A Message from Mayor Richard J. Berry



As summer approaches we look forward to a prosperous monsoon season. The year started with several storms with the help of the El Niño cycle. Wildflowers have been in bloom, insects and reptiles are on the move, and larger mammals can be seen as you hike and explore our wonderful Open Space lands.

However, spring has been dry and we are currently over an inch below average for rainfall. The much needed summer rains will bring life-sustaining water to our natural landscapes. The plants and animals are not the only resources that need water; our Open Space trails also benefit. As Open Space

Division staff conduct trail-building sessions nearly every Saturday during the Spring, Summer, and Fall, the need for water to help “harden” the newly built soft trail-tread is essential.

However, rainfall can also be detrimental to our trail system. Trails that have unofficially formed (called social or user trails) tend to erode when the heavy rains come. Our official trails are designed very carefully and sustainably by Open Space Division staff. These trails are built so rain water will flow across instead of down the trail. Next time you are in the foothills or an East Mountain Open Space, see if you can tell which trails are social trails and which have been designed and built to be sustainable.

As always, I encourage you to go explore the nearly 29,000 acres of Open Space land the City has to offer this summer. The Open Space Division has plenty of fun and exciting possibilities this summer whether it is at the Open Space Visitor Center or volunteering on a trail building session in the East Mountains.

And don't forget that the 2010 Summer Series has begun. Join us for free music, dance, storytelling, or even a fun Sunday hike this summer. Bring the whole family and enjoy your public Open Space. (See pages 4 and 5 for more details.) Please remember to respect Open Space lands as they are fragile ecosystems, so what ever you pack in, pack out!

"Off the Top of My Head" For Me, The Bosque Is Special

Before my wife Sabina and I moved to Albuquerque last September, our son Chris, a long-time Albuquerque resident, had told us that the *Bosque* (Spanish for forest)—that long stretch of cottonwoods along both sides of the Rio Grande just east of our community—was the largest cottonwood grove in either North American or the world and a very cool place. I lobbied my wife Sabina for us to buy a house near the Bosque so that I would have a nice, nearby place to run with my dog Tess, a rescued Samoyed sled-dog type of dog.

From my very first thrice-weekly runs with Tess into the Bosque I knew that my son was right about it being a very cool place. I experience a peaceful, relaxed feeling whenever I'm running on the Bosque trails. That almost all the trees are huge cottonwoods had something to do with my feelings, as it was a cottonwood that fell on my head and almost killed me in my front yard in Boulder, Colorado almost three years ago. I soon became an Open Space Trail Watch Volunteer. In that role, I report the number of hikers, runners, and bicyclists I observe during each of my outings, as well as a log of wildlife I observe.

For me, and for many people I meet on its trails, the Bosque is also a special place because of the many species of animals that you see there, especially the birds, like the blue herons, mallards, guinea fowl, black phoebes, and goldfinches are just a few of the many types of birds you will see in the Bosque and not in our neighborhood. It's also special because of the art installations that the Open Space Visitors Center has installed in the Bosque south of the facility for the LAND/Art program. See www.cabq.gov/openspace for details about the Center, which offers many programs and nature hikes for the public.

Finally, I would like to mention a place on a secondary north-south trail at a place equal to the 5 ½ mile marker. It's a stump that is something of a *descanso*, which refers to the embellished roadside crosses—shrines, in effect—erected where people have been killed in traffic accidents. This one is a gathering point for hiking and running dog-lovers who share a love of that part of the Bosque and who leave mementos, notes, and money at the stump that one of the group regularly matches and donates to the Humane Society. I have met most of my new Albuquerque friends there.

Duendes (and Volunteers) in Action!



Starting with Spring Cleanup in the Foothills, then moving to National River Cleanup Day and culminating with National Trails Day, with just enough time from one project to plan for another, April, May and June are one of the busiest times of the year for Open Space staff and volunteers.

This year's **Spring Cleanup in the Foothills** was the best attended series of cleanups since we began this event back in 2002. Each Saturday event was attended by over 80 volunteers. Work included trail maintenance, new trail construction, restoration of unauthorized trails, graffiti removal, trash cleanup and cleanup of dog waste. This year's Spring Cleanups set a new record for the amount

of dog waste removed; **1.5 tons!** It should be noted to dog walkers that dog waste is a major problem throughout our city. Dog waste can carry diseases, dog waste washes into the river where we are now getting our drinking water, dog waste is slow to decompose and dog waste stinks!

National River Cleanup Day was another well attended event, with 168 volunteers helping out. The good snow pack in the mountains meant a full river for volunteers on rafts, canoes and kayaks who spent time cleaning trash from islands and the river banks as they floated down to Central. Special thanks go out to Adobe White Water Rafting, Kirtland Air Force Outdoor Recreation and Quiet Waters Paddling Adventures of Bernalillo for supplying rafts, river guides, canoes and kayaks for volunteers. Thanks also to the City of Rio Rancho Parks and Recreation Department, Keep Rio Rancho Beautiful, the Bosque Meadows Homeowner's Association, the West Central Alliance of Neighbors (WeCAN), and the National Hispanic Cultural Center Volunteer Program for organizing cleanups at different points along the river.

