

## Celebrating the City Open Space Division's Outstanding Volunteers A Message from Mayor Richard J. Berry

Greetings to all and I hope everyone had a wonderful Christmas and New Year. This year Albuquerque's Open Space Division has lots to celebrate. Albuquerque not only has more parkland per capita than any other city in the United States, we also have some of the greatest volunteers dedicated to preserving and protecting it.

Each year, on the first Saturday in June, thousands upon thousands of Americans gather all over the country to celebrate National Trails Day and increase the awareness of the trails in their communities. These celebrations take many forms - organized hikes, photography workshops, children's activities, and so on. Many groups gather volunteers for a day of service as a way to give back to the trails that keep us healthy, provide an escape, and connect our communities.

It is in this area of service that Albuquerque residents really shine. This past year, 157,000 people participated in 2,176 Trails Day activities across the United States, Puerto Rico, and Canada. Of those projects, 414 of them were focused specifically on trail stewardship, including the event organized by the City of Albuquerque's Open Space Division and the US Forest Service. In Albuquerque, nearly 200 volunteers gave up



a part of their weekend to work hard maintaining our world-class trails. This impressive turnout was one of the largest anywhere! Consistently, Albuquerque residents volunteer in numbers over three times the national average for National Trails Day. In fact, turnout has become so great that the Open Space Division has had to put a cap on the number of attendees for the past few years.

This outpouring of support confirms what we all already know to be true - we love our open spaces, and are willing to pitch in to help them out. The City of Albuquerque fosters stewardship of our land and our city in many ways, and it is satisfying to see the public respond in numbers such as these. Keep up the good work, Albuquerque!

# Bosque Reforestation Opportunities Available Sign up your School or Organization Today!

It's Pole Planting time again. Pole planting is when we take long straight branches or "poles" from cotton-wood and willow trees and "plant" them into the ground. In the midst of a drought, finding an area where we can reach the water table or moist wet soil without having to dig beyond our means is a bit tricky but



we have a few areas in mind and things are gearing up to be a fine season. The plantings occur during the winter months (January through March) as the trees are dormant or sleeping. We can harvest and work with them at this time without doing any damage or harm, such as putting the trees into shock. This creates a very short window of opportunity to do this type of project so please don't hesitate to contact Bill Pentler, 452-5222 or wpentler@cabq.gov if you are interested.

To add to the rush, we have limited funds from an REI grant to provide a single bus for service projects for a class, grade, or school. **NOTICE:** The Visitor Center will be closed starting March 4th through April 12th for improvements to the main entrance road. ## Birding in the Bosque, Part 1 in a Series

Visitors to the City's Major Public Open Spaces are treated to the arrival of thousands of the locally cel-

ebrated Sandhill Cranes on their annual migration south. During the day, cranes, which are thought to be the oldest known bird species on Earth, find food in open fields. At night, they roost on Rio Grande sandbars. They can be seen in the North Valley at the Open Space Visitor Center, at Los Poblanos Fields Open Space, and as well as in the bosque (the forest along the Rio Grande).

In addition to thousands of cranes, Albuquerque open spaces are teeming with the sights and sounds of many other species of migrating birds at this time of year, including gaggles of Canada Geese, *hosts* of sparrows, *sords* of mallards, and



murders of crows. The bosque is full of singing birds every morning, and it's fair to say that the lives of many birders in the city are enhanced by these immigrants. We recently caught up with three Albuquerque bird-watchers – all Open Space Trail Watch volunteers - to learn more about what they follow and the benefits they feel that they derive from watching the birds.

### The Magic of Cooper's Hawks

**G.P:** Please tell us about you and birds.

Maurice Mackey: "Being an Open Space Trail Watch Volunteer gives me an opportunity to not only help monitor our Open Space lands but do some birding at the same time. I'm also a Volunteer for Hawks Aloft a local conservation group that monitors avian species and their relationship to their vegetative communities throughout the state.

"This year I monitored two Cooper's Hawk nests in the bosque, one just north of Montano on the West Side. Both nests had three young birds hatched, fledged (acquired the feathers necessary for flight), then began flying and left the immediate area of the nest. The adults can be very aggressive in protecting the nests when young are present. I've been attacked numerous times while observing the nest. (Never been injured or even hit) For this reason, we try to minimize disturbing the birds. People walking in the bosque should always seek to avoid the nests."

**G.P:** What benefits do you get from birding?

Maurice Mackey: "Birding in the bosque can be very rewarding. The most common birds found there are: Mourning Doves, White Breasted Nuthatch, Red Shafted Flicker, Black Chinned Hummingbirds, Downy Woodpecker, Blue Grosbeak, Summer Tanager and House Finches. Of course this is just a small sample of the birds one can see there in the summer. During spring and fall migrations many other birds can be seen. They make me feel good every day."

On behalf of the Open Space Division, we would like to thank all the volunteers who contributed to the success of our fall volunteer projects. Now that winter is here, we can take a break and spend some time enjoying our accomplishments.

For **Día del Río**, 91 dedicated volunteers came together to honor one of New Mexico's most precious natural resources, the Rio Grande. During the day volunteers, City Open Space staff, and our partner organization the West Central Alliance of Neighbors (WeCAN!): loaded an entire trash compactor full of trash from the bosque, in addition to removing large miscellaneous debris and tires; sorted recycling including glass, cardboard, plastic bags, and aluminum; and worked on trail improvements and remov-

ing invasive vegetation on the northwest corner on the Central Avenue bosque trail system.

On **Make a Difference Day**, which takes place the last Saturday of October each year, 41 volunteers joined the Open Space Division and our partner organization the Nicodemus Wilderness Project once again to work on improvements at the Piedra Lisa Open Space located in the Sandia Foothills at the end of Candelaria. Special thanks go to the Open Space Alliance for cosponsoring the event!

For **National Public Lands Day**, we celebrated with our annual Geocache Event, which attracted 44 volunteers who worked on projects in the southern end of the Sandia Foothills near Copper. Yummy bagels and snacks were enjoyed by all thanks to our sponsors Wolfe's Bagels and the Open Space Alliance.

Events like Día del Río, Make a Difference Day, and National Public Lands Day bring the entire community together to help protect our City's precious natural resources. *Thank you all for your participation and we look forward to working with you next year!*

# Trail Damage in the Foothills

Please continue to be on the lookout for the person or persons responsible for unauthorized trail work that has occurred between Indian School and Hilldale. This work has involved the use of pry bars and sledge hammers to remove natural rock from trails 365, 365 A, 401 and the Hilldale Loop. The rock being removed is from natural veins of granite that run across the trails and act as steps or ramps and serve as natural transitions from one elevation to another. By removing these rocks these trails are being destabilized and will be subject to erosion.

Please be on the look out and report anyone carrying tools, removing rocks and cutting back or removing vegetation without a uniformed Open Space employee present. Removing rocks, vegetation or altering the trails is considered vandalism to City property and destruction of natural resources and violators can be fined.

To report any suspicious trail work being done on Open Space land contact the Open Space Dispatcher at 452-5206 between the hours of 8AM to 5:00PM or call 242-COPS to report this activity to the Albuquerque Police Department. Specify that you are in an Open Space area and request an Open Space officer respond. To report damage that has already been done contact Jim Sattler at 452-5213. To report damage to Forest Service trails contact Kerry Wood at 281-3304.
