Paseo de la Mesa Multi-Use Trail Now Open

The City of Albuquerque's Open Space Division is proud to announce the opening of its newest bike trail!

Take a ride or a stroll on a new addition to the West Mesa trails network. The Paseo de la Mesa Trail runs from 81st Street (near to the Volcano Cliffs water tanks) up and west almost to Paseo de Volcan.

TRAIL HIGHLIGHTS INCLUDE:

•4.2 miles of paved trail uninterrupted by roadways!

•Enjoy close encounters with varied volcanic and geologic features!

•Great 360 degree view of the Jemez, Santa Fe, Sandia, Manzano, San Mateo, and Magdalena mountain ranges.

•Mount Taylor, the Ladron and Polvadera peaks, and Tomé Hill can all be picked out with the naked eye by knowledgeable trail-users!

Directions: From intersection of MONTAÑO Road and UNSER Blvd., proceed north on Unser up through the escarpment-cut; At top of grade, look to left for big water tanks and prepare to turn; Turn west/left on MOLTEN ROCK a short ways to stop sign; Turn south/left on 81st Street; Proceed south on 81st Street a short ways to trailhead entry and turn right/west into trailhead parking-lot; Follow directional signs from 81st and Molten Rock to lot.

As with all multi-use trails in the Albuquerque area, remember to be courteous at all times. You may encounter many different kinds of users on the trails. Expect to meet other bicyclists, walkers, persons in wheelchairs, in-line skaters, and possibly equestrians. Be aware that maintenance vehicles may be on the trail. Always remember that courtesy and caution are a part of having an enjoyable and safe trail ride. Enjoy the ride!

Please note that the Paseo de la Mesa Trail is recommended for advanced riders and hikers. Use caution, bring plenty of water, and always wear your helmet!

Dia del Rio 2010

They'll donate boats and run shuttles for any volunteers that are willing to help. (They won't be able to offer shuttles to people who have their own boats at this time). The Open Space Division started a beekeeping program three years ago as a test to see if keeping bee hives would be successful. The program started with two hives at Candelaria Farm Preserve and a year later a third bee hive was placed at the Open Space Visitor Center. This program would never have been possible without the dedicated volunteers who provided the bees and all materials including the hives themselves. The bee hive program has already yielded two batches of honey from the Open Space Visitor Center hive alone and generated almost \$500 for the Open Space Alliance. Since the program has been successful with our volunteers' hives, the Open Space Division plans to move forward with the purchase of City owned hives and our very own bees. We can't thank our volunteers enough! But we do try. The annual Open Space Volunteer Appreciation Dinner was held in August at the Open Space Visitor Center as a small token of our thanks. The Open Space volunteer program has been growing steadily over the years and the event was well attended, including volunteers from as far away as the Golden Open Space and Juan Tomas Open Space.

Trail Watch Volunteers received awards for the amount of hours they contributed, which ranged from a 25 hour Open Space Volunteer T-shirt to a 1000 hour Open Space Volunteer jacket. Special awards went out to a number of volunteers to recognize their special contributions to Open Space, including Charlie Wood for his help at the VC, his adoption of the Pino Trail, his work

on replacing faded trail signs at the Elena Gallegos and his help around the wildlife pond at the Elena. Special recognition awards were also given to Doug Calderwood for his commitment to the gardens; to Frank Ameduri for the extraordinary amount of time he dedicates to the facility, the gardens, and special projects; and to Dick Conway for the gorgeous podium he built and donated to the Center.

We'd also like to thank all of our Adoption groups who have been helping us maintain and improve our trail system. This years adoption Group of the Year went to Earth Web, who have been adopters of a trail in the Los Duranes area of the bosque, on the east side of the river, north of I-40. This section of the bosque burned in the summer of 2003. Earth Web adopted their trail in 2004, have been active partners ever since and have expanded their adopted area in 2009. CLIFFORD SMEED CRAWFORD

The Open Space Division and Albuquerque community mourns the loss of CLIFFORD SMEED CRAWFORD, Professor Emeritus of Biology. Dr. Crawford left an idelible mark on our City's history by helping found and manage the Bosque Ecosystem Monitoring Program (BEMP), in which hundreds of children and adults have participated. Dr. Crawford was born in Beirut, Lebanon on July 30th, 1932 and eventually made his way to Albuquerque. He had a strong passion for biology and above all loved the Rio Grande and its cottonwood bosque. Thousands of his students and friends carry the torch and continue to champion the river, the bosque, and all that makes it precious. He passed away on September 4th, 2010.

Margo Seaborn began volunteering for Open Space in November 2002, with her husband Rick, adopting a portion of Trail 365 south of Embudo Canyon. Margo was an avid cyclist and not only spent a lot of time patrolling trails on two wheels, but contributed to their upkeep. PAUL DAILY

Paul Daily was among the founding Trail Watch Volunteers, attending the very first training in 1994. Avid in his contributions to Open Space, Paul logged over 3,400 hours to the program. Jim Sattler fondly tells the story of Paul hiking up to a group of volunteers working hard on the repair of a trail, taking a long drink of water, and then, referring to his volunteer shirt, said, "The shirt says Trail Watch, not Trail Work." But Paul always went above and beyond expectations. He was among the first CIOTEs, or Community Interpreters Of The Environment, teaching thousands of children about Open Space and its extraordinary features. Early to rise, we became dependent on Paul's help opening the Elena Gallegos and foothill gates during times of trim staffing. He hosted Summer Series and taught a popular Map & Compass class, which transi-



tioned into a GPS class as technology took over. In fact, he was the first to make us aware of Geocaching and spearheaded the Open Space Division Geocaching guidelines. Every October he was atop Mesa Point Trail in Boca Negra Canyon during Balloon Fiesta guiding traffic movement and charming the visitors. He was a wonderful artist and a very clever poet and several pieces of his work were published in the Open Space News over the years. Paul was an important influence on the development of Open Space programming and, most importantyly, on the Open Space family. Paul Daily passed away on July 23, 2010.