National Trails Day was also well attended and in spite of 100 degree temperatures 155 volunteers came out to work on 16 different projects ranging from new trail construction near I-40 to trail maintenance north of the Elena Gallegos. Once again our partners from the Sandia Ranger District of Cibola National Forest also took part in the event and we received generous support from the Open Space Alliance and the Friends of the Sandia Mountains.

We would like to thank all of our sponsors, adoption groups, food preparers, volunteer crew leaders and of course the volunteers who make these events fun and successful. We hope to see you again next year if not sooner. A special thanks goes out to volunteers Renée J. THE OPEN SPACE VISITOR CENTER PRESENTS: Interwoven Traditions: New Mexico and Bauhaus

An exhibition of textile artistry, influenced by the impressive legacy of the Bauhaus school of Germany and relying heavily on the images of the American Southwest, will be presented July 3-Aug. 25 at Albuquerque's Open Space Gallery. It will be one of two exhibitions prepared by New Mexico tapestry artist James Koehler and his students, Cornelia Theimer Gardella and Rebecca Mezoff, as a culmination of three years of study on how the principles that emerged from Bauhaus in the early 20th Century have had a lasting influence on art in Europe and America. Mezoff is also a New Mexican, and Theimer Gardella divides her time between New Mexico and her native Germany.

The Open Space Gallery exhibition will be displayed through August 25. It will share an opening event July 24 (4-8 p.m.) with the biennial conference of the Handweaver's Guild of America. During that conference, Koehler will teach classes about Bauhaus technique and ideas. A second exhibition will be at the church Michaeliskirche in Erfurt, Germany, from its opening night event Sept. 5 to Oct. 30.

The life of the Bauhaus school (1919-1933) encompassed three different directors, three cities, and a changing swath of ideas and intellectual terrain. The school's commitment to abstraction as a language of modernism, the way it challenged how traditional academics were taught, and its process of creating objects left a legacy that continues to influence art today. Koehler, Mezoff and Theimer Gardella have been working on tapestries in the exhibition for the past three years. Their project has focused on studying selected writings by Bauhaus artists, exploring Bauhaus design theories, and looking at the contribution of Bauhaus aesthetics to contemporary tapestry weaving. Although their studies dealt with the theoretical aspects of Bauhaus design, the pieces to be shown in the exhibitions are practical, individually created translations of those studies.



Open Space Visitor Center Perennial Marsh

Many, many years ago before you were born, the Rio Grande was a wild river untamed by human interference. The big river meandered and braided across its flood plain changing course, sometimes dramatically, from year to year. This movement of the river partnered with a high water table provided conditions suitable for a variety of wetlands including marshes, wet meadows, and seasonal ponds. These wetlands provided a unique habitat for a wide range of plants and wildlife.

However, the unpredictability and raw power of the river had a devastating impact on the growing town of Albuquerque and its residents. Spring flooding ruined agricultural land, infrastructure, homes and livelihoods. In the early 20th century an effort to control the river began and continued through the early 1970's.

Now, drainage and diversion channels, levees, jetty jacks, and dams work together to prevent the river from breaching its banks – and they are very effective. Some would say effective to a fault. Without seasonal flooding, river channel meander and a high water table, over 85% of Middle Rio Grande wetlands have been lost, limiting habitat for riparian species.

The Bosque Biological Management Plan guides restoration and protection of the bosque and recommends protection, enhancement and creation of wetlands throughout the Middle Rio Grande riparian zone. Over the past 10 years, Open Space has built and managed three wetlands that have contributed to the expansion of riparian habitat in the Rio Grande corridor.

Today, we are pleased to announce the addition of a fourth wetland: the Open Space Visitor Center Perennial Marsh. The Marsh has transformed a struggling 1.5 acre agricultural field into a shallow wetland. Fed by irrigation waters March through October, marsh waters will recede over winter to create a mud flat or moist soils area. Animals living in the marsh are accustomed to this cycle and will hibernate in the mud until the water returns in spring.

Already, the Marsh supports soft shell turtles, killdeer, mallards, woodhouse toad tadpoles, red shiners, dragonflies, and a variety of riparian plants. One great blue heron has been spotted in the marsh and several egrets contrasting against the verdant landscape. It is a cheerful welcome to the Open Space Visitor Center. Be sure to visit soon and watch this habitat flourish. Don't forget your binoculars!

The Open Space Visitor Center Perennial Marsh would not have been possible without the initiative of dedicated Open Space staff and the fine work accomplished by the Open Space Maintenance crew.

PLEIN AIR WORKSHOP SERIES


Plein Air Painters of New Mexico (PAPNM) will offer two one day workshops in conjunction with the Open Space exhibits "**A View with Room**" and "**Little Gems**." The workshops and "paint alongs"/critiques act as fundraisers for Open Space Alliance.

Both workshops will take place on Saturday, October 23 from 9 am until 4 pm with a break for lunch. On Sunday, both instructors will conduct a "paint along" at Elena Gallegos Open Space in the morning. Enrollees may either paint along with them or they may watch the artists paint. In the afternoon, the artists will conduct a critique together of the paintings the enrollees executed in the morning. Paintings done at other times are not eligible for the critique. People may register for both days or for only one day, either the workshop or the paint along.
