compared to 9% who feel these are going down and 25% who feel this is not changing.
- 49% feel **home burglaries** are *going up* in Albuquerque, compared to 22% who say home burglaries are *going down* and 24% say this is *not changing*.

These results are similar to those observed last year, indicating that public perception of crime is not changing, and most residents believe crime is increasing in the city. It is important to note that according to APD official crime reports, most crimes including auto thefts, home burglaries, and homicides have actually gone down in the past year. Dealing with crime related issues is a major challenge for City Government, not just in actually reducing crime, but communicating to the public what is being done to bring crime down, and also changing perceptions of crime in the City.

HOMELESSNESS

Homelessness is a major issue facing all large cities, particularly with the economic downturn that has taken place over the last year and higher levels of unemployment. The survey results show that 29% of residents feel the City is doing a good job addressing homelessness. This is a significant improvement compared to the 13% who felt the same way in 2019. However, over one-third (36%) feel the City is doing a poor job of addressing homelessness, while 34% give the City mixed reviews or have a neutral opinion.

When asked how Albuquerque is doing addressing the issue of homelessness compared to other big cities in the country, 19% of residents say Albuquerque is doing a *better job*, while 53% feel Albuquerque is doing *about the same* and 18% believe Albuquerque is doing *a worse job* addressing homelessness.

Residents were read a list of different City policies and programs being implemented to address the issue of homelessness in Albuquerque and asked if they have heard or read anything about each initiative. While there is a relatively high level of awareness of opening new homeless shelters in the City, more needs to be done to increase awareness of some of the other initiatives.

- 67% say they have heard or read about opening new homeless shelters in the City.
- 50% have heard or read something about **providing housing to families through the One Albuquerque Housing Fund**.
- 49% have heard or read about the City keeping the Westside emergency center open 24 hours a day, every day of the year.
- 47% have heard or read about the City offering City services and housing to those living in homeless camps.
- 26% have heard or read about the City **providing a mobile showering unit for homeless residents**.

COMMUNITY SAFETY DEPARTMENT

Residents were informed the City of Albuquerque has proposed the creation of a new department called the Community Safety Department and, once fully staffed, the Department will send trained professionals to non-violent calls relating to public intoxication, drug use, homelessness, and mental health issues, without the police department. Residents were then asked if they have heard or read anything about the Community Safety Department prior to being surveyed.

Residents were informed that with the Community Safety Department responding to such issues as abandoned cars, discarded needles, addiction, non-violent mental health issues, and similar situations, police officers will be able to spend more time dealing with violent and other serious crimes. After being given this information, residents were asked if they feel the creation of the Community Safety Department is a *good idea* or a *bad idea*.


Three-in-four residents (75%) feel the creation of the Community Safety Department is a *good idea*, compared to just 17% who feel it is a *bad idea* and 7% who say it *depends*. These results show there is strong public support for the concept of a Community Safety Department in Albuquerque.

Overall, approximately two-fifths (41%) of the survey respondents say they had heard or read something about the Community Safety Department, prior to the survey, though the majority (59%) have not.




SUMMARY OF RESULTS



City residents were asked to rate the overall quality of life in Albuquerque. As shown above, 11% of City residents rate the quality of life in Albuquerque as being *excellent*, while 48% rate the quality of life as *good* and 27% give a *fair* rating. Twelve percent of residents feel the quality of life in Albuquerque is either *poor* (8%) or *very poor* (4%).

The percentage of residents who rate the quality of life in Albuquerque as being either *good* or *excellent* has improved slightly from 54% in 2018 to 59% currently.



Residents were asked if they are *very hopeful, somewhat hopeful, somewhat concerned*, or *very concerned* about the direction of the City in 2020. As shown above, half of the residents surveyed say they are either *somewhat hopeful* (33%) or *very hopeful* (17%) about the direction of the City, while 49% say they are either *somewhat concerned* (26%) or *very concerned* (23%).

The 50% of residents who say they are hopeful about the direction of the City is a slight improvement over the 46% observed four months ago.

Residents were read a list of local government services and programs provided by the City of Albuquerque and asked to rate how much of a priority each service should be when Albuquerque officials plan for the City's budget on a 5-point scale where a score of 5 means a *very high priority* and a score of 1 means a *very low priority*.

As shown above, 85% of residents rate **economic development programs to create jobs** as being a high priority (a score of 4 or 5), with 62% who rate this as a *very high priority*. Just 4% rate this as a low priority as indicated by a score of 1 or 2.

Over four-fifths (84%) of residents rate **improving programs for homeless individuals and families**, **substance abuse**, **and individuals with mental health issues** as a high priority, with 58% who rate this as a *very high priority*.

