

Throughout the month of October and into November opportunities abound in Open Space.

Worth celebrating this fall as well is the completion of two new trails in the East Mountains Open Space properties of Golden and

Fall Volunteer Opportunities with Open Space

Ours is a city of contrasting landscapes, with vast desert scrublands giving way to the lush river forest of the Rio Grande bosque, and piñon/juniper foothills leading to the majestic Sandia Mountains. These special places help to define who we are as a city. During the month of October, join the City of Albuquerque Open Space Division and other local organizations for two special events that serve to celebrate and protect our unique landscapes.



DIA DEL RIO, October 18th

This year the Open Space Division and REI will host the 14th Annual Dia del Rio Celebration. Join us for a variety of conservation projects that nurture and protect the bosque and river, including: trail work, graffiti removal, and trash clean up. There will be activities appropriate for all ages, so bring the whole family! During the event you can also enjoy educational tables from area organizations working to protect and enhance the Rio Grande and bosque. There will be a prize drawing at the end of the event, with prizes donated by REI and other generous sponsors.

WHEN: Saturday, October 18 from 8:30 AM - 1:00 PM. Arrive early for sign in and snacks provided by La Montanita Co-op and our other generous sponsors!

WHERE: Rio Bravo Riverside Picnic Area. Take Rio Bravo Blvd. west from Broadway. Before the bridge turn right onto Poco Loco Rd. and follow it directly west into the parking area.

BRING: Gloves, sun protection, and plenty of water.

REGISTER: Pre-registration is recommended. Stop by REI at 1550 Mercantile Ave NE or call 247-1191. *The first 80 people to pre-register will receive a free t-shirt the day of the event, courtesy of REI!*

Have a raft or canoe? Boaters are also encouraged participate and help clean trash from the river. (Boaters must follow New Mexico State Parks boating regulations. Call 1-888-NMPARKS for more information.)

MAKE A DIFFERENCE DAY, October 25th

Make a Difference Day is a **national day of community service** held annually at the end of October. Each year, volunteers throughout Albuquerque work to help improve the quality of life in our community through service projects. The Open Space Division and our partner organization the Nicodemus Wilderness Project participate in Make a Difference Day by organizing a variety of conservation activities that take place at the **Piedra Lisa Open Space** located at the end of Candelaria. Projects include trail maintenance, trail building, trash cleanup, graffiti removal, etc.

This day of spirited volunteerism is an enjoyable event for the whole family. Join us at **8:30 am** at the parking area east of Tramway on Camino de la Sierra, just south of the east end of Candelaria. Projects wrap up around 12:30pm.

The Nicodemus Wilderness Project is a worldwide organization based in Albuquerque and the adopters of the Piedra Lisa Open Space. Their mission is "to protect wildlife and our environment and to build future conservation leaders by engaging youth in environmental stewardship projects worldwide". Los Duendes at Work in the East Mountains Trail building Updates at Gutierrez Canyon and Golden Open Space

The mysterious and industrious Open Space trail crew known as *Los Duendes* has recently achieved two important milestones on the East Mountain Open Space properties of Golden and Gutierrez Canyon.

The first achievement is at the 1,180 acre Golden Open Space, which is located off of La Madera Road, approximately 10 miles off of New Mexico Highway 14. After years of planning and two seasons of trail construction the Open Space Division is proud to announce the opening of a 2.25 mile trail loop on a mesa top over looking the vast and colorful dissected arroyo complex leading to the San Pedro Creek. This is the first phase of a planned 8 to 10 mile trail system on the Golden Open Space.

The new trail was built by volunteers from San Pedro Creek Estates, Puertocito residents, and several mountain biking groups, including the Trail Partners, FooMTB, the WOMBATS and BOMB with supervision from Open Space staff.

