## 2-67 PHOTOGRAPHIC ARRAY / FIELD IDENTIFICATIONS

#### 2-67-1 <u>Purpose</u>

The purpose of this policy is to provide guidelines for completing photo arrays and field identifications in criminal investigations.

#### <u>2-67-2</u> Policy

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<u>It is the policy of the Department policy is</u> to conduct photographic arrays and field identifications according to established legal principles and to provide an opportunity for victims and witnesses to <u>correctly</u> identify <u>correctly</u> suspects accused of committing crimes without the appearance of suggested identification.

#### 2-67-2 Rules Procedures

- A. Photographic Arrays
  - 1. Any photographic array shown by any officer will be recorded and will require the use of the Albuquerque Police Department Photographic Identification Form (PD 1336).
  - 2. A complete report containing the following information is required:
    - a. Name of person(s) to whom the array was shown.
    - b. Name of the suspect.
    - c. Type of identification made (positive, negative, or tentative).
    - d. Name and APD photo numbers of other persons shown in the photographic array.
    - e. Use of at least five photos.
    - f. All photographs used in the photographic array will be of persons similar in appearance to the suspect.
- B. Exceptions
  - 1. Photo arrays are not appropriate in the following circumstances, including but not limited to:
    - a. A suspect is personally known to the victim or witness.
    - b. A suspect has been arrested at the scene of a crime and in the presence of the victim or witnesses.
    - c. The victim or witnesses have apprehended the suspect.
