With school starting this month, get your kids connected with our Public Library's free learning, tutoring and homework resources!

Did you know that our Albuquerque Bernalillo County Public Library offers a wealth of online resources for students of all ages? Whether you're just starting school, heading back as a middle schooler or high schooler, or taking classes as an adult, there's something for everyone! And all you need is a library card!

Lynda.com is a free online training service for all ages that offers computer literacy, graphic design, and much more.

Teen Zone offers homework help, research resources, online digital libraries of academic content, and tutoring and test preparation.

Brainfuse HelpNow is a resource provided through the State Library, offering students of all ages live online tutoring and homework assistance in both English and Spanish from 2pm - 11pm, and includes 24/7 access to interactive tests, academic skill assessments and standardized tests.

Cloud Library offers thousands of book downloads that you can access on a computer, a tablet or a smartphone.

NEIGHBORHOOD ASSOCIATION PROFILE

VISTA DEL MUNDO - SAFE AT HOME



In a quiet neighborhood at the base of the Sandia Mountains, a committed group of residents has effected positive changes and community events for all ages. The Vista del Mundo (VdM) Neighborhood Association, part of District 9, has actively rallied for updated playground equipment, a revitalized Open Space and walking trail, new lighting in the beautiful Embudo Hills Park (pictured below right); a Free Little Library, and best of all, the sense of togetherness and community that comes from working together to bring about change.

"Our neighborhood association formed in the late 1990s, and I'm proud to be part of the current board," said Chris Crum, pictured above second from left, with: Dennis Roach, Alicia Sandoval Gilliam, and Kent Long, who make up most of the neighborhood association board.

Vista del Mundo Neighborhood is located east of Tramway off Lomas, and has approximately 500 residences, many of whom are part of the neighborhood association and most of whom enjoy the many community events coordinated by the association board members each year at Embudo Hills Park and in other neighborhood areas.

"One of the events I love most is our annual Easter Egg Hunt," said VdM Vice-President Alicia Sandoval Gilliam. "In addition to it being a really nice community event for families in our neighborhood, it also brings everyone together and gives us that sense of togetherness that's essential in any neighborhood."

"We're grateful to our city councilor and his staff for all the outreach and assistance they provide us," said VdM President Dennis Roach. "We're an active association, yes, but our elected official is very involved with our group and we've established a great partnership."

The most recent addition to the neighborhood is the Little Free Library at Embudo Hills Park. Residents and surrounding neighborhoods are invited to take a book or leave a book, to benefit all who live in the area.

"We love our neighborhood so much, and I think all of us feel fortunate to live here," said Crum. "We're invested in safety for all, and we feel safe at home!" •





The 50-Mile Activity Loop is Albuquerque's longest multiuse trail and bikeway path, and is nearing completion! Segment 8, near Coors and Eagle Ranch, will feature shared bicycle lanes on the Paseo del Norte Frontage Road; a multi-use trail along Corrales Main Canal and Eagle Ranch; and improved signing and striping. Segment completion is anticipated in August.

The Bridge Boulevard Project in Bernalillo County extends from Coors to Riverside Drain, and is key in the Bridge Boulevard Corridor Redevelopment Plan. This project will take place in various phases., with Phase 1 Tower Road to include a buffered bike lane. Segment completion is estimated for early 2019.

Construction for the Central/ Unser Reconstruction Project runs through July 2019. The intersection will be improved with new signals, buffered bike lanes and trail improvements!

BUSINESS COALITION PARTNERSHIP IN NW AREA COMMAND

In any neighborhood, residents want to feel safe in their homes, on their streets, and in businesses. In turn, neighborhood businesses also want to provide a safe and pleasant experience for neighborhood customers.

With that in mind, the Northwest Area Command created a Business Coalition in 2017, aimed at decreasing concerns shared by several businesses along Coors Boulevard. These businesses, ranging from restaurants to retail businesses, experienced shoplifting, theft, and vandalism, and many owners wanted to proactively address thes issues.

"We were very pleased to partner with many businesses in the Coors and I-40 area, increasing

patrols, meetings between owners and our Crime Prevention staff, and putting resources in proximity to these businesses," said Lt. Scott Norris of the NW Area Command. "Businesses are an essential part of neighborhoods and their

safety is paramount."

Adam Silverman, co-owner of business property at Coors and I-40, spoke highly of the Coalition's work.

"Being in close contact with the NW Area Command and my fellow business owners has really helped address our concerns," he said. "I'd encourage other neighborhood businesses and residents to actively

reach out to their Area Command and be proactive about both personal and business safety."

"Businesses are a huge part of our

HAZARDOUS HOUSEHOLD MATERIAL DROP-OFF DAY!

Do you have unused paint, antifreeze, old cleaning supplies or other similar household items lying around or taking up space in your garage or back yard? Why not get rid of them on Saturday, August 18?

That's when the City's Solid Waste Management Department, Department of Municipal Development Engineering Division, Bernalillo County, and Advanced Chemical Transport will jointly host and sponsor a free Household Hazardous Waste Collection Event.

Residents of Albuquerque and Bernalillo County are encouraged to bring their household hazardous waste items on this drop-off day. Examples of household hazardous waste include items that can burn easily (flammable), corrode or irritate the skin (corrosive), or poison humans and animals (toxic.) Question:

With school starting now in August, how can I donate school supplies to students in need? Are there any school supply drives to which I can contribute items or money?

Answer:

The City has a school supply drive every August, and you can donate notebooks, pencils and pens at City Hall. You can also donate to the Albuquerque Public Schools Community Clothing Bank. This program serves all students enrolled in APS District and APS Chartered Schools. Items that can be donated are:

- Packages of new socks and underwear (six pairs per package, students can receive up to two packages per school year
- Shoes via vouchers for shopping at Payless Shoe store
- Clothing via voucher provided to APS for free by Goodwill Industries of NM (students get three outfits per voucher and can get up to three vouchers per school year)
- New or gently used hoodies or light jackets
- Toiletry bags and powdered laundry soap
- School supplies through individual kits and through bulk supplies given to schools
- Prom/Dance and Graduation Outfits for both boys and girls