The second achievement is at the 300 acre Gutierrez Canyon Open Space, which was recently expanded by the addition of the 420 acre John A. Milne property to create a Major Public Open Space area totaling 720 acres, spanning from New Mexico Highway 14 in Cedar Crest, east to Gutierrez Canyon Road. The original 300 acres are characterized by steep sided sandstone canyons with ephemeral streams and scenic overlooks. The geologic feature known as the Tijeras Syncline forms a steep ridge paralleling Gutierrez Canyon Road, near the eastern boundary of the property.

For years the residents on the east side of Gutierrez Canyon Road lived a stones throw from the Open Space, but were separated from it by the formidable looking ridge of the Tijeras Syncline. Open Space is now happy to announce a new access trail leading up and over the syncline and providing residents with a sustainable trail to access the property.

This trail was the product of four Eagle Scout projects over the course of two years. Eagle Scout is the highest rank in the Boy Scouts of America and to obtain this rank a scout must complete a project which demonstrates planning and leadership skills. The Division would like to thank Eagle Scouts Zach Bowles, Zach Kavelman, Lucas Walker and Josh Crowley for their hard work and contribution to Open Space.

Los Duendes or not, these accomplishments could not have been possible without the help of hardworking volunteers. Thanks to all those who picked up a Pulaski, Mattock or McLeod and helped make our trails possible!

Highlights of the 2008 Open Space Summer Series

With the earlier appearance of darkness and cooler conditions I'm both elated and a bit saddened by the end of the 2008 Open Space Summer Series which is the first one that I've put together completely.

In some ways the real test of success is in attendance and the true measure of it comes in averages of people per event. In 2007 we had an average of 43 people enjoying each of the Saturday Sunset Series and 12 to 13 for the Sunday Hikes. The averages for this year are 53 **folks** at each Saturday Series and an amazing increase to 24 people at each Sunday Hike. I attribute the increase on Sundays to opening the hikes to all areas of Open Space instead of having them occur strictly from the Elena Gallegos, not to mention the great press we've received from the Westsider section of the Journal

All in all, I'm calling this year a success although we didn't have consistent enough youth involvement at the Sunday Hikes to take advantage of the Nicodemus Wilderness Project's Apprentice Ecolo-



gist Initiative. This important initiative promotes stewardship and an awareness of the environment through conservation and/or educational projects. Young people then write about their experiences with the project and have the chance to win a \$500 scholarship. Next year during the Summer Series we would like to choose hikes and events that appeal more to families and youth, and to actively promote the Apprentice Ecologist Initiative opportunity.

That sets some goals and the stage for next year's venue. To give you a taste of what's in store for you with the 2009 Summer Series there's the potential to hear an accordionist, see an African dance troupe, see and learn about Bonsai Trees, turtles and tortoises, bird rehabilitation, huge snakes, Tai Chi, geology, hike some outlying Open Space properties, and much more!

I've also been thinking about Flamenco dancers, jugglers, and storytellers, but also want to know what *you'd* like to see! Please send me your ideas for things that might interest you. I can be reached at 452-5222 or <u>wpentler@cabq.gov</u>.

This is Open Space Full of grace, pretty like lace... Dog poop? A disgrace! Brain plasticity Reconnect neurons and joy Visit Open Space



PIEDRAS MARCADAS PUEBLO TOURS DURING BALLOON FIESTA WEEKEND



The Piedras Marcadas Pueblo Village is a unique part of the Petroglyph National Monument. Piedras Marcadas, Spanish for "Marked Rock" is an ancestral pueblo that was occupied between AD 1300 and the mid-1500's. It was comprised of three multi-storied structures and over 1,000 rooms, making it the largest remaining unexcavated pueblo in the middle Rio Grande Valley. The site is currently closed to the public. However, the Open Space Division will offer special tours of the site during the week of Balloon Fiesta, October 4th through the 12th.

In 1988, the City of Albuquerque purchased the property, protecting it from proposed development. Open Space Superintendent and Archeologist Dr. Matt Schmader will interpret the site and take you on a tour of this once thriving and important community. Bring water and dress appropriately for a short hike.
