# What Number Should I Call?

Which number you dial is important. 911 is for situations with immediate risk, such as a shooting. 242-COPS is for situations with no immediate risk, but where law enforcement is needed, including minor traffic crashes. 311 to report non-emergencies, like graffiti, or to ask general questions.

Actions we are taking to make Albuquerque safer:

- Historic investments in APD, including increased cadet pay, raises for officers, retention incentives, and modern technology to help officers fight crime.
- Expanding Automated Speed Enforcement to reduce reckless speeding.
- Operating Albuquerque Community Safety 24/7 to reduce APD and AFR's call volumes and connect people to the help they need.
- The Gateway Center is serving 300 people a day, more services coming online to serve 1,000 people a day.
- Added 500 new streetlights across Albuquerque.
- Connected network of 15,000 cameras to the Real Time Crime Center.