Just under three-quarters (72%) of residents feel **hiring more police officers and funding public safety needs** is a high priority, with 52% who rate this as a *very high priority*. Thirteen percent of residents feel this should be a low priority, while 15% give a neutral or mixed rating of 3.


Approximately three-quarters (73%) of residents rate offering more summer school and after-school programs for kids as a high priority, with 44% who rate this as a very high priority.

Approximately two-thirds (68%) of residents believe that **improving roads and streets** should be a high priority when planning the City budget (39% say it should be *a very high priority*), while approximately one-fifth (19%) have a neutral opinion and 13% feel this is a low priority.

The majority of residents (55%) feel **reducing environmental impact by investing in more energy efficient facilities and expanding renewable energy use** should be a high priority (33% feel this should be a *very high priority*), while 27% have a neutral opinion and 17% rate this as a low priority.

Nearly three-fifths (57%) of residents say **improving parks and recreational programs** should be a high priority (28% believe it should be a *very high priority*), while 14% feel this should be a low priority when planning the City's budget.


Finally, less than half (44%) of residents believe **improving public transportation services** should be a high priority when planning for the City's budget, with 25% saying this should be a *very high priority*. Twenty-seven percent of residents feel improving public transportation is a low priority, and another 27% give a neutral rating.

Residents were asked to rate how strongly they either agree or disagree that **Albuquerque City Government is responsive to community needs** using a 5-point scale where 5 is *strongly agree* and 1 is *strongly disagree*.


Approximately half (48%) of the residents surveyed agree Albuquerque City Government is responsive to community needs, as indicated by a score of 4 or 5, with 18% who *strongly agree*. Twenty-six percent of residents have neutral or mixed feelings as indicated by a score of 3, while 25% disagree that City Government is responsive to community needs (a score of 1 or 2).

The percentage of residents who feel Albuquerque City Government is responsive to community needs has improved dramatically when compared to previous studies. Currently, 48% of residents feel City Government is responsive compared to 28% observed in 2018 and 33% observed in 2016.

The improvement in perceived City responsiveness to community needs appears to be correlated to how City Government has handled the COVID-19 Pandemic. Residents who feel the City has done a good job handling the pandemic and has communicated well during the pandemic are much more likely to agree the City is responsive to community needs overall. Conversely, residents who feel the City has done a poor job handling and the pandemic and communicating are much more likely to disagree the City Government is responsive to community needs.

Residents were asked to rate **how well Albuquerque City Government has dealt with the Coronavirus/COVID-19 pandemic** using a 5-point scale where 5 is *excellent* and 1 is *very poor*. As shown above, the majority of residents (54%) give City Government positive scores of 4 or 5 for the way it has handled the Coronavirus (22% give an *excellent* rating). In comparison, 20% are critical of the way the pandemic has been handled by City Government as indicated by a score of 1 or 2, while 26% give a neutral or mixed rating of 3.

Overall, these results are similar to those observed in the September survey, in which 61% gave positive ratings for how City Government has dealt with the Coronavirus/COVID-19 pandemic and 16% were critical of the response. It is important to note the current survey was conducted during a period of new statewide restrictions and a significant increase in the number of people testing positive for COVID-19, which may account for the slightly lower scores.

Residents were asked to rate how strongly they either agree or disagree with various statements pertaining to Albuquerque City Government and the Coronavirus outbreak using a 5-point scale where 5 is *strongly agree* and 1 is *strongly disagree*.


As shown above, approximately four-fifths (79%) of residents agree Albuquerque City Government should **provide more financial assistance and aid programs to residents who have been unable to pay for housing and other necessities due to the pandemic** as indicated by a score of 4 or 5, with 54% who *strongly agree*. Less than one-in-ten (9%) residents disagree (a score of 1 or 2), while 11% have neutral or mixed feelings.

Seventy-nine percent of residents also agree Albuquerque City Government should **provide direct payments to businesses that have been hurt economically by the pandemic,** with 53% who *strongly agree*. Just 5% of residents disagree, while 14% have neutral or mixed feelings.

Just over three-fifths (61%) of residents agree City Government has done a good job of communicating with the public during the outbreak (35% *strongly agree*), compared to just 18% who disagree, while 19% have neutral or mixed feelings.


Three-in-five residents also agree City Government has done a good job keeping City services running during the outbreak (28% strongly agree) compared to 15% who disagree.

Finally, 27% of residents agree City Government has done a good job helping business owners during the outbreak, though 41% disagree and 28% have a neutral opinion.




One-in-three residents say they are aware that City-operated childcare services have been open for children of essential workers during the COVID pandemic.

It should be noted than women (44%) are more than twice as likely as men (21%) to be aware that City-operated childcare services have been open.




