Residential Burglary Prevention

Residential burglary rates are generally dictated by the active involvement of individual citizens and cooperative education efforts by neighborhood associations and other community groups. Homeowners who are willing to take certain steps to prevent this type of crime along with the assistance of local law enforcement can reduce and sometimes prevent break-ins and burglaries. Consider the following prevention tips as well as ways to retrieve any lost or stolen property.

- Establish trusted relationships with neighbors on your block. Agree to watch out for each other and report any suspicious activity in and around your home. Remember residential burglaries statistically occur during the day so if possible, identify trusted neighbors who might be home during this time.
- Evaluate your existing lighting and pay particular attention to access points such as entry/exit doors and windows. Make sure that each area has adequate illumination so that your neighbors can see any suspicious activity occurring on your property. Consider adding motion sensors to lights in remote areas around the home.
- Each door should be metal or solid core with a deadbolt lock and a minimum 1" throw. Short strike plate screws should be replaced with 3-4" screws that secure the plate into the doorframe. Doors should also be equipped with 180-degree eye viewers. Consider a security screen door.
- Trim all bushes and shrubs below the window level and up from the ground. Trim mature trees up to a

level 6-8 feet above ground. Eliminate hiding places or areas that allow someone the opportunity to enter through a window without being noticed.

- All primary window locks should be in place and fully operational. Install secondary thumbscrew locks on guide rails. Place them in a location that prohibits the window from being opened more than a few inches. Also, make sure screens are in place and secure. (Note: Windows and pet doors are common illegal entry points)
- Install screws in the upper rail of sliding glass doors. Place them just far enough into the rail to prohibit the door from being lifted and removed. Dowel rods and "charley bars" are secondary methods to secure the door - but make sure the primary locking devise is operational.
- Non-forced entry burglaries are on the rise especially during warm weather months. Eliminate this possible access point by closing and locking garage doors, windows and front/back doors.

- Record Your Property: The Albuquerque Police Department encourages all residents to use a free online system that will help keep track of valuables and other personal items. Reportit is a **FREE**, secure online service allowing citizens to record serial numbers, item descriptions, pictures, scan receipts and upload images for phones, electronics and other valuables. Should those items ever be stolen, having the information will go a long way in accurately and quickly identifying your property for insurance claims and recovery. EPC Draft of Coors Corridor Plan

The City of Albuquerque Planning Department and Department of Municipal Development (DMD) have released the Environmental Planning Commission (EPC) Draft Plan for public review and comment. It is available online at <http://www.cabq.gov/planning/residents/sectordevelopment-plan-updates/coors-corridor-plan/> and as a hard copy from the Planning Department, 600 2nd Street NW, 3rd Floor. The Plan area covers 11 miles of Coors Boulevard between Bridge Boulevard and Alameda Boulevard, including the Bypass.

Thirty years have passed since the original plan was adopted...the Westside's population and urbanized area have increased dramatically. The new Plan proposes a multimodal transportation strategy for the Corridor to boost the capacity of these regional arterial roadways without widening them significantly. The recommended street crosssections for the 20-year horizon of the Plan accommodate three driving lanes, a dedicated bus lane, bike lane and sidewalk in each direction. The bus lanes would support a Bus Rapid Transit service on Coors, as proposed in the 2035 Metropolitan Transportation Plan. Three traffic congestion "hot spots" are addressed with elevated northbound lanes beyond Ouray, an interchange at Montaño and an eastbound flyover at Paseo del Norte. Other public projects aim to improve the appearance of the Corridor and connections for pedestrians and cyclists. The transportation element of the Plan is advisory to the New Mexico Department of Transportation (NMDOT), which controls the Coors Boulevard/Bypass rights-of-way.

The Rank 3 Plan also includes regulations for development adjacent to Coors Boulevard/Bypass to maintain a high standard of design in this well-travelled corridor on the Westside, which parallels the Rio Grande Valley. The Design Overlay Zone element of the Plan requires landscape setbacks and buffers and controls walls and fences, signage, lighting, etc. Where Coors Boulevard veers to the northeast and offers stunning views of the Sandia Mountains, the Plan has maintained some restrictions on the maximum height and mass of structures. Note that the Plan does not establish or change zoning (land uses) nor affect propertyowners' current development entitlements.

The update is guided by current City policy in higher-ranked plans, such as Activity Centers and Corridors in the Comprehensive Plan and site design recommendations in the Westside Strategic Plan. It also reflects community input received on an earlier Working Draft that was presented at Open Houses in the fall of 2013 and has been discussed with a range of stakeholder groups.

"Triple A's of Health Swimming"

With the summer month's right around the corner pool season will soon be upon us. As a community we need to take steps to keep our public pools clean and safe and prevent the spread of illness...because we don't want our summertime fun ruined.

Preventing pool-borne illness is both an individual and community effort. The CDC recommends following the "Triple A's of Healthy Swimming" to prevent the spread of recreational water illness.

Awareness

1. Keep the poop, pee and germs out of the water.

a) Don't swim when you have diarrhea (the most common form of recreational waterborne illness).

b) Take bathroom breaks every 60 minutes (or more frequently with little ones).

c) Never change diapers poolside as the germs could wash into the pool.

2. Wash your hands!

a) Especially after using the bathroom or changing diapers.

3. Avoid swallowing the water!

a) Teach your little ones not to swallow the water. Action

Before getting into the pool ask the pool manager/ operator:

- a. About free chlorine levels and pH. (Free chlorine should be between at 1 to 4 ppm and pH should be between 7.2 to 7.8).
- b. How often chlorine levels are checked (these should be checked at least two times a day).

Advocacy

c. Help educate other swimmers, friends, coworkers and family members on how to prevent water borne illness while swimming.

Parliamentary Pointers

Executive Session

"An executive session in general parliamentary usage has come to mean any meeting of a deliberative assembly or a portion of a meeting, at which the proceedings are secret. ... A meeting enters into executive session only when required by rule or established custom, or upon the adoption of a motion to do so. A motion to go into executive session is a question of privilege and therefore is adopted by a majority vote.

Whenever a meeting is being held in executive session only members of the body that is meeting, special invitees and such employees or staff members as the body or its rules may determine to be necessary are allowed to remain in the hall. Thus in the case of a board or committee meeting being held in executive session, all persons—whether or not they are members of the organization—who are not members of the board or committee (and who are not otherwise specifically invited or entitled to attend) are excluded from the meeting.

....The minutes or record of proceedings of an executive session must be read and acted upon only in executive session, unless that which would be reported in the minutes....was not secret.... When the minutes of an executive session must be considered for approval at an executive session held solely for that purpose, the brief minutes of the meeting are approved by that meeting." Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised, 11th Edition, pages 95-96.

The procedure for going into executive session can be an announcement by the chairman, "At this point in the meeting, the executive committee will convene an executive session. All other persons are excused."

If an officer feels that an executive session is necessary because of the sensitivity of the topic to be discussed that person can state, "Mr. Chairman, I believe this question should be considered in a closed meeting. I move that the open portion of this meeting be declared ended and that everyone except the executive committee be excused." The Chairman would then state, "The chair rules that the question is one of privilege to be handled immediately. It is moved and seconded that the stated issue will be addressed in executive session. Is there debate on the motion?" The motion is adopted by a majority vote. Then all persons involved in the executive session are excused.

If the executive session is held in the middle of a meeting the session reports to the membership when the executive session is completed. The session may include only discussion; then the members would return to the meeting and conduct a vote to adopt the issue discussed.


