Items left in unattended vehicles that were stolen: Personal papers, tote bag, personal information, purse, wallet, IDs, 4 credit cards, checkbook and checks, insurance cards, \$1,200 in cash, 32" TV, refrigerator, DVD player and remotes.

Quick take-aways: Leaving anything of value or with personal information in a parked car is opening yourself up to being a target for an auto burglary. Clear your vehicle of valuables, items with personal information and lock up. "Hiding" a purse under the front seat does not work – auto burglars know to check under the seat, side pockets, gloves boxes and center consoles. The purse hidden under the front seat yesterday yielded a burglar the purse, wallet, 4 credit cards, the checkbook, insurance cards and \$1,200 in cash. The items that were stolen often lead to identity theft – a huge mess that takes the victim on average 2 years to clear up. Pare down what you leave in your vehicle when you walk away and practice good crime prevention in everyday life.
