We also had some great community engagement events with several of our fantastic businesses in the Southeast and our schools as well.


I would like to present just one of many, examples, of how every day, your officers are helping our community here in the Southeast. Sergeant Dave Griffin and his officers responded to a call here in the Area Command where they were dispatched to check on the welfare of a child in the custody of her mother who was a reported drug addict. During the contact Officers observed the lack of items in the child's room that would normally be in a child's bedroom (e.g., bed, dresser, toys, clothes, etc...) which was cause for concern for the officers. As a team, Sergeant Griffin and his officers organized and gathered items for this child. They had a new bed, a mattress, a dresser, some toys and other items along with a \$100 gift card to Walmart and two \$10 gift cards to the movies. After the child was placed into the custody of an approved guardian, Sergeant Griffin and his officers, set up the bed and furniture, which the child loved. Even being only six-years old, she felt the positive impact of your officers.

TIP HOTLINE: 505-843-STOP

Albuquerque Metro Crime Stoppers is a community program that relies on anonymous tips to solve crimes and to locate fugitives from justice. Without anonymity of callers, the program cannot be effective.

Crime Stoppers pays rewards only for anonymous tips. Tipsters who identify themselves are not eligible for a reward.

Crime Stoppers has sole discretion to decide the amount of any reward to be paid, from zero to \$1,000.

Crime Stoppers will pay rewards only for tips given directly to it. Any tip given to another source, such as law enforcement, will not be eligible for a Crime Stoppers reward.

Crime Stoppers does not pay rewards to any person who has a legal duty to assist in the arrest of suspects and fugitives.

#### THE NETHERWOOD PARK NEIGHBORHOOD ASSOCIATION - HISTORY, GOALS, & DREAMS (1890-2023)

The Netherwood Park Neighborhood Association (NPNA) is the volunteer membership organization of people living, owning property, and working in the area bounded by Indian School Rd, I-40, Carlisle Blvd, and North

Diversion Channel; <u>your neighborhood!</u> NPNA works with neighbors, local government officials, and business leaders to advocate neighborhood safety, upkeep of 2 city parks (Netherwood Park and Urban Forest/Miracerros Park), and social events.



Netherwood Park is a residential neighborhood, mainly single-family homes, with some apartments, townhouses, and condominiums (about 900 residents). This neighborhood's history goes back to the 1890's when

Albuquerque had only 4,000 residents, 4 public schools, and a state university with only 7 staff members (see more <u>History</u> at NPNA website). In addition to its 2 parks, there is the Tennis Club of Albuquerque (TCA) and fitness center for recreation, at least one church, and numerous small businesses who provide their services. The NPNA board communicates with APD, stays in touch with our City Councilor Tammy Fiebelkorn (District 7), and other elected officials, and work in support of safety, small business and overall economic development of the area. We communicate

and work with local schools (Montezuma elem, Jefferson MS, ABQ High, and UNM) as well as adjacent Summit Park and North Campus NA's to the south (which include restaurants and other businesses that neighbors use). At our east boundary is the 2100 Carlisle (Whole Foods) that is under construction for a variety of commercial developments. Albuquerque's vast

network of bike trails (over 400 miles) can be easily accessed at the NPNA western boundary at the North Diversion Channel Trail, adjacent to the UNM 9-hole golf course. Urban Forest offers a 0.5 mile off the beaten path with critters & native plants



If you would like to get involved, here's what to do. Become a member (see below). Typically, we have monthly Board meetings where we present/discuss budgets, crime statistics, current issues, plan upcoming events and activities. As an all-volunteer organization we maintain active Neighborhood Association status with the City &

State, collect dues and use that money to support/plan/conduct events and activities yearlong that encourage a sense of community in the NPNA; calendar, next page). Some of these events include: NPNA Annual Meeting, Wednesday Bite Nites (food trucks, activities in the park), July 4<sup>th</sup> parade (firetruck, games, watermelon, piñatas, music), NPNA-wide yard sale, Chuck Maguire Annual Golf scramble, quarterly trash pickup, and Balloon Blast (donuts, coffee at dawn in Netherwood Park). We also

sponsor a strong network of Neighborhood Watch Block Captains. Recently completed a **TreeNM program** that distributed 200 trees in the neighborhoods!

Maintaining pride and improving communication among neighbors is paramount to a good life. Current President Bill Gannon said, "We really want every street in the NPNA to have an active Block Captain who can communicate with every home on each street...and through the Watch we have a community, we have trust, and wave goodbye to fear." NPNA also works with Maia Mullen and Joe Brooks, presidents of North Campus and Summit Park NAs, respectively, to repair and upgrade the streetscape along Girard, NE, and pushing an effort to address speeding and high rate and severity of accidents along Indian School, NE. By clearly identifying problems in our community, and then getting all voices heard to address these problems,

we can then improve. Even in divided times, all things are possible. Things we do honestly bring a certain integrity and sense of place to us as humans. It makes us humble and at times awestruck, but all the while we all are working to make all lives better where we live and that is what makes for a good life.

#### A BRIEF ORIGIN/HISTORY OF URBAN FOREST PARK

Thirty years ago, a neighborhood group was formed by Kent Stout, later a president of NPNA, in opposition to the construction of 400 residential units on a tract of land west of Indian Plaza Shopping Center and east of Notre Dame. Construction of curbs and gutters had already begun, with no prior notice given to surrounding neighbors. The developer claimed that a notice several years earlier sufficed. At that time, at the request of the then developer, the neighborhood had relaxed single family dwelling and height restriction covenants. After numerous meetings, dates in Metro Court, and two trips to the New Mexico Supreme Court, the neighborhood group prevailed, and the developer was required to reduce the number of units by approximately one half. The case set legal precedent in allowing "late" intervention by neighborhoods.

Subsequently, another developer wanted neighbors to agree to R-3 (multi-family, townhouses apartments) in lieu of R-1 (single family) and also proposed to build in what is now Urban Forest Park, which had been included as a park in the original plat. In a case against



the second developer, the neighborhood group again prevailed and convinced the developer to donate the park to the neighborhood. The neighborhood group formed La Selva de Albuquerque (The Forest of Albuquerque), a non-profit 501 (c)(3) organization, to permit the developer to donate to a tax-exempt organization, thus allowing him a tax break. Neighborhood resident Sandy Eastham, a member of the City Council at the time, was able to obtain funds for development of Urban Forest Park, and La Selva then donated the property to the City. La Selva was dissolved in 1984. (This history was provided in 1997 by Kent Stout, transmitted by John Vittal)
