Aircra	2-15 Small Unmanned aft Systems (SUAS) ations	Presented by: Sergeant Brandon Wesenberg	
Discussion:	Sergeant Wesenberg explained that the only change in the policy was adding information about SUAS drones that will be deployed by FSB personnel. Question: I assume the drones will be used for search issues? Answer: Search issues is a good use for the drones and also for felony stops to get a full 360 degree view of the vehicle, and for search warrants. Question: Is there a plan to compare data with Canine (K-9) Unit deployments? Answer: Only some units are actively using the drones and are trained to use them. All of the data from the drones will be recorded but there are no data to compare with K-9 as this moment. Question: Will the drones be the used to take photographs and videos for demonstrations? Answer: If it is within Department guidelines, the drones will be used to take video and photographs. Question: Why was language about retention of SUAS data taken out of the policy? Answer: A conversation with the Attorney General's Office determined that it should be taken out. Question: Will drones be used to deploy powder, for an example, during a house fire? Answer: No, these drones will not be able to do that.
