- Jealousy
- Controlling Behavior

- Threats of Violence
- Force During Arguments
- Angers Easily When Drinking or Using Other Drugs
- Breaking or Striking Objects
- Discourages Other Friendships
- Threatens with Weapon
- Controls Your Schedule
- Accuses You of Being Unfaithful
- Controls All Finances
- Forces You to Have Sex

In an Emergency, Call 911

Call the police as soon as you can. Assault, even by a family member is a crime. Get medical attention, ask the medical staff to photograph your injuries and keep detailed record in the event action is necessary. Contact the court system about civil protection order. Leave the scene immediately.

If you haven't yet made it out to Balloon Fiesta and you see our Horse Mounted Unit on the field, please say hello! We have a new horse Scottie, and this is his first Balloon Fiesta he's working.

We officially launched a cutting-edge
Drone Program to boost crime-fighting
and community safety. Since August, the
drones have completed more than 200
flights and assisted in four arrests.
Housed in rooftop "hives" across the city,
the drones can deploy within seconds,
providing officers with real-time intelli-



gence and video before they arrive on scene. The program is already proving to be a game-changer—enhancing officer safety, gathering key evidence, and responding to incidents like ShotSpotter alerts within 90 seconds.

Crime Stoppers can now receive anonymous tips via text

ALBUQUERQUE – The Albuquerque Metro Crime Stoppers is now offering a text option to report crime.

To expand its reach and provide more reporting options for the community, the Albuquerque Metro Crime Stoppers can receive tips via text. Neither phone number nor IP addresses will be traced or stored, and are filtered out to restore anonymity and privacy.

Anyone with information about a crime can text a tip to "ABQCS" to 738477.

Tips can also be reported by phone at (505)-843-STOP or online at P3tips.com.

The non-profit organization was created by an Albuquerque Police detective in 1976 with the assistance of local media and has been accepting anonymous tips ever since. Tips that lead to an arrest are eligible for a reward.

Crime Stoppers serves several agencies in the Albuquerque metro area to include the Albuquerque Police Department, the Bernalillo County Sheriff's Office, Valencia County, Sandoval County, and Torrance County.

HALLOWEEN SAFETY TIPS



- TRICK OF TREATING SAFETY NECCESSITIES: GLOW STICK, FLASHLIGHT, REFLECTIVE TAPE APPLIED TO COSTUMES OR CANDY BAGS, EMERGENCY CONTACT INFORMATION CARD.
- TRY TO TRICK OR TREAT AS PART OF A LARGE GROUP AND WITH A RESPONSIBLE ADULT.
- EAT ONLY FACTORY WRAPPED TREATS.
- STAY ON WELL-LIT STREETS AND ALWAYS USE THE SIDEWALK.
- TALK WITH YOUR KIDS ABOUT NEVER ENTERING A CAR OR A HOME FOR A TREAT.
- IF YOU ARE DRIVINING AT NIGHT, MAKE SURE TO SLOW BE ALERT WHEN IN DOWN AND RESIDENTIAL NEIGHBORHOODS.














MEET YOUR OFFICER'S

SAFETY TIPS FOR FALL BACK

- Walk in groups.
- Know the area.
- Don't use headphones.
- Wear reflective gear.
- Have an emergency plan.
- If you exercise outside when dark, wear light colored, reflective clothes and something that blinks, such as a headlamp.

BALLOON FIESTA SAFETY TIPS

OCTOBER 4TH-12TH

- Always roll up car windows, lock the doors and take the keys even if you will be away for a short time.
- Remove ALL items from your vehicle whenever possible, but at the very least remove items from view – even items that might have the perception of value. Don't give a car thief a reason to break in.
- Do not leave unsecured firearms in your car. Thieves know that some people travel with firearms for safety.
- Establish a meeting point ahead of time incase you get separated from your group especially with the large crowds.
- Follow safety protocol. Avoid contact with the balloons and follow the pilots instructions.
