CRIME PREVENTION TIPS

Starting A Neighborhood Watch

The following steps show how to start a Neighborhood Watch in your neighborhood.

- 1. You or a neighbor decides to host an initial Neighborhood Watch meeting.
- 2. Whoever is going to host the meeting calls the APD Crime Prevention Office at (505) 768-2006 to provide their name, address and phone number. After making the call, the Crime Prevention Office will send a "starter packet" that will include, among other items, a form to collect information from your neighbors.
- 3. The host or designee goes up and down the block contacting the neighbors and recording their name, address and phone number on the form.
- 4. The host then sends the completed list back to the Crime Prevention Office in the self-addressed envelope provided in the starter packet.
- 5. After the CP Office receives the list from the interested party, a Crime Prevention Specialist will contact the host to set up a date and time for the Neighborhood Watch meeting.
- 6.The CR Specialist will then mail out invitations to each person whose name appears on the list. Fliers will also be sent to the host to be given out to the neighbors as a "last minute" reminder.
- 7. At the meeting, the host provides chairs and simple refreshments.
- 8. The Crime Prevention Specialist will conduct the meeting and towards the end, facilitate the group's selection of a Block Captain who will function as the neighborhood leader and will serve as a contact person for the Albuquerque Police Department.
- 9. The Block Captain is responsible for contacting new neighbors and for providing updated information to the Crime Prevention Office (Block Captain replacement, etc).
- 10. The block is now organized and may collectively purchase Neighborhoods Organized Against Crime (NOAC) Street Signs. The signs may be ordered (by the Block Captain only) through the Crime Prevention Office. The Block Captain may also join the Albuquerque Block Captains Association (ABCA). The block can also officially participate in the annual National Night Out celebration held the first Tuesday of August each year.

Definitions

Burglary – Unauthorized entry of any vehicle, watercraft, aircraft, dwelling or other structure, moveable or immovable, with the intent to commit a felony or theft therein.

Robbery – Consists of the theft of anything of value from the person of another or from the immediate control of another, by use or threatened use of force or violence.

Motor Vehicle Theft – Consists of a person taking any vehicle or motor vehicle intentionally and without consent of the owner.

This information is pulled from daily Calls for Service, which reflects all calls made to APD's 911 Emergency Communications Center. It does not reflect all crimes that police investigate, nor the final outcome of crimes investigated. Furthermore it may not reflect the true location of crimes as they may have occurred in a different location from which they are reported.

To put that into perspective, APD receives about 500,000 calls for service each year. By contrast, about 120,000 police reports are generated each year, which is more reflective of actual crimes. For that reason, the information illustrated should not be used to determine crime trends.

All attached crime numbers are preliminary numbers based on calls for service and pulled directly from the CADS system



The Atlas One app will automatically send you an alert when a public safety issue occurs near your current location, or places you care about, such as your home, school, or office.



Message from Chief Medina

I hope everyone had an enjoyable holiday season with your friends and families. Thank you to all of our staff that worked through the holidays and spent time away from your loved ones, we appreciate all that you do to help keep our community safe.

As we begin a new year, I am reflecting on our successes of 2023, and how we can improve as a department into 2024. Last year, we continued to have tremendous progress within our Homicide Unit. We hit a clearance rate of more than 90%, and we saw a significant decline in homicides as well.

As a department, we also had multiple divisions working proactive operations throughout the city which we know had a positive impact on crime. From the shoplifting operations that impacted quality of life issues at our shopping centers, to our Traffic Division, doubling citations from the year prior making our roadways safer, to our Downtown TEAM overtime, which has made vast improvements for those who live and work Downtown.

There is much more I want to focus on in the year ahead. This year will mark my fourth year as Chief and I'm incredibly proud of the work we've accomplished. Looking ahead, I plan to share more information regularly with our community on progress we are making on the DOJ Court Approved Settlement Agreement, recruiting, crime and community engagement.

As part of this effort, I'd like to share the Chief's Weekly Snapshot showing where we've seen a decline in crime categories and where we have room to improve. The percentages below show the preliminary stats from 2023 compared to 2022, the other data are total numbers for 2023.

Thank you to our community for your continued support and for working with us as we continue to grow and evolve as a law enforcement agency.