FEELINGS OF PERSONAL SAFETY


Residents were asked to rate how safe they feel outside in their neighborhood alone during the day and alone at night. As shown above, 84% of residents say they feel either *very safe* (60%) or *somewhat safe* (24%) **alone in their neighborhood during the day**, compared to just 9% who feel unsafe.



It is also observed that approximately two-thirds (68%) of residents say they feel either *very safe* (30%) or *somewhat safe* (38%) **alone in their neighborhood at night**, though 24% say they feel either *somewhat unsafe* (14%) or *very unsafe* (10%).



Looking at tracking results, the 68% of residents who say they feel **safe alone outside at night** in their neighborhood is very similar to the results observed in 2019 (65%), though down from 73% in 2018 and a high of 82% observed in 2014.



The 84% who currently say they feel either *very safe* or *somewhat safe* outside **alone during the day** is similar to results observed in 2019 and 2018, though down from earlier studies.

City residents were read various things that can be done to make neighborhoods safer and asked to rate how effective they feel each one is using a 5-point scale where a score of 5 is *very effective* and a score of 1 is *very ineffective*.

Approximately three-quarters (76%) of residents rate **more street lighting** as an effective way to make neighborhoods safer (as indicated by a score of 4 or 5), with 55% who rate this a *very effective*. Just 10% do not believe more street lighting is an effective way to make neighborhoods safer (a score of 1 or 2), while 14% have neutral or mixed feelings (a score of 3).

Just over three-quarters (77%) of residents believe **neighbors working together to report crime and suspicious activity** is an effective way of making neighborhoods safer, with 52% who feel this is *very effective*. Just 9% do not feel this is an effective way to make neighborhoods safer, while 13% have neutral or mixed feelings.

Approximately seven-in-ten residents (69%) feel **more police officers patrolling your area either by car, walking or biking** would be effective. Fourteen percent do not believe this would be effective, while 17% have neutral or mixed feelings.

Over one-third (36%) of residents rate **more nearby retail stores and restaurants** as an effective way to make neighborhoods safer, while 33% have a neutral opinion and 30% rate this as being ineffective.

Less than half (44%) of City residents rate **more neighborhood social events** as an effective way to make neighborhoods safer, while 29% have a neutral opinion and 27% feel this is ineffective. It is important to note that the current COVID-19 crisis and lockdowns may be impacting residents' feelings about having more neighborhood social events as an effective strategy.



Residents were asked to rate how strongly they either agree or disagree that the Albuquerque Police Department (APD) is **respectful in its treatment of citizens** using a 5-point scale where 5 is *strongly agree* and 1 is *strongly disagree*.

Approximately half (48%) of residents agree APD is respectful in its treatment of citizens as indicated be a score of 4 or 5 (25% *strongly agree*). However, 17% disagree (a score of 1 or 2), while 31% have neutral or mixed feelings.


Overall, these results are similar to those observed in the 2018 survey, though lower than ratings observed in 2015 and 2016 when public opinion of the Albuquerque Police Department was at a high point.



When asked how much trust they have in the police officers in Albuquerque, 37% of City residents say they have a *great deal of trust*, while 45% say they have *some trust* and 16% say they have *hardly any trust* in Albuquerque police officers.

It is interesting to note that residents age 50 and over (50%) are much more likely than those between the ages of 18 and 49 to say they have a *great deal of trust* in Albuquerque police officers.

Overall, residents currently place slightly less trust in Albuquerque police officers than was observed in 2018 when 42% said they had *a great deal* of trust and 47% had *some trust*, while just 10% said they had *hardly any trust* in APD officers.



The mean score is derived by taking the average score based on the 5-point scale. The <u>Excellent</u> response is assigned a value of 5; the <u>Very Poor</u> response is assigned a value of 1. The <u>Don't Know/Won't Say</u> responses are excluded from the calculation of the mean.

Residents were informed that APD is working with the U.S. Department of Justice to implement new policies and reforms designed to reduce the use of force and encourage policing that ensures residents' constitutional rights. City residents were then asked to rate how well of a job they believe APD is doing making these changes using a 5-point scale where a score of 5 is *excellent* and a score of 1 is *very poor*.

As shown above, 48% of City residents say APD is doing well (a score of 4 or 5) implementing new policies and reforms, with 14% who say APD is doing an *excellent* job. Twenty-nine percent of residents have a neutral opinion, and 16% say APD is doing a poor job (a score of 1 or 2).

Overall, the 48% of residents who give APD positive reviews for implementing the new policies and reforms is an increase when compared to previous studies, rising from 44% in 2018 and 40% in 2019.

Residents were asked if they feel different types of crimes in Albuquerque are *going up*, *going down*, or *not changing*. As shown above, 66% of residents believe **violent crimes** are *going up*, while just 10% say violent crimes are *going down* in Albuquerque and 21% feel it *is not changing*.

