## **Statewide Leadership Training & Collaborative Problem-Solving Workgroups**

The Office of Housing, the Center for Excellence in Social Work, and CNM Ingenuity are partnering to strengthen New Mexico's response to homelessness by investing in the people and organizations doing this work every day.

These statewide training and problem-solving workgroups bring nonprofit leaders together to build meaningful partnerships, share proven approaches, and co-create solutions to the complex challenges of homelessness and housing instability.

### **Topics:**

1. **Data Storytelling & Communicating the Stories of Our Communities:** A leadership session focused on using data to elevate community narratives, support informed decision-making, and strengthen communication grounded in lived experience.
2. **Mission-Driven Leadership & Advancing Initiatives Through a Community-Centered Lens:** Leaders learn strategies for advancing initiatives, strengthening mission alignment, and creating systems-level impact through community voice, data, and collaborative planning.
3. **Recruitment, Retention & Honoring Lived Experience in Creating Equitable Systems:** A session focused on equitable staffing, honoring lived experience, and building supportive organizational systems that reflect community strengths.
4. **Financial Stewardship & Supporting Providers in Diversifying Funding:** This workshop supports leaders in understanding resource development, diversified funding opportunities, and how to support nonprofit providers in sustaining community-wide missions.
5. **Critical Incident Debrief:** A hands-on session strengthening participants' ability to debrief difficult or traumatic events, reduce burnout, support emotional well-being, and build team cohesion.

### **Why This Matters**

Ending homelessness requires more than programs, it requires connected leaders, aligned strategies, and strong community partnerships. This initiative creates a collaborative space where leaders can move beyond working in silos to:

- Learning from local experts with deep knowledge of New Mexico communities
- Collaborating with peers to address real-time housing and homelessness challenges
- Sharing what's working and adapt statewide strategies
- Strengthening relationships that support coordinated, community-driven solutions

### **Who Should Participate:**

- Directors and nonprofit leaders

- Program and operations managers
- Decision-makers serving individuals experiencing homelessness or housing instability

### **Cohort Details**

- This training will be delivered virtually to accommodate leaders across the state.
- Participants will receive \$500 in stipends to attend these trainings
- Stipends will be issued upon successful completion of all five required trainings. Participants must attend all training sessions and receive a certificate of completion to be eligible for the stipend.
- Participants will engage in one expert-led training followed by an optional 1.5 hr guided Leadership Circle for peer strategizing and shared problem solving.
