Why Study Parking Downtown?

It has been almost a decade since the City holistically studied parking Downtown.


Multiple parking lots have redeveloped and the City has reconfigured several streets since the latest parking study in 2016.

The **Covid-19 pandemic** shuttered cities across the globe and changed how Downtowns operate, but Albuquerque is **bouncing back**.

The *Downtown 2050* plan calls for a **unified and agile parking strategy**, and envisions a district where people **park once** and walk between destinations.

Not Everyone Parks A Car

or drives for every trip. **On-street parking** typically makes streets **more comfortable** for people walking, but off-street parking **lots and garages** increase the time it takes to walk between destinations and can create an **unappealing environment** for pedestrians.

What We've Heard


Parking Downtown is not especially difficult, but it's a mixed bag.

Only 15% of survey respondents say parking is difficult when asked about Downtown in general.


People find it harder to park at events like the Growers Market.

Winter 2024 Survey




How easy or difficult is it to find parking at the Growers Market?



What We've Found

Parking Supply

Downtown has parking capacity for over **21,000** cars, and parking lots make up **32%** of real estate.

- On-Street Parking: 2,700 spaces
- Parking Lots: 9,100 spaces
- Parking Structures: 9,700 spaces




On-Street Parking

On-street parking is in high demand.


On-street parking accounts for only an eighth of Downtown's parking, but almost half of survey respondents say they typically park on the street.

Central Ave & Copper Ave/10th St Saturday, 8 AM August 2025



Surface Parking Lots

Many parking lots have spaces available, even at the busiest times.

Weekdays at 2 PM is the peak hour for parking. Not all lots are full.

Parking at the Growers Market

The City implemented a **pilot project** to help people find parking near the Growers Market.

The City's Parking Division opened the Library Lot at Tijeras Ave and 6th St for hourly public parking on weekends to provide more options.

The City's Metropolitan Development Agency installed **wayfinding signs** directing drivers to City parking facilities, as well as signs pointing pedestrians to the Growers Market.





The Parking Study will recommend more ideas for quick wins.