Approximately three-fifths (61%) also believe that **crimes involving guns** are *going up*, compared to 12% who feel crimes involving guns are *going down* and 23% say it is *not changing*.


The majority of residents (56%) believe **auto thefts** are going up, while 17% say auto thefts are going down and 24% feel this is not changing.

Just over half (53%) of the residents surveyed believe **crimes against children** are *going up* compared to 9% who feel these are *going down* and 25% who feel this is *not changing*. Women (61%) are more likely than men (45%) to believe crimes against children are *going up*.

Finally, approximately half of residents surveyed (49%) feel **home burglaries** are *going up* in Albuquerque, compared to 22% who say home burglaries are *going down* and 24% say this is *not changing*. Women (56%) are more likely than men (43%) to believe home burglaries are *going up*.

Overall, there has been little change in how residents perceive the different types of crimes when compared to the 2019 community survey, even though the official crime data shows that rates for most crimes have actually gone down in the past year.



Residents were asked to rate how well the City of Albuquerque is addressing the issue of homelessness using a 5-point scale where 5 is *excellent* and 1 is *very poor*.

As shown above, 29% of residents give the City positive marks for addressing the homelessness issue (as indicated by a score of 4 or 5). Over one-third (36%) feel the City is doing a poor job of addressing homelessness as indicated by a score of 1 or 2, while 34% give the City a middle rating of 3.

These results are a big improvement when compared to the 2019 survey when just 13% gave the City positive marks for addressing the issue of homelessness and 59% gave poor ratings.



When asked how Albuquerque is doing addressing the issue of homelessness compared to other big cities in the country, 19% of residents say Albuquerque is doing a *better job*, while 53% feel Albuquerque is doing *about the same* and 18% believe Albuquerque is doing *a worse job* addressing homelessness.



Residents were read a list of different City policies and programs being implemented to address the issue of homelessness in Albuquerque and asked if they have heard or read anything about each initiative.

As shown above, two-thirds of residents say they have heard or read about **the opening of new homeless shelters in the City** and half the residents surveyed have heard or read something about **providing housing to families through the One Albuquerque Housing Fund**.


Approximately half of residents have heard or read about the **City keeping the Westside emergency center open 24 hours a day, every day of the year** (49%) and **offering City services and housing to those living in homeless camps** (47%).

Just 26% of residents say they have heard or read about the City **providing a mobile showering unit for homeless residents**.



Residents were informed the City of Albuquerque has proposed the creation of a new department called the Community Safety Department and once fully staffed, the Department will send trained professionals with police to non-violent calls relating to public intoxication, drug use, homelessness, and mental health issues. Residents were then asked if they have heard or read anything about the Community Safety Department prior to being surveyed.

Overall, approximately two-fifths (41%) of the survey respondents say they had heard or read something about the Community Safety Department, though the majority (59%) have not.



Residents were also informed that with the Community Safety Department responding to such issues as abandoned cars, discarded needles, addiction, non-violent mental health issues, and similar situations, police officers will be able to spend more time dealing with violent and other serious crimes. After being given this information, residents were asked if they feel the creation of the Community Safety Department is a good idea or a bad idea.


Three-in-four residents feel the creation of the Community Safety Department is a *good idea*, compared to just 17% who feel it is a *bad idea* and 7% who say it *depends*.

When City residents were asked in an unaided manner, what types of recreational, cultural, performing arts, or sports related attractions or amenities they feel are needed in Albuquerque, 15% mention a **performing arts center**, 13% mention **more activities for youth and teens**, while 12% say a **professional sports team** is needed, 9% mention **live music venues** and 8% mention **sports fields for recreational use**.


Over one-in-three residents (36%) say there is either nothing in particular that is needed or did not offer a response.



Residents were informed that Albuquerque has a professional soccer team called New Mexico United and the team is temporarily playing its games at the Isotopes baseball park. Residents were then asked if they support or oppose building a <u>new multipurpose arena</u> that could be used for New Mexico United soccer games and other events in addition to soccer games.

As shown above, the large majority (63%) of residents say they *support* building a new multi-purpose arena that could be used for New Mexico United soccer games and other events, compared to 23% who are *opposed*.

Support for the multipurpose arena is strongest among men, residents under the age of 65, and Hispanic residents.



Residents were asked how many days, if any, they exercise for 30 minutes or more in a typical week. Twenty percent of residents say they typically exercise either six days (6%) or seven days (14%) a week, while 17% say they exercise five days a week.

Thirty percent of resident say they exercise either four days (12%) or three days (18%) a week, while 9% say they exercise two days and 5% exercise one day a week.

Sixteen percent of residents say they do not exercise in a typical week and 4% did not offer a response.

On average, residents exercise for at least 30 minutes 3.5 days in a typical week.
