Director Barbara Taylor Set To Retire

The Director of the Parks and Recreation Department, Barbara Taylor, is set to retire at the beginning of the year. During her time with the City of Albuquerque, Director Taylor's leadership and support of the Open Space Division led to the planning and completion of numerous projects.

One of the most important accomplishments during her tenure as Director was the design and development of the *bosque* ADA trail, the Rio del Norte Trail. This crusher fine trail runs from the overlook deck at Tingley Beach to Montañito Road, and provides people of all abilities opportunity to better enjoy the *bosque* and Rio Grande.

Director Taylor has also worked with the community and the City Council to set aside current and future funding to protect the Petroglyph National Monument. The goal is to acquire over sixty acres of land for

preservation as Open Space in the La Cuentista area, north of the current monument boundary. Along with former Mayor Berry, Director Taylor has served as an advocate for developing future environmental stewards of the land and resources in Albuquerque.

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For the past three years, special funding has been acquired to operate the Bosque Youth Corps. During the summer of 2017, the Bosque Youth Corps planted native trees, grasses and shrubs, pruned and trimmed over two miles of *bosque* trails, and participated in a variety of environmental education opportunities.

Barbara Taylor's dedication to the protection of our public lands will have a lasting impact for future generations in the Albuquerque area.

Fall 2017 “Bike Hikes”

When I became an Open Space volunteer in 2009, I came to treasure our monthly volunteer hikes led by staff or senior volunteers to different locations in our vast Open Space system. I learned much about each site we visited, gaining an appreciation for the unique qualities of each. But while these hikes were, naturally, on foot,

hikes” during October, they were enthusiastic. So I planned three hikes, for which I was joined by two other volunteers, Kenneth Hansson and Nadine Guillén. For the first bike hike on October 6th, we set out from Pueblo Montañó OS, crossing the river to the Aldo Leopold Trail with its many markers documenting the life and

I have since completed the majority of my Trail Watch duties by bike. While I bike all over the city, riding the nearly 16-mile long Paseo del Bosque Trail has been an especially fine way to travel between numerous OS locations beside the Rio Grande quickly and easily. But a little more than a year ago, the city greatly expanded its network of unpaved trails that go deep into the *bosque*. I found that these wide trails, designed to create greater accessibility, are perfect for bikes - road bikes as well as mountain bikes. And I was so enchanted by the experience of riding on them that I wanted to share it with other volunteers.

When I approached Kent Swanson and Dionne Epps with the idea of a series of volunteer “bike

accomplishments of this pioneer of conservation. We continued on to the section of the trail across from the Rio Grande Nature Center, which includes several informational signs detailing the history of the river and the *bosque*. Our third bike hike on October 26th was also in the *bosque*. We met at the plaza where Campbell Street accesses the Paseo del Bosque Trail and rode our bikes south, meandering through the woods, through meadows, along the river, until we reached the picnic area beside the Botanic Garden at Central. For this ride, the fall foliage was at its peak.

I designed these two bike hikes in the *bosque* to be moderately easy ones; but in between, I planned a more challenging one: on October 13th, we tackled the Paseo de la Mesa Trail, which requires a fair amount of uphill biking. This area on the West Mesa is not as frequently visited as other OS sites; but it affords such spectacular views across to the Sandias, to the volcanoes off to the South, and to the city below that it’s well worth the effort.

I greatly enjoyed leading these rides; and if other volunteers are interested in participating, I’d be happy to plan some more bike hikes in the spring.



News From the Far Side (of Open Space): A Golden Moment

For those of you who don't venture too far from the city limits, you may not know that there are 3,400 acres of Open Space on the east side of the mountains that are strung out along Highways 14 and 337. The Golden Open Space is the northern most and exudes a raw beauty of mesas and canyons, with multi-colored rock formations, and dotted with twisted and stunted junipers. It is a landscape shaped by faults, uplifts, sedimentary deposits and erosion. It is a land of sweeping vistas that take in the Sandia Mountains, the San Pedro Mountains, the Ortiz Mountains, the Jemez Mountains and the Sangre de Cristo Mountains. When the rains come, the mesas are blanketed in a variety of wildflowers that include snake weed, Blackfoot daisy, wild four o'clock, verbena, arnica, gay feather, and spiderwort, to

name a few. The Golden Open Space is also rich in human history. A history that includes ancestral pueblo peoples, Spanish and Mexican land grants, territorial era mining and ranching, and even the remains of a railroad built in the 1920s. All of this natural and cultural history makes the Golden Open Space a unique area and worth the drive.

An Update on the Golden Trail System

This season, volunteers and Duendes worked alongside Open Space staff to build 1.1 miles of a 1.7-mile trail that will be the last link in the Golden trail system. This trail will take visitors from the South Mesa down to the San Pedro Creek. The remaining .6 mile of trail is expected to be completed during the summer of 2018. When completed there will be approximately ten miles of trail, and a round trip on all the trails would be approximately fifteen miles!

If you plan on visiting the Golden Open Space for the first time, be prepared for rugged terrain and steep rocky sections. It can be a long hike or ride so be prepared and follow these helpful tips:

- Tell someone where you plan to hike or ride
- Bring a cell phone, but service can be spotty
- Print a map from the Open Space website
- Bring plenty of water
- Dress appropriately for changing weather
- Check the weather report before you start
- Use caution during the monsoon season; once you are in the canyons you can't see storms approaching.

Remember to stay on designated trails, and remember that archaeological sites are protected, so please do not remove any artifacts! Otherwise you will have to answer to the Duendes.

Reserving Open Space Properties

As 2017 draws to an end, the requests to reserve picnic areas at the Elena Gallegos and Carolino Canyon are just ramping up. The Open Space Division begins taking requests on November 1st for the following calendar year. In 2017, Open Space staff opened over 200 envelopes and answered hundreds of calls from people eager to reserve these locations. What are these areas and why are they so popular? What is the process?

The Elena Gallegos park is host to thousands of visitors per year. There are two reservation areas, Kiwanis and Double Shelter. Whether it is a family reunion, a wedding, or a company picnic, the Open Space Foothills provide a beautiful and unique setting for the gathering. One family has been celebrating joint birthdays in their family for 34 years, and a local organization brings participants from all over the world to an icebreaker before an intensive course. These visitors' first impressions of the City of Albuquerque is the Elena Gallegos park with its stunning views, multiple trails, and botanical diversity. Parking fees may be paid by the visit or with an annual pass that can be purchased for \$26.40; annual passes are also accepted at Boca Negra Canyon. If you were good this year, you may even have received an annual pass in your stocking.

Carolino Canyon is a remote, wooded picnic area located in the East Mountains on Highway 337. Amenities include two picnic shelters, grills, restrooms, electricity, water, shaded tables, and a playing field which can be used for volleyball, tetherball, and horseshoes. Carolino Canyon is available for reservations May-September. It is ideal for large gatherings of up to 250 people, and is the only Open Space property where camping is permitted.
