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How to Start A Neighborhood Watch

Welcome to the New Year. The Crime Prevention Unit is working very hard to continue to recruit new Neighborhood Watch programs. If you know of anyone who is interested in starting a Neighborhood Watch program please contact Pete Gelabert, Crime Prevention Specialist for the NW Area Command at, 505-768-4873 and or e mail Pete at pgelabert@cabq.gov.

- 1. You or a neighbor decides to host an initial Neighborhood Watch meeting.
- 2. Whoever is going to host the meeting calls Pete Gelabert, NW Area Command Crime Prevention Specialist at, 505-768-4873, and or E mail Pete at pgelabert@cabq.gov, to provide their name, address and telephone number. Pete Gelabert will send a starter packet to you.
- 3. The host or designee goes up and down the block contacting the neighbors and recording their name, address and phone number on the form.
- 4. The host then sends the completed neighborhood list back to Pete Gelabert, Crime Prevention Specialist..
- 5. Crime Prevention Specialist, Pete Gelabert will contact the host to set up a date and time for the Neighborhood Watch meeting.
- 6. At the meeting, the host provides chairs and simple refreshments.
- 7. The Crime Prevention Specialist will conduct the meeting and towards the end, facilitate the group's selection of a Block Captain who will function as the neighborhood leader and will serve as a contact person for the Albuquerque Police Department.
- 8. The Block Captain is responsible for contacting new neighbors and for providing updated information to the Crime Prevention Office (Block Captain replacement, etc.).
- 10. The block is now organized and may collectively purchase Neighborhoods Organized Against Crime (NOAC) Street Signs. The signs may be ordered (by the Block Captain only) through the Crime Prevention Office. The Block Captain may also join the Albuquerque Block Captains Association (ABCA). The block can also officially participate in the annual National Night Out celebration held the first Tuesday of August each year.

All attendees (members) are encouraged to submit recommendations, provide input concerning recommendations, ask questions and submit topics for discussion.

Community Partnership and Outreach:

APD'S COAST Outreach (Crisis Outreach and Support Team):

The COAST team continues to work with the West Side Homeless shelter, service providers and Field Officers to ensure that the homeless and most vulnerable are being offered shelter and resources. Service providers are continuing to do homeless outreach throughout the City.

Coffee with a Cop: at various restaurant locations:

Coffee with a Cop is an opportunity to interact with the officers assigned to their neighborhoods and ask questions, voice concerns, and get to know the police officers in your community.

Cop on the Corner: at various neighborhood locations.

The Albuquerque Police Department launched a new program called "Cop on the Corner" to help build relationships with the communities where officers patrol. The program will give people the opportunity to attend police field briefings where they can interact with the officers assigned to their neighborhoods. The day shift officers and swing shift officers hold briefings at various neighborhoods.

Business Coalition meetings:

We have three community business locations. The Westside area businesses, Riverside area businesses and the Cottonwood area businesses. We are working with the businesses to identify and reduce criminal activity. In the meetings we will identify the business stake holders that will be involved, concerns on any type of criminal activity. We will talk about resources that can be used to deter and reduce criminal activity and provide crime prevention training, business security assessments and educate the businesses concerning property crimes.

Crime Prevention, Neighborhood Watch Program:

The NW Area Command has over 100 neighborhood watch programs and block captains. We have established an excellent rapport and understanding of the needs and concerns of the neighborhoods and block captains within their respected neighborhoods. The block captain/officer initiative program strengthens the ties between the officers, and the community.

ADAPT Program (Abandoned & Dilapidated Abatement Property Team):

The program identifies and addresses abandoned and /or dilapidated properties that become public nuisance because they have a pattern of calls for service, serious criminal activity or because they pose a public safety threat. The goal is to work with property owners to increase the health, safety, and welfare of the buildings and the community. Through community policing we will reduce crime and increase quality of life in the area.







The Northwest Problem Response Team is constantly working to build positive relationships with the community through community outreach, tac plans with local businesses, and events with youth centers and schools.

The PRT currently includes Officer Brandon Forsberg, Officer Sean Morper, Officer Patrick Garcia, and has been supervised by Sergeant George Gabaldon. Sergeant Gabaldon has been with the Albuquerque Police Department since June of 2004 and has served in the Field Services Bureau, Open Space Unit, General Crimes Investigations, the Downtown Community Policing Unit and now is the Sergeant for NW PRT. Sergeant Gabaldon is retiring this December after a fulfilling career in the APD. His supervision, experience, positive outlook and sense of humor will be missed!

During the month of December, the NW PRT has been focusing heavily on having a presence in the large retail centers within the NW Area Command. By coordinating with the managers of retail businesses, loss prevention associates and a presence of marked patrol vehicles, it is the goal to deter shoplifting along with creating a safe environment during the busiest shopping season of the year.

To further the partnerships with businesses within the NW Area Command, PRT units have been working hand in hand with Walgreens to stop the frequent shoplifting and allow the workers and customers to feel safer in the stores. PRT units are working to become on a first name basis with the employees of the Walgreens within the NW area command and increase our presence in and around these retail stores.



To help with these efforts, two Officers have been allowed to be temporarily assigned to the NW PRT. Officers Arthur Acosta and Ricky Copeland have spent 2 weeks respectfully, assigned to the NW PRT. These additional resources have been greatly appreciated. To further the use of resources, the use if bike patrols will be used around the Cottonwood Mall area for and increased police presence.
