Dear Secretary Buttigieg:

Bernalillo County is requesting RAISE funding to reconstruct Bridge Boulevard Phase 3. The project includes protected bike lanes, ADA-compliant sidewalks, enhanced transit stops, raised landscaped medians, pedestrian lighting, adaptive signals, intersection improvements to address air quality, safety and mobility for all users, and roadway preservation. Bridge Boulevard improvements are identified in the Bridge Boulevard Corridor Redevelopment Plan which also calls for revitalization through land use changes and community-based economic development.

The corridor connects historically disadvantaged communities on both sides of the Rio Grande. It accesses nearby recreational and cultural trails and amenities such as the Biopark, Tingley Beach, National Hispanic Cultural Center, Railyards, Downtown, and Old Town Museums.

As the Committee that advises the City on the needs of people who walk, bike, use mobility devices, use other people-powered transportation options, and use public transit in our community, we are happy to support Bernalillo County's efforts to revitalize the Bridge Boulevard corridor with safe, multimodal transportation options for the South Valley.

Re: Street Planning for 4th Street between Menaul and Candelaria

The Greater Albuquerque Active Transportation Committee (GAATC) advises the City on the promotion of equitable, safe, and accessible active transportation for Albuquerque. The City of Albuquerque has made notable progress in this area, including the creation of an extensive system of pedestrian and cycling trails including hundreds of miles of bikeways, bike paths, walking trails, bike lanes, and bike boulevards.

However, as the largest city in a state with the highest per-capita pedestrian fatality rate in the United States for the past 7 years [1], remaining focused on safety is critical. This horrifying statistic is just the tip of the iceberg: much of our city remains unsafe and thus underutilized by pedestrians and cyclists. When citizens can clearly see, or worse, personally experience the dangers of walking, using the sidewalks or cycling in Albuquerque, it leads to underutilization of our active transportation In other words, were bicycles and pedestrians using the streets in greater numbers in the city, crash statistics would be far worse.

The lack of safety on our streets has other important ramifications in terms of equity, economic development, environmental degradation, and the 'livability' of Albuquerque. For too long false beliefs and assumptions about traffic management have perpetuated the building and maintenance of streets that are too wide, too fast, and frankly, too empty. For Albuquerque to be an economically viable, desirable place to live, for businesses to flourish, and for people to be safe, the city needs to reexamine its priorities and crucially, shift its focus to prioritizing increased safety and access for pedestrians, bicycles, and other active modes of transportation in all improvements, while slowing car traffic, and reducing land allocated to parking and other vehicle infrastructure. **This focus must be applied to every new road infrastructure project.**

Troublingly, a recent proposal for striping improvements for 4th street suggests transitioning an important thoroughfare that is currently 5 lanes wide all of which are dedicated to motorized vehicles, into a street with 5 lanes...all dedicated to cars. Shifting 2 of 5 lanes to car parking does nothing to improve bikeability. Thus, although this plan may slow traffic somewhat, which is laudable, but does little to increase access. The plan's other main accomplishment, besides slowing traffic, is to increase parking. Increased parking is not a goal to which Albuquerque should aspire. Parking is not synonymous with increased economic development, in fact, it often works against it, and the area already has ample area dedicated to parking (nearly 50% of the land!). Increasing parking excludes safe passage for bicycles, decreases foot traffic (yes, those two are related), and reduces the neighborhood's economic viability and desirability.

To ensure this and future projects meet the goals of GAATC and of the citizens, we help to represent, GAATC strongly recommends revisiting and revising the 4th Street plan between Menaul and Candelaria to provide safe bike lanes for cyclists in both directions.
