My ABQPD

The Albuquerque Police Department is launching a new mobile app providing real-time information at your fingertips.

APD formerly had the ABQ Police App where the public could submit tips, find a link to file reports and access the department's social media accounts. Now, APD is switching over to the Atlas One, APD has launched the My ABQPD app which is a communications platform that helps public safety agencies modernize the way they connect and interact with its residents and visitors. When the app has been downloaded, alerts can be catered to an individual's preferences whether that be for minor, up to extreme alerts.

Through the app, the public can also submit tips regarding on going investigations. For example, if a missing persons flyer is issued, the public can reply to the alert on the My ABQPD app and provide helpful information that could assist officers locate that individual.

Although the app has messaging capabilities, in case of an emergency please call 911. For non -emergencies, please call 242-COPS. Reports can be filed online, or in person at any area sub-station. The Atlas One can be downloaded on both the APPLE App store and on Google Play. If you have the old version of the APD app please remove from your devices.

To put that into perspective, APD receives about 1 million calls each year. By contrast, about 145,000 police reports are generated each year, which is more reflective of actual crimes. For that reason, the information illustrated should not be used to determine crime trends.

"Illicitly manufactured Fentanyl (IMF) is available on the drug market in different forms, including liquid and powder.

Powdered Fentanyl looks just like many other drugs. It is commonly mixed with drugs like heroin, cocaine, and methamphetamine and made into pills that are made to resemble other prescription opioids. Fentanyl-laced drugs are extremely dangerous, and many people may be unaware that drugs are laced with Fentanyl."

GENERAL CRIME PREVENTION TIPS

Being safer doesn't require changing your lifestyle, personality, or the things you enjoy doing. Planning ahead can keep you safer at home, at work, and while enjoying your favorite activities.

 Have your key in hand when approaching your residence. Waiting outside if anything appears suspicious—open door, broken windows, etc. Keep doors and windows locked at all times, consider supplementary locks if you leave a partially open window for ventilation. Leave a key with a trusted neighbor or family member. Never hide a key outside in a flower pot, under he doormat or in a fake rock. Trim landscaping for visibility. Utilize exterior lighting—leave exterior lights on all night. Consider motion sensor lighting for side of home. 	 Get involved in improving workplace safety, report needed repairs or safety concerns. Walk to and from parking areas with coworkers. Be discreet, don't advertise vacation plans or social activities to customers or clients. Report suspicious behavior or activity to security and/or management immediately. Escort visitors in secured areas. Let someone know where you will be and when you're expected back. Trust your instincts
 Advise someone of your route/routine before you head out. Vary your route and schedule so you are not predictable. Carry proper identification. Be aware and alert to your surroundings. Carry the necessary tools in case of an emergency. Avoid outdoor activities after dark Use personal protective gear Know your limits. Play well with others—invite your friends. Make safety a habit Everyone cant do everything, but everyone can do something. 	 Avoid walking alone, if possible. Walk with purpose and confidence, avoid distraction—cell phone, headphones. Choose busy, well-lit areas Walk facing traffic Keep your car in good working order. Have your key ready when approaching your car. Drive with doors locked and windows rolled up. Locate well-lit and frequently used bus stops. Check bus schedules in advance. Sit near the driver on buses Confirm the ride-share drivers rating Be a backseat rider Call and wait inside your ride-share
