
Team of the Month Firearms Range Unit

APD Notables

Investigative Bureau

Criminal Investigation Division (CID)

- A vehicle equipped with a Global Positioning System (GPS) was tracked by the unit. Surveillance on this vehicle resulted in the recovery of three stolen vehicles and seven arrests.

Scientific Evidence Division (SED)

- SED conducted 1,272 calls for service.
- SED responded to 126 primary burglary calls and completed 965 reports.






